On November 30, 2015, I was working the midnight shift (10:45pm-6:45am) as a uniformed officer in marked cruiser #4 in the town of Stow. Also working the shift was Officer DeZago.

At approximately 2:22am, Officer DeZago and I, along with Stow Fire/EMS Rescue 16 and ProEMS ALS, were dispatched to 219 Taylor Road for a report of a possible unresponsive male. It should be noted 219 Taylor Road is a group home owned by Advocates, Inc.

On arrival, I observed a male party walking up to the front door of the building, later identified as Advocates, Inc. Staff Member [REDACTED]. I asked [REDACTED] what was going on; he responded that he did not know. I then asked [REDACTED] if he had called 9-1-1 about someone who was unresponsive; he stated 'Bob' [REDACTED] called and he did not know what was going on. I followed [REDACTED] inside the residence and [REDACTED] met us at the bottom of the staircase. [REDACTED] stated Brendan REILLY was in his bedroom and was not waking up. It should be noted REILLY has a history of mental illness and is known to abuse prescription medications. Both [REDACTED] and [REDACTED] brought me to REILLY's bedroom where he was laying on his back, half on the bed and half off the bed. I shouted REILLY's name and shook him to check for responsiveness; REILLY did not respond. REILLY's breathing also did not appear normal. I then updated dispatch and requested assistance from [REDACTED] to get REILLY onto a hard surface, the floor, to continue an assessment. As we started to bring REILLY to the floor, he opened his eyes, grunted, and quickly closed his eyes again and appeared to fall asleep. REILLY's breathing appeared to be more normal and I placed him in the recovery position on the bed. Shortly thereafter, Stow Fire/EMS arrived and began their assessment. Stow Fire/EMS and Pro EMS ALS transported REILLY to Emerson Hospital.

While in REILLY's bedroom, I observed approximately 40-50 pink oval pills with '44329' imprinted on them spread out on the bedstand right next to REILLY's bed. I recognized these pills to be Benadryl. There were also approximately five (5) empty Benadryl containers throughout REILLY's bedroom.

I then spoke with [REDACTED]. [REDACTED] stated approximately one hour ago, REILLY went to his room and told him he had something for him in his bedroom. At that time, [REDACTED] and REILLY went to REILLY's bedroom. There, REILLY handed [REDACTED] two (2) white round pills that he recognized to be his Ativan. [REDACTED] stated he recognized the packaging that the pills came in to be his. [REDACTED] stated REILLY also took some pills but he did not know how many. [REDACTED] stated REILLY told him that he stole the pills from the locked staff office where all the medications are kept in a locked cabinet. [REDACTED] stated he noticed REILLY began to become sleepy and told him that he "felt good". [REDACTED] stated he tried to make REILLY some coffee but after an hour, REILLY laid down on his bed and fell asleep. [REDACTED] stated he checked on REILLY several times and when he noticed REILLY's breathing started to become shallow and he wouldn't wake up, he decided to call 9-1-1. [REDACTED] advised me that before calling 9-1-1 he asked [REDACTED] to check on REILLY but was told to give REILLY privacy. [REDACTED] advised me that when the dispatcher requested to speak with a staff member, [REDACTED] refused to speak on the phone because he thought REILLY was fine. I asked [REDACTED] where REILLY put the pills and the packaging; he stated the last time he saw them, they were on the night stand table next to his bed.

Officer DeZago then spoke with [REDACTED] and Officer DeZago went to the staff office, where [REDACTED] used his key to enter, and observed the black cabinet to be open, which is normally closed and locked. [REDACTED] reported the black cabinet was last seen closed and locked at approximately 12:00am when he gave REILLY an antacid. [REDACTED] also reported the small safe inside the black cabinet was also open, which is usually closed but

not locked, in which he noticed [REDACTED]; Ativan was missing from this small safe. [REDACTED] stated there were 52 pills left in the package that was missing. [REDACTED] stated it did not appear any other pills were missing. It should be noted one of the office windows was found to be unlocked but closed and the screen was in place. It should also be noted, [REDACTED] showed me that the key that is used to lock and unlock the medication locker is located approximately 5' away from the locker which was supposed to be locked up but was not when [REDACTED] accessed the key during this time.

I then asked [REDACTED] when the last time he saw REILLY; he stated at approximately 1:30am when REILLY requested a cigarette. [REDACTED] stated he appeared to be acting normally at that time. I then asked [REDACTED] if he had noticed or heard REILLY and [REDACTED] up around the house; he stated no. [REDACTED] stated he was upstairs the whole time in the livingroom watching TV and did not notice anything unusual going on. [REDACTED] stated [REDACTED] came to him as he was already on the phone with 9-1-1. [REDACTED] stated he tried to speak to the dispatcher but [REDACTED] would not allow him to have "privacy" to speak on the phone. I asked [REDACTED] why he was outside when I arrived; he stated he was retrieving his personal cell phone charger from his vehicle because his cell phone was going dead.

During this time, [REDACTED] called his supervisor. While on the phone, [REDACTED] entered REILLY's room where [REDACTED] found the missing medication package located under the side table next to REILLY's bed. The package listed [REDACTED] as the patient and the medication to be Lorazepam 1mg, Ativan. [REDACTED] again stated there was supposed to be 52 pills left in the package and there were zero (0) left. [REDACTED] again stated this medication is kept in the unlocked safe in the locked medication cabinet in the locked staff office. I advised dispatch to update Stow Fire/EMS regarding this new information. Photographs were taken and are attached to this report.

REILLY is being charged with the following:

94c/37 Larceny of a Drug (Ativan)

266/16/B Break into a Depository

A verbal report was made with Jorge at the Disabled Persons Protection Commission (DPPC), case #CP-35014, and this report will be faxed.

Nothing further at this time.
