INTERVIEW OF DEVIN MCDONALD

TROOPER JAMES CONNOLLY
DETECTIVE MICHELLE HALLORAN

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,	MR. MCDONALD: Well, her mother was worried. I
2	told her I had to come down to the station.
3	TROOPER CONNOLLY: Jot this down.
4	MR. MCDONALD: Sorry about that.
5	TROOPER CONNOLLY: D-e-v
6	MR. MCDONALD: I-n.
7	TROOPER CONNOLLY: i-n.
8	MR. MCDONALD: M-c-D-o-n-a-l-d.
9	TROOPER CONNOLLY: Devin, can you tell me about
10	last night?
11	MR. MCDONALD: Okay. Last night I got back
12	from work. I
13	TROOPER CONNOLLY: What time?
14	MR. MCDONALD: Oh, I got back let me see,
15	3:00, 3 o'clock maybe.
16	TROOPER CONNOLLY: In the morning?
17	MR. MCDONALD: No afternoon, yesterday
18	afternoon. He was getting ready to go to a wake at
19	TROOPER CONNOLLY: Who is "he"?
20	MR. MCDONALD: Alan, my roommate, that guy. He
21	was getting ready to go to a wake for our buddy that
22	just passed.
23	TROOPER CONNOLLY: Who was that, and where was

1 MR. MCDONALD: Ronnie Voltor (phonetic), and I think it was in Middleton. He died, I guess -- I think 2 3 -- they said he died from sleep apnea the other day -the other week. So he went to that with a couple of 4 people. And I was upstairs. About 7 o'clock he had 5 come back, and came back and started screaming about --6 7 well, he was trying to get in the front door, the very front door, which is never locked. It just had a bad 8 handle and you got to kind of fuck with it. Screw it, 10 sorry. TROOPER CONNOLLY: It's okay. 11 MR. MCDONALD: So he started like almost 12 kicking in the door, and I'm upstairs with my 13

girlfriend, in my room. We hear this smashing on the door. So by the time we get downstairs, he's coming in the apartment door now. "Don't ever shut that fucking front door." And he was really belligerent. I'm like, "Okay. I have no problem." So I'm like, "Whatever, dude," and went upstairs. I can see --

20 TROOPER CONNOLLY: Who was home?

MR. MCDONALD: It was me and my girlfriend,

22 Kim.

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TROOPER CONNOLLY: Does she normally live 23

24 there? 1 MR. MCDONALD: Yeah. She -- she lives with me 2 now. Yeah. We've been living together for a couple 3 months now. Yeah.

TROOPER CONNOLLY: How did you guys get that apartment?

MR. MCDONALD: I got that apartment -- I got asked by Alan to move in there because they were -- they were looking for a roommate. You know, me and Alan have been best friends since we were 12 years old. He's like my brother, you know. But yeah. So we -- he started kind of -- very hostile, so I just went upstairs -- figured out when things -- you know, let him -- he was obviously upset.

Next thing, I hear him down there, smashing something. Me and my girlfriend get to the top of the steps and look down at the -- at the kitchen, and he's smashing my dining room table chairs. I'm like, "What the hell? I'm calling the cops if you don't cut it out." Then he proceeded --

20 TROOPER CONNOLLY: This is still like 21 7 o'clock?

22 MR. MCDONALD: No. It was about like 7:15, 7:12, 7:30.

TROOPER CONNOLLY: Okay. And the only three

people are you, Kim, and Alan?

MR. MCDONALD: Yes, and Alan. But whoever brought him back came -- wait a second. So I see him smashing the chairs. I told him, "Cut it out, or I'm going to call the cops."

TROOPER CONNOLLY: I'm sorry. I should have just said -- because I just want to cover this one thing. When he was hitting and yelling at the door, you let him in, right?

MR. MCDONALD: No. He finally got in the very front door, which is -- which it's just got a bad handle, and you got to kind of jiggle it, and he was just kicking it because it wouldn't open.

TROOPER CONNOLLY: Uh-huh (affirmative).

MR. MCDONALD: By the time I got downstairs, to -- to see what the hell what the banging was, he was finally coming in the apartment door, like into our apartment, and freaking out about the door being shut.

"Don't ever shut that door" and rah, rah, rah. And I was just like --

TROOPER CONNOLLY: Why do you think he was so belligerent?

MR. MCDONALD: Because he was just wasted. I could tell immediately he was fucked up, all right. He

was on something bad or way drunk or something else. So

I'm like, "Okay, whatever." That's why I went upstairs

-- back upstairs. He started smashing my fucking

kitchen table. I threatened, "I'll call the cops if

you're going to keep it up," you know.

And he decided started -- proceeded to smash the rest of the table, and -- and started yelling, "Why -- (indiscernible), why are you smashing your own table? Ha, ha, ha" -- as he was smashing the -- the crap out of it. Me and Kim were just -- "What the fuck, dude?" Like, "I'm calling the cops. That's it." He come charging upstairs, fucking -- almost knocked my girl over -- almost knocked my girlfriend over.

TROOPER CONNOLLY: Where was that at?

MR. MCDONALD: That was in the hallway, right outside my room. I went in the bathroom, took a quick piss. I'm coming out, and he's bumping her with his chest, like, rah, rah, rah, rah. I'm like, "Dude, don't touch her." And -- and then he got -- he tried to get in my face then. I told him, "Go downstairs," you know, just to stay the fuck away. Then he fucking went downstairs for about two minutes. I sat on my bed. And then he just came charging back up, pushed past -- pushed -- came just bursting in my room. I

- 1 | have no door because he kicked that in months ago.
- 2 Pushed past Kim, and he stormed on inside, trying to
- 3 | fight me. And you know, he made a couple marks because
- 4 | he was trying to swing on me. I actually had a bloody
- 5 lip from him last night. They took photos of it.
- TROOPER CONNOLLY: Uh-huh (affirmative).
- 7 MR. MCDONALD: And -- and Kim immediately was
- 8 on the phone with the cops, you know, because -- I
- 9 | called 911 out, because he was trying to swing on me
- 10 and fight me.
- 11 TROOPER CONNOLLY: So I'm sorry. Just to --
- 12 because I'm trying to write it down as you're talking.
- 13 But so he's downstairs, and he's breaking stuff?
- MR. MCDONALD: He broke up the table after --
- 15 after I told him to stop or I'm going to call the cops.
- 16 TROOPER CONNOLLY: And then you guys come to
- 17 | the top of the stairs.
- 18 MR. MCDONALD: Well, yeah. We saw him -- we
- 19 heard him smashing shit. We looked at the top of the
- 20 stairs. Like came to the top of the stairs. I see one
- 21 of the chairs. He's going smash on the floor. I'm
- 22 | like, "Dude, what are you doing? That's my table.
- 23 Come on." Cut it out, or I'm going to call the cops.
- 24 And took another chair and smashed that one all over

- 1 | the place. Then he -- and he's -- and I'm like, "Dude,
- 2 | that's it. I'm calling the cops." And then he
- 3 | proceeded to continually smash the table while we're
- 4 upstairs. He's yelling, "Dammit, why are you
- 5 destroying your own table?" And he's laughing.
- TROOPER CONNOLLY: Were you calling the police then?
- 8 MR. MCDONALD: At that point, yeah. I told him 9 I was going to call the cops.
- TROOPER CONNOLLY: Yeah. Did you call 911? Or did you call (indiscernible)?
- MR. MCDONALD: Well, no. I never got the

 chance to. I told him I was about to call, and we -
 literally within a minute -- not even a minute, like I

 was going to call. He basically to burst in my room.

 Had the tables all destroyed on the floor at this

 point. I mean, I went and saw it, and it was

completely destroyed when I went down after.

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But totally came up, burst in my room, pushed Kim right out of the way, like grabbed by the arm and fucking dove on me, and I was laying on my bed at this point trying to get back up. Dives on me, starts -- tries choking me first, and he's wrapping me into a headlock. He starts on -- punching me. He punched me

in the side of my head. And I'm brushing him off for a minute, and she was on the phone with the cops. And then, all of a sudden, I hear this girl saying, "Come on, Alan. It's time to go." I didn't know who the girl was that -- that he left with last night. Some -- someone -- his -- got him out of there, because she'd heard that, "Alan, I'm calling the cops right now, you know. You know, "That's it. You're done."

And he took off. And the cops -- you know, we gave them the complaint, took pictures, showed them what happened.

They said, "Okay." (indiscernible) Okay. So, you know, "If he comes back here, just call us." I said, "Okay." They said, you know, "Just lock everything, you know. And if he comes back, just give us a call because we're looking for him right now."

"Okay, fine." And all was quiet. And I'm not sure if he did, but I turned -- I said it five to -- I had the feeling he slashed -- slashed the tire on my Caravan.

I had to get up at 4:30 for work this morning, and as soon as he was gone and the police had left, I turned to Kim, I said, "Five bucks says I'm going to go up there and my tires are going to go up there and my tires will be flat on the Caravan." He slashed my

- 10 motorcycle tires over the summer too. Like \$300 a tire 1 2 were just slashed them with a razor, gone, you know, 3 because he was on dope at that time. So anyway, I get up this morning at 4:30 in the 4 5 morning, had a flat tire, had to have my boss come pick 6 me up. I worked until about noon. I get back. 7 TROOPER CONNOLLY: I'm sorry. You did find a 8 flat tire on your car? 9 MR. MCDONALD: Oh yeah. Yep. I had a flat 10 tire on the rear of my --TROOPER CONNOLLY: Is the car still flat? Is 11 the tire still flat? 12 13 MR. MCDONALD: Yeah. It's in the back of my -it's in the back of my car. I have a spare one right 14 15 now. 16 TROOPER CONNOLLY: Where's that tire? 17 MR. MCDONALD: It is on the premises of East 18 Coast Gas. TROOPER CONNOLLY: What -- is that --19 2.0 MR. MCDONALD: The gas station where the scene happened. It's -- yeah. So -- that's still there. 21
- 22 But yeah. I was looking at --TROOPER CONNOLLY: What kind of car is it? 23 24 MR. MCDONALD: It's a Grand Caravan. It's my

mother's. You know, she let me borrow it to get back and forth work right now.

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TROOPER CONNOLLY: Which tire was it?

MR. MCDONALD: Passenger side, rear. But I'm not 100 percent sure if he did, but I'll tell you, it was fine at 6 o'clock last night when I went to the store and I came back, parked it. And then he came back at 7:30, and I get up -- you know, he comes back and (indiscernible) happens, and I wake up this morning, and my tire's flat, which is something he seems to do a lot. You know, he seems -- he tried doing it to my Envoy once, you know. My buddy actually stopped him because he was trying to slash it with a razor knife. My buddy said, "Don't do that. You're destroying someone's property here."

TROOPER CONNOLLY: So you didn't change it in the morning; your boss came and picked you up?

MR. MCDONALD: Yeah. My boss picked me up.

Andrew helped me change it this afternoon, because he's like, "Dude, can we just get out of here?"

Anyway, so I left it -- I left. I got back like, you know, noonish, fell asleep for a couple hours, and I think that was about 3 o'clock. All of a sudden I got woken up by hearing him screaming and

slamming shit. You know, and his brother, Anthony's sitting in -- standing in the kitchen with him, and my girlfriend, Kim, is sitting on the steps, and he's smashing his speaker on the floor.

And Anthony's telling him to calm down and get over it or the cops are going to come. Joe was going to call the cops. And I'm like, "Dude, what the fuck?" You know, I'm like, "Dude, what" -- it's all up the steps, and then he just burst off the steps to come at me. Anthony gets him to come back down for a second.

TROOPER CONNOLLY: So hold on. I'm sorry.

MR. MCDONALD: Uh-huh (affirmative).

TROOPER CONNOLLY: So where is he breaking stuff?

MR. MCDONALD: He busted in the --

TROOPER CONNOLLY: In the first floor?

MR. MCDONALD: -- in the kitchen -- right in the kitchen. He took a speaker, and I think he tried to throw it at Kim. I didn't see that because I was coming out of my room.

TROOPER CONNOLLY: Where was that speaker normally?

MR. MCDONALD: It was in the living room, just on a mantel. She moved it into the kitchen on the

floor to use it while she was working in the kitchen,
you know. And I mean, I guess that really set him off
because he tried to throw it at her.

TROOPER CONNOLLY: It was on the first floor though?

MR. MCDONALD: Right.

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TROOPER CONNOLLY: Moved it from the mantel?

MR. MCDONALD: Yeah. Just on the floor, like

down on the floor in the next room. You know, so

just --

TROOPER CONNOLLY: And this is at 3 o'clock today?

MR. MCDONALD: Yeah, around 3 o'clock. And I didn't see him throw the speaker, but I heard her like -- you know, like she was freaking out. Anthony's telling him to calm down. And then he picked back up the speaker and just smashed it on the floor right in front of her or right -- like this (gestures).

She's sitting on the steps, like this

(gestures). I say like, "What the fuck, you know,

like, dude, cut the crap." I said, "The cops are

already looking for you now from last night." And he

comes charging up there, and he tried to fight me in

the hallway.

He started grappling with me, tried to swing on me. I mean, I got fucking some bruises over here from him, you know, grabbing me. And I said, "That's it. I'm out." Anthony said, "Can you guys just leave?" I said, "Yeah. I'm out of here for now." I said, "He should have got out of here soon. The cops are looking for him." "Oh, what do you mean, dude?" "They want him for last night, dude." And so we left. I'm like, "Well, I'm out of here for now. No problem, Anthony. We'll -- we'll leave, but I'm calling the cops."

TROOPER CONNOLLY: Did you see him slam the speaker?

MR. MCDONALD: I saw him slam the speaker off the floor after -- he'd already thrown it, I guess, at her, like at her. Anthony got in the way of it like -- like actually blocked it from hitting her. And it was already half-broken by the time I came around the corner, and he's screaming at the top of his lungs, picking it up and then smashing it off the floor.

And now it's all over the place, you know. The speaker is all busted up. That's what I witnessed him do there. Then he came up to me and basically tried to grapple with me again. So I leave, and I just leave just to get out of there. Of course, now I got to

change my tire. So Anthony's trying to help me change my tire because he feels bad because I got a flat tire, and he knows his brother (indiscernible). He did do it, so he helps me get the spare on.

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And we leave, call the cops. I said, "Hey, you know, you told us to call when he came back. He's at the house, sitting there right now, okay. So there you go." And they're like, "Oh, yeah. We already -- someone called 911. They're already on their way over there. Can you meet us there? You got a key?"

At first, they wanted to meet us at the Lobster Claw place. And then they called and said, "Well, he's not at the house. No one's answering. It's all dark. Can you come up here and open up the house, so we can go and see if he's in it?" I'm like, "Yeah. Okay. I'll meet you up there."

So that's when there's five Reading cops or something there, and I pull in and try to open the -- give them the key to open the door. And the very front door, which is never locked -- it's a sucky door; you don't lock it. It's a deadbolt you can only lock on the inside because we don't have the key for it. I said, "Well, if that's locked, he's in there." You cannot lock it unless you're locking it from the

inside. And that's when they -- the police -- Anthony and the police were trying to get him to come out of the house because they knew he was in there, you know.

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And I didn't go in -- I saw them -- you know, it took them an hour, the Reading Police trying to take -- get him to come out, talking to him. And of course, they had every opportunity to burst in there if they really had to, and they didn't want to do that. No one wanted them to do that, you know.

And next thing I know, they're all running from one -- you know, they had almost a -- I'm parked inside of the garage all under cover, and next thing I know, they're running over the other side. And Alan's brother, Anthony, is screaming, "They shot my brother."

TROOPER CONNOLLY: You --

MR. MCDONALD: I was in my Caravan because the cop said, "Oh, sit in your car. We're going to have him out of here. Just stay in the car." I said, "Okay." They're like, "We just want to get him off the premises, and you know, you can go in the house and whatnot." And that didn't happen.

TROOPER CONNOLLY: You didn't hear a gunshot?
You just said --

MR. MCDONALD: I didn't hear a gunshot. But I

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   also -- and I asked them at that point -- I think there
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   was the fire engines -- the Reading Fire had just left,
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   or was just going back in because they -- they were
   there. They were going to -- they were going to pry
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   open the door, like bust it open. And I think they --
   he was supposed to be coming out -- talking to his
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   brother on the phone or something. And the fire truck
   started leaving. Alls I was hearing was like the beep
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    -- the beep at that point. I didn't hear a qunshot.
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            TROOPER CONNOLLY: So you're in the parking lot
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   of the gas station?
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            MR. MCDONALD: Yeah. But I'm on the far side
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   now. Like the garages are over here with the gas
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    pumps, and the apartments are on this side. I'm like
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    over here on the -- on the sidewalk. And I guess where
    everything happened is over here, the other side of the
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    lot. I couldn't see anything.
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            TROOPER CONNOLLY: So just to recap, you --
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    they tell you to come back -- the police?
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            MR. MCDONALD: Yes.
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            TROOPER CONNOLLY: They say come back.
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            MR. MCDONALD: Well, they wanted to meet us at
    -- at the Lobster Claw originally --
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            TROOPER CONNOLLY: Yeah.
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1 MR. MCDONALD: -- just to -- to get our 2 statements because he assaulted us both again today. TROOPER CONNOLLY: So you did do that, or you 3 4 5 MR. MCDONALD: No. We were going to. 6 TROOPER CONNOLLY: Yeah. 7 MR. MCDONALD: And then they -- they called my 8 girlfriend's phone back and said, "Meet us at the 9 house, because it's dark. I don't think he's here. Do 10 you got a key to get in?" "Yeah. I got a key. I'll 11 open it." "Do you want to go and open it?" I said, 12 "Okay. No problem." It was all -- everything was 13 deadbolted. 14 TROOPER CONNOLLY: So you did try to open it? MR. MCDONALD: Yeah. I tried -- yeah. I tried 15 to open the door for them. You know, I got the -- "You 16 got the house key?" "This is -- it's supposed to be 17 this one." I said, "Officer, no one has this deadbolt 18 19 key. It's been there -- you know, no one has a key for 20 it. It's never locked. It's for the -- it's the main 21 entrance to get into the -- both apartments -- in all 22 the -- both apartments." 23 TROOPER CONNOLLY: When you say "both

apartments" -- I didn't know -- I --

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MR. MCDONALD: Well, okay. There's -- you walk 1 up the little steps, and there's a door, and there's a 2 hallway, and our apartment's the one on the left, and 3 4 there's an apartment right across, on the right. 5 TROOPER CONNOLLY: Are they separated apartments, or are they --6 7 MR. MCDONALD: Yeah. TROOPER CONNOLLY: -- bedrooms with a 8 9 different --MR. MCDONALD: They're separated -- they're 10 11 separated apartments. 12 TROOPER CONNOLLY: And then you share the 13 kitchen, living room? MR. MCDONALD: Well, I don't -- the other 14 apartment has their own living room, kitchen --15 16 TROOPER CONNOLLY: His? MR. MCDONALD: -- bedrooms. The -- the other 17 apartment -- no. There's two separate apartments --18 19 like full apartments. TROOPER CONNOLLY: Oh. 20 MR. MCDONALD: I share an apartment with Alan 21 22 and my girlfriend. 23 TROOPER CONNOLLY: I see. MR. MCDONALD: Now, we are on the second floor, 24

1 in one big room. He moved himself into the living room 2 downstairs to have his whole -- a bigger room for 3 himself. Okay, fine. That's -- that's cool. So the downstairs living room was his, upstairs, big room was 5 mine and my girlfriends. And the kitchen and bathroom

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were supposed to be community places.

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TROOPER CONNOLLY: How long have you guys lived there with him?

MR. MCDONALD: She's only moved in, I think, three months ago. He -- I mean, she -- she'd been around and -- and almost living there for about six, you know, but moved in about three. I've been living with him for almost a year. But I mean, I've been best friends with him for -- hmm, I'm 42 now, so 30 years. But I mean, I could -- I could smell booze on his breath.

TROOPER CONNOLLY: Today?

MR. MCDONALD: Oh yeah. I could tell -- when he was trying to fight with me and wrestle me, I could smell the -- the booze just pouring off of him. And he -- his eyes were just -- I think he was -- he was doing some serious drugs because his eyes were tiny little stacks -- I mean --

TROOPER CONNOLLY: Do you know that he was

|prescribed any medications?

MR. MCDONALD: Oh God. They've got him on a bunch of different medicines. I don't know what the hell he's taking. I don't know. I mean, he -- he almost died of an overdose not that long ago. He went away for a couple months.

TROOPER CONNOLLY: Are they legally prescribed, or are they things that he just from people that he probably --

MR. MCDONALD: No. He's got some prescriptions that -- like Gabapentin that he gets prescribed -- TROOPER CONNOLLY: Yeah.

MR. MCDONALD: -- and a couple other things.

But I mean, I think he was doing other things. I think he -- I think he started doing dope again, myself. And -- or I know for a fact he's been taking Klonopins.

You know, that's something I know for a fact, because he was -- he was hunting around for him. And I heard him hunting around for them, so I know that he was doing -- so I think he was just drunk. And in all honesty, I seen him like this when he was -- when he was doing heroin and taking pills.

TROOPER CONNOLLY: When he came up the stairs today, you guys fought in front of your bedroom?

1	MR. MCDONALD: Yeah. In the hallway, in front
2	of my bedroom. Yeah. That that's no. He was
3	trying to fight me. I was just trying to trying to
4	keep him from hitting me and get his arms like so he
5	couldn't swing on me anymore. That was about it. He
6	kept saying, "Hit me. Hit me." I'm like, "I'm not
7	going to hit you. I'm not going I'm not getting
8	arrested for assaulting you." I'm like, "You're
9	assaulting me." I'm like, "I'm not going to jail over
10	you."
11	TROOPER CONNOLLY: When do you think that the
12	police noticed that he was inside? You tried to open
13	the door, but then realized he was
14	MR. MCDONALD: Well, that was it when I
15	he must be I turned around and said, "Well, he has
16	to be in there, because there's no way to lock that
17	door unless you do it from the inside." That's it.
18	You know, it has
19	TROOPER CONNOLLY: Yeah.
20	MR. MCDONALD: no one has a key for it.
21	TROOPER CONNOLLY: Yeah.
22	MR. MCDONALD: You have to deadbolt it
23	TROOPER CONNOLLY: Yeah.
24	MR. MCDONALD: on the inside, and that's it,

you know.

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2 TROOPER CONNOLLY: Did you see him inside? MR. MCDONALD: No. But it -- he -- it 3 was dark, quiet, and he was -- he had just called my 4 5 phone about four times, calling me all sorts of -- told 6 me he was going to kill my cat and throw my cat out or 7 you know -- I'm like, "Dude, don't touch my cat because, you know what -- first off, you can't give 8 9 away someone else's animal. That's illegal. All 10 right? And second, if you touch my cat, then that's 11 animal cruelty, and there's going to be a charge here." I said, "You already got charges on you. You're not 12 going to run from that." And so he didn't like that, 13 you know. He didn't like that at all because the cops 14 15 were already there and all before I showed up. And they're like, "Oh, it's dark. Can you meet us up here 16 instead of the Lobster Claw?" So I was on my way to 17 the Lobster Claw. 18 19

TROOPER CONNOLLY: Did he call you after you tried to open the door?

MR. MCDONALD: No.

TROOPER CONNOLLY: No?

MR. MCDONALD: No.

TROOPER CONNOLLY: Did you talk to him at all

after that?

MR. MCDONALD: No. No. He was talking to his brother.

TROOPER CONNOLLY: Why did the police send you out to your car if they didn't think he was inside?

MR. MCDONALD: No. Because I told them straight up, "He's got to be inside because that door's locked." And I said, "There's no way to lock it unless you lock it from the inside."

TROOPER CONNOLLY: Okay.

MR. MCDONALD: Okay. It wasn't like they were at the apartment door. They were at the hallway door, which is never locked. So I'm like, "He has to be in there." I'm like, "Someone had to do it from the inside of the house." And there's a side door from the garage that goes in there, which has a deadbolt too.

And Anthony has the normal doorknob key. I have the normal doorknob key. But there's a deadbolt. You have to lock it from the inside.

TROOPER CONNOLLY: Did you guys try that door?

MR. MCDONALD: Yeah. They tried that. And

then after, we couldn't get through the hall door, I

gave the cops my key. "Here's my here's my key. Try

to get in whatever doors." And they went, "Okay. Why

don't you sit in your car because we want to get this dude." I'm like, "Absolutely. I'm out of here. I'm like, "I'll sit in my car. I'll wait here." And the next thing I know, it turned into a nightmare.

TROOPER CONNOLLY: So you and Kim are both sitting in your car. You did not see Alan at all?

MR. MCDONALD: No. Did not see Alan. Just watched the cop do a lot of trying to surround the house and calling to -- talking to him, yelling up at the windows and, you know, his brother talking to him on the phone, on speaker phone, the cops trying to talk to him. And I never saw Alan again.
