THE COURT: Okay. So, gentlemen, I just want to remind you that there's a sequestration order in effect for this matter.

You're not to discuss this matter with anyone, and there's to be no discussion of this matter by anyone in this room until there is a formal report issued. With that, you can step outside. Thank you.

[Witnesses exiting]

THE COURT: Are there any preliminary matters that need to be addressed, Ms. Lynch, or -- No?

MR. PASCIUCCO: Just briefly, Your Honor.

THE COURT: Yeah.

MR. PASCIUCCO: Your Honor, my client is expected to testify today. And it's our position that he will testify. And I have no issue with him answering questions from Assistant District Attorney Lynch. However, I've advised him not to answer questions posed by Attorney Koufman. So, if Attorney Koufman does ask him questions, which I understand he'll -- he will be allowed to question witnesses, my client's going to respond that upon advice of counsel he has elected not to answer the question.

THE COURT: Okay. Well, we'll address that when it's time for him to testify. Okay? All right. Ms. Lynch, you want to call your first witness?

Thank you. Sergeant Patrick Silva, please. MS. LYNCH: 1 [SERGEANT PATRICK SILVA, Previously Sworn.] 2 MS. LYNCH: May I proceed, Your Honor? 3 THE COURT: You may. MS. LYNCH: Thank you. 5 DIRECT EXAMINATION OF WITNESS, SERGEANT PATRICK SILVA 6 BY MS. LYNCH: 7 Good morning, sir, would you please identify yourself, state 8 your name, and spell your last name for the record? 9 Sergeant Patrick Silva, S-I-L-V-A. 10 Α What is your occupation, sir? 11 I work as a Sergeant for the Reading Police Department. 12 How long have you been with the Reading Police Department? 13 0 14 Α Ten years. Of those ten years, how long have you held the rank of 15 16 sergeant? Almost five. 17 Α Now, sir, directing your attention to Friday, February 2nd of 18 2018, did you work for the Reading Police on that Friday night? 19 No. Α 20 And directing your attention to the following day, Saturday, 21 February 3rd of 2018, were you on duty with the Reading Police 22 that day? 23 Α Yes. 24

What were your hours that day?

25

- 1 A 3:00 p.m. to 1:00 a.m.
- 2 | Q And on that particular date, what time did you arrive at work
- 3 | that day?
- 4 A Probably about twenty of or quarter of three o'clock.
- 5 Q And when you arrived at work that day, where did you report
- 6 | to initially?
- 7 A The sergeant's office at the -- at the police station.
- 8 Q And was anyone there when you arrived at the sergeant's
- 9 office?
- 10 A I don't know if he was inside the sergeant's office, but I
- 11 | spoke with Lieutenant McKenna, who was the OIC of the dayshift
- 12 that day.
- 13 Q Now, in terms of the shift that you were responding to, what
- 14 was your role as the sergeant that evening?
- 15 A So, because my shift overlaps on two different ends, I
- 16 would've been a patrol supervisor from 3:00 p.m. to 4:00 p.m., and
- 17 | then I would've assumed the role of the officer in charge between
- 18 the hours of 4:00 p.m. and midnight.
- 19 Q And that would be in the normal course; --
- 20 A Yes.
- 21 Q -- is that right?
- 22 A Yes
- 23 Q Now, on this particular date when you arrived at work what
- 24 | did you do to familiarize yourself with any activities going on in
- 25 Reading at the time that you were reporting for duty?

- 1 A So, I do what I always typically do, which is I use our
- 2 | computer system, our CAD system which is called Micro Systems, to
- generate the log of the previous few days. I work a four-on-and-
- 4 four-off, so I'm off for a number of days in between my -- my
- 5 | shifts. So, I tried to s -- scan the log to see any kind of major
- 6 incidents that have been going on or ongoing things that I need to
- 7 be aware of as I take control of the shift.
- 8 Q Now, in terms of the shifts at the Reading Police, did the
- 9 officers that were doing patrol -- did they respond at three
- 10 o'clock, as well, or was their time staggered?
- 11 A So, the -- I am the only person that works -- On that
- 12 particular day, I was the only person that -- working the
- 13 3:00 p.m. to 1:00 a.m. shift. The other officers either work a
- 14 dayshift which runs from 7:00 a.m. to 5:00 p.m. or an evening
- 15 | shift which runs from 4:00 p.m. to midnight.
- 16 Q Now, how long did it take you to familiarize yourself with
- 17 the entries in the Reading Police electronic system?
- 18 A I probably scanned them for 15 minutes or so.
- 19 Q And on that -- in that occasion did you have an opportunity
- 20 to review information concerning an incident at 1462 Main Street
- 21 | the previous evening?
- 22 A Yes.
- 23 Q Now, in addition to reviewing the electronic information, did
- 24 | you also speak to Lieutenant McKenna?
- 25 A Yes.

- I | Q Now, initially when you responded to that location, was there
- 2 anything unusual going on when you first arrived?
- 3 A No, business as usual.
- 4 Q Now, at some point as you were -- Now, -- Strike that. Just
- 5 to go back: regarding the address 1462 Main Street, prior to
- 6 | reading that report about the previous evening, were you familiar
- 7 | with that address before?
- 8 A Yes.
- 9 Q Had you ever responded to that location before?
- 10 A Yes.
- 11 Q On approximately how many occasions?
- 12 A At least a handful of times for -- for various different
- 13 things. May -- Maybe upwards of almost 10 times, including all
- 14 | the different reasons I would respond to that location for -- for
- 15 | various reasons.
- 16 | Q What were those reasons?
- 17 A So, mo -- most of them were for domestic-related calls or
- 18 domestic disturbances. But there was also occasions I was there
- 19 | for gas disputes. It's a gas station as well as a -- a business.
- 20 | So maybe a business dispute of some kind. And there was also a
- 21 | break-and-enter that happened that I was up there for that I
- 22 investigated one time.
- 23 O Now, in terms of your familiarity with that location, had any
- 24 of those prior calls involved an individual named Alan Greenough?
- 25 A Yes.

- 1 Q And how many of those instances?
- 2 A Those would've been all of the domestic-related incidents.
- 3 | So, at least a handful of times. Three, four, five probably.
- 4 | Q Now, were you familiar with Devin McDonald or Kim Bellino
- 5 prior to that time?
- 6 A No. That was my first interaction, I believe, with -- with
- 7 Mr. McDonald.
- 8 Q Now, on this particular evening who was scheduled to comprise
- 9 | the evening shift, four to midnight?
- 10 A So, the evening shift would've been four patrol officers.
- 11 And that would be Officer Drauschke, Officer Savio, Officer
- 12 | Fontes, and Officer Vatcher.
- 13 Q And when you initially arrived, were any of those three still
- 14 | there -- four still at the station?
- 15 A Not when I arrived at just prior to 3:00, no.
- 16 Q Now, as you were at the station getting ready for the shift
- 17 to start at four o'clock, those officers' shift to begin at four
- 18 o'clock, did you become aware of a situation that was occurring at
- 19 | that proximate time?
- 20 A Yes.
- 21 Q And what did you become aware of?
- 22 | A Reading dispatch put out a -- a -- a broadcast for a -- a
- 23 domestic-type incident at -- at the gas station, there at East
- 24 | Coast Gas. And the -- So the dayshift units were advised of that
- 25 Three patrol officers working the dayshift were advised of that.

- I \mid The call, I believe, initially came in from a -- a female, the --
- 2 | the person you mentioned, Kim, who indicated that she had been
- 3 assaulted and that she had left that residence. So now we were
- 4 | having officers respond to that residence to investigate that --
- 5 that call for service.
- 6 Q Okay. And how were you made aware of this? Was it through
- 7 | radio, through phone?
- 8 A I think I heard it over the radio. But my office is directly
- 9 adjacent to dispatch, so I don't know if I heard it through actual
- 10 human speaking or through -- through the radio. But I heard it
- 11 | starting to occur.
- 12 | Q And in terms of the officers that were reporting for the
- 13 evening shift, did any of them begin to come in as this call had
- 14 | come into the station?
- 15 A Yes. I don't remember exactly what time, but those officers
- 16 | started to respond in by about twenty of or quarter of four
- 17 o'clock, prior to their shift starting.
- 18 Q Now, in terms of the information regarding the call, did you
- 19 | at that time recognize it to be the location from the prior
- 20 | evening?
- 21 A Yes.
- 22 | Q Now, at that time as you and Lieutenant McKenna -- was it? --
- 23 A Yes.
- 24 Q -- were in the process of transferring command of the
- 25 department, can you tell us what if anything you did?

- 1 | A Well, because I recognized the address from the night prior
- 2 and knew that a criminal application was being sought against --
- 3 | against Mr. Greenough for some criminal charges, I went back to
- 4 | the log to -- to verify what had happened the night prior. And --
- 5 And as I was being updated as to what was happening, that day on
- 6 | Saturday.
- 7 Q And when you reviewed the report, did you take any action
- 8 with respect to the officers on the scene in terms of informing of
- 9 informing them of the information in the log?
- 10 A Yes. I started to just update them and advise them. I
- wasn't sure if they knew or they were aware that we had been at
- 12 that address the -- the night prior and that -- for a similar-type
- 13 | incident and that there was a -- a report filed by Officer Vatcher
- 14 | in which criminal charges were being sought.
- 15 Q And with regard to that, that was over the radio?
- 16 A Yes.
- 17 | Q And did you advise them in that radio transmission that there
- 18 was PC for Mr. Greenough for two counts of assault and battery
- 19 against two roommates?
- 20 A Yes.
- 21 Q Now, in terms of the response to that location, at some point
- 22 did you become aware that the officers were having some difficulty
- 23 getting into the residential premises?
- 24 A Yes.
- 25 Q Now, at that time had you assigned anyone to do anything with

- 1 | respect to the two roommates who were not onsite?
- 2 A Yes. I -- I believe it was Officer Fontes that I initially
- 3 dispatched or ordered basically over the radio or -- to go to
- 4 where they were. And I believe that was just over the line at the
- 5 | -- at the Lobster Claw rest -- restaurant, which is just over the
- 6 | line into North Reading.
- 7 Q And with regard to that meeting, at some point did you hear
- 8 from the officers that led you to do something with respect to Ms.
- 9 | Bellino?
- 10 A I -- It was my understanding that Ms. Bellino had a key for
- 11 | the address. And at some point I was attempting to get the -- get
- 12 her to respond to -- to the gas station, to the apartment, in
- 13 order to help us unlock one of the doors using whatever means she
- 14 | had. I believe it was a key.
- 15 Q And directing your attention to the radio transmissions for
- 16 | February 3rd of 2018, specifically Track 12 at 3:55:07 p.m., if
- 17 | you would just listen to that transmission.
- 18 A Yes.
- 19 [Audio Playing at 9:22:43 a.m.]
- 20 BY MS. LYNCH:
- 21 Q And that was you who identified yourself as Sergeant Silva?
- 22 A Yes.
- 23 Q And that call was placed by the dispatcher, according to the
- 24 records of the Reading Police, at 3:55 p.m.; is that correct?
- 25 A Yes.

- Now, as a result of that did you continue to monitor the
- 2 radio?
- 3 A Yes.
- 4 | Q Now, as a result of your conversation diverting Ms. Bellino
- 5 | back to the house as opposed to Lobster Claw, did you communicate
- 6 | with Sergeant -- with Officer Fontes at 3:56:20?
- 7 A I believe so, yes.
- 8 Q Okay. And directing your attention to Track 14 of February
- 9 3rd of 2018, if you would listen to that recording.
- 10 [Audio Playing at 9:24:44 a.m.]
- 11 BY MS. LYNCH:
- 12 Q Now, did you make that transmission?
- 13 A Yes.
- 14 Q And who were you communicating with?
- 15 A Badge No. 93 is Officer Fontes. Badge No. 66 is Officer Sean
- 16 Wilson. And I was advising Officer Sean Wilson who was already on
- 17 scene of the gas station that Kim was on her way there. And I was
- 18 | advising Officer Fontes that he didn't need to go to the Lobster
- 19 Claw, to go straight to the -- to the gas station because the --
- 20 | the female was on her way there.
- 21 Q And the female voice on the radio transmission was what
- 22 officer?
- 23 A Officer Gooley.
- 24 Q Now, at some point, directing your attention to Radio
- 25 | Transmission Track 15 at 4:01:23 p.m., did you -- Well, if I could

play that now. [Audio Playing at 9:26:02 a.m.] BY MS. LYNCH: 3 Now, at 4:01:23 p.m., that was supposed to be the start of 4 the evening shift relieving the dayshift; is that right? Α Correct. 6 And at that time Number 86, Call No. 86, was who? 7 8 Officer Vatcher. And at that time what did you do with respect to Officer 9 Vatcher? 10 I sent him up to the scene, to the gas station. 11 And subsequent to that, at 4:02:28 p.m., did you receive a 12 radio transmission that Devin McDonald had showed up but the keys 13 didn't work? 14 I -- I believe so, yes. 15 Now, at some point, directing your attention to 4.06:50 p.m., 16 which would be Track 22, did you learn at that time -- or did you 17 receive a radio transmission from Officer Gooley at that 18 approximate time? I believe so, yes. 20 And if you would play that, please. 21 [Audio Playing at 9:27:32 a.m.] 22 23 BY MS. LYNCH: Now, at some point did you learn -- did you receive a 24

subsequent transmission from Officer Gooley at 4:07:51 p.m. that

25

- 1 | they had access to the building but not the actual apartment and
- 2 requesting that they would need the fire department to get in?
- 3 A Yes.
- 4 | Q Now, directing your attention to the radio transmission on
- 5 February 3rd, Track 26 at 4:09:33 p.m., I'm going to play this and
- 6 ask you some questions.
- 7 [Audio Playing at 9:28:37 a.m.]
- 8 BY MS. LYNCH:
- 9 Q Now, after you had that communication with Officer Gooley,
- 10 did you do something yourself to follow up on the information from
- 11 | the prior night?
- 12 A Yes.
- 13 0 What was that?
- 14 A I placed a phone call to Lieutenant Kevin Brown, who was in
- 15 charge of the shift f -- for the incident on -- on the night
- 16 before.
- 17 Q So, he had the role that you would have had if you were
- 18 | working.
- 19 A Correct.
- 20 | Q And did you speak to Lieutenant Brown at that time?
- 21 A Yes.
- 22 Q And what was your purpose for calling Lieutenant Brown?
- 23 A Just to make absolute 100-percent certainty what occurred the
- 24 night before and verify that we did in fact have probable cause to
- 25 make an arrest for the night before on top of whatever we had

- 1 | happening during my current shift then.
- 2 | Q Did anyone other than you following up on that PC initiate
- 3 any communication with Lieutenant Brown?
- 4 A Not to my knowledge.
- 5 Q And did you --
- THE COURT: I'm sorry; just to be clear: you spoke to
 Lieutenant Brown.
- THE WITNESS: Correct.
- THE COURT: Lieutenant Brown told you what specifically?
- 10 THE WITNESS: We -- We basically reviewed the night before,
- 11 | stated that we absolutely had probable cause to make a -- an
- 12 | arrest of t -- I believe it was two counts of assault and battery
- 13 for the night before. And we spoke about how that was on top of
- 14 and -- and in addition to whatever charges we would've had from
- 15 the incident on Saturday when I was working.
- 16 THE COURT: And had you talked to Lieutenant Brown to verify
- 17 that prior to communicating over the radio with Officer Gooley?
- 18 Or did you do that after? I was just confused by the --
- 19 THE WITNESS: I believe the radio transmissions we just heard
- 20 were just prior to me placing that phone call. And it was those
- 21 radio transmissions that made me want to call and just make --
- 22 triple-check that we were a hundred percent sure on what we were
- 23 doing.
- THE COURT: So, back to you saying to her, "I believe we do,"
- 25 | -

- THE WITNESS: Yes.
- THE COURT: Yes. But at that point you weren't sure.
- THE WITNESS: Well, no, I was -- I was sure in -- in my
- 4 heart. The reason why I called Lieutenant Brown was to just make
- 5 | sure I wasn't missing anything from the night before because I
- 6 wasn't physically working.
- 7 THE COURT: Sure in your heart based upon what?
- 8 THE WITNESS: The -- The log entries that I saw, that the
- 9 charges were actually being filed, the complaint application was
- 10 | filled out by Officer Vatcher from the night before, and he's an
- officer that I -- I believe and I trust that he filed a complaint
- 12 application so -- and reviewed and signed off by Lieutenant Brown.
- 13 THE COURT: Thank you.
- 14 BY MS. LYNCH:
- 15 Q And directing your attention to the radio transmission for
- 16 | February 3rd at 4:20:44 p.m., Track 29, if I could play that for
- 17 you.
- 18 [Audio Playing at 9:32:05 a.m.]
- 19 BY MS. LYNCH:
- 20 Q And when you say you spoke to 62, who was 62's call number?
- 21 A Lieutenant Brown.
- 22 | Q Now, were you personally aware of any prior connection
- 23 between Lieutenant Brown and Mr. Greenough?
- 24 A No.
- 25 Q Did that come up at all during your conversation regarding

- 1 PC?
- 2 A Not that I can recall.
- 3 Q Now, at this time, two of the officers that had been
- 4 | scheduled for the evening shift were Fontes and Vatcher -- were
- 5 | not at the police station; is that correct?
- 6 A Correct.
- 7 Q Now, in the normal course when you would take over a shift,
- 8 was there a procedure that would take place at the station before
- 9 the officers went out on the street?
- 10 A Yes, we commonly refer to that as roll call.
- 11 Q Had -- Because of the events that were unfolding shortly
- 12 | before roll call, did roll call take place at that time?
- 13 A No.
- 14 Q Now, as all of this was transpiring, were the other two
- 15 officers that were scheduled at 4:00 p.m. -- specifically Officer
- 16 Drauschke and Officer Savio, were they physically at the police
- 17 | station?
- 18 A Yes, they -- they were definitely there by -- by the time
- 19 these transmissions were happening.
- 20 Q Okay. And did you see them?
- 21 A Yes.
- 22 | Q And were they privy to the same radio transmissions that you
- 23 | were at the time?
- 24 A Yes.
- 25 Q Now, at some point did you receive a radio transmission

- 1 | shortly after that, specifically at 4:21:52 p.m.?
- MS. LYNCH: And for the record, that would be Track 30 for
- 3 February 3rd of 2018. I'd ask to play that.
- 4 A Yes.
- [Audio Playing at 9:34:13 a.m.]
- 6 BY MS. LYNCH:
- 7 O Now, who were you communicating with in that radio
- 8 | transmission?
- 9 A The call sign is 66. That's Officer Sean Wilson.
- 10 Q And you were at the police station still when that happened?
- II A Yes.
- 12 Q And were Officer Drauschke and Officer Savio with you at the
- 13 | station?
- 14 A Yes.
- 15 Q Now, as a result of that information, that he has a pole and
- 16 | it's turning into a horror show, did you do something at that
- 17 | point?
- 18 A Yes.
- 19 O And what was that?
- 20 A I ordered Officer Savio and Officer Drauschke to respond up
- 21 to the scene, and I myself got my equipment together and also
- 22 responded up to the scene.
- 23 Q And in the meantime was there any effort made to contact the
- 24 | Reading Police Fire Department?
- 25 A Yes.

- 1 Q Now, had that occurred at a time when it was unclear whether
- 2 Mr. Greenough was inside the apartment?
- 3 A I believe so.
- 4 Q And the purpose for the fire department was what?
- 5 A To open the door.
- 6 Q And at some point when you realized that Mr. Greenough was in
- 7 | the apartment were -- was some action taken with respect to the
- 8 | fire department?
- 9 A That happened when I arrived on scene. I advised the fire
- 10 department that we wouldn't be using them to force any type of
- 11 entry with him inside there. And I advised them they could clear
- 12 | the scene.
- 13 Q Okay. Now, in terms of your direction to Officer Drauschke
- 14 and Officer Savio, did something happen with respect to them being
- 15 able to get up there, in terms of availability of vehicles?
- 16 A We -- We were just running short of cruisers, at this point.
- 17 Q And so did you have a cruiser assigned to you?
- 18 A Yes.
- 19 Q And what if anything did they do for means of transportation
- 20 up to that call?
- 21 A They took the animal control officer van up to the scene
- 22 together. They both rode in the same vehicle.
- 23 Q Now, at that point, with the officers from the evening shift
- 24 | going up there, what was your intention concerning the dayshift
- 25 once you got up there?

- 1 A Well, depending upon how s -- how serious the incident was
- 2 once I got up there and I made that determination, my initial
- 3 | feeling was that maybe we could relieve the dayshift officers and
- 4 | they could go home and have the evening s -- evening shift
- 5 officers take care of the -- the rest of the call.
- 6 Q Now, at that point, once you made the decision to go up to
- 7 | the station, can you describe what you did?
- 8 A Once I decided to go up to the gas station?
- 9 0 Yes.
- 10 A So, I -- I went up as quickly and safely as I could. Officer
- II Drauschke and Officer Savio were shortly behind me, in -- ins --
- 12 | inside of their vehicle. As soon as I arrived on scene, I
- 13 attempted to gain as much information as I could regarding where
- 14 Mr. Greenough was, where my officers were in relation to the
- 15 building, specifically speaking if we had a perimeter set up
- 16 around the building, and find out what the actions were with the
- 17 | pole that Officer Wilson had mentioned. So, basically I'm trying
- 18 | to figure out how serious the incident is and where to go from
- 19 there.
- 20 Q Now, as -- in anticipation of testifying, were you -- did you
- 21 view certain videotape that was obtained from the gas station?
- 22 A Yes.
- 23 Q And I'm going to draw your attention to the video Camera 2,
- 24 | timestamp 1702:11, which was 4:29:21 p.m. I'm going to ask you to
- 25 look at this sequence of events and see if you recognize --

- 1 | Q Now, as you were approaching that group, do you see the man --
- 2 | If I just might walk up here for a moment. Do you see this man
- 3 here in the camera angle? [Indicating.]
- 4 A Ye -- Yes.
- 5 Q Did you have any conversation with him prior to -- well, as
- 6 you approached the group of officers?
- 7 | A I don't recall if I spoke to him while I was walking right
- 8 there. I did speak to him at some point.
- 9 Q Okay. But initially you went over to the officers.
- 10 A Yes, yeah.
- 11 Q And as you were talking to the officers -- Now, that vehicle,
- 12 | that white vehicle, is that a police officer's vehicle, a police
- 13 | cruiser?
- 14 A It's a police department vehicle. It belongs to our animal
- 15 | control officer, who uses it for his animal control duties as well
- 16 as the parking enforcement officer duties.
- 17 Q Now, as you arrived and approached around that timestamp,
- 18 | what was happening as you got there?
- 19 | A My officers were in that area just past the gas pumps,
- 20 | basically standing outside of the -- of the residential section of
- 21 | -- of this property. The fire department -- that's the ladder
- 22 | truck, and then there's a pickup truck -- they were also standing
- 23 (out there. And that's when I had my initial conversation with
- 24 | them that based on the facts that I knew we -- we wouldn't be --
- 25 | we wouldn't be using them for -- for whatever we had going on down

- there at the point -- at that point.
- 2 Q And as a result of that did they leave the area?
- 3 A Yes.
- 4 Q And at that point can you tell us what happened after you
- 5 | basically discharged the fire department?
- 6 A Well, it was at about this time that I realized that all of
- 7 | my officers who were on scene were in the front of the building
- 8 and -- and nobody was in the rear of the building, which surprised
- 9 | me and -- and drew my attention because I had specifically
- 10 requested and ordered and verified that we had a perimeter on the
- 11 | building on my -- prior to arriving on scene.
- 12 Q So, as a result of making that observation, what did you do?
- 13 A I -- I -- I believe I -- I don't know if I asked Officer
- 14 | Savio or if he suggested it and I confirmed it, but he is the
- 15 person who was sent around to the rear of the building in order to
- 16 take that post to make sure that Mr. Greenough was not fleeing out
- 17 of the back of the residence.
- 18 Q And up until that point it was your understanding that he was
- 19 inside the building?
- 20 A Yes.
- 21 | Q And that he had actually talked to the officers?
- 22 A Yes.
- 23 Q Now, at some point after Officer Savio went towards the back
- 24 of the building, did you receive a radio transmission from him at
- 25 4:30:58 p.m., specifically Track 35?

- 1 A Yes.
- 2 Q And if I could play that, please.
- [Audio Playing at 9:42:27 a.m.]
- 4 BY MS. LYNCH:
- 5 Q And that was Officer Savio that made that transmission?
- 6 A Correct.
- 7 Q And was that the first notice that you had that the back of
- 8 | the building had an open --
- 9 A Yes, ma'am.
- 10 Q -- opening. Now, as a result of that, what if anything did
- 11 | you do?
- 12 A I believe it was about this time that I myself walked around
- 13 to the side and looked in the back to see what Officer Savio had
- 14 observed. And I also observed the same thing.
- 15 Q What happened next?
- 16 A Well, at this point, situation is -- is changing in my mind
- 17 and I -- I am now considering various tactical options as far as I
- 18 | believe our suspect who was inside of the residence has now fled
- 19 outside of the residence. And I am advising my officers to kind
- 20 of fan out and take a look and see if he's in the immediate area
- 21 of the -- of the property there.
- 22 Q Now, at that time do you remain in the back of the building
- 23 or do you walk back to --
- 24 | A I think I've walked back towards the front, at this point.
- 25 | Q Now, directing your attention next, was your attention

- 1 | attracted to the area of the service station itself?
- 2 A Yes.
- 3 Q And how did that happen?
- 4 A At some point I heard two gunshots.
- 5 Q Okay. But before that --
- 6 A Oh, I'm sorry; I apol --
- 7 Q -- did you have occasion to learn that there was another door
- 8 | into the premises?
- 9 A Yes. I apologize. Yes.
- 10 Q Okay. So, you come around back and you at some point after
- 11 that learn that there is another way into the apartment.

- I A Back out to the front of the building, where I -- where I
- 2 | just was, kind of just beyond the gas pumps, I believe.

- 5 | A I believe it was -- I believe it was towards the residence.
- 6 Q And why did you and Officer Drauschke leave?
- 7 A Just in the quick time that we had inside the apartment, it

- 2 | Q Did you know at that time when he said, "Got him by one of
- 3 | the vehicles, " what he -- where he was referring to?
- 4 A I thought I did, but I didn't.
- 5 | Q Where did you initially think he had observed him?
- 6 A On the north side of the property. So, if you're looking at
- 7 | the building, to the right.
- 8 Q So, where the residences were, as opposed to where the garage
- 9 bays were.
- 10 A Yes.
- 11 Q Where were you when you received that radio transmission?
- 12 A Over to that side, as well.
- 13 Q But you did not see Officer Drauschke.
- 14 A No.
- 15 Q Now, after you received that radio transmission, what if
- 16 anything happened next that attracted your attention?
- 17 A I heard two gunshots.
- 18 Q And had you ever heard gunshots outside of the range before
- 19 | this?
- 20 A No.
- 21 Q After you heard the two gunshots, were you able to tell from
- 22 your vantage point where the gunshots were coming from?
- 23 A No.
- 24 | Q Did you know whether they were inside or outside?
- 25 A I couldn't tell.

- I Q Now, after you heard those two gunshots, did you receive
- 2 | another radio transmission?
- 3 A Yes.
- 4 | Q And directing your attention to Track 39, Reading Police
- for recorded transmissions for February 3rd, real-time 4:33:25, if I

- 9 Q And so it was within a matter of less than a minute, half a
- 10 minute, that you had received that transmission; is that correct?
- 11 A Correct.
- 12 Q So, that Transmission 38, "Got him in one of the vehicles,"
- 13 began at real-time 4:33:13. And according to the records of
- 14 Reading, at 4:33:25 was the broadcast from Officer Drauschke of
- 15 shots fired.

- 17 Q What happened after you heard that sound?
- 18 A Quite honestly, a little bit of panic s -- struck in. And I
- 19 was -- I started to scramble to figure out where those shots were

- 9 Q So, you could see those officers coming out of the building,

- 11 A I believe I -- O -- Once they -- Definitely once they came
- 12 out, I -- I -- I knew where they were coming from and I knew who
- 13 they were and --
- 14 Q Okay.
- 15 A -- what was going on.
- 16 Q Now, in terms of the officers, once you saw the officers
- 17 outside did you see anyone go in a particular direction away from
- 18 | where you were?
- 19 A Yes.
- 20 Q And who was that?
- 21 A Anthony.
- 22 Q And what happened next?
- 23 A My attention was drawn to Anthony, as he was running towards
- 24 me from the south side. So, the -- As you're looking at the
- 25 | building, to the left side. And he was screaming something to the

- 1 effect of, "You shot my brother. You killed my brother,"
- 2 | something to that effect.
- 3 Q What did you do at that point?
- 4 | A I ran past Anthony in the direction he was coming from,
- 5 looking for Officer Drauschke.
- 6 Q Now, to just go back for a moment, I'm going to direct your
- 7 attention to the Reading Police radio transmissions, Track 43
- 8 | broadcast at 4:33:45. I'm going to ask that you listen to that
- 9 broadcast.

- 1) BY MS. LYNCH:
- 12 Q Now, the voice that said, "Out by the vehicles," who was
- 13 | that?
- 14 A Officer Drauschke.
- 15 Q And who was the voice that said, "Get the fire department
- 16 down here"?
- 17 | A That was mine.
- 18 MS. LYNCH: And so that was at 4:33:45, according to the
- 19 records, for the record.
- 20 BY MS. LYNCH:
- 21 Q In terms of your movements, after you saw Mr. Perrotti run
- 22 towards you, what happened next?
- 23 | A I ran -- Like I said, I ran past him in the direction that he
- 24 was coming from, searching for Officer Drauschke.
- 25 Q And where did you go?

- 1 A I went to a section of -- of where vehicles are parked, like
- 2 | I said, to the south side, to the left side as you're looking at
- 3 | the building, where there's a -- a number of vehicles, I don't
- 4 | recall how many, and located Officer Drauschke in between two of
- 5 those vehicles.
- 6 Q Was he alone or was he with anyone?
- 7 A He was with Mr. Greenough.
- 8 Q And were there any other officers with him?
- 9 A No.
- 10 Q Did you see Officer Gooley?
- 11 A At some point, yes. I don't recall where she was standing as
- 12 | I was running up. I just remember running as fast as I could that
- 13 | way.
- 14 | Q But was it -- Did Officer Gooley get there before you did?
- 15 A It's possibly. My -- I just -- My memory is just running as
- 16 | fast as I could and officers around me running towards the same
- 17 direction.
- 18 Q What happened when you got there?
- 19 | A I located Officer Drauschke and I observed Mr. Greenough on
- 20 | the ground. He was bleeding from his -- his midsection, from his
- 21 chest. And it appeared as though he had been shot.
- 22 Q What happened next?
- 23 A Is -- I spoke to Officer Drauschke. I -- I don't even think
- 24 | I -- I don't know if I started the conversation or if he did. But
- 25 Officer Drauschke had said something to the effect of, "He came at

- 1 | me. I had to shoot, "or, "He came at me. I had to." Something
- 2 | along those lines.
- At that point I then began directing my officers to secure
- 4 Mr. Greenough in handcuffs and then begin medical aid.
- 5 Q Now, in terms of your memory of the words that Officer
- 6 Drauschke used, do you have a memory of the exact words that he
- 7 used?
- 8 A Not today, no.
- 9 Q At the time that you were there, did you -- Strike that.
- 10 That evening of February 3rd, were you interviewed by members of
- 11 | the state police and Reading department?
- 12 A Yes.
- 13 Q And at that time were you interviewed concerning what was
- 14 | said when you approached Officer Drauschke?
- 15 A Yes.
- 16 Q So, is your present memory exhausted as to the exact words
- 17 | that you recall Officer Drauschke using?
- 18 A Yes.
- 19 MS. LYNCH: Let me just -- One moment.
- 20 THE COURT: Sure.
- MS. LYNCH: Page 17.
- 22 BY MS. LYNCH:
- 23 Q I'm just going to draw your attention to lines 16 to 22 on
- 24 page 17. And if you could read that to yourself. And once you
- 25 do, if you could let me know.

- 1 A [Reviewing document.]
- 2 | Q Having reviewed that document, is your present memory
- 3 refreshed as to the words that Officer Drauschke used?
- 4 A Yes.
- 5 Q And specifically what is your present memory now refreshed as
- 6 to what that was?
- 7 A Officer Drauschke told me Mr. Greenough had his hands in his
- 8 | pockets, he was charging towards him screaming, "Kill me. Kill
- 9 me."
- 10 Q Now, what did you observe about Officer Drauschke's physical
- 11 appearance/demeanor/condition at that time?
- 12 A He was obviously affected by the incident that was going on.
- 13 He was -- appeared -- I just don't -- not nervous but, you know,
- 14 he -- he appeared, you know, hypervigilant about what was going on
- 15 around him. He was speaking quickly to me, faster than his normal
- 16 | tone that he would s -- usually speak to me in. And he was kind
- 17 of -- kind of walking back and forth in a very short period, as if
- 18 he was greatly affected by something that just happened.
- 19 Q Now, in terms of Officer Drauschke, when you arrived did you
- 20 | observe him assist in administering first aid to Mr. Greenough?
- 21 A Yes.
- 22 Q At some point did you step in with regard to what Officer
- 23 | Drauschke was doing?
- 24 A Yes.
- 25 Q And what specifically was that?

- 1 | A Once I -- Once we had enough officers that were rendering aid
- 2 | and I knew the fire department was on the way, I had Officer
- 3 Drauschke step away from Mr. Greenough and I advised him to go sit
- 4 | in the front seat of my cruiser.
- 5 Q And did he comply with those requests?
- 6 A Yes.
- 7 Q Was the cruiser, your cruiser, still in the position that you
- 8 | had left it initially?
- 9 A No. I believe it was further towards the south side of the
- 10 building.
- II Q So at some point did you or another officer move that
- 12 | vehicle?
- 13 A Yes.
- 14 Q And do you recall who?
- 15 A I don't.
- 16 O Now, is -- was there a protocol that you were to follow,
- 17 based upon your training and experience, in the aftermath of a

- 22 A Well, so, the first course of action is to render any aid
- 23 that's needed to anybody that's injured, which is the first thing

- Now, is an officer being checked out at a hospital protocol 18
- in the aftermath of a police-involved shooting? 19
- А Yes. 20
- 21 Now, in addition to that, in a situation in which a police
- 22 officer is exposed to blood or other biological fluids, is there a
- protocol that's followed for a safety precaution? 23
- Α Yes. 24
- 25 And what is that?

- 1 | A They would also be seen at a local hospital and evaluated for
- 2 | any exposure in a -- in a -- documentation would be done. I
- 3 | believe it's called an unprotected exposure form. The officers
- 4 | would also document using that form.
- 5 Q Now, while you were there, were you aware of whether or not
- 6 Officer Drauschke was seen by one of the firefighters to check his
- 7 | vitals?
- 8 A Yes. Firefighter Belmonte came over to Officer Drauschke.
- 9 And I was managing several different things, but I know that he
- 10 | spoke to Officer Drauschke.
- 11 Q Now, in terms of what was going on in terms of the protocol,
- 12 | in an officer-involved shooting incident is there some
- 13 responsibility that you have to secure the officer's weapon?
- 14 A Yes
- 15 Q Can you describe what that is and what you did?
- 16 | A So, the reason why I'm securing it is that it could -- it's
- 17 | potentially evidence and it needs to be secured. It's not going
- 18 | to go with the officer to be evaluated at the hospital. Officer
- 19 Drauschke remained with his firearm in the front seat of my
- 20 | vehicle until after he was initially evaluated and -- and then
- 21 until it was determined that he was going to be transported. At
- 22 that time, I was the person with gloves, removed the firearm from
- 23 | his holster, and I secured it in a lockbox that it's in the rear
- 24 of -- of my cruiser.
- 25 Q And at some point that evening did you turn Officer

- 1 Drauschke's department-issued weapon to members of the state
- police firearms identification section?
- 3 A Yes.
- 4 Q And so it remained from Officer Drauschke to you to the state
- 5 | police?
- 6 A Correct, ma'am.
- 7 Q Now, in terms of your familiarity with that location, you had
- 8 responded to that location previously; is that right?
- 9 A Correct.
- 10 Q And had you ever had any interactions with Mr. Greenough away
- 11 | from those premises?
- 12 A To my -- To my best recollection, I had. He was a member of
- 13 | a group of individuals who I had had numerous individuals with.
- 14 | So I had definitely spoken with him, not at the residence there at
- 15 the gas station, but nothing that I can speak specifically about
- 16 here.
- 17 Q Now, in terms of the situation that you were confronted with
- 18 | that afternoon, when you went down to assess the situation were
- 19 | you at that time considering other options that were available to
- 20 | the police at that time?
- 21 A Yes.
- 22 | Q Now, at -- when you learned that it appeared that Mr.
- 23 Greenough was no longer in the building, what were the options
- 24 | that you were considering at that time?
- 25 A So, the -- the first thing I wanted to do was expand the

- perimeter a little bit to make sure that he wasn't still on the property. That would've been my first course of action.
 - My second course of action would've been if I felt as though a -- a track was necessary in order to apprehend him, would be to request a -- a -- the assistance of a K9 officer. We don't have one in Reading, so it would have to be a -- a mutual aid partner.
- Those were the -- Containment and -- and some type of a secondary search would've ben what my -- what my typical reaction to a person who fled the scene of a crime would've been.
- 10 Q And at the point when you arrived at that location, was Mr.

 11 Greenough to your knowledge inside the house?
- 12 A To the best of my -- To the best of my knowledge, he was
 13 inside the house when I first arrived on -- on scene.
- 14 Q So you believe that he left after you arrived.
- 15 A I -- I can't -- I don't know. I -- I don't know if he left
- 16 | just prior to my arrival or -- or when I arrived. But the
- 17 | information that I had from my officers was that they observed him
- 18 inside. And my first knowledge that he wasn't was when Officer
- 19 Savio went around the back and realized that the window had been
- 20 | pushed out.

4

- 21 Q Now, given the timeframe between the time of your arrival and
- 22 | the time of being alerted to the door inside, did you feel that
- 23 | you had a barricaded situation at that point?
- 24 A Not once I realized that I believed Mr. Greenough had left
- 25 Q And so, did you have any time to initiate protocols for that?

- 1 A No.
- 2 Q Now, in terms of your involvement or your being a member of
- 3 | the Reading Police, as of February of 2018 did the Reading Police
- 4 have any taser capability or less-than-lethal capability?
- 5 A No.
- 6 | Q And in terms of the events that unfolded, it's fair -- would
- 7 | you agree that the -- that amount -- the amount of time that you
- 8 | were at the scene was a little under, I believe it was, about five
- 9 | minutes --
- 10 A That's fair.
- 11 Q -- before the shooting happened?
- MS. LYNCH: If I might just have one moment, Your Honor.
- 13 THE COURT: Sure.
- 14 BY MS. LYNCH:
- 15 Q Now, did you have any knowledge concerning Mr. Greenough from
- 16 your past dealings with that residence? You indicated you had
- 17 been there before for calls involving the roommates. What was
- 18 | your understanding concerning Mr. Greenough's mental state or
- 19 whether he was known to use controlled substances?
- 20 A Mr. Greenough was known as a person who used drug and --
- 2! | illegal drugs and alcohol to the -- to the Reading Police
- 22 Department. I knew that personally.
- 23 | Q And were the calls that you responded to correlated or
- 24 | related in any way to that?
- 25 A The best way I can describe it is typically somebody on scene

- 1 | when we go -- when we went to that address was under the influence
- 2 of either drugs or alcohol, which was a -- a p -- a part or a --
- 3 some type of a cause of the just disagreement or the -- or the
- 4 | fight that had been -- what had been called in to us.
- 5 Q Thank you, Sergeant.
- 6 A I appreciate it.
- 7 THE COURT: Mr. Pasciucco.
- 8 CROSS EXAMINATION OF WITNESS, SERGEANT PATRICK SILVA
- 9 BY MR. PASCIUCCO:
- 10 Q Good morning, sir.
- 11 A Good morning.
- 12 Q My name is Peter Pasciucco. I represent Officer Erik
- 13 | Drauschke. I just have a few questions for you today.
- 14 A Yes, sir.
- 15 | Q Sergeant, now, you indicated on direct examination that
- 16 | you've been with the Reading Police Department for approximately
- 17 | 10 years; is that correct?
- 18 A Yes. Yes, sir.
- 19 Q And you've been a sergeant for five years?
- 20 | A It'll be five years in just a month or two, but yes.
- 21 | Q And during the duration of your time with Reading Police,
- 22 Officer Erik Drauschke has also been a sworn officer; is that
- 23 | correct?
- 24 | A Correct.
- 25 Q Okay. And he was a -- he was an officer with Reading when

- 1 | you came on approximately 10 years ago.
- 2 A Correct.
- 3 | Q Okay. So you've worked with him in various capacities over
- 4 | the years?
- 5 A Yes.
- 6 Q Okay. And during this timeframe in February of 2018, you
- 7 essentially supervised him?
- 8 A Yes.
- 9 Q Okay. And you observed him on radio calls or speaking with
- 10 | civilians on occasion, --
- II A Yes.
- 12 Q -- correct? Did you ever have any issue with his training or
- 13 how he handled those situations?
- 14 A Never.
- 15 Q Okay. And did you trust him as a fellow officer?
- 16 A Yes.
- 17 Q Directing your attention to Friday, February 2nd, 2018, you
- 18 were not working that night; is that correct?
- 19 A Correct, sir.
- 20 Q Okay. And so, when you came in on Saturday, February 3rd of
- 21 | 2018, that's when you reviewed the logs and sort of familiarized
- 22 | yourself with what had transpired the night before.
- 23 A Correct.
- 24 Q Okay. And your shift started at what time?
- 25 A 3:00 p.m.

- 1 Q 3:00 p.m., okay. And at approximately 4:00 p.m., that's when
- 2 | the -- Is it -- What is it called in Reading? Is it last half?
- 3 | Is it afternoon shift?
- 4 A We -- We call it the C shift. But it would be a -- a first
- 5 half, first half of the evening.
- 6 Q Okay. At some time around four o'clock, that's when the
- 7 other officers arrived at the station?
- 8 A Yes.
- 9 Q Okay. And initially you only ordered or requested that
- 10 Officer Vatcher respond to the scene --
- 11 A Yes.
- 12 Q -- out of those -- Was it three or four officers that were
- 13 on?
- 14 A Four officers would be working the evening shift with me.
- 15 Q Okay. And it was only Officer Vatcher that you initially
- 16 requested or ordered to go to the scene.
- 17 A Correct.
- 18 Q Okay. And then at some point you heard a radio transmission
- 19 from Officer Wilson about a pole?
- 20 A Yes.
- 21 Q And the suspect threatening to hit the officers with a pole;
- 22 | is that fair to say?
- 23 A Yes.
- 24 Q And was it at that point that you then decided "I need to get
- 25 | additional officers on scene"?

- A Correct.
- 2 Q Okay. And that's when you specifically informed Officer
- 3 Drauschke and Officer Savio to respond.
- 4 A Yes.
- 5 Q Okay. And why was there a shortage of cruisers that evening?
- 6 | A Well, we just don't have a whole lot in Reading, we'll --
- 7 I'll start with that. The other reason is that we're all
- 8 | single-officer cruisers in Reading. So, between the three
- 9 dayshift officers that were already on -- on the road and on --
- 10 and on scene as well as Officer Vatcher and then Officer Fontes,
- 11 | who I dispatched up originally to go meet with the reporting
- 12 | party, -- as well as we also just from time to time have cruisers
- 13 that are out of service for one reason or another.
- 14 Q And so, did you instruct Officer Drauschke and Officer Savio
- 15 to take the animal control vehicle?
- 16 A I don't specifically remember telling them to take that car.
- 17 But it is very common for me to say, "Take whatever's out there
- 18 | and go."
- 19 Q Okay. So there was a sense of urgency for them to respond to
- 20 | the scene?
- 21 A Yes.
- 22 | Q Now, once you do respond to the scene, was it known to you
- 23 how many entrances there were into the residence?
- 24 A No.
- 25 Q When you arrived to the scene, was it your understanding that

- the suspect, Mr. Greenough, was locked inside?
- 2 A Yes.
- 3 Q All right. And at some point you learned that there's a
- 4 | window open in the back; is that correct?
- 5 A Correct.
- 6 Q Okay. And you recall speaking with state police detectives
- 7 | in the evening hours after the shooting?
- 8 A Yes.
- 9 Q Okay. And do you respond [sic] telling those state police
- 10 detectives that you seemed a little annoyed or almost scolded your
- II guys because there wasn't someone looking out the back?
- 12 A Correct.
- 13 Q Okay. At some point did you have conversations with your
- 14 | fellow officers on scene for them to either go in the back or them
- 15 to go to the other side of the property?
- 16 A Yes.
- 17 Q Okay. Do you remember who you spoke to specifically?
- 18 A I -- I definitely had a conversation in some regard with
- 19 Officer Savio, telling him to go out back. That is the radio
- 20 transmission that sparked the issue of the -- there being an open
- 21 back window.
- 22 A period of time after that is when we were led into the
- 23 residence by Anthony to go check the inside of the residence. And
- 24 when we came -- when myself and Officer Drauschke came out, I
- 25 | believe I directed him in some way to go stay on the far side of

- 1 | the building. So, that's the south side, or the left side as
- 2 | you're looking at the building.
- 3 Q Okay. So, when you -- So, you speak with Anthony Perrotti at
- 4 | some point. He directs you into the second entrance.
- 5 A Yes.
- 6 Q Okay. Do you go into the actual apartment, or did you stay
- 7 | in the office area?
- 8 A No, I -- I was in just a few steps into that first room. I --
- 9 Like I said, I would call it maybe a living room or -- or
- 10 | something, the first room inside the -- from where that entrance
- 11 | was.
- 12 Q Do you recall any observations you made once you were inside
- 13 | there?
- 14 A Yes.
- 15 Q And what did you observe?
- 16 A The -- The apartment was in disarray. There was a -- a
- 17 | broken -- like, maybe a coffee table or a table that was
- 18 completely broken in the middle of the apartment. Disarray is the
- 19 best way I can describe it. There was stuff everywhere.
- 20 Q And then when you exit the apartment and leave the office to
- 21 go back to the exterior of the office of the property, that's when
- 22 | you think you had some sort of a conversation with Officer
- 23 Drauschke to --
- 24 A Yes. We were walking out at the same time. So, the only
- 25 | side of the building or the property, if you will, that we didn't

- 1 have an officer standing at was, like I said, the south side or
- 2 | the left side as you're looking at it. And that's where Officer
- 3 Drauschke -- that's the direction he left when we walked out that
- 4 door.
- 5 Q Okay. And that's the video that you -- the video
- 6 | surveillance that you observed earlier --
- 7 A Yes.
- 8 Q -- of you walking out of the office, you going one way,
- 9 Officer Drauschke going the other?
- 10 A Correct.
- 11 | Q Okay. At some point you hear shots fired and you immediately
- 12 -- I shouldn't say "immediately." You don't know where they come
- 13 from, --
- 14 A Correct.
- 15 0 -- correct?
- 16 At some point you learn over radio transmission from Officer
- 17 Drauschke that he's out by the vehicles.
- 18 A Correct.
- 19 Q Okay. At that point do you know which side of the property
- 20 he's on?
- 21 A No.
- 22 Q At what point do you realize that Officer Drauschke is on the
- 23 | south side of the property?
- 24 A When Anthony came running towards us and was screaming at us
- 25 | that -- I knew it was obviously behind him, that he was c -- that

- 1 | -- that -- where the incident had took place.
- 2 Q Okay. Do you know where Anthony Perrotti was when the
- 3 | shooting took place?
- 4 A I don't.
- 5 Q Okay. So, once your attention is drawn to the south side of
- 6 | the property, that's when you respond?
- 7 A Yes.
- 8 Q And do you remember who was with Officer Drauschke and Mr.
- 9 Greenough when you arrived?
- 10 A No. Like -- You know, like I testified earlier, I -- I wish
- II I did. I -- I r -- was running that way. I know I was running
- 12 with other officers. I'm not as fast as some of the other
- 13 officers, so it's entirely possible that somebody got to that
- 14 | location before me. My memory is hectic of that, you know,
- 15 snippet of time. And I ran as fast as I could and discerned the
- 16 best -- you know, figured out the best I could of what was going
- 17 on.
- 18 Q Okay. And you were able to review your transcript from the
- 19 | state police interviews the evening of the shooting; is that
- 20 | correct?
- 21 A Yes.
- 22 Q And you recall telling the detectives that Officer Drauschke
- 23 | made statements to the effect of: the suspect, Mr. Greenough, had
- 24 his hands in his pockets; he was charging towards him; and he was
- 25 | yelling, "Shoot me"?

- Something to that effect, yes. 1 Α
- Did you assist in rendering aid to Mr. Greenough? 2
- Α No.
- You sort of supervised the scene at that point? 4
- Α Correct.
- And fair to say that you had a lot of supervision to do at 6
- that point? 7
- Α Most I've ever had.
- Thank you, sergeant. 9
- You're welcome. 10 Α
- THE COURT: Mr. Koufman, questions? 11
- MR. KOUFMAN: 12 If I may.
- THE COURT: Yeah. 13
- 14 MR. KOUFMAN: An offer of proof with respect to a couple of
- 15 topics.
- 16 THE COURT: Yes.
- MR. KOUFMAN: First I'd like to ask some questions about some 17 radio transmissions.
- THE COURT: You just have to speak a little louder. 19
- I'd like to ask some questions about the radio 20 MR. KOUFMAN:
- transmissions for when he was at the station, if I may begin 21
- 22 there.

- THE COURT: Yeah. 23
- CROSS EXAMINATION OF WITNESS, SERGEANT PATRICK SILVA 24
- BY MR. KOUFMAN:

- Officer -- Sergeant, excuse me, my name is Victor Koufman and
- 2 | I represent the family of Anthony -- of Alan Greenough, Anthony
- 3 | Perrotti, and also Ms. Rawson, who's here. And I just have a few
- 4 questions for you.
- 5 A Sure.
- 6 Q When you were on the station that Saturday, February 3rd, you
- 7 | did hear some radio transmissions; is that correct?
- 8 A Yes.
- 9 | Q And you overheard some radio transmissions come in; is that
- 10 | correct?
- 11 A Yes.
- 12 Q And did you also hear some radio transmissions come in from
- 13 Officer Wilson?
- 14 A Yes.
- 15 | O And one of those radio transmissions that came in from
- 16 Officer Wilson had to do with -- we heard that things were
- 17 deteriorating at the garage; is that correct?
- 18 A Correct, sir.
- 19 Q And on top of all that, that this was turning into a
- 20 | shitshow, I think he said.
- 21 A I don't recall the specific verbiage he used. But I don't
- 22 think he swore on the radio. But --
- 23 | Q Okay. But that things were deteriorating; --
- 24 A Yes.
- 25 Q -- is that correct?

- And is it also true that that's the point where you asked
- 2 Officer Wilson if Alan Greenough had been contained? Is that
- 3 | correct?
- 4 | A I believe that's -- that's the time that I made that
- 5 transmission, yes.
- 6 Q Right. And you made -- And his response was, "Yes"; is that
- 7 | correct?
- 8 A Yes.
- 9 Q And it was important for you to do that, in order to fulfill
- 10 | your responsibilities, because that was protocol; is that correct?
- 11 A Less protocol and more tactics, I w -- I would say. But,
- 12 yes, that's what I was aiming for, is to have a contained scene
- 13 when I got there.
- 14 Q Right. And so, at that point was he -- if he was contained,
- 15 | would he have been barricaded?
- 16 A Yes.
- 17 Q Now, at some point you go to the garage. I'm just going to
- 18 refer to it as the garage, if that's okay.
- 19 A The property you mean, sir?
- 20 Q The property.
- 21 A Yes.
- 22 | Q Yeah, Okay. And when you arrived at the East Coast Gas &
- 23 Auto Repair, the garage, --
- 24 A Yes.
- 25 | Q -- all your officers were out front; is that correct?

- l A Yes.
- 2 | Q Okay. So, the first thing that goes through your head, or
- 3 | the first thought, is "Is anybody out back?" Is that correct?
- 4 A That's correct.
- 5 | Q And at that point you were a little pissed; is that correct?
- 6 A That's fair to say, yes.
- 7 Q Okay. And so, at that point you actually ask your guys --
- 8 Were there six officers there at the time?
- 9 A So, there was three from the dayshift and now there'd be four
- 10 from the evening shift. So, I had seven officers on scene and --
- 11 and then in addition to -- to me.
- 12 Q Okay. And they were all in the front of the building; is
- 13 | that correct?
- 14 A Thereabouts.
- 15 | Q Okay. And so, you actually asked them, "How are we -- Guys,
- 16 how are we surrounding? How do we know he's still in the
- 17 | apartment if nobody's out back?" Is that correct?
- 18 A That's -- That sounds close to what I said, yes.
- 19 O And then that's the point that you sent Officer Savio to the
- 20 | back of the building; is that correct?
- 21 A Correct.
- 22 | Q Okay. Now, -- And that's when he observed the window being
- 23 opened.
- 24 A Yes.
- 25 Q Okay. And that's when he radioed to you that the window was

- 1 open; is that correct?
- 2 A Correct.
- 3 Q Okay. And so then, after that, at some point you learned
- 4 | that the side door of the -- leading from the apartment into the
- office of the garage was open; is that correct?
- 6 A I don't know if "open" is the right word. It was able to --
- 7 | able to be accessed, is the best --
- 8 0 Unlocked.
- 9 A Okay, yes. We were able to get into it, yeah.
- 10 Q Right. And you said you did give a statement to the state
- 11 | police after this incident; --
- 12 A Yes.
- 13 Q -- is that correct? And in your statement you indicated that
- 14 | he -- "he" being Anthony Perrotti -- was able to open that door.
- 15 | "So, clearly that door which was previously locked according to my
- 16 officers is now open." When did your officers tell you that door
- 17 | was open?
- 18 A I was present when the door was opened by Anthony.
- 19 Q Okay. But when did they tell you that the door could be
- 20 accessed so you could access the inside of the apartment through
- 21 | that door?
- 22 A That was the conversation that Anthony had with the group of
- 23 officers out front then, when he let us into the -- to the -- to
- 24 the shop, to the business side of it.
- 25 | Q Okay. So, Anthony told you it was open; is that correct?

- 1 A I don't remember his exact words. Anthony let us in there,
- 2 | to let us into the apartment. I don't remember exactly how that
- 3 exchange went.
- 4 Q Okay. And then you walked into the apartment with some of
- 5 | your officers; is that correct?
- 6 A Yes.
- 7 Q Okay. And at that point you scolded your officers again
- 8 because nobody had been in the back, and you saw that the window
- 9 | had been opened; is that correct?
- 10 A I spoke to them. I don't know if "scold" is the right word.
- 11 | But I definitely addressed the situation.
- 12 Q Okay. And then that's when you heard the first radio
- 13 | transmission, or shortly thereafter, from Officer Drauschke that
- 14 he found somebody in the back; is that correct?
- 15 A I was already outside at that point, I believe. But yes.
- 16 Q So he -- Okay. And then the -- And then subsequently you
- 17 | heard a second transmission from Officer Drauschke; is that
- 18 | correct?
- 19 | A Yes.
- 20 Q And the second was "Shots fired"; is that correct?
- 21 A Yes.
- 22 | Q Okay. Just so it's clear: so, that was -- the amount of time
- 23 | separating those two calls was 12 seconds; is that correct?
- 24 | A It's hard for me to judge time, sitting here, sir. But I --
- 25 | I trust that the radio transmissions reflect that.

- 1 Q Okay. And so that's when you went out and you -- and at some
- 2 | point you saw Anthony running; is that correct?
- 3 A Correct.
- 4 | Q And he said, "You killed my brother. You did not have to
- shoot him. You guys just killed my brother"; is that correct?
- 6 A I don't recall specifically what he said. My memory would be
- 7 exhausted as far as his -- his specific words. But --
- 8 Q Okay. But you don't recall anything else as you sit here
- 9 | today?
- 10 A No.
- 11 Q Okay. Now, when you arrived at the Hummer -- I mean, you
- 12 went into the back. I'm trying to move quickly here. When you
- 13 arrived to the left of the building and you went, Alan Greenough
- 14 was -- you saw him near the Hummer; is that correct?
- 15 A Correct.
- 16 Q And you saw him near the passenger front door of the Hummer;
- 17 | is that correct?
- 18 A Yes.
- 19 Q Okay. And the front door of the Hummer was open; is that
- 20 | correct?
- 21 | A I -- I just don't recall if it was open or closed.
- 22 Q But his -- But he was -- Was he lying on the ground?
- 23 A Yes.
- 24 | Q And you -- So, he was lying on the ground right near the
- 25 | front door, the passenger front door of the Hummer, correct?

- i A Yes.
- 2 Q Okay. And Sergeant -- I'm sorry -- Officer Drauschke was
- 3 | near him; is that correct?
- 4 A Yes.
- 5 Q Okay. Now, prior to this incident, you said that you had
- 6 | some familiarity with Alan Greenough; is that correct?
- 7 A Yes, sir.
- 8 Q Okay. And you made some mention of that -- in your
- 9 | statement, that you did some work in your police as a -- as a
- 10 police officer with respect to the community, and that's how you
- II | gained your familiarity with him; is that correct?
- 12 A Yes.
- 13 Q Okay. But isn't is also true that you never arrested Anthony
- 14 | for anything; is that correct?
- 15 A I've never arrested Ant --
- 16 Q Up to this, yes.
- 17 A I've never arrested Anthony.
- 18 Q And you've never arrested Alan Greenough, as well; --
- 19 A Cor -- Correct.
- 20 0 -- is that correct?
- 21 A Correct, sir.
- 22 Q And is it also true that you never arrested somebody out of
- 23 the house, of the garage, for an assault and battery?
- 24 A I have never been the officer arresting anybody out of that
- 25 house.

- Q Okay. And it's also true that you've never had a physical
- 2 | altercation with Alan Greenough; is that correct?
- 3 A As in myself with Offic --
- 4 Q Yes.
- 5 A -- with Alan Gr -- No, I've never had a physical
- 6 | confrontation with him.
- 7 | Q Okay. And so, you basically had been to the garage for
- 8 roommate disputes; is that correct?
- 9 A Yes.
- 10 | Q Not to arrest somebody; is that correct? This is before the
- 11 | shooting.
- 12 A Yes.
- 13 Q Now, you mentioned a Lieutenant Brown, that you were able to
- 14 | call Lieutenant Brown on that Saturday, February 3rd, --
- 15 A Correct.
- 16 | Q -- before you went to the garage. And is that correct?
- 17 | A Yes.
- 18 | Q And so, you were able to have -- you had contact with
- 19 | Lieutenant Brown that day.
- 20 A Yes.
- 21 | Q And you were easily able to call him; is that correct?
- 22 A Yes.
- 23 Q And if one of your officers had told you that Alan Greenough
- 24 | wanted to speak with Lieutenant Brown, you would've been able to
- 25 | get in touch with Lieutenant Brown.

- 1 A Yes.
- 2 Q And so, you and Officer -- you were on the scene for
- 3 | approximately five minutes before the shooting?
- 4 A I believe that -- that's correct.
- 5 Q And Officer Drauschke arrived with you to the garage; is that
- 6 | correct?
- 7 A Correct.
- 8 Q So he was on the scene for less than five minutes before the
- 9 | shooting; is that correct?
- 10 A Yes.
- 11 Q Thank you.
- 12 THE COURT: So, Sergeant Silva, I just have some questions, --
- 13 THE WITNESS: Yes, ma'am.
- 14 THE COURT: -- just to make sure that I have everything in
- 15 | the proper sequence.
- 16 CROSS EXAMINATION OF WITNESS, SERGEANT PATRICK SILVA
- 17 BY THE COURT:
- 18 Q Just to pick up a little bit on what you've been asked about
- 19 | the -- "prior domestics" I think is how you classified them when
- 20 A.D.A. Lynch asked you -- prior domestic calls that you responded
- 21 to: approximately how many times had you responded?
- 22 A I would say three to five times involving Mr. Greenough. We
- 23 | have been to that location many times.
- 24 Q Okay.
- 25 A It's a busy place.

- I Q All right.
- 2 A But Mr. Greenough for --
- 3 Q Mr. Greenough: three to five times.
- 4 | A I -- I believe that's my best estimate, yes.
- 5 Q And when you say "involving Mr. Greenough," was Mr. Greenough
- 6 | the caller calling for -- were they cross-complaints? What type
- 7 of interaction did you have?
- 8 | A I would say it's a pretty good even split: sometimes he was
- 9 the caller, sometimes he was the person being called on.
- 10 Q You also said -- I think in response to one of the questions,
- 11 again, Ms. Lynch asked -- that alcohol and drugs had often been
- 12 | involved in those calls. Again, your memory of who was involved
- 13 under the influence of either of those?
- 14 A Mr. Greenough was almost always intoxicated when I dealt with
- 15 him. He clearly had a substance abuse issue.
- 16 Q Now, when you arrived on shift on February 3rd, in addition
- 17 to reviewing logs I think you also testified that you also spoke
- 18 to Lieutenant McKenna.
- 19 A Yes, ma'am.
- 20 Q Okay. And what did Lieutenant McKenna tell you about the
- 21 | prior call to that location?
- 22 A So, he actually didn't have much to share about the prior
- 23 | call because he worked the dayshift on Saturday. He wasn't
- 24 | involved with the incident directly on Friday. The conversations
- 25 | I had with Lieutenant McKenna prior to this call coming in were

- 1 | very routine: you know, no prisoners, no -- you know, nothing --
- 2 | you know, very routine OIC-to-OIC conversations prior to the --
- 3 | this call coming in.
- 4 | Q Prior to this call. And was it your understanding that --
- 5 for the incident that happened the day before, that Mr. Greenough
- 6 was going to be summonsed?
- 7 A Yes.
- 8 Q Okay. So, after you talked to Kim or Ms. Bellino, at that
- 9 point after hanging up the phone with her and finding out that
- 10 | she'd gone, I think, to the Lobster Claw and was going to be
- II coming back to the residence, what was your intention at that
- 12 | point with regard to Mr. Greenough and the direction that you gave
- 13 | your officers?
- 14 A So, the direction that I gave my officers was: if he had
- 15 already fled and he was completely gone from the scene, we would
- 16 | be including this incident with the incident from the night before
- 17 and kind of making it all one incident over two days, just to
- 18 supply the court with that documentation. So, that was only a
- 19 | brief period of time when I thought that Mr. Greenough had been
- 20 gone for a period of time.
- 21 We were actually inviting the reporting party and victim back
- 22 | to allow us in just to make sure there nobody was in there, so
- 23 | that she felt safe to go in.
- 24 That quickly changed as soon as I started receiving the
- 25 transmissions from Officer Wilson that he was in fact inside the

- l apartment and now beginning to interact with Officer Wilson.
- 2 Q Okay. So, at that point Officer Wilson and the officers who
- 3 are on scene are trying to find out, based on the transmissions,
- 4 | whether they have PC; --
- 5 A Yes.
- 6 Q -- is that correct? Okay.
- And Mr. -- And they're asking Mr. Greenough to come down and
- 8 | speak to them.
- 9 A Yes. I wasn't on scene for that, but that -- that's what has
- 10 | been kind of relayed to me from those officers: that they're
- 11 | speaking to him through, I believe it was, an open window or a
- 12 | screened-in window, basically trying to negotiate with him to come
- 13 outside and speak to them.
- 14 0 And he didn't want to come outside.
- 15 A He -- No, he did not.
- 16 Q Okay. And so, Mr. Greenough at that point could've left,
- 17 | because you're still trying to figure out whether or not --
- 18 they're still trying to figure out from you on the transmission
- 19 whether or not there's probable cause. So, he doesn't want to
- 20 | speak to the officers and he's free to leave, then, at that point.
- 21 A I wouldn't say so, not based on the -- So, the -- the -- Now
- 22 the call for service on Saturday was a f -- the female, Kim,
- 23 | indicating that she had been assaulted by Mr. Greenough. And that
- 24 | was the call for service. So, I would say no, he wouldn't have
- 25 been free to leave. I would've asked my officers to detain him,

- based on that accusation that he had just assaulted a roommate.
- 2 Q So, then at some point things change. You hear from Officer
- 3 | Wilson that things are turning into a horror show. He's got what
- 4 appears to be a pole.
- 5 A That's -- That's what we've --
- 6 Q Then at that point, you decide to do what?
- 7 A Go to the scene.
- 8 Q Okay. Do you -- Before you go to the scene, do you call the
- 9 fire department to go to the scene as well?
- 10 A Lieutenant McKenna did that.
- 11 Q Lieutenant McKenna did that, okay. And why did Lieutenant
- 12 McKenna do that? Did he communicate with you?
- 13 A He did. He believed that should -- So, he made that
- 14 communication during the time-period when we thought Mr. Greenough
- 15 was not there, that the keys did not work from the two other
- 16 people, Kim and Devin. And he was going to use the fire
- 17 department to assist those people in getting back into the
- 18 residence that they lived in, that they felt as though they were
- 19 | locked out of as a result of this incident.
- 20 | Q Okay. And at least when you were interviewed by the state
- 21 | police, I think you said something about the chief or whoever was
- 22 | in charge of the fire department storming off and refusing to
- 23 help.
- 24 A He -- He was upset that he had been called down to assist
- 25 | with this.

- 1 | Q Okay. So, you arrive on scene. The fire department, at some
- 2 | point, you send them away and tell them --
- 3 A Yes, ma'am.
- 4 Q 'Cause they're not going to help. And then again tell me
- 5 | what happens from that point on.
- 6 A I -- I -- I first met with the -- the fire captain. I told
- 7 | him that we -- we would not use them. He was unwilling and I
- 8 | didn't feel as though he was an appropriate option at that point.
- 9 | So they began to leave.
- 10 That was at that point that I began to meet with all my
- 11 officers on scene and I realized that they -- there was not some --
- 12 | there couldn't have been somebody in the back because they were all
- 13 | in the front. And that's when I directed Officer Savio to go
- 14 around to the back of the building to basically hold the perimeter
- 15 on the back to make sure that Mr. Greenough did not leave the
- 16 | residence.
- 17 Q Okay. I just want to find something that -- All right. So
- 18 I'm just looking at page 25 of what you told the state police: "It
- 19 | wasn't a real formulated plan. Just that honestly everything was
- 20 | clicking in my head: 'All right. Am I going to call for the K9?
- 21 How serious is this call? Are we definitely going to track this
- 22 | quy down?'"
- 23 So you still didn't know if this was a serious call or not.
- 24 A I knew it was serious. I didn't know -- I didn't know
- 25 whether I was -- In the -- In the time-period where I -- I knew

- 1 | that Mr. Greenough or I believed Mr. Greenough was not still in
- 2 | the residence but I didn't know how far he had gotten from the
- 3 | residence, I didn't know that I was going to be calling in K9s and
- 4 | how big of a perimeter I was now -- now going to attempt to
- 5 secure.
- 6 Q Okay. You also said, "Am I going to have this dog go bite
- 7 | this guy in the woods? Are we good to go on everything like
- 8 | that?" What did you mean by that?
- 9 A What I meant by that was: are we good to lock down an entire
- 10 neighborhood and bring dogs out and send them searching through
- 11 the woods? I'm -- I was thinking about kind of liability. Are
- 12 there other people around there? There was a lot of civilians at
- 13 | the -- at the gas station during this incident. I was thinking
- 14 about having to lock everybody down, clear it out, you know, how
- 15 many officers that would take, how large of a scale this was
- 16 starting to grow to had he got any distance away from the gas
- 17 | station at all.
- 18 Q Okay. And so, while that's racing through your mind as a
- 19 | sergeant, at any point do things stop or do you immediately hear
- 20 gunshots next? Do you -- "Guys, we need to regroup. I have
- 21 to --"
- 22 A So, my first point of order was to make sure he wasn't
- 23 | inside, which -- We were let inside by Anthony, his brother. The
- 24 -- The number of officers went inside and I had them checking the
- 25 entire inside, to start there to make sure that he was not there.

- That plan or that course of interaction was interrupted by the qunfire.
- Had that not happened, my plan at that point would then have
- 4 been to make a decision: whether we were going to start calling in
- 5 | for additional resources from out of town to set up a bigger
- 6 perimeter and call in for help from K9 units in order to track
- 7 him.
- 8 Q Okay.
- 9 A But that was interrupted.
- 10 Q So, at no point would the plan be to determine just on a
- 11 search of the area that he's not there and then leave?
- 12 A No, b -- not based on -- based on the fact that he had made
- 13 those threats toward Officer Wilson that he had relayed to me,
- 14 | with the pole that he said --
- 15 O What threats?
- 16 A He said that -- Officer Wilson had relayed to me that he was
- 17 | threatening him with a pole.
- 18 Q Okay. I thought Officer -- I thought you had said that
- 19 Officer Wilson said he had a pole. He was threatening him with a
- 20 pole?
- 21 A I -- I th -- I -- To my recollection, one of the radio
- 22 transmissions was he had armed himself with a pole and he was
- 23 | either threatening them or s -- I believe the word was
- 24 "threatening."
- 25 Q And that was the only weapon or that was the only thing that

- 1 | could be construed as a weapon that you were aware that he had?
- 2 A Yes.
- Q Okay. And because of that, again, at no point would you have
- 4 searched the area, determined that the residence was safe for Ms.
- 5 | Bellino and folks to go back to, determined that Mr. Greenough was
- 6 | there, and had left and applied for a warrant or whatever you were
- 7 going to do next?
- 8 A No, we would've done a much more exhaustive search than that
- 9 before I cleared and -- and took no action.
- 10 Q "Exhaustive search" meaning what?
- 11 A As in: if he wasn't located directly on the property --
- 12 Q On the property.
- 13 A -- I would've done a -- a larger-scale search of the
- 14 | neighborhood to see if he had made it to the street behind the
- 15 | property. I don't think he would've made it out the front, but I
- 16 | would've made that -- that perimeter more towards the back,
- 17 | towards the neighborhood that doesn't really directly abut but it
- 18 abuts through the woods behind the gas station.
- 19 Q And is that -- And that's typical police protocol in all --
- 20 A I would say given the fact that this was an incident that
- 21 happened for a second time in two days, that he had in my opinion
- 22 threatened the officer with some type of a weapon, that this had
- 23 risen to that level.
- 24 Q So when you heard what you believed to be gunshots -- I think
- 25 you testified that you hadn't -- you'd only heard them on the

- 1 | range before that --
- 2 A Yes, ma'am.
- 3 Q -- you went where or did what?
- 4 | A Well, because I wasn't able to pinpoint exactly where they
- came from, to be quite honest I kind of stutter-stepped and drew
- 6 my gun out and just started searching the area with my eyes to see
- 7 | if I could find where the gunfire was coming from, where there was
- 8 a commotion or something that would lead me to go towards that
- 9 location.
- 10 Q And at some point you came across Officer Drauschke and Mr.
- 11 Greenough.
- 12 A Correct.
- 13 | Q And where, physically located?
- 14 A In between two vehicles on, like I said, the s -- So, it's
- 15 the south side of the property, which would be the left side as
- 16 you're looking at the building.
- 17 Q How soon after did you hear -- after his radio transmission
- 18 did you hear the gunshots?
- 19 A Maybe 10 seconds. It wasn't very long. I --
- 20 | Q And his radio -- as you recall, his transmission was what?
- 21 What did he say, Officer Drauschke?
- 22 A So, first he said, "I have him by the cars," or "in the cars"
- 23 or "near the cars," something to that effect. Then it was the two
- 24 | qunshots. Then it was "Shots fired."
- 25 And then I -- as I'm searching, I called out to him over the

- I radio. I think I said, "7-4, location."
- 2 And I initially had forgot about this but he did respond and
- 3 | said again, "By the cars," or, "Near the cars," which was still
- 4 | confusing to me as to which car he was near.
- 5 Q And were you the first officer to get there?
- 6 A I went with a group of officers. So, my memory is -- is
- 7 exhausted as far as which officer was standing in front of me. We
- 8 | were there within a moment of -- of -- of one another. We --
- 9 Officer Drauschke was there and then all the officers came rushing
- 10 over to help in fairly quick, short order.
- 11 Q Okay. And I'm sorry if I already asked you, but your
- 12 direction of travel to get to them was what?
- 13 | A So, I was -- If you're looking at the building, I'm off to
- 14 this side. [Indicating.] I had to run basically clear across the
- 15 parking lot, to the south side, which is where I located Officer
- 16 Drauschke.
- 17 Q Did you have any trouble reaching them?
- 18 A No.
- 19 Q Okay. So there was nothing in your way, nothing obstructing
- 20 | you from getting to them.
- 21 A Not other -- I mean, there's vehicles there. But I was able
- 22 to navigate my way through.
- 23 Q And the other officers that arrived, were they essentially
- 24 running with you, or did they seem to be coming from other
- 25 directions? Was anybody right with you?

- 1 A No. Oh, yes, everybody -- Right with me.
- 2 Q Right with you.
- 3 | A Not with Officer Drauschke, correct.
- 4 | Q Okay. All right. And all in the same direction, --
- 5 A Yes. Yes, ma'am.
- 6 Q -- running to him.
- 7 And I know your memory had to be refreshed by Ms. Lynch with
- 8 regard to what Officer Drauschke said to you when you reached
- 9 them, but was that the first thing he said to you?
- 10 A Yes, it was the -- it was the only thing.
- 11 Q The only thing.
- 12 And you testified earlier that Mr. Greenough in the limited
- 13 encounters you had with him had never been violent.
- 14 A No, not towards me, no.
- 15 Q Not towards you. You'd never had a physical confrontation
- 16 with him.
- 17 A Correct, ma'am.
- 18 Q And at some point there was some difference in what you
- 19 | indicated about the window being open. I think at one point you
- 20 | said "pushed out." Was it open or was there a screen pushed out?
- 21 A I believe a screen was pushed out and -- and -- at the
- 22 exterior of the building.
- 23 Q Screen pushed out.
- And, again, it was Lieutenant Brown that you confirmed with
- 25 | that there was probable cause?

- 1 A Yes, ma'am.
- 2 Q Okay. Just give me one second.
- 3 A Yes, ma'am.
- 4 Q And you -- You were the -- As the sergeant, you secured
- 5 Officer Drauschke's firearm.
- 6 A Correct, ma'am.
- 7 Q And from your review of the logs from the incident the day
- 8 | before, it was the officer's intention, you said, to -- or they
- 9 | were -- get a summons?
- 10 A Th -- That was the intention, based on solely Friday night.
- 11 Q Solely Friday night. Thank you, sergeant.
- 12 A Yes, ma'am.
- THE COURT: Ms. Lynch?
- MS. LYNCH: Yes, if I might.
- 15 REDIRECT EXAMINATION OF WITNESS, SERGEANT PATRICK SILVA
- 16 BY MS. LYNCH:
- 17 Q You indicate that your memory was exhausted concerning the
- 18 | sequence of officers going to the side.
- 19 A Yes, ma'am.
- 20 Q With the Court's permission, I'm going to ask to show you
- 21 portions of the video, specifically Video Camera 2 starting at
- 22 | 1706:41 on the timestamp, which is 4:33:51 p.m. And then I'm
- 23 going to ask you some questions about it.
- 24 [Video Playing at 10:44:48 a.m.]
- 25 BY MS. LYNCH:

- 1 Q Now, the individual who's running, who is that?
- 2 A Anthony.
- 3 Q Now, do you see anyone coming from the office?
- 4 | A Yes, it's -- I'm having trouble discerning which one is
- 5 which. But those are three officers coming out from what appears
- 6 to be the -- the residential section of this building.
- 7 | Q And who is the officer running now towards the --
- 8 A I believe that's Officer Gooley.
- 9 Q And then is Anthony back at this point?
- 10 A Correct.
- 11 O And who are these officers?
- 12 A Myself; Officer Vatcher; that's Officer Fontes; that's
- 13 | Sergeant Silva running right there.
- 14 Q So, with regard to that video, is your present memory
- 15 refreshed as to whether you were the first officer to run in that
- 16 director or whether there were other officers ahead of you?
- 17 A It is refreshed.
- 18 Q And what is your present memory now as to who --
- 19 A That --
- 20 Q -- was there first?
- 21 A That Officer Gooley was a few steps in front of the group
- 22 that I was running with.
- 23 Q And in terms of this call, did Lieutenant McKenna ever go to
- 24 | the scene that afternoon?
- 25 A No, ma'am.

[OFFICER DAVID SAVIO, Previously Sworn.]

THE COURT: Good morning.

24

25

1 DIRECT EXAMINATION OF WITNESS, OFFICER DAVID SAVIO BY MS. LYNCH: Good morning, sir. Would you please state your name and, if 3 you would, for the record spell your last name? Good morning. My name is David Savio. And the spelling is 5 S-A-V-I-O. And Officer Savio, what is your occupation? 7 I'm a police officer with the Town of Reading. 8 How long have you been a Reading police officer? Twenty-four years. 10 Now, directing your attention to Friday, February 2nd, and 11 Saturday, February 3rd of 2018, did you work with the Reading 12 Police Department on those days? 13 Yes. On both those days I was working the C shift, which is 14 4.00 p.m. to 12:00/midnight. And directing your attention to that Friday, the 2nd, what 16 was your assignment that day? 17 I was assigned to uniform patrol in a marked police car. 18 A And were you alone or with a partner? Alone, 20 Who else was working patrol that evening with you? 21 So, it was Officer Drauschke, Officer Vatcher, and Officer 22 Fontes. 23 And so, were you the same officers that were scheduled to 24

work on February 3rd --

25

- 1 A Yes.
- 2 Q -- that shift?
- 3 A Yes.
- 4 Q Now, directing your attention to the evening hours, did you
- 5 respond to a radio broadcast at 7:32:13 p.m. for a call to 1462
- 6 | Main Street?
- 7 A Yes.
- 8 Q And where did you go?
- 9 A We went to 1462 Main Street.
- 10 Q And did other officers respond to that address that evening?
- 11 A Yes. The entire shift responded.
- 12 O And who was that?
- 13 A It was Officer Vatcher, Officer Drauschke, Officer Fontes,
- 14 and I.
- 15 Q Now, given -- Was there a reason that all four officers
- 16 | showed up?
- 17 A Usually on domestic disturbances we try to send heavy
- 18 staffing, just for safety reasons.
- 19 Q And when you arrived -- At some point did you arrive at 1462?
- 20 A Yes. I believe we all arrived at about the same time.
- 21 Q Now, directing your attention to the timeframe approximately
- 22 7.36 p.m., did you arrive at that location with other officers
- 23 | around that time?
- 24 A Yes.
- 25 | Q And when you arrived at that location, did you speak to

- 1 | anyone?
- 2 A Yes. We spoke to Devin McDonald. He was seated on the front
- 3 stairs of the apartment.
- 4 Q And what did you observe about Mr. McDonald as he was seated
- 5 on the front stairs?
- 6 A He -- He was upset. He had been in some type of altercation.
- 7 | Q And when you say he was sitting on the steps, is that outside
- 8 | the premises?
- 9 A Yes.
- 10 Q And what happened when you saw him at that location?
- 11 A He indicated that the suspect, Alan Greenough, had already
- 12 | left the scene prior to our arrival.
- 13 Q And did he indicate whether there was anyone else in the
- 14 house at that time?
- 15 A No.
- 16 Q Now, was there anyone working -- Was the gas station open at
- 17 | that hour?
- 18 A Yes.
- 19 Q And to your knowledge did any of the officers that responded
- 20 | speak to any of the employees of the gas station at that time?
- 2) A Yes, I believe Officer Fontes peeled off from us and he went
- 22 to speak to the gas station attendant.
- 23 Q And at some point did you and the other officers enter the
- 24 | house?
- 25 A Yes, Officer Drauschke, Officer Vatcher, and I and also Devin

- I lentered the apartment together.
- 2 Q Now, as you were outside initially, what if anything did Mr.
- 3 | McDonald tell you had led them to call the police?
- 4 | A I don't have a recollection on that.
- 5 Q With regard to your role at that location, once you went
- 6 inside what role did you assume in this call?
- 7 | A Well, what we first did was we took a sweep through the
- 8 apartment just to make sure that the suspect, Alan Greenough,
- 9 wasn't still on scene. So, we -- we quickly walked through the
- 10 apartment, making sure that he wasn't there.
- 11 Q And where did you go?
- 12 A I went through the kitchen and I went upstairs to the second
- 13 | floor.
- 14 Q And did you observe anyone on the second floor when you got
- 15 | there?
- 16 A Yes. I encountered a white female. Her name was Kimberly
- 17 | Bellino and she was in a second-floor bedroom.
- 18 O And what did you observe about her?
- 19 A She was also upset. And I asked her, you know, what had
- 20 happened that evening.
- 21 Q Now, prior to you getting upstairs, did you observe anything
- 22 about the condition of the apartment itself that attracted your
- 23 attention?
- 24 A Yes. Upon entering the apartment, in the kitchen the kitchen
- 25 table was completely shattered and on the ground.

- And when you got upstairs, did you have any conversation with
- 2 | Ms. Bellino?
- 3 A Yes. I asked Ms. Bellino the facts of the matter.
- 4 Q And what if anything did she tell you had happened?
- 5 A She explained to me that Alan Greenough had come home upset
- 6 from a friend's wake. She said that apparently a friend had died
- 7 of sleep apnea. He came home very upset. He stormed into the
- 8 kitchen, shattered some of the kitchen furniture.
- 9 He proceeded up to the second floor, where he went out of his way to grab her by the arm and push her out of the way.
- And then he focused his attention on Devin McDonald, who was
- 12 also in the second-story bedroom across from her. And then he
- 13 | focused his attention on Devin McDonald. And she said that he
- 14 attacked Devin McDonald. And I asked her to clarify what she
- 15 | meant by "attacked." And she said that Alan had gotten Devin into
- 16 a headlock and t -- tried to strangle or -- or choke him.
- 17 | Q Now, in terms of Ms. Bellino's description to you, did she
- 18 | tell you anything about Mr. Greenough's sobriety?
- 19 A Sh -- I don't believe she did.
- 20 Q Now, at that time, given the nature of the call and the
- 21 | nature of the report, did you take any action with regard to
- 22 advising either Ms. Bellino or Mr. McDonald of any rights that he
- 23 has under the Abuse Prevention Act?
- 24 A Yes. Well, first and for -- foremost we made sure that they
- 25 didn't need rescue, emergency rescue attention. So, we asked them

- 1 | if they needed an ambulance and they both declined. And we also
- 2 explained their rights under Mass. General Law 209A. Not only did
- 3 | we verbally explain their rights, but we gave them a hard copy of
- 4 the law.
- 5 Q Now, with regard to your observations of Mr. McDonald, did
- 6 | you observe any injuries -- cuts, bruises, injuries to him?
- 7 A Yes. Actually, Officer Vatcher pointed them out. And he had
- 8 some markings on his face, his lip, and his neck.
- 9 0 What about Ms. Bellino? Did she appear to have any injuries?
- 10 A She did not.
- 11 Q Did you make any observations concerning her sobriety?
- 12 A No.
- 13 Q Did you make any observations concerning Mr. McDonald's
- 14 | sobriety?
- 15 A No.
- 16 Q Sir, showing you these two documents, do you recognize what
- 17 | these two documents are?
- 18 A Yes. These are the 209A rights forms.
- 19 Q And did you have any role in providing these to Ms. Bellino
- 20 or Mr. McDonald?
- 21 A Yes. My signature is on both; that means I produced both of
- 22 | them to -- to each person.
- 23 Q And so you had told them about their right to seek a
- 24 restraining order?
- 25 A That's correct.

- And at that time they declined; is that right?
- 2 | A They declined.
- MS. LYNCH: At this time, Your Honor, I would offer these two
- 4 | documents signed by Officer Savio, one Devin McDonald's and the
- 5 other Kim Bellino.
- 6 THE CLERK: It would be Exhibit 53 and Exhibit 54, Judge.
- 7 THE COURT: Thank you.
- 8 THE CLERK: Thanks.

- 10 BY MS. LYNCH:
- 11 | Q Now, while you were there did Mr. -- Strike that. While you
- 12 were at the house, did anyone observe Mr. Greenough in the house?
- 13 A No.
- 14 | Q During the time that you were at the apartment, -- Well, how
- 15 long a period of time were you officers at the apartment?
- 16 A I would estimate approximately a half-hour.
- 17 Q And during that time were any photographs taken of Mr.
- 18 McDonald or the residence?
- 19 A Yes, there were photographs taken of the smashed furniture.
- 20 And there were also photographs taken of Devin McDonald.
- MS. LYNCH: If I might just have one moment, Your Honor.
- 22 THE COURT: Sure.
- 23 MS. LYNCH: If I might just see the exhibits.
- 24 BY MS. LYNCH:
- 25 Q I'm going to show you what has previously been admitted as

- 1 | Exhibit No. 43. Do you recognize what this photograph depicts?
- 2 Oh, sorry.
- 3 A Yes, that's a -- a photograph of Devin McDonald's face.
- 4 | Q And does that show the areas of any injuries?
- 5 A Yeah, the left cheek. And it -- it's kind of blurry and
- 6 | cloudy, so it's difficult to see that lip. But there was some
- 7 | blood on his lower lip. I can't see it from this angle.
- 8 Q Okay. And in terms of what's been previously admitted as
- 9 Exhibit 44, do you recognize that?
- 10 A Yes.
- 11 Q And 45, does that appear to be the same shot?
- 12 A Yes.
- 13 | Q And the quality of this print, you would agree, is less than
- 14 optimal?
- 15 A Yes.
- MS. LYNCH: Your Honor, I believe the last time we were in, I
- 17 | had indicated that we were having some printer issues. And if I
- 18 | could just at this time substitute those pictures.
- 19 THE COURT: Sure.
- 20 MS. LYNCH: Let me just -- This one is not in yet.
- 21 BY MS. LYNCH:
- 22 Q I'm going to show you this photograph. Do you recognize what
- 23 | this photograph depicts?

- 25 | left lip now.

- 1 | Q And is that a fair and accurate representation of the picture
- 2 | that was taken that night when you were at the house?
- 3 A Yes.
- 4 Q Okay.
- MS. LYNCH: At this time I'd ask that this be admitted as the
- 6 | next exhibit, please.
- 7 THE COURT: This is 55.

- 2 A No.
- 3 | Q So that at -- the status of that call as of midnight was that
- 4 | no contact had been made with Mr. Greenough, to your knowledge?
- 5 A Correct.
- 6 Q Now, directing your attention to the following day, Saturday,
- 7 February 3rd, you indicate that you were on the same shift, four
- 8 | to midnight?
- 9 A Correct.
- 10 Q When had you reported for duty?
- 11 A Our shift starts at four, and I usually show up to work a few
- 12 minutes early. So I was in roll call a few minutes early. And
- 13 Officer Drauschke and Officer Vatcher were also present.
- 14 Q And at that time what happened when you arrived for your
- 15 | shift in the roll call room?
- 16 A Sergeant Silva came into roll call and he indicated that
- 17 there was a disturbance at 1462 Main Street that had tied up the
- 18 | entire dayshift.
- 19 And he spoke to Officer Vatcher and he said, "Officer
- 20 | Vatcher, you were responsible for the domestic violence report
- 21 | that too place the night before. Why don't you head up there and
- 22 | see if you can assist the dayshift officers?"
- 23 And then he said to Officer Drauschke and I, "There's plenty
- 24 of help up there. You've -- You -- You officers can sit tight
- 25 until we determine what your assignment's going to be."

- And then he walked back down the hallway.
- 2 Q So what did you and Officer Drauschke do at that point?
- 3 A We just kind of hung around the station and we were waiting
- 4 for assignment. And while we were waiting, I heard three radio
- 5 transmissions come over the air.
- 6 Q And specifically can you tell us what those radio
- 7 transmissions communicated to you?
- 8 A Yeah, first it was: Officer Wilson came over the air and said
- 9 | the situation was turning into a show. Then Officer Wilson came
- 10 over the air and he said that the suspect, Alan Greenough, had
- 11 armed himself with a pole. And then the third transmission, he
- 12 asked if there was probable cause to arrest.
- 13 Q And in terms of the sequence of these calls, are you familiar
- 14 | with what the sequence was? Or you just recall that there were
- 15 three calls and that those were the contents?
- 16 A I can't say the exact sequence, but those were the three
- 17 radio broadcasts while we were in the station.
- 18 Q That you recall.
- 19 A Yes.
- 20 Q Now, concerning the radio transmission regarding a pole, as a
- 21 result of that radio transmission did something happen?
- 22 | A Well, Sergeant Silva came back in the roll call and he spoke
- 23 to Officer Drauschke and I. And he said, "Hey, officers, why
- 24 don't you find a cruiser and get down to the scene. See if you
- 25 can either assist or relieve the dayshift officers."

- But there was a bit of delay because there was no marked
- 2 police units left. So, Officer Drauschke was looking for keys to
- 3 any vehicle. And he did locate the keys to the animal control
- 4 officer's van. And he notified Sergeant Silva that we would be
- 5 | taking that.
- 6 Q Now, this van was located where in relation to the police
- 7 | station proper? Is there a garage? Is it outside?
- 8 A It was -- It was in the lot.
- 9 Q Now, when you and Officer Drauschke got into the vehicle, who
- 10 assumed what positions in the vehicle?
- 11 A Officer Drauschke was the driver; I was the passenger.
- 12 Q And were you able to see Officer or Sergeant Silva and him
- 13 responding?
- 14 A Yes. As -- As we were getting into the animal control
- 15 officer's van, I noticed that Sergeant Silva was also getting into
- 16 the supervisor's car, Car 6, which is a marked police unit.
- 17 Q And what happened next?
- 18 A We all left the lot at the same time and we all arrived at
- 19 1462 Main Street at about the same time.
- 20 Q And who pulled in first, if you recall?
- 21 A I believe it was Sergeant Silva, and then we were behind him.
- 22 Q What happened when you arrived at that location?
- 23 | A I exited the -- the vehicle and I observed several officers
- 24 and emergency personnel meandering or mingling in front of the
- 25 | apartment building. There were police officers and also

- I | firefighters.
- 2 Q What happened next?
- 3 | A So, I walked up to the group and I tried to ascertain what
- 4 | was happening on scene and see if I could be of assistance.
- 5 Q And what did you learn at that time?
- 6 A So, there were several officers present: there was Officer
- 7 Wilson, there was Officer Lee, Officer Gooley, Officer Fontes, and
- 8 Officer Vatcher. And there were also fire officials. But I asked
- 9 them. I said, "What's happening here on scene?"
- 10 And the information that I got: that Alan Green -- Greenough,
- It he suspect, he had armed himself with t -- some type of stick or
- 12 | pole that had either a nail or a screw hanging out of it. And he
- 13 had locked himself in the apartment.
- 14 Q What happened next?
- 15 A So, to see how I could be of assistance I said, "Hey, has
- 16 | anyone gone around back to secure the perimeter?" Didn't seem
- 17 | like anybody had, 'cause all of the resources were mingling around
- 18 | the front. So I thought it would be helpful to -- to go around
- 19 back and secure the perimeter.
- 20 Q And did you do that?
- 21 A Yes.
- 22 Q And can you describe what you observed as you went back
- 23 there?
- 24 A As I arrived around back, I noticed a lower-level window that
- 25 was open. There was a torn screen on the ground that had fallen

- 1 into a concrete -- It was either a small, like, window basin
- 2 | crawlspace or like a stepdown. And -- And the window remained
- 3 open.
- 4 Q As a result of that, what if anything did you do?
- 5 A I immediately notified Sergeant Silva via the radio that
- 6 there was an open lower-level rear window and possibly the suspect
- 7 | might've already escaped the apartment.
- 8 | Q Now, with the Court's permission I'd like to direct your
- 9 attention to the radio transmission on February 3rd, Track 35 at
- 10 4:30:58 p.m. And then I'll ask you questions about it.
- 11 A Okay.
- 12 [Audio Playing at 11:12:28 a.m.]
- 13 | BY MS. LYNCH:
- 14 Q And did you receive a response to that radio transmission
- 15 | from Sergeant Silva, specifically Track No. 36 at 4:31:31?
- 16 A Yes.
- MS. LYNCH: If you could play that please.
- 18 [Audio Playing at 11:13:10 a.m.]
- 19 BY MS. LYNCH:
- 20 Q And so, that transmission was who directing you to remain in
- 21 | the back?
- 22 A That was Sergeant Silva.
- 23 Q Now, can you tell us, in the back area of that location, what
- 24 | that looked like? What was located back there?
- 25 A So, there was a fence that lined the back of the building.

- 1 There was some snow cover and some -- some debris.
- 2 Q And at that time, were you able to observe whether or not
- 3 | there were any doors or entrances in the back of the premises?
- 4 A I don't believe so.
- 5 | Q I'm showing you this item, which has previously been admitted
- 6 as Exhibit 10. Do you recognize what's depicted in that photo?
- 7 A Yes, that's the rear of the building.
- 8 Q And is that a fair and accurate representation of the area
- 9 that you had to travel to get from the side of the building to the
- 10 | back, where you found that open window?
- 11 A Yes.
- 12 Q And directing your attention to Photograph No. 11, I'm going
- 13 to ask you if you recognize what that photograph depicts.
- 14 A Yes. That's the lower-level window that I discovered upon
- 15 reaching the back.
- 16 Q And specifically, the area that I'm pointing, is that the
- 17 | condition of the window as you saw it when you went in the back
- 18 that afternoon?
- 19 A Yes.
- 20 Q Now, what did you observe about the area extending behind --
- 21 | further behind that area, the back of the building leading to the
- 22 parking lot on the left-hand side?
- 23 A There was a fence that wrapped tight toward the back of the
- 24 building.

- 1 | Q Now, as you were outside, were you aware or did you receive a
- 2 | radio transmission related to officers going into the house?
- 3 A Yes. Sergeant Silva indicated for me to -- to keep my
- 4 position, that officers were making entry.
- 5 Q And did you learn that via radio transmission?
- 6 A Yes. Also I -- I -- I walked toward the corner of the
- 7 | building and I believe Sergeant Silva had met me at the corner.
- 8 And he indicated "The officers were making entry now, make sure
- 9 you hold the perimeter."
- 10 Q So, when you say you went back to the corner of the building,
- 11 did you backtrack where you had come?
- 12 A So, I was standing in front of the window and I walked to the
- 13 | -- if you're looking from the street, to the right corner of the
- 14 | building. And Sergeant Silva was there and he explained to me
- 15 | that the officers were making entry, "Hold the perimeter."
- 16 Q Okay. And so at that point you remained where?
- 17 A I went back to the open window.
- 18 | Q And from your vantage point outside, did you see any officers
- 19 | inside the house?
- 20 A Yes, I saw Officer Vatcher inside the apartment. And Officer
- 21 Wilson was also speaking to me. He was asking me if I could see
- 22 any footprints in the snow.
- 23 O Could you?
- 24 A With the terrain, it was uneven. And I had already walked
- 25 back and forth several times. I didn't find anything of

- 1 | significance.
- 2 Q Okay. Now, as you were at your vantage point in the back,
- 3 did you hear a radio transmission from Officer Drauschke at
- 4 4:33:13 p.m., specifically Track 38: "Got him in one of the
- 5 | vehicles"?
- 6 A No, I didn't hear that.
- 7 Q So, from your vantage point, that was a transmission that you
- 8 didn't hear at the time.
- 9 A I didn't hear that first transmission, no.
- 10 Q Now, after -- As you were in the back, as you saw the
- 11 officers inside, did something happen that attracted your
- 12 | attention?
- 13 A Yes. Two qunshots rang out.
- 14 Q You could hear the actual quishots?
- 15 A I could.
- 16 Q Could you tell what direction they were coming from, given
- 17 | your position behind the building?
- 18 A It was diff -- It's difficult to say.
- 19 Q What did you do once you heard that?
- 20 A I remember officers inside the apartment running. And I was
- 21 running toward the front. I -- I began to run toward the front of
- 22 | the building.
- 23 Q And what happened when you got to the front of the building?
- 24 A There was a bit of confusion, where those gunshots were
- 25 | coming from. And I saw officers stacked on the entryway to the

- | apartment. So, I fell into the stack of officers that were there.
- 2 Q What happened next?
- 3 A Sergeant Silva asked Officer Drauschke for clarification,
- 4 | what his location was.
- 5 Q And what happened at that point?
- 6 A Officer Drauschke said, "Over by the cars."
- 7 | Q And directing your attention to Track 43 on February 3rd,
- 8 | timestamped 4:33:45, if I could play that. And I'll ask you
- 9 | questions about it.
- 10 [Audio Playing at 11:24:08 a.m.]
- 11 BY MS. LYNCH:
- 12 Q Now, you say that -- Once Officer Drauschke said that he was
- 13 out by the vehicles, what did you do?
- 14 A I began to proceed toward the left side of the building. One
- 15 of our responsibilities as overnight shift officers is to check
- 16 commercial properties, so we learn the commercial properties and
- 17 | we learn the dynamics of those commercial properties. And I knew
- 18 at that particular gas station, East Coast Gas Station, that
- 19 customer cars were usually stored on the left-hand side of the
- 20 building. So I began to run toward the left-hand side of the
- 21 | building where I thought he may be.
- 22 Q And what happened next?
- 23 A As I approached the awning, I observed a white male. He was
- 24 v -- very upset. He was crying and he was collapsing to his
- 25 knees. And he made several -- several statements.

- 1 Q And do you remember what he said?
- 2 | A I don't -- I don't remember his specific verbiage. But my
- 3 understanding of what he was saying was he was threatening a
- 4 lawsuit.
- 5 Q And did you have a memory at that time of what -- well, at
- 6 the time -- Strike that. Is your present memory exhausted as to
- 7 | the words that he used?
- 8 A Yes.
- 9 Q Might it refresh your recollection if I showed you something?
- 10 A You could show it to me and then I'll let you know.
- 11 Q Page 6. I'm going to direct your attention to page 6, line
- 12 | 16 through line 21.
- 13 A [Reviewing document.] So, I can see the verbiage in the
- 14 statement.
- 15 | Q Well, I'm just --
- 16 A Oh.
- 17 Q I'm going to ask you a question now.
- 18 A Okay.
- 19 Q Having looked at that document, is your present memory
- 20 refreshed as to what this man said as he ran towards you?
- 21 A I -- I'm still not sure of the specific verbiage.
- 22 Q Okay.
- 23 A I know what my understanding of what he was saying is, --
- 24 Q Okay.
- 25 A -- as I -- as I stated.

- Now, with regard to that interview, the transcript that I
- 2 | showed you, that was an interview that was conducted that evening;
- 3 | is that right?
- 4 A It w -- It -- It was, yes.
- 5 Q Or late evening.
- Now, on this particular day, once you encountered this man,
- 7 | where did -- what did you do? Did you stop or did you continue?
- 8 A No, I ran r -- I ran right by him. At the time, I didn't
- 9 know who he was. One of the officers pointed out later that he
- 10 was the brother of the suspect.
- And I continued over to the -- the customer cars. And that's
- 12 where I encountered Officer Drauschke, Officer Gooley, and the
- 13 suspect. And they were to the right of a Hummer H2, color orange.
- 14 Q So, when you arrived it was -- there were three people in
- 15 that location: Officer Drauschke and Mr. Greenough and Officer
- 16 Gooley?
- 17 A Yes.
- 18 | Q What did you observe about their relative positions and what
- 19 | they were doing?
- 20 A Officer Drauschke was on the left. Officer Gooley --
- 21 Q Left of what?
- 22 A If I'm facing Officer Drauschke, Officer Gooley, and the
- 23 | suspect, Officer Gooley was on the left. They were all to the
- 24 | right of the Hummer H2 that was parked head-in. And so, Officer
- 25 | Drauschke was on the left. The suspect was in the middle; he was

- 1 | handcuffed and on the ground. And Officer Gooley was on the
- 2 right.
- 3 Q And what were they doing at that point?
- 4 A They were standing.
- 5 Q What happened next?
- 6 A I was re -- rehear -- rehearsing in my head what -- what you
- 7 do at a police-involved shooting. And I was referring to an
- 8 80-hour course that I had taken approximately 15 years ago at a
- 9 DEA drug class. And the first thing they said you do at a
- 10 police-involved shooting is handcuff the suspect. So, I knew that
- 11 was already done, so we checked that off.
- 12 And the second thing they said you do at a police-involved
- 13 | shooting is try to make the scene safe by securing the weapon and
- 14 an -- any evidence. So the next thing I did was I approached
- 15 Officer Drauschke and I asked Officer Drauschke where the weapon
- 16 was.
- 17 Q And what if anything did Officer Drauschke say to you at that
- 18 time?
- 19 A Officer Drauschke said, "I couldn't find a weapon." And then
- 20 he said to me, "He wouldn't show me his hands. He wouldn't show
- 21 | me his hands."
- 22 Q What happened next?
- 23 A I rehearsed in my head what -- the third thing you do at a
- 24 | police-involved shooting. And they said that you give medical aid
- 25 | when it's safe to do so. So, what we did was we focused on

- preservation of life and -- and -- and saving the suspect's life.
- 2 | Q And what did you do in order to facilitate that?
- 3 A Well, at the same time, Sergeant Silva was already on it and
- 4 he was already yelling out commands. And he said to me -- He
- 5 | said, "Officer Savio, I want you to go grab the medical kit and
- 6 | the AED so we can start medical aid."
- 7 Q So, did you go back?
- 8 A As I turned to satisfy his order, I saw Officer Vatcher and
- 9 Officer Lee already running to our location. Each had -- One had
- 10 | an AED and one had the medical kit. So I knew the -- those items
- 11 | were already being brought.
- 12 O What's an AED?
- 13 A It's a -- It's an automatic defibrillator.
- 14 Q So, once you saw that they had the necessary equipment, what
- 15 | if anything did you do?
- 16 A So, once the equipment arrived on scene, Officer Drauschke,
- 17 Officer Vatcher, Officer Lee, Officer Gooley, and I, we all began
- 18 | medical aid and we all took a task.
- 19 Q And what did -- what was your task?
- 20 | A I assembled the -- the Ambu bag, which is a rescue breathing
- 21 device. And I gave rescue breaths.
- 22 Q And how do you give rescue breaths?
- 23 A Two breaths to every 30 chest compressions.
- 24 Q What were the other officers doing?
- 25 A So, initially -- initially, Officer Lee was at the head of

- I the suspect and he was trying to tear off the T-shirt. And he was
- 2 | having trouble. And Officer Drauschke had the wherewithal to see
- 3 | that he was having trouble. So, Officer Drauschke was able to
- 4 | produce a knife and then lean down towards him and the suspect so
- 5 the shirt could be cut off.
- 6 Q And at some point was Mr. Greenough's shirt cut off?
- 7 A Yes.
- 8 Q At that time were you able to see any injuries to Mr.
- 9 | Greenough?
- 10 A Yes.
- II Q What injuries did you observe?
- 12 A He had two gunshot wounds to the -- to the right of his
- 13 chest.
- 14 Q Now, in this process of administering emergency first aid,
- 15 did Officer Drauschke assist in that venture?
- 16 A The only thing that Officer Drauschke was able to assist with
- 17 was providing the knife so the shirt could be cut off.
- 18 Q And was there a reason for that? Specifically, did he
- 19 receive an assignment or a direction from Sergeant Silva?
- 20 A I don't recall.
- 21 Q At some point did he go to another location at the scene
- 22 itself?
- 23 A Yes. At -- When the EMTs arrived, they're a higher level of
- 24 training than us. And as the EMTs arrived on scene, they replaced
- 25 | all the officers that were giving medical aid. And at that point

- 1 | Seigeant Silva removed Officer Drauschke from the area of the
- 2 | immediate shooting to the front seat of a patrol unit that was
- 3 | close by. And then he assigned me to Officer Drauschke.
- 4 Q Were you given any specific instructions concerning any
- 5 | conversations that you had with other officers?
- 6 A Yes. So, while we were being treated by fire officials, it
- 7 | was determined that Officer Drauschke at some point needed to be
- 8 transported to the hospital. Prior to getting onto the rescue
- 9 unit, Sergeant Silva advised us not to discuss any of the facts of
- 10 the matter with one another.
- 11 Q Other than Officer Drauschke's statement to you when you
- 12 | first arrived, had he told you anything about what had happened
- 13 between him and Mr. Greenough?
- 14 A No.
- 15 Q Had you discussed with any other officers what they had seen
- 16 or heard up to that point?
- 17 A No.
- 18 Q Now, in terms of your involvement in administering first aid,
- 19 did you and other officers get blood or other bodily fluids on
- 20 you?
- 21 A Yes. There was -- There was a substantial amount of blood.
- 22 | It was on the ground. It was on the suspect's chest. It was in
- 23 the suspect's mouth. And during CPR, at the conclusion when we
- 24 | were relieved, I remember Officer Gooley saying to me, "D -- Dave,
- 25 you have blood splatter on your face."

- 1 Q Now, as a result of your work as a police officer, is there
- 2 something that you have to do when you come in contact with bodily
- 3 | fluids?
- 4 A Yes. We have to fill out an exposure report, and then we
- 5 | have to get baseline tests done to make sure that we don't have
- 6 any communicable diseases already. And then months later, you
- 7 have to get retested to make sure that you didn't contract a
- 8 communicable disease.
- 9 Q And so, was that protocol followed as well?
- 10 A Yes.
- 11 Q And did you receive an assignment from Officer Silva at the
- 12 | scene that you followed up on? Specifically, did you go
- 13 | somewhere?
- 14 A Yeah, I went to a hospital with Officer Drauschke.
- 15 Q Okay. So, were you assigned to remain with Officer
- 16 Drauschke?
- 17 A Yes, for the duration of the evening.
- 18 | Q What did you observe about Officer Drauschke's physical
- 19 appearance, condition, demeanor, and the circumstances from the
- 20 | time that you saw him at the side of the cruiser through the time
- 21 | that you left the area to go to the hospital?
- 22 A Stress, anxiety, shock, upset.
- 23 Q And is Officer Drauschke someone that you knew through his
- 24 entire career at the police department?
- 25 A Yes.

- 1 Q How long a period of time were you at the hospital with
- 2 | Officer Drauschke?
- 3 A I'm not sure.
- 4 \ Q Did you go somewhere after you went to the hospital?
- 5 | A Yes. Aft -- After Officer Drauschke was released by medical
- 6 | staff, Officer Mullin [phonetic] and I transported him and his
- 7 | wife home to his house.
- 8 Q And after you did that, did you do something?
- 9 A Yeah, we re -- we returned to the station.
- 10 Q And directing your attention to the early morning hours of
- II February 4th at approximately 12:50 a.m. -- strike that -- 3rd,
- 12 | the 3rd, did you -- were you interviewed by police?
- 13 A Yes.
- 14 | Q And in terms of your experience as a police officer in
- 15 Reading, did you have any contact with Alan Greenough before you
- 16 had administered CPR to him that afternoon?
- 17 A Well, we had the call the night before but we had never run
- 18 into him. And then, October 11th of 2017, we did respond to a
- 19 disturbance call at 1462 Main Street at one in the morning, where
- 20 | I had some interaction with Alan.
- 21 Q And can you describe for us what that experience was?
- 22 | A That particular evening, it was a call at about 1:00 a.m.
- 23 Dispatch broadcasted that a resident was locked out of his
- 24 apartment by his roommate. And the officers that were working
- 25 | that night were Officer Drauschke, Officer Vatcher, and I. And we

- 1 | all responded.
- 2 Q And what happened on that call?
- 3 A Upon arriving at 1462 Main Street, Devin was at the same
- 4 location, seated on the stairs out in front of the apartment. He
- 5 | indicated that he was having an argument with his roommate over
- 6 roommate things and that he was locked out of the apartment by
- 7 | Alan Greenough.
- 8 Q What happened?
- 9 A Well, what we try to do in cases like that is we try to
- 10 | mediate a resolution. So, we tried to -- Officer Vatcher and I
- II tried to raise Alan at the door. But he refused to answer the
- 12 door. He refused to let us in. But he did speak to us through an
- 13 open second-story window.
- 14 0 And what was that conversation?
- 15 A It wasn't -- It wasn't good. I mean, he was a little bit
- 16 impolite. He was a little bit immature. He -- He would interrupt
- 17 us as we spoke.
- 18 So, there was a point where we just stopped interacting with
- 19 | him and we spoke back with Devin. And we said, "You know, -- You
- 20 know, what are we going to do for a resolution to this?"
- 21 And Devin was able to contact his -- his mom, who was able to
- 22 come to the scene and pick him up and allow him to stay there for
- 23 | the evening.
- 24 Q And in terms of observations of sobriety that night, were you
- 25 in a vantage point to make any observations concerning Mr.

- Greenough's sobriety that occasion?

 A No, he was on a sec -- in a second-story window.

 And what about Mr. McDonald?
- 4 A I believe he was drinking that evening.
- 5 Q But Mr. McDonald was able to resolve the situation by getting
- 6 his mother to pick him up?
- 7 A Correct.
- 8 Q And you had no other dealings at that address in your
- 9 experience?
- 10 A Not me personally. I don't believe so.
- 11 Q And was there anything unusual about the police response to
- 12 Mr. Greenough on that prior call that you were there, specifically
- Officer Vatcher or Officer Drauschke?
- 14 A No.
- MS. LYNCH: If I might just have one moment.
 - 16 THE COURT: Sure.
 - MS. LYNCH: Thank you, Officer Savio.
 - 18 THE WITNESS: Thank you.
 - 19 THE COURT: Mr. Pasciucco?
 - 20 MR. PASCIUCCO. Sure.
 - 21 CROSS EXAMINATION OF WITNESS, OFFICER DAVID SAVIO
 - 22 BY MR. PASCIUCCO:
 - 23 Q Good morning, sir.
 - 24 A Good morning, sir.
 - 25 Q My name is Peter Pasciucco. I represent Officer Drauschke.

- 1 | I just have a few questions for you today.
- 2 A Okay.
- 3 Q You indicated on direct examination that you've worked for
- 4 | the Reading Police Department for 24 years; is that correct?
- 5 A Yes.
- 6 Q All right. And Officer Drauschke's worked there for about 12
- 7 of those years?
- 8 A Correct.
- 9 Q Okay. Are you familiar with the term "FTO"?
- 10 A Yes.
- II Q And what is that?
- 12 | A Field training officer.
- 13 Q Are you a field training officer?
- 14 A Yes. I have been for the past 20 years.
- 15 Q Okay. And what are the responsibilities of a field training
- 16 officer?
- 17 A Well, the new officers shadow the field training officers and
- 18 they learn actually how to function as a police officer in the
- 19 community. So, number one, you teach the recruit the dynamics of
- 20 the town. You teach them the operation of the vehicle. You
- 21 expose them to policy during calls. You assist them with
- 22 report-writing. Things of that nature.
- 23 Q When Officer Drauschke became a sworn officer with the
- 24 Reading Police Department, were you assigned as his field training
- 25 officer?

- 1 A Yes.
- Q Okay. And so you worked directly with him, in that capacity
- 3 | as a field training officer?
- 4 A Yes.
- 5 Q And you've seen Officer Drauschke progress as a police
- 6 officer over the past 10 to 12 years?
- 7 A Yes.
- 8 Q All right. And you've seen him or you've worked with him
- 9 responding to calls and interacting with the community; is that
- 10 | fair to say?
- 11 A Yes.
- 12 Q Okay. And in February of 2018 did you have any concerns with
- 13 his abilities as a police officer?
- 14 A No.
- 15 Q Was he someone that you could rely on and someone you could
- 16 trust when responding to calls?
- 17 A Definitely.
- 18 | Q Okay. Do you know whether Officer Drauschke ever served in
- 19 the role as field training officer --
- 20 A Yes, he --
- 21 | Q -- himself?
- 22 A He is now.
- 23 | Q Okay. And do you know around what time he was assigned to or
- 24 | became a field training officer himself?
- 25 A No.

- 1 Q Directing your attention to Friday, February 2nd of 2018, you
- were one of the responding officers that evening?
- 3 A Yes.
- 4 Q To 1462 Main Street?
- 5 A Yes.
- 6 Q Okay. When you walked into the residence or entered the
- 7 | residence, did you immediately see the table that had been, as you
- 8 indicated, smashed?
- 9 A Yes.
- 10 Q Okay. So, no one had to direct your attention to it. It was
- 11 | plainly visible to you?
- 12 A It was demolished.
- 13 Q Okay. And you had a conversation with Ms. Bellino, and
- 14 during that conversation she indicated that Mr. Greenough was the
- 15 one that had demolished that table?
- 16 A Yes.
- 17 Q Did you have any reason to believe anyone other than Mr.
- 18 Greenough was the one who was responsible for demolishing that
- 19 | table?
- 20 A No.
- 21 | Q Okay. You indicated that there was -- the table was
- 22 demolished Did you actually see the screws or nails sticking out
- 23 of the --
- 24 A Not at that time, no.
- 25 | Q -- table or table legs?

- Okay. Do you recall Officer Drauschke being inside the
- 2 apartment that Friday?
- 3 A Yes.
- 4 Q Okay. Do you recall where he went inside the apartment?
- 5 A I don't have a recollection of what rooms that he went into
- 6 or who he was with.
- 7 Q Okay. And he was not the primary officer to that call?
- 8 A No, it was Officer Vatcher's.
- 9 Q Okay. And you never saw -- Alan Greenough never responded to
- 10 | the apartment that evening?
- 11 A No.
- 12 Q But it was your understanding, your belief, that there was
- 13 probable cause to arrest for a domestic assault and battery?
- 14 A Yes.
- 15 Q And your training and experience as a police officer, if a
- 16 domestic assault and battery doesn't happen within a police
- 17 officer's presence yet there's probable cause that the crime
- 18 occurred, you can arrest; is that correct?
- 19 A Correct.
- 20 Q Okay. And that's different than a non-domestic assault and
- 21 | battery.
- 22 | A Yeah, that would be a misdemeanor in the past. That's
- 23 non-arrestable.
- 24 Q So, you end your shift on Friday. Do you go home or did you
- 25 | work it overtime, or did you -- into Saturday or did you --

- 1 A I'm not sure if I worked in overtime. But I -- I did go home
- 2 | at midnight that night, on Friday.
- 3 | Q Okay. And then you returned to the station that afternoon?
- 4 A At four o'clock, correct.
- 5 Q On that Saturday, the 3rd. And do you recall being inside
- 6 | the station and seeing Officer Drauschke and Sergeant Silva?
- 7 A Yes.
- 8 Q At the onset of the shift?
- 9 A Yes.
- 10 | Q Okay. Do you recall hearing the three radio calls that you
- II mentioned on direct testimony? Do you recall hearing them or were
- 12 they relayed to you by Sergeant Silva?
- 13 A No, I -- I heard them directly. I had a radio on me.
- 14 Q Okay. So your radio was on and you --
- 15 A Yes.
- 16 Q -- heard the calls.
- Okay. And initially Sergeant Silva was not going to dispatch
- 18 you to the scene; is that correct?
- 19 A That's correct, or Officer Drauschke.
- 20 | Q Okay. But at some point did -- the radio call came over that
- 21 the suspect was armed with a pole and he was threatening the
- 22 officers; is that fair to say?
- 23 A Well, I -- I believe the radio transmission was he was armed
- 24 | with a pole. I -- I don't remember if he said that he was
- 25 | threatening anyone with it.

- 1 | Q Okay. But at some point when that radio transmission that
- 2 | you recall hearing that said something about being armed with a
- 3 | pole --
- 4 A Correct.
- 5 Q That's when Sergeant Silva then changed his mind and ordered
- 6 | you or requested you and Officer Drauschke to respond to the
- 7 scene.
- 8 A Yes.
- 9 Q Okay. And you were unable to secure a cruiser; is that
- 10 | correct?
- 11 A Yes.
- 12 Q And so you had to take the animal control van?
- 13 A Yes.
- 14 O Were there any animals inside the vehicle?
- 15 A No.
- 16 Q Okay. And you were able to respond to the scene with Officer
- 17 Drauschke?
- 18 A Yes.
- 19 Q Okay. Once you arrived to the scene, do you remember who you
- 20 | spoke with initially?
- 21 A No. There was a group of officers. I don't remember who
- 22 | specifically said what.
- 23 Q Okay. But within seconds or at least a minute of being on
- 24 scene, you made the decision or you made the statement "I should
- 25 | qo check the back."

- 1 A Yeah, to secure -- secure the perimeter.
- 2 | Q Perimeter, okay. And you go out back and you see the open
- 3 | window; is that fair to say?
- 4 A It is.
- 5 Q Okay. Did you have any interaction with Anthony Perrotti on
- 6 | scene?
- 7 A I didn't speak with him at all. I -- I remember seeing him
- 8 underneath the awning.
- 9 Q When you arrived on scene, were you aware that there were --
- 10 there was a second entrance into the residence from the office?
- 11 A No, I wasn't aware of that.
- 12 Q Okay. So that's not -- you didn't use that entrance the
- 13 | night before --
- 14 A No.
- 15 | Q -- in getting into the apartment?
- 16 A No.
- 17 Q Okay. At some point you received information that the
- 18 suspect, Mr. Greenough, had a piece of wood with screws in it?
- 19 A Correct.
- 20 Q Okay. Do you remember who you heard that communication from?
- 21 A No.
- 22 | Q Okay. And I know this was almost a year-and-a-half ago, but
- 23 did you make any connection between the demolished table and the
- 24 | piece of wood with screws in it that evening?
- 25 A Yes.

- 1 Q Okay. So what -- And it was your belief or your
- 2 understanding that it might be the same thing?
- 3 A Yes.
- 4 Q Okay. And would you consider that a weapon?
- 5 A Yes.
- 6 Q Can you tell us a little bit about the NESPIN training that
- 7 you attended? I realize it was 15 years ago, but sort of what it
- 8 entailed, where it was located?
- 9 A Ye -- Yes. It was in Franklin, Mass. It's r -- It's run by
- 10 the state police. It was an 80-hour DEA drug school. And one of
- Il the -- one of the sections of the school or one of the learning
- 12 points was officer-involved shootings.
- 13 Q Okay. And you indicated that when you heard the shots fired,
- 14 you realized that this was an officer-involved shooting situation,
- 15 you started replaying in your head what you had learned at that
- 16 training.
- 17 A Yes.
- 18 Q And was this the first real-life officer-involved shooting
- 19 | scenario that you were involved in?
- 20 A Yes. I -- I -- I have responded to another call where a -- a
- 21 | female had fired a gun at her loved one, but it wasn't -- no
- 22 officers fired a weapon. So, this was the first time I was on
- 23 scene where an officer has fired their weapon.
- 24 Q Okay. And in that training, to your recollection the first
- 25 thing to do in that scenario once a firearm has been discharged is

- 1 to handcuff the suspect.
- 2 A Yes. And that was a clear point. That's the first thing you
- 3 do.
- 4 | Q And why -- What were you trained-on/taught? What's the
- 5 reason for that?
- 6 A 'Cause that ends the threat.
- 7 Q And is that because there's a possibility that they could
- 8 still be armed or that the gunshot may have not limited their
- 9 | mobility?
- 10 A And also, in most cases they're under arrest for some crime
- Il at that point also.
- 12 Q The second point you indicated was to secure the scene or
- 13 | secure the weapon?
- 14 A Correct.
- 15 Q Okay. And in this scenario, you directly asked Officer
- 16 Drauschke if there was a weapon or something to that extent; --
- 17 A Yes, I said, --
- 18 Q -- is that right?
- 19 A -- "Where is the weapon?"
- 20 Q Okay. And what do you recall his response being?
- 21 A His response was "I didn't find a weapon."
- 22 Q Okay. Did that tell you that he had already looked for a
- 23 | weapon?
- 24 A Yes.
- 25 Q Okay. Did he make any statements -- or I believe you did

- testify on direct that he made some statements, but if you could
- 2 | just testify again as to what he -- what Officer Drauschke
- 3 | indicated the suspect was doing with his hands.
- 4 A He said the suspect would not show him his hands.
- 5 | Q Now, the location where Officer Drauschke was, where the
- 6 | suspect was that you responded to, do you have a recollection as
- 7 to what was surrounding the vehicle and the individuals?
- 8 A Yeah, I remember it being a confined space. There was some
- 9 | fencing, maybe another vehicle. It was a confined space.
- 10 | Q Okay. So it wasn't an open area. It was something -- Did
- 11 | you have to maneuver around anything to get there?
- 12 A Vehicles. I -- I remember vehicles.
- 13 Q Thank you, officer.
- 14 THE COURT: Mr. Koufman, do you have --
- MR. KOUFMAN: If I may.
- 16 THE COURT: -- an offer to make?
- MR. KOUFMAN: Thank you.
- 18 CROSS EXAMINATION OF WITNESS, OFFICER DAVID SAVIO
- 19 BY MR. KOUFMAN:
- 20 | Q Officer Savio, my name is Victor Koufman. I'm the attorney
- 21 of the family, Alan Greenough's family. I just have a few
- 22 questions for you.
- 23 A Good morning, sir. Yes.
- 24 | Q So, if you go to a domestic and there's suspicion that
- 25 there's a firearm on the premise, is the protocol to search for

- 1 | that firearm?
- 2 A I don't understand the question. Can you -- Can you -- Can
- 3 | you rephrase the question?
- 4 | Q Yeah. If you arrive at a domestic and you have a suspicion
- 5 | that there might be a firearm on the premise, are you under an
- 6 obligation as a responding officer to search for that firearm?
- 7 A I would say yes. We -- If -- If I believed a firearm was on
- 8 | scene, I -- I would look for it, correct.
- 9 Q Now, on Saturday, on February 3rd of 2018, you -- when you
- 10 arrived at the scene, the first thing you did was you requested an
- update from the officers who were already there; is that correct?
- 12 A Yes.
- 13 | Q And then you noted all the officers were out front, correct?
- 14 A Yes.
- 15 Q And so you went to the back to form a perimeter, as you had
- 16 | just said; is that correct?
- 17 A Yes.
- 18 Q 'Cause you recognized the importance of doing that; isn't
- 19 | that correct?
- 20 A Yes.
- 21 Q Because you had somebody who was supposedly contained or was
- 22 | supposed to be contained within that apartment, correct?
- 23 A Yes.
- 24 Q Okay. And then when you got to the back at some point, you
- 25 were in the back and at some point you saw the sergeant at the

- 1 | corner of the building; is that correct?
- 2 A Yes, I believe so.
- 3 Q Right. And so then he told you to maintain the perimeter
- 4 because people were going into the apartment; is that correct?
- 5 A Yes.
- 6 Q And so, you went back to that window; is that correct?
- 7 A Yes.
- 8 Q And when you were at that window, suddenly you heard two
- 9 | shots; is that correct?
- 10 A Yes.
- And before those two shots, you didn't hear anything; is that
- 12 | correct?
- 13 A Well, I was having a conversation with Officer Wilson about
- 14 footprints in the snow.
- 15 Q Okay. After that, how much time separated your conversation
- 16 | with Officer Wilson about footprints in the snow and the hearing
- 17 of the shots?
- 18 A It didn't seem like much time at all, sir.
- 19 Q Okay. But during that short period of time, whatever it was,
- 20 you heard nothing else; is that correct?
- 21 A Yeah.
- 22 Q Okay. Then you heard the two shots, is that correct, all of
- 23 | a sudden, --
- 24 A Yes.
- 25 Q -- right? And at that point you heard Officer Drauschke's

- radio transmission?
- 2 A O -- O -- Officer Drauschke came over the air and indicated
- 3 | shots fired.
- 4 Q Okay. And that's when you ran to the front of the building;
- 5 | is that correct?
- 6 A Yes.
- 7 Q Okay. And then -- 'Cause you didn't know where the shots
- 8 came from.
- 9 A Yes.
- 10 Q Okay. And then when you were at the front of the building,
- II at some point you saw Anthony Perrotti, right? And so you ran in
- 12 | the direction that he was coming from; is that correct?
- 13 A Well, I -- It -- It's not that-quite simple. So, when I came
- 14 | to the front of the building, there was some confusion where the
- 15 shots had come from. And I saw officers stacked on the corner of
- 16 the building, so I fell into that stack.
- 17 And then when Sergeant Silva indicated that -- over the
- 18 radio, he asked Officer Drauschke's location. And Officer
- 19 Drauschke said he was over by the cars. I knew that the cars were
- 20 | parked on the left side of the building. Then I started to make
- 21 my way toward the customer cars, where I thought Officer Drauschke
- 22 | was.
- 23 I encountered Anthony underneath the awning.
- 24 Q On the way to the --
- 25 A On -- On the way to the cars, correct.

- 1 | Q And then ultimately you made it to the Hummer and where Alan
- 2 | Greenough was located; is that correct?
- 3 A Yes.
- 4 Q Okay. Now, when you saw Officer Drauschke, you indicated
- 5 that he said -- you asked him where the weapon was; is that
- 6 | correct?
- 7 A I did, yes.
- 8 Q That was the first thing you said.
- 9 A First thing.
- 10 | Q And his response was "We could not find a weapon"; is that
- II | correct?
- 12 A Yes.
- 13 | Q And he also says, "He would not show his hands"; is that
- 14 | correct?
- 15 A That's correct.
- 16 Q And what he did not say was: Alan was running at him; isn't
- 17 that correct?
- 18 A He didn't say anything like that, no.
- 19 Q Now, just that back area of the building, you had a good look
- 20 at the window that you thought Alan Greenough may have left the
- 21 | apartment from; is that correct?
- 22 A That is a possibility, he left through that open window. I
- 23 | still don't know to this day if he --
- 24 | Q Okay,
- 25 A -- if he left --

- 1 | Q Well, --
- 2 A -- through that window.
- 3 Q If somebody was coming out of that window, how far up is the
- 4 | window to the ground?
- 5 A A few feet.
- 6 | Q And in order to navigate that few feet, then you -- it falls
- 7 down on sort of like a bulkhead to a basement; is that correct?
- 8 A Yeah, some type of crawlspace or stairwell.
- 9 Q Right.
- 10 A Something to that effect.
- 11 Q So somebody descending or coming down from that window has to
- 12 | negotiate themselves to get over that bulkhead; isn't that
- 13 | correct?
- 14 A Yes.
- 15 Q Okay. And so then can -- The path that leads from that
- 16 bulkhead to the Hummer, if you're facing the window going to the
- 17 | right, are you familiar with that area?
- 18 A Yes.
- 19 Q Okay. And there's a lot of -- There was a lot of -- In
- 20 | February of 2018 when you were there, there was a lot of debris in
- 21 | that area; is that correct?
- 22 A There was snow and there was, like, tree limbs and -- and
- 23 | fencing. Yeah, it was -- it was a congested area.
- 24 Q And so there are a lot of items that somebody would have to
- 25 | navigate in order to get from that window to the Hummer where the

- 1 | cars were kept; is that correct?
- 2 | A I -- I would say that's fair.
- 3 Q Now, you mentioned an incident where you were at the East
- 4 | Coast Gas & Auto Repair. Was it 2014?
- 5 A Two thousand -- Well, 2017.
- 6 Q 2017, where you came with Officer Drauschke and another
- 7 officer because apparently Devin McDonald was locked out of the
- 8 | apartment; --
- 9 A Yes.
- 10 Q -- is that correct? And you testified that that incident was
- 11 resolved when he called -- when Devin called his mother to come
- 12 | pick him up; is that correct?
- 13 A Yes.
- 14 | Q Okay. So nobody was arrested; is that correct?
- 15 A No.
- 16 Q There was no violence that you observed; is that correct?
- 17 A Yeah, or -- or reported, I -- I believe.
- 18 Q And there was no reported violence, either; is that correct?
- 19 A Yes.
- 20 Q Okay. Thank you.
- 21 THE COURT: Thank you.
- 22 Officer Savio, I just have a few questions for you, too, so I
- 23 | can just get the sequence of things correct.
- 24 THE WITNESS: Okay.
- 25 THE COURT: Okay?

CROSS EXAMINATION OF WITNESS, OFFICER DAVID SAVIO

2 BY THE COURT:

1

- 3 Q So, other than the October 11, 2017, incident, the February
- 4 2nd and 3rd, you didn't have any other interactions with Mr.
- 5 Greenough? Or --
- 6 A Cor --
- 7 | Q -- did you?
- 8 A Correct. No, I did not.
- 9 Q Okay, okay. So, when the state police interviewed you, you
- 10 | indicated on page 11, with regard to the October incident, "One
- 11 | night he wouldn't let Devin back in the apartment and Devin
- 12 decided just to have his mom pick him up and he went home. But
- 13 | they were having -- Apparently, Devin and Alan are childhood
- 14 | friends and they kind of have a soft spot for each other. But it
- 15 doesn't seem like they get along when they drink. So I think
- 16 | that's the cause of some of the behavior here, is the drinking or
- 17 | the alcohol dependency."
- 18 So, when you say they kind of had a soft spot for each other,
- 19 | it seemed like you had more knowledge of the relationship between
- 20 the two of them. Is that just from the October 11th incident, or
- 21 where did you get that information about the soft spot they had --
- 22 A I --
- 23 | 0 -- for each other?
- 24 A I believe it was a combination of the call on the 11th and
- 25 | also the call on the 2nd.

- 1 Q Okay. On the 2nd when you responded to that call, Mr.
- 2 | McDonald was under the influence of something; is that correct or
- 3 | fair to say?
- 4 A I'm not sure. I believe it -- On the -- the -- October 11th
- 5 | I believe he had been drinking. But on the 2nd, I'm not -- I'm
- 6 | not sure if he had been drinking.
- 7 | Q Did you speak to him on the 2nd, or was that the -- was that
- 8 Officer -- was it Vatcher who --
- 9 A Vatcher spoke to Officer -- I mean, to Devin.
- 10 Q So you don't know whether he was under the influence?
- II A Not on --
- 12 Q Or you don't recall?
- 13 A I don't recall.
- 14 Q Okay. Do you have any knowledge from that incident as to
- 15 whether the situation with the headlock after the funeral -- Was
- 16 that a mutual-combat situation? Or did you receive any
- 17 | information --
- 18 A Yeah, so after I spoke to Kimberly Bellino upstairs, we -- I
- 19 came downstairs and I conferenced the matter with Officer Vatcher.
- 20 And he indicated that he had a conversation with Devin and he went
- 21 through the facts that Devin presented to him. He indicated that
- 22 Devin said to him that Alan had come home intoxicated and upset
- 23 | from a family friend's wake and that he encountered a sticky door
- 24 | which he kicked m -- many times. And then he came into the
- 25 apartment, he shattered some furniture.

- Devin yelled downstairs to him from the bedroom, "Hey, what's going on down there?" He indicated that Alan ran up the stairs, said some hurtful things to incite a fight, threw some punches and elbow, and then they wrestled a bit. And Devin said that he had
- 5 to put Alan in a headlock to -- to stop the assault.
- Devin was specifically asked -- because there's forms we have to fill out if a strangulation takes place at a domestic.
- 8 Q Mm-hmm.
- 9 A So Devin was specifically asked: was he strangled on scene?
- 10 And he declined and he said it was a mutual headlock.
- 11 0 Mutual headlock.
- And they both denied their rights with regard to 209A to get
- 13 a restraining order, emergency order?
- 14 A Well, Devin did. Alan had already left that time.
- 15 Q I meant -- What I meant was Ms. Bellino. There was --
- 16 A That's correct.
- 17 | Q She was advised of her rights, too.
- 18 A Yes. They both declined emergency orders at that time.
- 19 Q Okay. Was there any reason that evening to check the
- 20 perimeter of the house to look for Mr. Greenough? Did you or
- 21 Officer Vatcher do that that night?
- 22 A No. The information that we had was when Kimberly threatened
- 23 to call the police they said that Alan had already left. A female
- 24 | had come to pick him up in a car.
- 25 Q Okay. Now, on the 3rd when you were waiting, I think you

- said for further instructions either after roll call or when the
- 2 other officers had gone up to the station, you said you heard the
- 3 | transmissions over your radio; is that right?
- 4 A Yes.
- 5 Q And the radio that you're wearing where on your uniform?
- 6 | A Duty belt. We all have issued personal radios. So when we
- 7 | come to role call, we're in uniform, prepared to work, with our
- 8 duty belts on.
- 9 Q Okay. Once you heard those transmissions and you were given
- 10 | further instructions by Sergeant Silva, you and Officer Drauschke
- 11 | went up to the station; is that right?
- 12 A Yes. We went up to 1462 Main Street, which is --
- 13 Q Okay.
- 14 | A -- East Coast Gas.
- 15 | Q Did you go up with lights and sirens, or --
- 16 A Yes.
- 17 Q Yeah, okay.
- 18 A That ACO van, even though it's an animal control officer's
- 19 | van, it's also outfitted with blue emergency lights.
- 20 | Q And when you got up there, did Sergeant Silva direct you to
- 21 go check the perimeter, or did you do that on your own initiative?
- 22 A I did that on my own initiative.
- 23 | Q Okay.
- 24 A And then later he confirmed for me to stay where I was, via
- 25 | that radio transmission.

- 1 | Q And was that after you radioed to him about the window?
- 2 A Correct.
- 3 Q Did he send any other officers out to assist you with the
- 4 | perimeter once you said you saw the window in the state it was?
- 5 A No. But I did see him at the corner of the building at some
- 6 | point.
- 7 Q Saw who?
- 8 A Sergeant Silva.
- 9 Q But you don't know whether the window was in that condition
- 10 | before or when the screen was -- came out of the window.
- 11 A No.
- 12 Q Okay. You also testified that when your -- You didn't hear
- 13 the transmission that Officer Drauschke made about locating Mr.
- 14 | Greenough. Did you say you didn't hear that?
- 15 A I did not hear that first transmission.
- 16 Q Okay. And I don't -- How does that -- I mean, are there --
- 17 | Sometimes are there transmissions that are missed over an
- 18 officer's radio?
- 19 A It -- It happens sometimes. You just don't hear the
- 20 transmissions.
- 21 | Q But to your knowledge you heard all the other transmissions --
- 22 A Yes.
- 23 | Q -- at issue that night, just not that one.
- 24 A Just not that specific one.
- 25 1 O Okay. How far away were you when you're standing by the

window from ultimately where you found Officer Drauschke and Mr.

- 2 Greenough?
- 3 | A I would -- I would estimate 60 yards, maybe.
- 4 Q Now, you said something about training with regard to
- 5 | commercial property, and that's how you knew where to go?
- 6 A Yeah. So, in our police department, one of the
- 7 responsibilities of the A shift, which is the midnight-to-eight
- 8 officers, is each night at around five in the morning we have to
- 9 do a round of commercial building checks. Each officer that's
- 10 | assigned to that shift has to check every single commercial
- 11 business in their sector as well as all the schools and parks.
- 12 So, every single shift that you work, you drive through every
- 13 | single commercial lot, park, and school. So you become very
- 14 | familiar with the commercial businesses, the parks, and the
- 15 | schools as a result.

- 16 | Q So, when you said when the shots -- when you heard the shots,
- 17 | I think you used the word -- the officers were -- you were
- 18 originally "stacked." And then once Officer Drauschke gave his
- 19 | location -- "By the cars" -- you, based on that knowledge, then
- 20 | peeled off and went which way?
- 21 A So, originally when I came around the front of the building,
- 22 there was some confusion where those gunshots rang out from. And
- 23 | I saw officers stacked on the entryway to the apartment. I
- 24 | figured if these officers are stacked on the entryway to the
 - apartment, maybe they believe the shots came from inside the

- 1 apartment.
- 2 O Mm-hmm.
- 3 A So I stacked on the officers, planning that they were going
- 4 to make an entry.
- 5 | O Mm-hmm.
- 6 A And then Sergeant Silva indicated over the radio, to Officer
- 7 Drauschke, "What's your location?"
- 8 And he said, "Over by the cars."
- 9 And then I knew -- a lightbulb went on -- if he's over by the
- 10 cars, the customer cars are parked to the left side of the
- 11 | building if facing the building from the street. So I made my way
- 12 | toward those cars.
- 13 Q Did you communicate that to the other officers, or you just
- 14 | went to the left side on your own?
- 15 A Yeah, I -- I just went. And, I mean, this is a extremely
- 16 stressful situation.
- 17 Q Mm-hmm.
- 18 A When you hear gunshots ring out, you -- you know, you're
- 19 | fearful of getting harmed.
- 20 | Q | Mm-hmm.
- 21 A You're fearful of not seeing your family again. And this
- 22 | isn't a regular call like an OUI arrest where you can just, you
- 23 know, say all the facts of the case and it's this simple. It --
- 24 Q Mm-hmm.
- 25 A It can become a little distorted, a little bit confusing.

- 1 There can be stress distortions that --
- 2 Q Mm-hmm.
- 3 A It's a very, very stress -- the first time in my career I
- 4 | experienced this level of stress.
- 5 Q So, you took off in that direction.
- 6 A Yeah.
- 7 Q And then I think you testified when you got over there you
- 8 | saw the other officers standing; is that right?
- 9 A Yes,
- 10 Q Okay. And "the other officers," again, being? Who was there
- 11 already?
- 12 A So, it was Officer Drauschke.
- 13 Q Mm-hmm.
- 14 A He was standing to the left. The suspect was in the middle,
- 15 | handcuffed and on the ground. Officer Gooley was on the right.
- 16 Q And the first thing you asked is -- 'cause you were going to
- 17 | secure the weapon, is "Where's the weapon?"
- 18 A That's right.
- 19 Q And Officer Drauschke responded how?
- 20 | A He could not find a weapon.
- 21 | Q Was anyone directed that night to do an additional search to
- 22 | see if you could find a weapon?
- 23 A I know that I searched the -- the passenger compartment of
- 24 | the Hummer myself. There was a Hummer H2 that was right there at
- 25 the scene. And I remember checking that passenger compartment

- 1 | seat, just making sure that there was no weapon there.
- 2 Q On your own initiative.
- 3 A Yes.
- 4 Q No one directed you to do that.
- 5 A I don't believe so.
- 6 Q Was there any search of the yard there for any weapon, either
- 7 | the -- what y'all believed was the pole or the stick or anything?
- 8 | A Not at that initial time because, as I say, once we
- 9 determined that there was no weapon in the immediate area after
- 10 Officer Drauschke explained that to me, the thing that we focused
- 11 on was preservation of life and -- and administer first aid.
- 12 I'm not sure what -- After the EMTs came and -- and -- and we
- 13 were swapped out by EMTs, I'm not sure what assignments Sergeant
- 14 | Silva gave what officers, because I was assigned to Officer
- 15 Drauschke.
- 16 Q And it's your testimony today -- I just want to make sure I'm
- 17 | clear on this -- that you -- when you ran by Mr. Greenough's
- 18 | brother, now you're not sure what you heard?
- 19 A Well, he said several statements. And it was riddled with --
- 20 | it was riddled with s -- like, swear words.
- 21 O Mm-hmm.
- 22 A So, I'm not sure of the exact verbiage. So, I don't think
- 23 | it's fair to quote someone if you don't know the exact thing they
- 24 | said. I know how I understood it. And my understand is -- is
- 25 | that he was threatening a lawsuit.

- 1 Q Okay. And I appreciate what you said about "not fair." But
- 2 | you did tell -- give a statement to the state police indicating
- 3 | that --
- 4 | A Yes. I'm just not m -- remembering that specific language
- 5 | right now.
- 6 Q Okay. And it's your understanding from the February 2nd
- 7 | incident that Officer Vatcher was seeking a summons or a warrant?
- 8 A No, I -- it was my understanding on scene that night that he
- 9 | was going to a -- apply for an arrest warrant. And that's what
- 10 | the radio transmission says, if -- if you listen to the radio
- 11 transmission.
- 12 Q But separate from the radio transmission, he had communicated
- 13 | that to you or you had some discussion about it?
- 14 A Yes.
- 15 Q And did you observe the bullet wounds to Mr. Greenough?
- 16 A Yes.
- 17 Q And where were they located?
- 18 | A They were the right portion of his chest, within an inch of
- 19 each other. If you're facing the suspect, a little offset to the
- 20 | right.
- THE COURT: Ms. Lynch, do you have any questions?
- 22 MS. LYNCH: Nothing, thank you.
- 23 THE COURT: Thank you. Anything? No?
- 24 | Thank you very much, officer.
- 25 MR. KOUFMAN: Judge, can I just ask one?

THE COURT: Okay. Ţ 2 THE CLERK: So if I could --THE COURT: Absolutely. 3 [OFFICER ERIK DRAUSCHKE, Sworn.] 4 THE WITNESS: Good morning, Judge. 5 THE COURT: Good morning. DIRECT EXAMINATION OF WITNESS, OFFICER ERIK DRAUSCHKE 7 BY MS. LYNCH: 8 Good afternoon, sir. If you would please state your name and 9 spell your last name for the record. 10 It's Erik with Good afternoon. It's Officer Erik Drauschke. 11 A a K. Last name is D-R-A-U-S-C-H-K-E. And it's Badge No. 74. And, sir, can you tell us what your occupation is? 13 I'm a police officer in the town of Reading. 14 15 How long have you been a police officer in the town of 16 Reading? Right now it's been approximately 12 1/2 years. 17 Prior to becoming a police officer, did you have any other 18 19 law enforcement or security experience? I worked as a security officer for several different 20 companies. They included Stop & Shop loss prevention; as well as 21 a company that was Kemm [phonetic] Security that became Selonon 23 [phonetic] Security, working over -- it was overnight security for 24 the protection of buildings; and also briefly as a security guard

at a college campus.

- I Q Now, sir, directing your attention to Friday, February 2nd of
- 2 2018, were you on duty with the Reading Police?
- 3 A I was.
- 4 | Q And what were your hours and assignment that night?
- 5 A I was working 4:00 p.m. to 12:00 a.m., the C shift. And I
- 6 | was assigned to Sector 2. I -- As I recall, it was Car 1.
- 7 Q And is that a marked police cruiser?
- 8 A It is.
- 9 Q And are you in uniform or plain clothes?
- 10 A In uniform.
- II Q And did you have a partner or were you alone?
- 12 A I was lone.
- 13 | Q Now, on that particular evening what were your duties?
- 14 | A The Sector 2 that I was assigned to is the south side of
- 15 town. It's delineated south and west of the train tracks that are
- 16 | in town.
- 17 Q And the area of 1462 Main Street, was that within your sector
- 18 | that night?
- 19 A No.
- 20 | Q Now, during the course of your duties, were you dispatched to
- 21 | a call at 1462 Main Street with other officers?
- 22 A I was.
- 23 Q And in terms of that call, did you receive that assignment
- 24 | through a radio transmission?
- 25 | A As I recall, yes. From -- And I responded from the station,

- 1 | as I recall.
- 2 | Q And did -- were you the only officer that responded, or did
- 3 other officers respond?
- 4 A No, other officers responded as well.
- 5 | Q And do you recall who those officers were?
- 6 A As I recall, Officer Savio, Officer Fontes, and Officer
- 7 | Vatcher.
- 8 | Q And was there a reason that four officers were dispatched to
- 9 | that particular call?
- 10 | A We've all been familiar -- at least Officer Savio, Officer
- 11 | Vatcher, and I have been familiar with that location for previous
- 12 | calls for domestic incidents involving several roommates having
- discrepancies and having consumed alcohol and that being a part of
- 14 | it, as well as I've also responded there prior times for alarm
- 15 calls or gas leaks.
- 16 Q Now, in terms of the nature of the call, were you familiar
- 17 | with Alan Greenough at the time that you received the assignment
- 18 to go to 1462 Main Street?
- 19 A I was.
- 20 Q Had you ever arrested Mr. Greenough before?
- 21 A Not from what I recall.
- 22 | Q And how many prior interactions with him had you had?
- 23 A Maybe two.
- 24 | Q And do you recall when they were in relation to this
- 25 | particular evening?



- 1 A The only one that I can recall a specific date for was
 2 several months before February we had responded, as Officer Savio
- 3 had stated, to a call for a roommate being locked out of the
- 4 residence.
- 5 Q And so you responded to that call --
- 6 A Correct.
- $7 \mid 0$ -- at that location.
- When you arrived at that location, were other officers
- 9 | already there?
- 10 A I recall us all arriving approximately the same time.
- 11 | Q And what did you encounter when you arrived at that location?
- 12 A The victim, iden -- later identified as Mr. McDonald, was
- 13 outside. And he was starting to explain to us that Alan had
- 14 already left the residence with a unknown female in an unknown
- 15 vehicle in an unknown direction of travel, was what I understood.
- 16 Q And you received this information when you were outside?
- 17 A Correct.
- 18 Q What happened next?
- 19 A As we went inside with Mr. McDonald, we entered the front
- 20 | entrance into the apartment. As you walk down the hallway, it's
- 21 | the door on the left. We walked into the kitchen to go over what
- 22 had occurred with Mr. McDonald.
- 23 O Now, when you entered this, this is the exterior door that
- 24 | leads into a hallway?
- 25 A Correct.

- 1 Q And you say that you went into the door to the left?
- 2 A Correct.
- 3 Q And what room do you enter as you -- as that door opens from
- 4 | the hall?
- 5 A You enter right into the kitchen.
- 6 Q What did you observe about the kitchen when you went in?
- 7 A The kitchen was in disarray. It was a mess. There was
- 8 | broken pieces of furniture all over the kitchen floor. It looked
- 9 like shattered pieces of wood from a table and chairs.
- 10 Q And showing you what has previously been admitted as Exhibit
- 11 No. 46, do you recognize this?
- 12 A Yes. That's the broken table.
- 13 | Q And is that a fair and accurate representation of the way it
- 14 appeared to you that night?
- 15 A I'm sure it had been shuffled around a bit while we were
- 16 | there trying to kick it out of the way. But, yes, that's what was
- 17 on the floor.
- 18 Q Okay. And do you know who took pictures that night, if
- 19 anyone?
- 20 A I do not recall who specifically took the photographs.
- 21 Q Okay. But you did not.
- 22 A Not from what I recall.
- 23 Q Okay. Now, when you entered the room and saw that, what if
- 24 | anything did you and the other officers do? Well, first of all,
- 25 | who went into the apartment?

- 1 A From what I recall, Officer Savio, Officer Vatcher, and I
- 2 entered. I later realized that Officer Fontes had come in at some
- 3 | point after us. I was unaware of where he was specifically at
- 4 | that time.
- 5 Q Okay. So, you are in the apartment. Where do you go in the
- 6 | apartment itself?
- 7 A As I was standing in the kitchen listening to Mr. McDonald's
- 8 explanation of what happened, we had explained to him that we were
- 9 | going to check the residence to make sure that Mr. Greenough was
- 10 | not still there. And as from what I recall, myself and I believe
- 11 Officer Fontes checking down in the basement, as well as in his
- 12 bedroom which we learned was off to the right when you came in
- 13 | that kitchen door, off to the right, that was also split into part
- 14 of a living room.
- 15 Q How did you access the basement?
- 16 A From a -- As you went through the kitchen, it was a door that
- 17 | was at the end of the kitchen.
- 18 Q And was it straight ahead or --
- 19 A It was --
- 20 | Q -- to the side?
- 21 A -- off to the right, from what I recall.
- 22 Q Okay. Did you observe anything in the basement?
- 23 A I did not observe anyone inside the basement, no.
- 24 Q Where else did you go?
- 25 A And I also went into what I later found out was Alan's

- bedroom, which as I mentioned was off to the righthand side of the
- 2 | kitchen that was split in two between -- it looked like a bedroom
- 3 | and a living room.
- 4 Q And as you went in that location, what observations if any
- 5 | did you make that you noted at that time?
- 6 A I decided to check around the bed to make sure that he wasn't
- 7 hiding underneath or under any sheets. I observed several things
- 8 | that had taken my attention. One of them was a -- a hatchet --
- 9 looked like it was old and rusty -- with a wooden handle that was
- 10 up over the mantlepiece, as well as a gunlock that I recognized as
- 11 | a cable-style gunlock that was on a table. It looked like a
- 12 | coffee table inside that room.
- 13 Q Okay. And I'm just going to approach you before I put it on
- 14 | the presenter. Showing you what has been marked as Exhibit No.
- 15 | 18, do you recognize the area that's depicted in that photograph?
- 16 A Yes. That's the living room portion of that bedroom that was
- 17 Alan's.
- 18 | Q And do you see the items that you observed that Friday night,
- 19 | specifically the hatchet and the -- what appeared to be a gunlock?
- 20 A Yes. This is the hatchet right up here above the
- 21 | mantlepiece, behind this motorcycle model. And this is the
- 22 | cable-style gunlock with a black cable and the yellow locking
- 23 | mechanism.
- 24 | Q Okay. So, you've just pointed to two locations that I will
- 25 | point when I put it on the presenter.

- And then just showing you Exhibit 52, do you recognize what's depicted there?
- 3 A Yes, that's that same gunlock that I just had explained.
- 4 | Q And just showing you Exhibit 18, the area of the hatchet, is
- 5 | that where -- is this the item that I'm pointing to that appears
- 6 | to be behind a figurine of a motorcycle?
- 7 A Correct.
- 8 Q And is that the position that those items were in as you
- 9 | recalled seeing them on the night?
- 10 A I do not recall the hatchet being specifically behind that
- 11 | model, but I could be mistaken.
- 12 Q Okay. But you remember the hatchet.
- 13 A Correct.
- 14 | Q And it's that hatchet.
- 15 A Yes.
- 16 Q Now, the area of this table here, is that the area where you
- 17 | -- the item you recognized as a gunlock was?
- 18 A Correct.
- 19 Q And showing you Exhibit 52, what is this item?
- 20 A That's the gunlock that I had seen.
- 21 \ Q Now, you indicated that you had prior familiarity with that.
- 22 | Can you just generally describe for us how that is engaged when it
- 23 | is used as a gunlock itself?
- 24 A This is a similar gunlock to ones that we actually give out
- 25 | as -- I believe it's called Project S -- Child Safe from the

station. Officers are generally given one of these to go along with their firearm when they become a police officer so that the firearm is safe at your house as well as possibly being inside a -a locked safe or cabinet.

So, when the cable goes down, generally in a handgun it goes generally down through the chamber or it could go down through the slide when the slide is racked back and come out down through the handle. You then lock it into the yellow locking mechanism there and there's a key. Or some gunlocks possibly have a combination lock.

THE COURT: Can I just ask a question about that. That same lock, officer, could be used for a bike; is that right?

THE WITNESS: Not that I'm aware of, no.

THE COURT: That lock can't be used for a bike?

THE WITNESS: I've never seen that specifically used for a bike. Bike cable locks are generally a lot bigger and generally have a spiral-corded expandable cable to them.

THE COURT: Okay. Because there is an exhibit with a bicycle in it. And I'm wondering whether or not you saw that bike in Mr. Greenough's bedroom on -- when you went.

THE WITNESS: Since I have seen these exhibits, I have seen that bike. But I don't recall seeing the bike or having that go through my mind as even an option that night.

THE COURT: Okay, Thank you.

25 BY MS. LYNCH:

- 1 | Q And in terms of the bike lock -- strike that -- the gunlock
- 2 | that you observed in that, it was empty at the time you saw it?
- 3 A Correct.
- 4 | Q As a result of that, what if anything did you do or say at
- 5 | that time, if anything?
- 6 | A I thought it was unusual. I had made a mental note of it.
- 7 | And from what I recall, I had listened when the other officers
- 8 | were interviewing Mr. McDonald. And we have a check-sheet that
- 9 goes through an assessment of injuries as well as domestic
- 10 | violence worksheet. And one of the questions that specifically is
- in there is: does the suspect have a firearm or does he have easy
- 12 | access to one? And I had recalled hearing him say no.
- But I thought I had recalled mentioning it to them: "This
- 14 seems kind of odd, even though he just said no, that there is a --
- 15 | a gunlock here." And I don't recall anyone else making a big deal
- 16 out of it, that I had noticed it.
- 17 | Q Now, at that time, having noted that, was Mr. McDonald asked,
- 18 | "Does he have a qun or does he have access to a qun?"
- 19 A He had been asked by the other officers during that
- 20 | checklist, yes.
- 21 Q Yes. And he answered no to those questions?
- 22 A Correct, from what I understood.
- 23 | Q Now, in terms of your observations in the room, it's fair to
- 24 | say Mr. Greenough was not in the room.
- 25 A Correct.

I Q And after you had looked in the room and made those observations, what happened next?

A I had gone back just to confer with the other officers about what had occurred. I had been made aware that Mr. McDonald and

Mr. Greenough had a -- both a verbal and a physical altercation.

6 Mr. McDonald informed us several times, like a broken record, that
7 he had consumed several drinks after getting home from work.

When Alan had come home from a wake, Alan was upset. He had evidently smashed either several of the chairs or the table; I'm not sure which order. There was some more verbal argument. He then later went down and smashed the rest of the furniture that was inside the kitchen.

While I was speaking with them, Officer Savio had been upstairs. He had spoken with a female that I was unaware was in the residence that I later found out was last-name Ms. Bellino and that she had also been assaulted by Mr. Greenough physically.

They had both been advised of their rights.

Someone had requested that photographs be taken of both Mr. McDonald as well as the residence.

They were informed of any -- if they had any injuries that they had the right to be seen by the medical staff, as well as their 209A rights.

- Q And this was handled by other officers?
- A Correct. I was just a backup officer there in case they needed any assistance.

- And at some point were you actually called away to go to a
- 2 | call?
- 3 A I did actually -- Once I realized that they were all set,
- 4 | that Mr. Greenough was not there and that the matter was being
- 5 | handled, that charges were going to be filed, I cleared the scene
- 6 | if I wasn't needed. And I did end up responding to another call.
- 7 | Q Now, during your interaction with Mr. McDonald that night,
- 8 | did you make any observations concerning his sobriety?
- 9 A I observed that he had been drinking. I could detect the
- 10 odor of alcohol. I did not know whether he was intoxicated. But
- 11 he had admitted several times that he had consumed alcohol and
- 12 that he was home when he had done it. And he had just come home
- 13 from work, and that's why he chose to have a few drinks.
- 14 Q And did he make any statements to you that you heard or that
- 15 you -- to officers that you heard concerning Mr. Greenough's
- 16 | sobriety?
- 17 A I do not recall that.
- 18 Q Now, what was your understanding, as you cleared from that
- 19 call, concerning what action if any was to be taken concerning Mr.
- 20 | Greenough and the events that night?
- 21 A I was aware that there were going to be charges filed for
- 22 assault and battery. They were also putting out a BOLO, "be on
- 23 | the lookout, " for Mr. Greenough for PC to arrest if he had been
- 24 | located.
- 25 Q And after that BOLO went out or while that BOLO was going out

- 1 | -- "be on the lookout," that is -- did you resume your patrol?
- 2 A Yes, I -- As I stated, I had gone to another call for
- 3 | service.
- 4 Q During that time that you were working that night, how late
- 5 | did you work that night?
- 6 A Until midnight.
- 7 Q During the time that you left the house until the time that
- 8 you left your duty that morning, now on the 3rd, had you had any
- 9 | contact with Mr. Greenough yourself?
- 10 A No.
- 11 | Q Had you any information that Mr. Greenough had been located
- 12 by any officers?
- 13 A No.

- 14 | Q Was there any information that anyone had any contact,
- 15 | whether in person or by telephone, with Mr. Greenough?
- 16 A No.
- 17 | Q Now, after you went home from work that day, when were you
- 18 | next at work as a Reading police officer?
- 19 A I was working the next C shift on the next day, on Saturday
- 20 | the 3rd, from 4:00 p.m. until 12:00 a.m.
- 21 Q And again was it a uniform patrol?
- 22 A Yes.
- 23 Q Was it supposed to be a marked vehicle?
- 24 | A Yes.
- 25 | Q And were you expecting to have a partner or to be alone?

- 1 A To be alone.
- 2 | Q Now, when did -- Where did you report for duty that
- 3 | afternoon?
- 4 | A Generally when I report for duty I get there, as best as I
- 5 | can, 15 to 10 minutes ahead of time if I need to change into my
- 6 | full uniform as well as my duty belt. Or sometimes if I worked
- 7 | the detail I already come in uniform. As best as I recall, I had
- 8 gone down to the basement to change, that day.
- 9 Q Okay. So, you actually got dressed into your uniform at the
- 10 | station prior to reporting?
- 11 | A From what I recall, yes.
- 12 Q So, once you changed into your uniform, where did you report?
- 13 A Up to roll call.
- 14 Q Do you remember about what time it was that you arrived at
- 15 | roll call?
- 16 A It was right approximately at four o'clock.
- 17 | Q Now, prior to reporting to roll call, were you monitoring or
- 18 hearing any of the radio transmissions?
- 19 A I do not recall having my radio on at that point in time.
- 20 Occasionally I do have to change the battery out or I have it
- 21 | turned off.
- 22 Q Now, when you got up to the radio room, what if anything did
- 23 | you observe? -- the roll call room, what if anything did you
- 24 | observe?
- of A I recall shortly being followed by Officer Savio at one

- I point. I did not recall seeing anyone else inside the roll call
- 2 | room, which is unusual 'cause generally the sergeant's there
- 3 | waiting to start roll call. The other two officers that are
- 4 | normally on the shift were not in the room, from what I recall.
- 5 | O And would that be Vatcher and Fontes?
- 6 A Correct.
- 7 | Q What happened when you and Officer Savio found the roll call
- 8 room empty?
- 9 A I'm not sure who had made us aware but someone had made us
- 10 aware at that point, after we noticed that no one was in there and
- Il gone out towards the hall, that there was another similar incident
- 12 as the night before, up at 1462 Main Street, the East Coast Gas
- 13 | Station, involving the same individuals.
- 14 Q And were you advised as to who if anyone was responding to
- 15 | that call at that point?
- 16 A As far as I was aware, the dayshift was already up there.
- 17 | And at one point I had been made aware that Officer Vatcher had
- 18 | gone up there.
- 19 Q Now, on that particular afternoon, you were getting -- you
- 20 and Officer Savio were both reporting to duty for four o'clock; is
- 21 | that right?
- 22 A Correct.
- 23 | Q And you were getting this information from who, concerning
- 24 | what was going on?
- 25 A I had gone down the hall to hear several broadcasts over --

- 1 | through dispatch. You can hear their radio out loud as you're
- 2 | walking down the hallway. Lieutenant McKenna and Sergeant Silva,
- 3 | I recall, were also present in the station. And at one point I
- 4 | had gone in to speak with them, as well.
- 5 Q What happened when you went in to speak with them?
- 6 A I recall going in and being present with Sergeant Silva while
- 7 | they were looking to see if there was the PC still to arrest Mr.
- 8 Greenough, as well as what other charges may be present at that
- 9 | current time.
- 10 | Q Now, were you familiar with or were you present for a radio
- 11 | transmission made by Sergeant Silva to Officer Wilson regarding
- 12 | sending Officer Vatcher up?
- 13 A Yes.
- 14 | Q And in terms of Officer Vatcher, did he have any special
- 15 responsibilities relative to the call that you had responded to
- 16 | the night before?
- 17 A I was just aware that he had already been sent up there prior
- 18 to my arrival.
- 19 Q Okay. But the question I was asking has to do with the
- 20 February 2nd response. Was he the reporting officer?
- 21 A He was, on the 2nd. Yes, that's correct.
- 22 Q Now, as part of your presence in that area of the police
- 23 | station at approximately 4:02:28 p.m., did you hear a radio
- 24 | transmission from Officer Gooley that Mr. McDonald had arrived at
- 25 | the scene but the keys didn't work on the deadbolt?

- 1 | A I didn't remember hearing any specific names. I just
 2 recalled hearing a conversation in the background while I was
 3 standing between dispatch and the sergeant's office regarding them

- As you were situated walking in that direction, did you observe anything that attracted your attention?
- A As I had been panning the area, searching around, I had

 observed as I got close enough to the vehicle to be able to see

 inside that H2 Hummer I could see a white male leaning towards the

 inside, towards the center of that Hummer H2, in the front seat.

Was the door of the Hummer open or closed?

- 1 | A It was closed.
- 2 Q And was there any illumination in the area, other than the
- 3 | daylight conditions, at that point in time?
- 4 | A Just from what I recall, daylight conditions.
- 5 | Q Now, as you were approaching in this area prior to seeing
- 6 | this individual leaned over towards the driver's side of the
- 7 Hummer, had you seen any pedestrians or people in the area of
- 8 | those vehicles or -- for lack of a better word -- junk?
- ON A NO.
- 10 Q At the point when you approached, -- Let me ask you this:
- 11 that day, did you have a duty belt with a department-issued
- 12 | firearm?
- 13 A I did.
- 14 Q Are you righthanded or lefthanded?
- 15 A I'm lefthanded.
- 16 | Q And so, your sidearm is at your left side?
- 17 A Correct.
- 18 | Q As you were making your way, looking to see in that side --
- 19 | as you're facing the building, the left side of the building, what
- 20 was the condition of your sidearm at that point?
- 21 A I -- It was holstered at that time. And the -- It's a
- 22 | Level 3 retention holster. The top latch or loop, as you could

- 20 O And so, that was the radio transmission I believe, for the
- 21 record, Track 38, February 3rd, at 4:33:13?

- 25 Q At the point when you said that, what was the condition of

- 1 | the door of the Hummer?
- 2 A The door was still closed.
- 3 Q At that point, what was the condition of your sidearm?

- 5 | Q After you made that radio transmission -- Now, in order to
- 6 make a radio transmission, did you have a handheld radio or was it
- 7 one of those portable ones that clipped onto your uniform?

- 4-184 whole body. I could see him leaned over towards the center of the -- the Hummer, towards the console, with -- Both hands were hidden 2 3 in the front pocket of his hooded sweatshirt. He -- He looked at me. I could see that he was staring right 4 through me. 5 I then said, "Take your hands out of your pockets." 6 He said something to the effect, while he was staring at me, 7 "Fuck you." 8 And did he say it in that tone of voice? 9 Yes. It was angry. It was not calm. 10 So, then I realized that he's not going to follow my 11 commands. I -- So, per training from the academy and all our 12 firearms training, I create a distance, I drew my firearm, and I 13 again ordered him to show me his hands, to which he said something 14 to the effect of, "Fucking shoot me," or, "Fuck you. Shoot me." 15 So, at that point --16 Okay. Can I just --17 Ye --18 19 -- stop you for a moment there. When you were having this exchange with this man, did you recognize who it was? 20
 - I had recognized it as Alan Greenough. I hadn't seen 21 him in a while but I did recognize him. And he also matched the 22
 - 23 description that was given as a tall, skinny, white male.

From what I had later found out was Anthony, as well as one 25

Okay. And who did you get that description from?

- of the other employees that I believe works at the gas station.
- 2 Q And when had they given you that description?
- 3 A As I was exiting the gas station and going to look for him.
- 4 Q Okay. So, when we saw the video of you walking out of the
- 5 | station and heading towards that area, it was --
- 6 A From what I recall, it was while we had been in the gas
- 7 | station, exiting, yes.
- 8 Q Now, at the point when you gave Mr. Greenough the command to
- 9 show you his hands and to get out of the vehicle, was your gun
- 10 unholstered at that point?
- 11 A When I first gave him the command and saw his hands were in
- 12 | there, my gun was still holstered.

- 25 A So, I had started, as I mentioned, to back up away from him

- 1 as best as I could, keeping my distance but keeping close enough
- 2 | that should he comply -- that I could go to the next procedure
- 3 | which would be to have him get down on the ground and go into the
- 4 prone position.
- 5 Q Now, were you able to maintain a distance between you and Mr.
- 6 Greenough as you were backing up and he was exiting the vehicle?
- 7 A I was only able to go, as I mentioned, as quick as it
- 8 happened, as fast as I could give him the commands and take a step
- 9 | back in the time to keep my balance.
- 10 Q And as you were doing so, were you aware of what your
- 11 backdrop was?
- 12 A I was not immediately aware that my back was turned to that
- 13 | vehicle, no.
- 14 Q Can you describe what is happening to the distance between
- 15 | you as you're backing up and he's heading towards you?
- 16 A So, as I had given him several commands and I realized that
- 17 he wasn't going to follow my commands, I said in my head, "He's
- 18 not complying. He has a firearm drawn at him. Whatever's in that
- 19 | pocket, as soon as he takes any steps closer he's going to ~~ it's
- 20 going to come out of the pocket and he's going to use it."
- 21 Q This is your thought process --
- 22 A This is my thought process.
- 23 | O -- at that time?
- 24 A As quick as -- as he -- he was coming out and I was giving
 - bim the commands: "He's not listening, he's not listening."

- And at that point, after I had mentioned about five or six times, he started to charge towards me --
- 3 O Now, --
- 4 A -- with his hands still in his pocket.
- 5 Q Can you describe, when you say "charge" -- The hands are in
- 6 the pocket. What type of a garment is this, if you recall?
- 7 A It's a hooded sweatshirt or a hooded jacket that did not have
- 8 | a zipper, 'cause we had to cut it off.
- 9 Q Okay. So the hands are in like a pouch --
- 10 A Tucked in.
- 11 | Q -- pocket?
- 12 A Correct.
- 13 | Q And can you see them at any point as he's coming towards you?
- 14 A I could not see his hands, no.
- 15 Q When you are backing up, you described that at some point he
- 16 | began charging?
- 17 A Correct.
- 18 Q What do you mean by charging?
- 19 A So, I can -- It's probably best to demonstrate, if I may.
- 20 | Q Sure.
- 21 A So, as I was trying to step back and keep the distance, he
- 22 | started lunging in the charging motion like this --
- 23 Q So, for purposes of the --
- 24 | A -- with his hands in his pockets. So, for the purposes of
- 25 | explaining it, it s -- it starts off with a lunging motion, I

- 1 | guess you would say, coming towards me faster than I could back up
- 2 | in the limited space that I had had.
- 3 Q And so, with -- for purposes of demonstration, is your body
- 4 | straight-upright or is it at an angle, pitched forward as --
- 5 A I would say it would be cantered forward.
- 6 Q Okay. And how far -- Now, -- So, as you were thinking this,
- 7 | what was your state of mind as to whether or not you were faced
- 8 | with a situation of serious bodily harm or death?
- 9 A I said, "He has a weapon. It's in there." And as soon as he
- 10 | charged towards me, I said, "It's coming out and he's either going
- 11 to seriously injure me or he's going to kill me."
- 12 Q So what did you do?
- 13 A So, at that point, as I mentioned, I had my firearm drawn
- 14 center mass. I fired two shots to stop the threat.
- 15 Q And when you shot two shots at the center mass -- Did you
- 16 receive training in use of deadly force in the course of your
- 17 | training and experience as a police officer?
- 18 A Yes, I have.
- 19 | Q And did you receive any specific training as to when you're
- 20 | in a situation where you believe you are confronted with imminent
- 21 danger of death or serious bodily injury, where you are to aim?
- 22 A Yes.
- 23 Q And what is that?
- 24 A And that would be center mass, which is the largest portion
- of the body that you're confronted with.

- 1 Q And in terms of your training and experience, is there
- 2 anything that you received in your training concerning the amount
- 3 of times or the number of discharges?
- 4 A You fire to stop the threat.
- 5 Q And so, you indicate that you fired twice?
- 6 A Correct.
- 7 Q And why did you stop?
- 8 A I stopped because the threat stopped. He stopped in his
- 9 tracks and started to turn around. And that's when he had gone
- 10 down to the ground.
- 11 Q Now, officer, as you were backing up, how close did you get
- 12 to the other cars that were in that row behind the Hummer?
- 13 A After looking around and assessing where I had been, I was
- 14 probably only a matter of about a foot from that back of that
- 15 | vehicle.
- 16 | Q Okay. And I'm just going to -- just want to show you this
- 17 | photograph which has been admitted as Exhibit 27. Do you
- 18 | recognize what this shows?
- 19 A Right. So, this is the Hummer up to your left corner. The
- 20 | wood fence line over here. [Indicating.] These are several of
- 21 the other vehicles that I had mentioned were -- realized
- 22 afterwards were behind us. And this is the one -- appears to be
- 23 | right here -- that was directly behind where I was standing. And
- 24 | this is where he had ended up turning and falling onto the ground,
- 25 | where this blood is depicted.

- I Q And if I might just have one moment. Showing you what has
- 2 been admitted as Exhibit 25, can you indicate, at the time that
- 3 | you shot, was the front door of the Hummer open or closed?
- 4 | A From what I recall, the front door was still open.
- 5 Q So, this is the area that you were backing up towards when
- 6 you discharged your firearm?
- 7 A Correct. This is the front door over here, the furthest away
- 8 | from us, the back of the hummer, as I mentioned, where I had been,
- 9 in between the rear of the Hummer, the rear corner here, and that
- 10 | fence line.
- 11 Q Now, now at that point when -- You may resume the stand;
- 12 sorry. At that point, once Mr. Greenough was on the ground, what
- 13 | if anything did you do at that time?
- 14 A I had continued to give him orders to show me his hands,
- 15 | 'cause his hands were still tucked inside the front pocket of his
- 16 | sweatshirt as he was going from the standing up down onto his
- 17 knees, from what I recall. I didn't know whether he could hear me
- 18 or if he just wasn't complying still. So I continued to give him
- 19 orders to show me his hands, to which he failed to do.
- 20 | Q Now, can I just step back for one moment: you were backing up
- 21 | into an area that you -- Were you aware of what was behind you?
- 22 | A I hadn't looked to see exactly what is behind me until I had
- 23 assessed the threat and then started to back up, to look to see
- 24 | where he was in regards to where I was.

nid you have a sense that you had a clear path out of that

- area? 1 I did not appear to have a clear path out of that area, no. 2 Not -- Not from what I had seen, not with that fence, the Hummer, 3 and then the vehicles behind me. 5 I'm confused by the question and the answer, 6 because I think it was asked earlier. So, was the -- When did you become aware of what was behind you? You said when you assess the 8 threat? A -- After I had -- After the threat -- After I THE WITNESS: 10 had fired the two shots and he was going down on the ground and I 11 was giving him orders to show me his hands, I had taken a l --12 You're trained to look around you to see if there's any additional 13 threats and see your surroundings. 14 THE COURT: And that was the first time you --And that's when I had realized the vehicle was 15 THE WITNESS: 16 right behind me, correct. 17 THE COURT: You weren't aware of it before you fired. 18 THE WITNESS: No, I was not aware that it was directly behind 19 me. - We both were able to get his hands out of his pockets and
- 2 | handcuffed, at that point.
- $3 \mid Q$ Now, at that point once you were able to handcuff Mr.
- 4 Greenough, did you do any search or check for weapons?
- 5 A Yes, I did. I -- I tried to do a fast pat-frisk of the area
- 6 that was where his hands had been as well as his upper torso and
- 7 | start with his pockets, at which point Sergeant Silva had come
- 8 over and had stated, "We need to make sure that we're starting
- 9 first aid after he's checked."
- 10 Q And what happened next?
- 11 A So, we had flipped him over so he -- he was laying with his
- 12 | face up.
- Other officers started to show up. I recall someone asking
- 14 out loud, "What happened?" And I wasn't sure at first -- I r --
- 15 As I recall, after I had turned and looked, it was Officer Wilson.
- And I had stated -- I wanted someone to know what had
- 17 | happened. And I had stated a quick recap: that he had been in the
- 18 car, he had his hands in his pockets, he wouldn't take them out.
- 19 And I told him to show me his hands. And he came toward me
- 20 | saying, "Shoot me. Fucking shoot me."
- 21 | Q Now, how close was it that Mr. Greenough was to you at the
- 22 | point where you discharged your firearm?
- 23 | A I would approximate that it was less than -- I had described
- 24 | it I believe to the state police as less than a body-length from
 - than 6 feet.

- 1 Q And once you had determined by that search that there was no
- 2 | weapon in the pocket, what role did you play then?
- 3 A I recall asking for an Ambu bag and a first aid kit, which
- 4 | I'm sure every other officer that was there was asking someone to
- 5 grab as well.
- 6 And I recall Officer Lee coming down and asking if anyone had
- 7 | a knife to get his sweatshirt off. So, I had a pocket knife that
- 8 I bring with me to work. I provided him with that knife. He was
- 9 able to cut his sweatshirt. I was able to rip his T-shirt below
- 10 | that, with my hands, to clearly expose his upper torso.
- 11 Q And at that point did you see any injuries?
- 12 A I had observed at least one gunshot wound to his upper --
- 13 | what would be his upper left torso.
- 14 | Q So, from your vantage point you could see a single gunshot
- 15 wound?
- 16 A Yes.
- 17 | Q But you had fired twice?
- 18 A Correct.
- 19 Q And at -- How long did you remain assisting in the
- 20 | administration of first aid?
- 21 A I was assisting as long as it would take to cut someone's
- 22 | sweatshirt off and rip the T-shirt; call for, as I mentioned, the
- 23 Ambu bag and the AED and the first aid kit.
- I recall someone, I'm not sure -- I thought it was Officer
- 25 | Gooley -- was providing rescue breaths. But as I've been made

1 | aware, she may have switched off with Officer Savio.

I made them aware that he appeared to be choking on blood or some object that was in his mouth and that he needed to turn his head to clear that obstruction.

It was at about that time that Sergeant Silva had pulled me away and said not to talk to anyone, go over to his SUV, and sit inside; that they were going to be sending the fire department over to clear me off; and not to talk to anyone.

- Q At that point did you have any blood or bodily fluids on you?
- 10 | A Yes, I did.

- 11 Q And was Sergeant Silva's vehicle where it was situated when 12 you first pulled in behind him, or had it moved?
- 13 A It had moved.
- 14 | Q And where was it in relation to the scene, at that point?
- 15 A It was behind all the vehicles. So, basically maybe a little 16 closer to Main Street than from where you're looking at right now,
- 17 | from what I recall.
- 18 Q All right.
- 19 A So, probably halfway between the -- those vehicles and Main 20 Street.
- 21 Q And at that point did you still have your firearm that you
- 22 had been issued --
- 23 A Yes, I did.
- 24 Q -- by the department? And at what point did you re-holster?
- 25 A I had re-holstered after I started the handcuffing process.

- 1 Q Now, once you went to Sergeant Silva's vehicle, what next
- 2 happened?
- 3 A I had started to remove -- I had black search gloves on. I
- 4 | had removed those 'cause they had been blood-soaked. I took off
- 5 | my watch 'cause it had blood on it. I then sat in the vehicle,
- 6 | the p -- front passenger seat, and just tried not to touch
- 7 anything and not to talk to anyone until the fire department came
- 8 over.
- 9 Q Now, after -- At some point after you discharged two rounds,
- 10 | did you ever communicate over the radio that shots had been fired?
- 11 A Yes, I did.
- 12 Q At what point in the sequence of events was it that you made
- 13 | that radio transmission?
- 14 A From what I req -- r -- recall, it was right after he had
- 15 turned and faced away. And I had time to reach up with my right
- 16 | hand and activate my mic.
- 17 | Q So, it -- he was still un-handcuffed at that point?
- 18 A Correct.
- 19 | Q And it was how long after -- Well, I know time is probably
- 20 | hard to approximate in that context. But sequentially, was it
- 21 after that that you then began the handcuffing attempt?
- 22 A Correct. It was after Officer Gooley had come. And they all
- 23 | had showed up after -- probably a matter of seconds after I had
- 24 | called off that there were shots fired.
- Now, at some point were you given any instructions concerning

- 1 whether you should speak to anybody about what had happened, by
- 2 anybody?
- 3 A Sergeant Silva advised me not to speak to anyone regarding
- 4 the incident.
- 5 Q And other than the investigators involved in this
- 6 investigation, did you speak to anybody else?
- 7 A The only people that I spoke to were the people that I was by
- 8 | law allowed to, which was my wife, my attorney, anyone that worked
- 9 | in the medical or -- excuse me -- therapist-related field, for
- 10 | seeking assistance.
- 11 Q But you did -- you were allowed to speak to investigators
- 12 | from the District Attorney's Office; is that correct?
- 13 A Correct, yes.
- 14 Q Now, at some point, per protocol were you transported to the
- 15 | Winchester Hospital?
- 16 A Yes, I was.
- 17 | Q And did you follow the protocol for exposure to blood?
- 18 A Yes, I did.
- 19 Q And in terms of your experience as a police officer, I
- 20 | believe you indicated that you had received trainings in firearms
- 21 | use; is that right?
- 22 A Correct.
- 23 | Q And what about self-defense?
- 24 A Yes.

- I until the time February 3rd of 2018?
- 2 A During the academy as well as once a year, we've had training
- 3 | in self-defense, defensive tactics. During the academy, it was
- 4 | generally every Friday as well as, as I mentioned, at NERPI, which
- 5 | we have to go to once a year. One d --
- 6 O What is NERPI?
- 7 A I believe it stands for Northeast Regional Police In-Service.
- 8 | So, you go to -- So, NERPI, you go to recertify and CPR, criminal
- 9 law updates, defensive tactics. So, there's one day designated
- 10 entirely to defensive tactics, use of force, the use-of-force
- 11 | continuum. And then we also have one other day that's also -- it
- 12 | -- it could be any various trainings that they have: domestic
- 13 | violence, --
- 14 Q Now, --
- 15 A -- special victims units.
- 16 Q Do you have any -- what's referred to as "scenario-based"
- 17 | firearms training?
- 18 A Yes, we have.
- 19 Q Can you describe that for the Court?
- 20 | A Several years we had rented -- the department had rented a
- 21 firearms trailer from the -- or borrowed from the sheriff's
- 22 department, in which case it's a live fire. They use special
- 23 | rounds, in which case there's a -- self-healing is the easiest way
- 24 | to describe it -- screen that they project a -- various scenarios
- 25 | from a computer that were previously recorded with real people,

- 1 | real scenarios. And it cut -- has cut screens depending on how
- 2 | you react to the individuals or how they react to what you're
- 3 | saying. And the person that's running the machine can either
- 4 | comply or fail to comply. And there's either deadly-force
- 5 | situations or there's situations where they comply or there's
- 6 situations where th -- there's -- you use pepper spray or
- 7 | something to that nature.
- 8 Q And with respect to this training that you've had, are there
- 9 any consequences to a failure to successfully complete these
- 10 | exercises?
- 11 A Not that I'm aware of. This was just for training purposes.
- 12 Q And how many times did you go through this scenario-based
- 13 | training?
- 14 A As I mentioned, it was a few years that we had done it. It
- 15 | wasn't consistent from the 12 1/2 years that I've been there.
- 16 Q Now, other than your department-issued firearm, did you --
- 17 | were you equipped by the department with a taser?
- 18 A No.
- 19 | Q Did you have a taser?
- 20 A No.
- 21 | Q Are you allowed to have any weapons that are not
- 22 department-issued while you're on duty?
- 23 A From what I understand, various officers have had, as I
- 24 | mentioned, knives that they're allowed to utilize that -- most o
 - like, a punch on the back for breaking glass or cutti

- seatbelts and stuff to that matter.
- 2 | Q So you're permitted to have a knife for purposes of --
- 3 A Correct.
- 4 Q -- implementing a job.
- 5 What about a taser? Like an -- would an officer be allowed
- 6 to have a private taser?
- 7 A No.
- 8 Q And were you aware of when a -- whether or not the Reading
- 9 Police as of February 3rd had any less-lethal -- were you issued
- 10 any less-lethal or what's called "less-lethal" weaponry?
- 11 A We -- The only thing that we have on our duty belt other than
- 12 the firearm is a duty baton and pepper spray, OC spray.
- 13 Q And did you -- based upon the circumstances that you were
- 14 | confronted with and the knowledge that you had from the prior
- 15 | night and that afternoon, did you consider using pepper spray or
- 16 | the baton?
- 17 A No. This was a deadly-force situation.
- 18 Q Now, in terms of your training, you mentioned about shooting
- 19 | at the center mass. Are you trained to shoot in the extremities?
- 20 A No.
- 21 Q And do you know why that is?
- 22 A 'Cause it's a small target and generally when someone's
- 23 | moving it's even harder to hit a moving object like an extremity,
- 24 | a hand, or a foot. And you always have to be aware that the
- 25 | surroundings behind you could have other people. And if you start

- 1 | aiming wide for someone's hand or your -- or their foot, it could
- 2 | r -- ricochet off the ground or it could go even wider and take a
- 3 | wider course towards someone else in the backdrop.
- 4 Q So, the actions that you took, were they based on your
- 5 | education, training, and experience?
- 6 A Correct.
- 7 Q In terms of your training and experience, is there any
- 8 training that you received concerning the distance between people
- 9 and what is a safe distance to maintain between someone that you
- 10 | believe is armed?
- 11 A Well, when we were in the academy, we learned about the
- 12 21-foot rule, which as I've been made aware is even a longer
- 13 distance now. And what the 21-foot rule was: if someone's
- 14 | confronting you with a deadly weapon, they can reach you and
- 15 strike you in less time than you'll have to draw your firearm and
- 16 | successfully fire a round.
- 17 Q And you indicate that it was your approximation that you were
- 18 how far from Mr. Greenough at the point where you discharged?
- 19 A Approximately less than 6 feet.
- 20 MS. LYNCH: Now, if I might just have one moment, Your Honor.
- 21 THE COURT: Sure.
- 22 MS. LYNCH: I'm just trying to find the portion of the
- 23 | transcript, Your Honor.
- 24 THE COURT: Sure, sure.
- 25

- 1 BY MS. LYNCH:
- 2 | Q Now, officer, prior to Officer Gooley approaching, was there
- 3 | anyone else that you saw or heard in the vicinity?
- 4 A Yes, there was.
- 5 O And who was that?
- 6 A It was Mr. Perrotti.
- 7 | Q Where -- What was it that attracted your attention to Mr.
- 8 | Perrotti when you were at the side of the Hummer?
- 9 A Shortly after the shots were fired, I heard a voice come from
- 10 my right. As I mentioned, when you're panning the area and
- 11 keeping attention to who's around and what your surroundings are,
- 12 | I looked over to my right and I heard Mr. Perrotti say something
- 13 to the effect of, "You shot my brother. You fucking shot my
- 14 | brother, " and was very angry.
- I then told him that he had to clear the area, he had to get
- 16 out of here as fast as he could. He then stormed off angrily
- 17 towards the front of the building, which I now found out is where
- 18 you would have seen him in the video running towards the other
- 19 officers.
- 20 Q Now I'm going to put up Exhibit 61 and the diagram that was
- 21 previously admitted. The area where you observed Mr. Perrotti --
- 22 MS. LYNCH: With the Court's permission, if he can approach -
- 23 THE COURT: Sure.
- 24 MS. LYNCH: -- and just indicate where Mr. Perrotti was at

- 1 BY MS. LYNCH:
- 2 A So, as I had mentioned, the Hummer was over here on the side
- of the fence line. It doesn't appear to be in this shot right
- 4 | now. I had seen him from my right, over on this side of the
- 5 | building, somewhere along this side of the wall. [Indicating.]
- 6 Q So you're saying that he was in the area immediately adjacent
- 7 | to the wall of the garage portion?
- 8 | A Right. I couldn't tell you how close from the building he
- 9 actually was. But he was somewhere right around in this area.
- 10 Q So, can you approximate how far that was from the end of the
- Il fence line where you were at the Hummer?
- 12 A Maybe 30 yards, 25 yards.
- 13 Q And that was the closest that he got.
- 14 | A Correct.
- 15 Q And at that point it was just you and Mr. Greenough?
- 16 | A Correct.
- 17 Q And that's when you asked Mr. Perrotti to leave?
- 18 A Correct.
- 19 Q Okay. You may resume the stand.
- 20 At some point do you recall -- Strike that. Back in February
- 21 of 2018, I believe you indicated that you were 6 feet tall; is
- 22 | that right?
- 23 A Correct.
- 24 Q What was your weight?
- 25 A Approximately 250 pounds.

- Okay. And how does that compare to your weight today?
- 2 | A It's probably pretty close. Maybe a -- a little lighter than
- 3 I am now.
- 4 Q And in terms of your observations of Mr. Greenough, what was
- 5 his approximate height?
- 6 A I would say he was probably close to my height, maybe a
- 7 | little bit shorter.
- 8 Q So, 6 feet or a little under?
- 9 A From what I recall.
- 10 Q And what about the manner in which you discharged your
- 11 firearm? What was the direction that you held it if -- you know,
- 12 | at your side? Was it at any angle? Was it at a 90-degree angle?
- 13 A It was pointed up towards center mass, towards his -- as I
- 14 | mended -- as a mentioned, the largest portion of the body that was
- 15 directly in front of me, which would be the torso region.
- 16 Q So, for purposes of the record, you've demonstrated a
- 17 | two-hand clasp on it?
- 18 | A Two-handed grasp, correct.
- 19 | Q And it was approximately in your chest area?
- 20 A It -- It w -- I would say it would be several feet in front
- 21 of my chest.
- 22 | Q And I believe you indicated that you believed it was just
- 23 | several feet that Mr. Greenough had gotten to the point where you
- 24 fired?
- 26 1 A Approximately less than 6 feet, correct

- Q And was that less than the original distance that you had created by backing up?
- 3 A Correct.
- 4 Q Did you, in the circumstances, feel that you had any other
- 5 option other than the action that you took?
- 6 A No. I felt it was the immediate threat.
- 7 Q Did you feel -- Did you -- Based upon your observations did
- 8 you believe that Mr. Greenough had, in addition to complying,
- 9 other options available to him --
- 10 A Yes.
- 11 Q What were they?
- 12 A He could've either: locked the door to the vehicle, not let
- 13 | me in; he could've gone out through the other side of the d -- the
- 14 other side of the vehicle to escape out the other side of the
- Hummer; he could've got out the door, gone around the door, gone
- 16 | around the front of the vehicle or gone to the direction which I
- 17 | had originally traveled, since I was no longer standing in front
- 18 of that doorway.
- 19 Q Now, understanding that it was the limited timeframe that
- 20 this incident took place, did that have any significance to your
- 21 assessment of the danger that you were presented with?
- 22 A Yes.
- 23 O And what was that?
- 24 A He had other means to avoid the situation that he was
- 25 | creating.

- 1 Q And by failing to adhere to them, what was your thought
- 2 process?
- 3 A That he had that threat to either seriously injure me or kill
- 4 | me. If he had the other options in front of him -- to back away,
- 5 get out of the car, lock the car, or go the other way, run away --
- 6 | and he's choosing not to listen to that, not to take his hands
- 7 out, and to charge towards me, he had no other intent.
- 8 Q And you indicated that you attempted to retreat by moving
- 9 | backward?
- 10 A Correct.
- 11 Q About how far back, distance-wise, do you think you got
- 12 | before you shot?
- 13 A I'd say I made it less than 6 to -- 5-6 feet.
- MS. LYNCH: If I might just have one moment.
- 15 THE COURT: Sure.
- 16 BY MS. LYNCH:
- 17 Q When Mr. Greenough got out of the vehicle and was coming
- 18 towards you, what did you observe about his physical appearance
- 19 and demeanor, in terms of mood?
- 20 | A He appeared not in a right state of mind. He appeared angry.
- 21 | He wasn't calm and -- or laughing or anything like that. He was
- 22 | yelling when he said, "Fucking shoot me. Shoot me." I wasn't
- 23 | focused on his face as he was coming towards me or as he was out
- 24 of the vehicle, because I was hyper-focused on where his hands
- 25 were, inside his pocket. But I could hear in his voice that he

- wasn't in a right state of mind.

 Q And what was his tone of voice or volume of voice that you
 detected?
- 4 A I detected that he was angry and that it was a loud tone. It
- 5 | wasn't just speaking like this. He was -- "Fucking shoot me.
- 6 | Shoot me." It was angry and direct.
- 7 | Q In the time that you were in Mr. Greenough's presence, did
- 8 | you make any observations of odors relative to the issue of
- 9 | sobriety?
- 10 A Yes, I did.
- 11 Q And what specifically did you observe?
- 12 A During my interaction with him, specifically when I opened
- the door and was talking to him inside the doorway, and then more
- 14 | specifically when I was standing over him after, providing first
- aid, I detected the strong odor of alcohol coming from his breath.
- MS. LYNCH: If I might just have a moment, Your Honor.
- 17 THE COURT: Sure.
- MS. LYNCH: Thank you, officer.
- 19 THE COURT: Thank you.
- 20 CROSS EXAMINATION OF WITNESS, OFFICER ERIK DRAUSCHKE
- 21 BY THE COURT:
- 22 Q Officer, you indicated that you had pepper spray on you.
- 23 A Correct.
- 24 Q But you chose not to use it because you said this, in your
- 25 mind, was a deadly-force situation.

- 1 A Correct.
- 2 | Q Okay. How often -- How long have you been a police officer,
- 3 | again?
- 4 A Approximately 12 1/2 years. At that point it was
- 5 approximately 11 1/2 years.
- 6 Q 11 1/2 years. And during that 11-1/2-year period, how often
- 7 | had you had the defensive-tactics/use-of-force training?
- 8 | A As I mentioned, once a year we go to the NERPI, in which case
- 9 one day is specifically directed towards the use of force and
- 10 defensive tactics.
- 11 Q And prior to this incident, do you recall the last time that
- 12 you'd been there for training?
- 13 A I have a record of it I believe I provided my attorney. I do
- 14 not off the top of my head know what the date was.
- 15 Q And there's no consequences, I think was your answer, for
- 16 | failing any portion of the training.
- 17 A For that firearms trailer, no, it was not a pass-or-fail,
- 18 from what I recall. It was more exposure to the various scenarios
- 19 and a training purpose than it was a pass-or-fail scenario.
- 20 Q Do officers -- Do you know if they have to be retrained if
- 21 | they miss a portion of that? Is that -- I mean, do you consider
- 22 that a consequence if you don't -- aren't successful with that?
- 23 A I would say if there was something they were concerned about
- 24 after someone had run through various scenarios.
- 25 They didn't provide everyone with the same exact scenarios

'cause: A) they didn't want anyone to talk about what they went through, to be expecting it; and they also didn't want everyone to

3 have the same type of scenario. They wanted as much variety as

4 | they could provide with that computer program that they had. I

5 | couldn't give you an exact number of scenarios that they had.

But if -- if someone did something that they felt they believed needed correcting, they would explain and go over what they could've done to fix in that specific scenario that they were going through. But as I mentioned, this -- each scenario was also being played out by the instructor, so it was not the same every time someone ran that one specific scenario; he could change it up.

Q Does the training include, then, scenarios where you might be dealing with people who have -- are under the influence or have anger issues or have mental health issues?

A I would say that they had people that would appear -- They don't tell you specifically that they're intoxicated. Sometimes they give you, like, a fake dispatch and they'll say there was a domestic dispute or this person was committing a robbery inside a store or something to that nature. Some of them appeared to act like maybe they were, from what I recall, intoxicated and stumbling around, like, over-excessively and --

Q Yeah.

- 24 | A -- and such like that.
 - Q But there didn't appear to be any difference in how you were

- trained to react given that particular scenario, encountering
- 2 | somebody who's mentally ill as opposed to somebody who's not,
- 3 encountering somebody who may be under the influence as opposed to
- 4 | someone who's not, and then reacting based on that?
- 5 | A I would say if it was -- I don't recall any situation that
- 6 they would specifically point that out, no.
- 7 Q Okay. And you said in your mind this was a deadly-force
- 8 | situation. And that was based on what?
- 9 A That was based on my training and experience from, as I
- 10 | mentioned, scenarios that we've gone over during NERPI that
- 11 | they've showed us video clips on, the force -- use-of-force
- 12 | continuum, which is the backbone that they go over every year --
- 13 Q I think --
- 14 A -- to kind of --
- 15 | Q -- what I meant, though, was what did you encounter that made
- 16 | you think that this fit into how you were trained and this was a
- 17 | situation where you would not use pepper spray?
- 18 A Oh, okay; I apologize.
- 19 | Q No, that's okay.
- 20 A So, based on the fact that he had already been armed with a
- 21 | pole. I didn't know how big or small it was or what it looked
- 22 | like; I hadn't seen it.
- 23 Q Mm-hmm.
- 24 A Based on the fact that I knew there had been a hatchet the
- 25 | night before when I was there.

Q Mm-hmm.

12.

A And I had made a note of that.

Based on the fact that there was the gun -- what I recognized from my training and experience as a gunlock that our -- us as a department hands out. There could possibly be a firearm in there that someone may own or could've been with him at that night.

The fact that I had known that he was a possible drug abuser.

There could've been a needle concealed in there.

As I mentioned, any number of sharp objects could've been concealed in there.

Q So, all of which, though, you knew before you approached the vehicle. So, wouldn't officer safety dictate that you wait for other officers before you approach the vehicle, when Mr.

Greenough's already contained in the vehicle?

A So, as I approached the vehicle I was close enough that he would've been able to hear me calling for other officers. And I didn't want the chance that he was going to either try to get away or escape. So, I immediately opened the door to be able to deal with him. It was -- If he tried to get out or run away, I was already by myself. So I decided to open the door and address it as I was there. As I mentioned, I thought time had elapsed and people were already on their way, in which case I ended up finding out that no one had been.

Q I guess, though, what I'm asking you, though, is: because you were concerned justifiably about your safety, wouldn't those

- concerns -- all of the information that you knew that led it to be
- 2 | a deadly-force situation, you knew prior to approaching the car.
- 3 | So, still I --
- 4 A I didn't know at that point, to be more specific, that he had
- 5 had his hands in his pockets and that he was concealing something.
- 6 I -- I didn't see anything in the car specifically sticking out,
- 7 like a pole or something like that that -- I -- I suppose that
- 8 | better explains to you my reasoning behind why I did what I did.
- 9 Q Why -- My --
- 10 A It's the fact that I didn't see anything sticking out or see
- 11 | it in his hands, holding anything.
- 12 Q My question is: a lot of what you already testified to in
- 13 response to Ms. Lynch's question and what I've heard you say that
- 14 rose to it being a deadly-force situation in your mind --
- 15 A Mm-hmm.
- 16 Q -- would also make it an unsafe situation, I would think, for
- 17 | you to approach the vehicle alone, because: you made observations,
- 18 you testified to, of the hatchet, of the gunlock; you knew already
- 19 | that he wasn't responding to commands to officers who had already
- 20 been on the scene; you knew that he was angry and it was turning
- 21 | into a shitshow or whatever Officer Wilson indicated.
- 22 So, protocol for your safety, I'm asking, wouldn't that have
- 23 | dictated you not approaching the vehicle once you radioed and
- 24 | said, "I see him in the car"? Wouldn't you then wait for the
- 25 other officers?

- 1 A I didn't know at that point how long it had been that I had
- 2 | waited. So, I had already thought as I men -- mentioned, time did
- 3 | not seem to go relevant to what I was thinking.
- 4 Q Right.

يكتع

- 5 A I thought I had already waited. And I said, "I can't wait
- 6 | any longer for someone to show up." So --
- 7 Q And you didn't radio and say, "Hey, guys, did you hear me?
- 8 He's in the car over here"?
- 9 A It was all happening too fast to be able to --
- 10 Q Okay.
- II A -- get that out, so --
- 12 Q All right. So, how many minutes from the time that you
- 13 | radioed, "He's over here in the car," to when you started to
- 14 approach the car?
- 15 A From what I felt or from what it actually time-wise was?
- 16 Q From what you felt and then what it was time-wise.
- 17 | A I thought it -- From the time that I had actually called in
- 18 and started approaching, I thought it had been several minutes.
- 19 And then once I had opened the door and started to deal with him,
- 20 | it had felt like it had been about a minute, when in reality I
- 21 | found out that it was actually only a matter of less than -- From
- 22 | when I radioed it in until the shots were fired was less than, I
- 23 | believe, -- less than a minute, less than --
- 24 O Just --
- ~ 30 seconds.

- 1 Q So, again, when you approached the car, describe how you saw
- 2 Mr. Greenough.
- 3 A So, as I approached, as I had mentioned, I was close enough
- 4 | to see at my height from the passenger side walking directly
- 5 | towards his vehicle. And I could see him leaning, as I mentioned,
- 6 | from where I was, in towards this -- the middle of the vehicle.
- 7 | I was close enough that he would be able to hear my voice, as
- 8 | I had mentioned, when I called it over.
- 9 Q Mm-hmm.
- 10 A And I had called it over real quick, as you could hear as
- Well the tension in my voice. So, obviously I had that distorted
- 12 | time. And as I mentioned, it was probably less than 6 to 7 feet
- 13 or whatever I testified to, that I was -- close to the vehicle
- 14 from when I called that off to opening the door.
- 15 Q Okay. And where's your hand with regard to your firearm?
- 16 A So, my left hand was on my firearm. As I mentioned, the
- 17 latch had been down.
- 18 O Yeah.
- 19 A My hand -- It was still holstered, --
- 20 O Yeah.
- 21 | A -- with the thumb depressor -- it was still locked in. And I
- 22 | reached with my right hand after I had called it in. And that's
- 23 when I had approached and reached with my right hand to the handle
- 24 and opened the door.
- 25 Q Opened the door.

- 1 A Correct.
- 2 Q Okay. And then when you opened the door did you step back or
- 3 did you stand where -- right at the door?
- 4 | A As I had opened the door, I had stood to basically where the
- 5 | lengthy of the door would've opened to and -- so that I could see
- 6 him fully with the door fully open.
- 7 Q Okay. And you could see him fully with the door open.
- 8 A Correct.
- 9 Q And what was -- where was he at that point? What was he
- 10 | doing?
- 11 A And as I had mentioned, his hands were in his pockets and I
- 12 | couldn't see them. And he was leaned over, still leaning over
- 13 towards the center of the vehicle like --
- 14 | O Mm-hmm.
- 15 A -- he was trying to hide from me.
- 16 Q Okay. And still, you're the only officer there.
- 17 A Still, I was the only officer there.
- 18 Q All right. And then just go through again --
- 19 A And I had no idea whether anyone was around me or coming
- 20 | towards me at that point. So, --
- 21 | Q Okay. So, I know you've already said it before, --
- 22 A Mm-hmm.
- 23 Q -- but tell me what happens next.
- 24 A Okay. So, as I mentioned, as I gave him the instruction to --
- 25 | saw that his hands were in there and I said, "Get out of the car,"

- 1 | and he didn't immediately move, --
- 2 Q Yep.
- 3 | A I could see his hands that were in his pockets, leaning over
- 4 | like he was trying to hide, even though I'm right there in front
- 5 of him; he's not hiding from anyone.
- 6 I gave him the order to show me his hands, with my firearm
- 7 | still holstered.
- 8 And he said, as I mentioned, to -- something to the nature
- 9 of, "Fuck you." And I --
- 10 Q And what --
- II A -- could see his eyes.
- 12 Q What's the lighting like then? Is the car illuminated? Or
- 13 how -- What's the lighting like?
- 14 A It was the -- As I had previously mentioned, it was enough
- 15 light that it was before failing daylight or --
- 16 O Mm-hmm.
- 17 A -- approximately at -- at about that time where it was about
- 18 4:30.
- 19 Q Mm-hmm.
- 20 | A So I could see him enough through the daylight through the
- 21 | vehicle.
- 22 Q Okay. And go ahead.
- 23 A So, as I mentioned, as I had stated and gave him the command
- 24 to show me his hands and he said something to the nature of, "Fuck
- 25 | you, " I then backed up and moved back towards the -- with my back

- I | towards, as I mentioned, Main Street as he started to get up and
- 2 | said to the nature of, "Fucking shoot me. "
- 3 Q Is that left or right that you're moving, or straight back?
- 4 A So, can I stand up and demonstrate?
- 5 Q Yep, yep.
- 6 A So, if I was standing you -- towards you and you were in that
- 7 | passenger seat, I then turned with my back towards Main Street --
- 8 O Mm-hmm.
- 9 A -- as he started to get out of the vehicle. So, as I contin
- 10 | -- And he said something to the nature, as I mentioned, as you --
- 11 before, he was getting up -- and something to the nature of,
- 12 | "Fucking shoot me," or, "Shoot me."
- So, as I started continuing to step back, saying, "He's not
- 14 | complying. I got to create distance."
- 15 And the amount of times that I was rapidly firing, saying,
- 16 | "Show me your hands. Take your hands out of your pockets," he's
- 17 | failing to comply and still swearing at me, saying, "Fucking shoot
- 18 me. Shoot me."
- 19 Q How many times did you give him the commands?
- 20 A As I mentioned, it was approximately five or six times during
- 21 | the whole incident.
- 22 \ Q Now, I know you had testified that his hands are still in his
- 23 pockets at this point.
- 24 A Correct.
- 25 | Q And how -- Can you show/demonstrate: how does he get out of

- 1 | the vehicle other than with his hands in his pockets?
- 2 A From what I recall, as -- So, it's hard to demonstrate from
- 3 this position, so I might have to turn this way. So, he was in --
- 4 | he was leaning like this, towards the center of the vehicle. And
- 5 as he was swearing at me, he was staring at me. And as he finally
- 6 | got up, he got up in a fast moment like this, was standing up,
- 7 | saying, "Fucking shoot me. Shoot me," almost like in a
- 8 hunched-over, like, aggressive shoulder movement like, "Come on,"
- 9 like, taunting me to -- to shoot him.
- 10 | Q And what does -- Sweatshirt pockets are different. So, what
- 11 | kind of sweatshirt pocket --
- 12 A So, it was -- The best way to describe it is any typical
- 13 heavy, hooded sweatshirt that you pull over your head has that big
- 14 -- I don't know --
- 15 Q One.
- 16 A -- the best description. But one pocket, I would s -- call
- 17 | it. And like a giant pouch in the front that both hands were in.
- 18 Q Okay. Go ahead.
- 19 A So, as I mentioned, as he started to charge towards me and
- 20 | leaning towards me, that's when I had made the determination that
- 21 | if he gets too close that weapon's coming out of that pocket and
- 22 he's going to use it. So that's when I had determined at
- 23 approximately less than 6-feet distance he was too close and that
- 24 | I had to fire.
- 25 | Q Okay. And at that point, when you're making that

- 1 determination, I know you were describing how the three steps --
- 2 A Mm-hmm.
- 3 Q -- of the unholstering and all of that.
- 4 A Yep.
- 5 Q So, at that point --
- 6 | A So, it had already been -- I had unholstered after his
- 7 | failure to comply, while he was still leaning inside the vehicle.
- 8 | I had unholstered and drawn my firearm --
- 9 O Mm-hmm.
- 10 A -- while stepping back.
- 11 | Q Okay. And at this point he's still coming forward and you
- 12 | testified he's charging at you.
- 13 A Correct.
- 14 Q So, -- And you described it kind of with his head down. How
- 15 many steps towards you?
- 16 A I wouldn't specifically say head down. It's --
- 17 Q Okay.
- 18 A It's the body lunging mo -- you know, your momentum's going
- 19 | forward. So your top half of your body would be further than your
- 20 lower half.
- 21 Q But is he upright or --
- 22 | A Not standing upright, no.
- 23 | Q Okay. All right. So he's lunging towards you.
- 24 | A Correct.
- 25 | Q Still with his hands in his pocket.

- 1 A Correct.
- 2 Q Okay. And to be clear, at that point I think you testified
- 3 that you weren't fully aware if there was anything behind you or
- 4 not.
- 5 A I was not specifically aware of what was directly behind me,
- 6 no. I just knew it was a cluttered area with vehicles and all the
- 7 | junk and stuff I had to walk through.
- 8 Q And you were still moving back.
- 9 A At that point, when he started charging toward --
- 10 0 Yeah.
- 11 A Correct.
- 12 Q And there was nothing obstructing you from moving back.
- 13 A Directly where -- The amount of steps I had taken, I had not
- 14 | run into anything.
- 15 | Q Okay. Go ahead.
- 16 A So, as I mentioned, directly after I had fired the two shots
- 17 and he turned around, from what I recall he had turned around
- 18 | towards -- from facing me, to his right, his clockwise, towards
- 19 the vehicle and away from me, facing towards the woods, and then
- 20 | had got --
- 21 As I mentioned, Mr. Perrotti had come over from the side, and
- 22 | I had told him to clear out of there.
- 23 And I recall Alan going down onto his knees and hunching
- 24 | forward while he was on his knees, with his hands still in that
- 25 front --

- 1 Q Let me --
- 2 A -- pocket.
- 3 Q -- just go back with you for a minute. You testified that
- 4 | you're trained to -- in a deadly-force situation, to shoot until
- 5 | the threat stops.
- 6 A Correct.
- 7 Q Okay. So, the threat could stop after one shot, potentially,
- 8 | yes? And you -- But --
- 9 A It could, potentially, yes.
- 10 Q So, you shot once. And then what did Mr. Greenough do?
- 11 A He was still coming towards me.
- 12 Q Okay. And so, what was the length of time between the first
- 13 | and the second shot?
- 14 A What -- I'm sorry; could you --
- 15 | Q The time between the -- I -- Did you -- When you shot the
- 16 | first time, --
- 17 A Yep. I couldn't g --
- 18 Q -- you saw he was still coming.
- 19 | A I couldn't give you --
- 20 Q Okay. But you --
- 21 A -- an approximation of the time.
- 22 Q -- saw he was still coming towards you.
- 23 A Correct.
- 24 | Q Can you describe how he was coming towards you at that point?
- 25 A It was still in that charging motion, yeah.

- I Q Still in a charging motion. So you fired again.
- 2 A Correct.
- 3 | Q Now, the deadly force training, you say you're trained to
- 4 | shoot at the --
- 5 A Center mass.
- 6 Q -- center mass. And is that in every scenario?
- 7 A Any deadly-force situation. You may not always be presented
- 8 | with someone's torso; I don't want to jump to just any situation.
- 9 But if someone had presented to you and they were holding a
- 10 hostage and their head was the biggest part of their body that was
- 11 exposed and you had a clean shot, that would be center mass.
- 12 Q So they never -- You never shoot somebody in the leg --
- 13 A No, you do not.
- 14 Q -- or the arm or --
- 15 A No.
- 16 Q No. Okay.
- 17 A Not unless that was the only thing that was presented to you.
- 18 Q Okay. Go ahead.
- 19 A So, after the -- he had turned and I cleared Mr. Perrotti
- 20 away, as I mentioned, it was approximately at that time where he
- 21 | had crouched down onto his knees and was still leaning with his
- 22 | hands in his pockets.
- 23 And I was continuing to give him the orders to show me his
- 24 hands, take his hands out of his pockets. And as I mentioned, I
 - "' bnow whether he couldn't hear me or if he physically could

not take his hands out of his pockets. But he wasn't complying.

So at that point, as I mentioned, at -- after the shots had first been fired and I called off that I had shots fired, and when Officer Gooley arrived, she arrived over from -- what I recall, the righthand side. And she -- I told her that I can't get his hands out of his pocket, he's still got his hands in his pockets.

So, she assisted me in -- After I had holstered my firearm, she assisted me in handcuffing him.

And then I -- As I mentioned, I quickly pat-frisked him for a weapon.

And then the other officers starting showing up behind.

And I, you know, explained to -- when Officer Wilson had asked what had happened, I had given him that brief recap.

And we started providing the first aid, from that point.

Q So, when you -- when he got out of the vehicle and you were able to see/have a better visual of his hands in his pockets with the sweatshirt, --

A Correct.

Q -- did you see anything or were you able to see anything that appeared to be weighing the pocket down other than --

A I couldn't tell because his hands were both -- It appeared that they were both collapsed inside there. So --

Q And you said you did a pat-frisk.

24 A Correct.

O And was that the extent of the search that you did?

- 1 A As fast as I could before being told that we needed to start
- 2 performing first aid, yes. I don't -- I am unaware if anyone
- 3 further checked or double-checked. You know, as they had
- 4 mentioned earlier, if anyone had checked the area, I was unaware
- 5 of that.

- 6 Q Okay. Now, I know some of the other officers have testified
- 7 | that they were familiar with the location, various calls including
- 8 | calls for gas leaks and --
- 9 A Correct.
- 10 Q -- other things. Had you been there for --
- ii A Yes.
- 12 Q Okay. Were you familiar with the interior of the gas station
- 13 as well as the residence prior to you going there the --
- 14 A On Friday?
- 15 Q -- Friday before?
- 16 A Not from what I recall.
- 17 | Q Okay.
- 18 A Just from what I could see outside on that prior incident
- 19 where Officer Savio had mentioned that from a second-story window
- 20 | that Alan had been yelling at. So I was aware that there was at
- 21 | least an upper floor.
- 22 Q So, after you fired the second time was when he went down to
- 23 | the ground.
- 24 A He had first turned around, stopped, turned around, and then
- 25 he had gone down onto the ground.

- 1 Q After the second --
- 2 A Second shot, correct.
- 3 Q So, turned away from you, down to the ground.
- 4 A Correct.
- And that's the approximate time -- where he was either turned
- 6 around or just gone down onto his knees -- that I had seen Mr.
- 7 Perrotti come over from my righthand side.
- 8 THE COURT: I may have things later, but -- Mr. Pasciucco?
- 9 MR. PASCIUCCO: Yes. Your Honor, I've asked the District
- 10 Attorney's Office if I can just utilize their laptop and the
- Il Internet at some point. I don't know if the Internet is set up.
- 12 It is? Okay, thank you.

13 CROSS EXAMINATION OF WITNESS, OFFICER ERIK DRAUSCHKE

- 14 BY MR. PASCIUCCO:
- 15 O Good afternoon, Officer Drauschke.
- 16 A Good afternoon, sir.
- 17 Q So, I just have a few questions for you. How old are you?
- 18 | A I'm 36 years old.
- 19 Q Okay. And are you married?
- 20 A Yes.
- 21 | Q Okay. And do you have any children?
- 22 A Yes. I have one daughter.
- 23 Q And how old's your daughter?
- 24 | A Approximately a year-and-a-half.
- 25 Q Okay. And which police academy did you attend?

- 1 A The Transit Police Academy in Quincy, Mass.
- 2 Q Okay. And when did you graduate from that Academy?
- 3 A In the winter. I believe it was February 2007.
- 4 | Q And what was the general curriculum at the academy?
- 5 A You went through all police procedures, report-writing, OUIs,
- 6 | investigations, firearm training, defensive tactics, as well as
- 7 | calls for service.
- 8 Q Did you have a license to carry prior to becoming a police
- 9 officer?
- 10 A No.
- 11 Q Do you currently have a license to carry?
- 12 A Yes, I do.
- 13 Q And is it a Class A?
- 14 A Yes, it is.
- 15 Q Class A, unrestricted?
- 16 A Correct.
- 17 Q Okay. And do you recall when you obtained that license to
- 18 | carry?
- 19 A During the -- Sometime during the academy process.
- 20 | Q Okay. And did you have to take a firearms course prior to
- 21 | obtaining a license to carry?
- 22 A We took a firearms course during the course of the academy.
- 23 Q Okay. And then, as a result of taking that course and
- 24 | completing the academy, you were issued a Class A license --
 - Correct.

4-230 -- to carry? Okay. 4 MR. PASCIUCCO: If I may approach, Your Honor. 2 THE COURT: Sure. 3 BY MR. PASCIUCCO: 4 5 So, I'm going to show you a document.
