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$P R O C E E D I N G S$
(Court called to order.)
(10:08 a.m.)

THE COURT OFFICER: You may be seated. Court is in session.

Just, once again, please make sure your electronic device is turned off and put away.

Thank you.
THE CLERK: And, your Honor, calling Docket 2227 IN01, Inquest into the Death of Brendan Reilly.

THE COURT: Would the parties identify themselves for the record, please.

MR. VAN EPPS: Good morning, your Honor. Graham Van Epps for the Commonwealth.

MS. GEMMILL: Good morning, your Honor. Caitlin Gemmill for the Commonwealth.

THE COURT: Good morning.
MR. MCDONALD: Good morning, your Honor. Alan McDonald for the Lexington police officers.

MR. HEINEMAN: Good morning, your Honor. Michael Heineman for the Reilly family. With me is Jason Kent, also from my office.

THE COURT: All right. And just before
we begin, $I$ just want to maybe put a few thangs on the record.

And just so, for the people that have never been involved in an inquest or aren't famılıar with the procedure, this is not a confrontational exercise, meaning it is not a -- a trial where there are different sides.

The purpose of an inquest is to provide the fact finder, me, with information from which I can determine whether there's probable cause or not to believe that a crime occurred in connection with the events of February 12, 2022 .

So, to that end, while there is -- there may be questioning of various witnesses, cross-examination of the witnesses is not allowed and not permitted under the rules.

A further thing, and $I$ think the lawyers are aware of this, but to the extent that other people are not, we were out at the scene this morning looking at the -- doing a view.

I kind of disclosed to everybody beforehand I'm from Lexington. I graduated from Lexington Hıgh School. I grew up about 100 yards away, 200 yards away from where the incident took place.

I grew up on Liberty Avenue, so I'm very familiar with the scene, I'm very familiar with the area.

I don't know any of the parties involved. I haven't been back to Lexington since I graduated.

Well, my parents sold the house in 1987. I graduated college in 1985. I haven't been back to Lexington since right around then, other than to drive through on the highway and occasionally just driving through.

But $I$ just wanted everyone to understand that $I$ am very familiar with the area around where this all took place.

I have no vested interest in anything that happened. I don't know any of the parties.

So with that -- and, also, just one other thing, I apologize.

I notice that there are people that are wearing masks. If anyone prefers to wear a mask, that is totally fine with me, so whatever your comfort level is; and that goes for any of the witnesses that are going to come in.

Anyone that wants to wear a mask should feel completely comfortable wearing a mask. All right?

MR. VAN EPPS: Your Honor, I just wanted to address a couple housekeeping matters before we call the first witness.

Prior to the proceedings today, there have been three discovery notices. There was a fourth sort of rolling discovery that was kind of leading up to today.

I brought hard copies of the materials, and I've given them to the clerk. I'll have an inventory of them, an actual notice, for the Court a little bit later.

Most of them are transcripts of things like that. There's also the training materials the court wanted me to get.

THE COURT: Yes.

MR. VAN EPPS: There are -- there is a new State Police interview report in there involving a -- a juvenile that the court can read over. We can talk about that later.

I also did disclose to counsel ahead of time, Officer Charles DiChiara is -- you know, we expect to call on January 4 th as a -- for background -- on use of force and training and things like that.

He was apparently disciplined in 1998 by the Waltham Police for conduct unbecoming.

Essentially, he -- he used foul language during booking.

He essentially was -- took over the booking of a very argumentative and hostile arrestee, who had been threatening a female officer -- essentially threatening to rape her and all these things.

And when the guy challenged DiChiara to a fight, DiChiara referred to him as a coward but also referred to him using foul language referring to a woman's genitalia -- the $P$ word, not the $C$ word.

And he was later disciplined for that and served a suspension. So $I$ don't know that it has a lot of value, but $I$ just want to bring it up - -

THE COURT: Okay.
MR. VAN EPPS: -- out of an abundance of caution.

THE COURT: Sure. Okay. Whenever you're ready.

MR. VAN EPPS: Commonwealth calls Kim Hine.

THE COURT: Mr. Van Epps, have you gone
over with the various witnesses that these are basically closed proceedings and that they're not necessarily to discuss -- you can't keep them from discussing their testimony but obviously that these are --

MR. VAN EPPS: They've been advised that it's a nonpublıc, closed proceeding.

THE COURT: All right.
MR. VAN EPPS: If the Court wishes the witnesses to refrain from discussing it until the report comes out, I'd suggest the court just say that.

THE COURT: Fine.
THE COURT OFFICER: Step up here, please.
I'm just going to ask that you raise your right hand.

Face the clerk, please.
THE CLERK: Do you solemnly swear or affirm the testimony you'll provide the Court today will be the truth so help you God?

THE WITNESS: Yes.
KIMBERLY HINE, SWORN
THE CLERK: Right this way, please.
THE COURT: And just watch your step getting in there.

And, Commonwealth, before you begin. Ms. Hine, my name's Judge Brennan. these -- this -- as you probably are aware from talking to the DA's office, this is an inquest proceeding, which is basically a closed, secret proceeding.

I can't order you not to discuss your testimony with anyone, but my preference is until the report is released that you not discuss your testimony with anyone.

THE WITNESS: Okay. Yup.
EXAMINATION
BY MS. GEMMILL:
Q. Good morning, ma'am. Can you please introduce yourself to the Court and spell your first and last name for us?
A. Sure.

My name is Kim, K-I-M, Hine, H-I-N-E.
Q. All right. Is Kim a nickname, or is that your full name?
A. Kimberly.
Q. Can you just spell that first, your full first name for us?
A. $K-I-M-B-E-R-L-Y$.
Q. Ma'am, how old are you currently as you sit
here today?
A. Forty-nine.
Q. What is your date of birth?
A. September 5, 1973 .
Q. Where do you currently live?
A. 145 East Street, Lexington.
Q. How long have you lived at that address?
A. 2008 .
Q. All right. Did you live in Lexington your whole life, or did you grow up somewhere else?
A. I grew up somewhere else.
Q. Okay. Do you currently work?
A. I do.
Q. What do you do for work?
A. I'm a marketing director at CVS Health.
Q. CVS Health?
A. CVS Health, yes.
Q. Okay. I'm going to turn your attention now to February 12 th of 2022.

I believe you told us you'd been living in Lexington for quite a few years.
A. Um-hum.
Q. Were you living at that same address in February of 2022?
A. Yes.
Q. Okay. Did you have particular plans on that Saturday?
A. I was heading to Bedford to go shopping.
Q. Okay. And if you can just make sure you talk
into your microphone, just to make sure --
A. Sure.
Q. -- everyone can hear you.
A. Is that better?
Q. Okay. Thank you. Acoustics are a little funny in this room.

You were headed to Bedford to go shopping?
A. Yes.
Q. Okay. About what time were you planning to go on a shopping trip?
A. (No audible response.)
Q. Like, what time of day was it?
A. Probably late morning.
Q. okay. Were you going with anyone?
A. No, I was alone.
Q. How did you plan to get to Bedford?
A. Driving.
Q. What kind of car did you have at the time?
A. I think $I$ was driving my Jeep Wrangler.
Q. Your path into Bedford --
A. Um-hum.
Q. -- what road did that take you on through Lexington?
A. Let's see, it went down East street. I took a left on Adams; right on Coolidge; right on Hancock.

And then $I$ was going to go through the rotary up, $I$ forget the name of the road, but to Bedford Street.

But $I$ couldn't, so $I$ kind of went one extra turn around the rotary after the incident. Q. Okay. The rotary you're talking about -A. Um-hum.
Q. -- is that the rotary near the Diamond Middle School?
A. Yes.
Q. Are you familiar with that rotary?
A. Very much. My kids went to school there.
Q. Your kids went to Diamond Middle School?
A. Correct.
Q. Okay. How many -- how frequently would you say that you go through that area on a regular basis?
A. Oh, probably only once a week.
Q. All right. But it's fairly frequently?
A. Yeah, yeah. Probably about once a week or
so.
Q. Okay. So what street are you taking to approach the rotary that day?
A. Hancock.
Q. Hancock?

You said that you couldn't go through the rotary.

Can you please describe to us what you observed as you approached the rotary from Hancock Street?
A. Sure.

So the rotary has four roads plus the driveway to Diamond, which is kind of like a road because it's a really long driveway.

And when you come up to the rotary, you're supposed to stop before you merge on, which is what I did.

And when $I$ stopped -- it all happened really quickly -- but $I$ saw pretty much straight across from me, so when $I$ was on Hancock, then there's the Diamond driveway, then there's -- I think that's called Burlington Street.

So on whatever that street is called, $I$ saw a man lying perpendicular to the road, and there was about, like, six cops around him.

And $I$ saw what looked like the -- the cops were holding what looked like rifles, like, long guns, but $I$-- I'm now assuming they weren't actually rifles, but, like, those bean bag -- I'm golng to say the wrong here, like, bean bag guns. Q. I'm going to ask you a few more questions -A. Um-hum.
Q. -- about that --
A. Um-hum.
Q. -- but first I'm going to show you a document and ask you if you recognize this. Okay?

MS. GEMMILL: Your Honor, may I approach?
THE COURT: Yes.
MS. GEMMILL: Okay.
BY MS. GEMMILL:
Q. Ms. Hine, can you just take a look at this image and -- oh, I'm sorry.
A. Um-hum.
Q. Tell me if you recognize what's depicted in this image.
A. Yeah.
Q. What does that image depict?
A. The rotary and the five roads.
Q. All right. Is this a fair and accurate deplction of the rotary as you know it but
probably in the summertime?
A. Yeah.
Q. Okay.

MS. GEMMILL: Your Honor, I would ask that this be introduced as my first exhibit today.

THE COURT: All right. Exhibit 1.
(Exhibit No. 1, Photograph, received into evidence.)

MS. GEMMILL: Your Honor, may $I$ publish this?

THE COURT: Yes.

MS. GEMMILL: $I^{\prime} m$ just going to place Exhibit 1 on our ELMO here --

THE COURT: Okay.
MS. GEMMILL: Kind of.

BY MS. GEMMILL:
Q. Ms. Hine, can you see the ELMO screen from where you're seated?
A. Yeah.
Q. Okay. I'm just going to indicate here on Exhibit 1 -- am $I$ indicating Hancock Street?
A. Yes.
Q. All right. And this is the road you were coming into the rotary on, correct?
A. Yes.
Q. All right. And this road right here, to the right of Hancock Street, is that the driveway for Diamond?
A. Yes.
Q. Okay. And then the next road around the rotary is Burlington street, correct?
A. Yes.
Q. All right. I'm going to bring you Exhibit 1, and $I^{\prime} m$ just going to ask if you can mark for us where you saw the man who was laying on the roadway.
A. Okay.
(Inaudible discussion.)
BY MS. GEMMILL:
Q. If you can just draw a little oval for us in the approximate area of where you saw the man laying.
A. (No audible response.)
Q. Okay. Thank you.

MS. GEMMILL: $I^{\prime} m$ just going to publish
Exhibit 1 again.
BY MS. GEMMILL:
Q. So that little dark mark you made up here on Burlington Street is where the man was laying?
A. Yes.
Q. So you mentioned that there were cops around this man; is that correct?
A. Yes.
Q. And that's pollce officers, right?
A. Yes.
Q. And how many did you think you saw?
A. $\quad I^{\prime} m$ guessing, like, six.
Q. Okay. What did you observe about the man who was lying in the roadway?

Lake, could you see from your position what color his skin was, that kind of thing?
A. Only thing $I$ really remember, $I$ think he had a hoodie on, but, and he was white, that's all I remember, really.
Q. Okay. You mentioned that you noticed some of these officers holding what looked like long rifles.

Do you know how many of those long rifles you saw?
A. No.
Q. Did it appear that only one officer was holding a rifle like that or more than one officer?
A. No, it was more than one. I would guess
three maybe. I don't know.
I -- like, they were around the guy, so I think some of the cops were kind of blocked, you know, blocking the others.

But $I$ would say at least three maybe. It could be more.
Q. Did you notice anything about the color of those rifles?
A. If you made me pick a color, I'd say brown. Q. Okay. Could you see whether or not the man on the ground was moving around at all when you first observed him?
A. I saw him, like, try to get up.

Like, he was lying like this and he -- if you're lying like this, kind of pushed himself up, but he didn't -- I don't remember him getting all the way up.
Q. You're kind of making a movement with your body where you sort of put your hands behind you.

Is that what the man was doing, is putting his -- putting his hands behind him?
A. Well, I remember his torso, like, coming up a little bit, and $I$ would imagine unless -- I mean, unless you have a really strong core, you don't
usually get up without some sort of leverage, so...
Q. Okay. So was he in, like, a seated position at that point?
A. I don't even remember him getting all the way up to seated, to be honest.
Q. All right. What was happening with his legs when you're observing him putting his hands behind him?
A. I don't remember anything about his legs.
Q. Okay. Could you see whether or not this man had anything in his hands?
A. I don't, but $I$ was -- I mean, if you remember the -- remember the picture, $I^{\prime} m$, like, pretty far away, so $I$ don't remember anything in his hands.

He could have, but $I$ don't remember it.
Q. Okay. We'll get back to that in just a second.

So you are -- are you kind of stuck at the intersection of Hamilton and this rotary?
A. Hancock.
Q. Excuse me, Hancock and this rotary?
A. I'm basically where $I$ would normally stop to get on to the rotary; I just -- I stopped. I
didn't move any -- I'm still -- I'm not in the rotary yet.
Q. Do you have a sense about how long you stayed in that particular spot?
A. Total? Maybe five minutes.
Q. Okay. So a matter of minutes?
A. Yeah.
Q. All right. Did you ever observe the male on the ground move into a different position from that sort of leaned back position that you were describing?
A. I mean, most of the time he was flat.
Q. Okay. When he wasn't flat, can you describe what you saw him do, if anything?
A. Again, like, he -- all $I$ remember is that he kind of got up; but he didn't get all the way up.
Q. Okay. Could you see whether he got his feet underneath him to stand?
A. I don't remember the feet.
Q. All right. Could you see what the police officers were doing, if they were moving around at all while this man was on the ground?
A. Not that $I$ can remember.
Q. Okay. From your vantage point, could you
hear any sounds?
A. Well, I heard gunshots.
Q. We'll get to that in just a second.

But prior to hearing a sound of possible gunshots, did you hear any other sounds, like voices?
A. I think $I$ heard some type of yelling; but, like, my window was up and $I^{\prime} m$ sure my radio was on.

I know my radio was on, because $I$ remember turning it down.

So there was, like, some shouting, but I did not discern any words because, again, my radio was on and my window was up. It was cold. It was winter.
Q. At any point during your observations in the rotary that day, did you hear any words that were being said by the folks --
A. No.
Q. -- that you could see?
A. No. Just some shouts.
Q. Could you tell where the shouting was coming from?
A. No.
Q. Okay. So you couldn't discern if the
shouting was coming from the man on the ground or from the police officers or from both?
A. No.
Q. Okay. All right. So you're watching this man who's -- who's on the ground; he's trying - it looks like he's trying to get up.

Can you describe for us what you saw happen?
A. I mean, that's really what $I$ saw happen. Q. Okay. You said that you heard gunshots.

Can you describe to us what you were seeing at the time you heard what sounded like gunshots?
A. It was basically all at the same time of what I just explained.
Q. Okay.
A. And $I$ heard, like, maybe five gunshots maybe, I don't remember exactly, but there were several, a handful.

But it all happened kind of at the same time.
Q. Did you notice what happened to the man after you heard those gunshots?

Like, did his body move or anything like that?
A. Well, he -- after he tried to get up, he ended up back in the same position that he was, like, prone.
Q. Okay. Could you see what the police officers did after you heard those shots?
A. I don't remember them doing anything --
Q. Okay.
A. In particular.
Q. -- at some point did you decide to document what you were seeing?
A. I did.
Q. How did you do that?
A. On my phone.
Q. Okay. Did you take photographs or video? Both of those things?
A. A video.
Q. Okay. And were you able to provide a copy of that video to investigators in the course of this investigation?
A. Yes.
Q. Okay. What part of your observations were you able to film?
A. It was after what $I$ just described.
Q. Okay. After you heard the shots?
A. Yes.
Q. Okay. Did you notice whether any of the police officers attempted to help the man on the ground after you heard the shots?
A. I don't remember.
Q. Okay.
A. I feel like at that point $I$ was kind of, like, in shock myself.

And I'm not sure $I$ was completely paying attention; and that's probably when $I$ was, like, Oh, my God, and I, like, grabbed my phone afterward, like, after, so...
Q. Okay. Do you remember seeing if any ambulances came into the area, anything like that?
A. No, but $I$-- soon after the cars from the Diamond lot -- they play basketball there on Saturdays -- were leaving, were, like, getting -going to the rotary, and $I$ had cars backing up behind me, and $I$ felt like I need to -- I need to go, I need to get out of here, so I entered the rotary, like, you know, after maybe two cars from Diamond entered, like, then $I$ entered, so I was out of there pretty quickly.
Q. All right.
A. Like, as soon as that video went off, I
was --
Q. All right. Do you know about how long you spent filming before you had to move along? A. I think only a minute or two.
Q. Okay. Ms. Hine, do you recall giving an interview to a member of the police department on February 13 th , the day after this happened?
A. I don't think it was one day after, I think it was, like, two, but, yes.
Q. So shortly after --
A. Yes.
Q. -- right?
A. Yup.
Q. Do you have any recollection of telling that officer that interviewed you that you saw the man get up off the ground and move towards the officers?
A. I might have.
Q. Okay. Do you -- do you have a recollection of seeing that at this -- as you sit here today? A. I don't.

But $I$ would imagine that whatever $I$ said then is probably more accurate than what I'm saying ten months later.
Q. Okay. Do you remember whether you saw any of
the police officers putting on gloves, like for medical treatment purposes after this?
A. I don't remember now.

If $I$ said it at the time, it was, again, probably more accurate than what $I^{\prime} m$ saying ten months later --
Q. Okay.
A. -- because $I$ was interviewed two days later, so...
Q. Understood.

MS. GEMMILL: Thank you so much, Ms. Hine.

I don't have any further questions for you.

THE COURT: All right. Anybody else have any questions?

Mr. Heıneman?
MR. HEINEMAN: Yeah, just -- just briefly.

EXAMINATION

BY MR. HEINEMAN:
Q. I'm unclear about whether you saw the man ever get to his feet.

As you sit here today, do you have any memory of the man getting to his feet before you
heard gunshots?
A. I don't remember it today, as $I$ said, but if I -- if $I$ said it two days after, $I$ would trust my recollection two days after more than $I$ would trust it ten months after, so...
Q. Thank you.

Do you remember how many -- the sounds of the gunshots, were they all the same sound to you, or did you hear different sounding gunshots?
A. I think they were the same, but $I$ can't say for sure.

I don't think $I^{\prime} v e$ ever actually heard gunshots before, except on TV.
Q. Thank you.

THE COURT: Thank you. All set.
THE WITNESS: All right.
(Witness excused.)

MR. VAN EPPS: Judge, let me just check in the hallway and see if our next witness is there.

THE COURT: Sure.
(Pause.)
MR. VAN EPPS: Your Honor, the next witness is going to be John Chang.

THE COURT OFFICER: Stand here; raise
your right hand.
THE CLERK: Mr. Chang, do you solemnly swear or affirm that the testimony you'll provide the Court today will be the truth so help you God?

THE WITNESS: Yes.
JOHN CHANG, SWORN
THE COURT OFFICER: Right this way, sir.
THE COURT: Good morning, Mr. Chang.
Before we get started, my name's Judge Brennan.

I'm obviously -- well, not obviously; I'm the judge who's presiding over this.

I can't order you not to talk about your testimony when you leave here today, but my preference is at some point there's going to be a report written about -- and that's going to be released to the parties about whatever findings I make, and what $I^{\prime} d$ ask is that you wait to talk to anybody about what you're testifying to today until then, okay?

THE WITNESS: Okay.
EXAMINATION
BY MR. VAN EPPS:
Q. Mr. Chang, good morning.
A. Hi .
Q. We met before, right?
A. Yeah.
Q. And could you -- could you tell us where you live today, what town you live in currently?
A. I live in Waltham.
Q. Waltham?
A. Yeah.
Q. And, back in February of this year, did you live in Lexington?
A. Yes.
Q. And where'd you live?
A. I lived -- I don't really remember. Is it Hancock Street?
Q. Um - -
A. I don't --

MR. VAN EPPS: Judge, can you hear him all right?

THE COURT: Just -- if you could just do me a favor and put the microphone down a little bit --
A. Do you mean the address?
Q. Do you know the address?
A. I don't know the address. I have bad memory issues.
Q. You have memory issues?
A. Yeah.
Q. Okay. And did you live alone or with a roommate?
A. I lived with Brendan and James at that house in Lexington.

I think $1 t$ was Hancock Street, was it?
Q. You think Hancock Street?
A. Was it Hancock Street?

Yeah, yeah.
Q. Is that a -- is that 98; that's right by the rotary?
A. Yes, yes.
Q. Okay. And how long did you live at

98 Hancock Street, sir?
A. I think it was a couple of months. I can't really remember.
Q. And you mentioned you lived with a Brendan and a James.

Are you referring to James Hanify?
A. Yes.
Q. And is the Brendan -- is that Brendan Reilly?
A. Yes.
Q. How long did they live with you, if you remember?
A. The few months $I$ was there.

When $I$ got there, they were already there, SO...
Q. Now, was that a house that -- you know, it's managed by a group, but there are nurses that come there?
A. Yeah. It's managed by a group, but I think the nurses are separate. I don't think they come wlth the house, yeah.
Q. Okay. And were you getting help while you lıved at that house?
A. No, I didn't have a nurse or anything. I was staying there unofficially because -- yeah.
Q. Because why?
A. Oh, because $I$ needed a place to stay. And I work with the group on other stuff and -- at the time, and, like, so I (indiscernible) place to stay.

You usually have to pay, like, part of your Social security benefits to be there, but I was staying there free.

Maybe it was official, but, like, I just wasn't paying, but, like, yeah, I worked with that group already, though, officially, though. Q. Did you have a bedroom on the second floor?
A. Yes.
Q. Okay. Now --
A. I had a key and stuff, so...
Q. You had a key, too?
A. Yeah.
Q. Did -- did you -- did you understand that other people in that house were getting visits from nurses for mental health?
A. Yeah.
Q. Okay.
A. Yeah.
Q. And when you and $I$ met last time, did we talk about your own mental health situation?
A. Yeah.
Q. Okay. And could you just tell Judge Brennan what that is?
A. I have schizophrenia, but, yeah. I -- just get thoughts and stuff like that.

I hear -- I don't hear things auditory; but, like, I imagine conversations and stuff happening.
Q. And we talked about the last time we met whether you can recognize when it's happening or not?
A. I can, yeah.

I can give a good report of what happened, like, accurate, and it won't be -- yeah, I don't have any auditory or visual hallucinations. Q. Okay. Do you have -- are you thinking clearly today?
A. Yeah.
Q. Okay.
A. It's just $I$ have trouble remembering what happens a long time ago, so...
Q. Okay. And when Judge Brennan -- and when the clerk gave you the oath to tell the truth, you understand that's --
A. Yeah.
Q. -- trying to be truthful and accurate?
A. Yeah, I am. I try to be accurate, yeah.
Q. I appreciate that.

The -- the medication that you're prescribed that you're supposed to take for your schizophrenia, do you always take it?
A. I don't take it because I haven't heard anything -- well, $I$ call -- it's not hearing, but I haven't heard anything for two years or so, so I don't really need it.

I just have head pains from, like, a mental collapse $I$ had a couple years ago.
Q. I didn't hear you.
A. I just have head pains from a mental
collapse; memory issues now. I don't really hear anything.
Q. Does the medication that you sometimes --
A. It hurts.
Q. -- take -- it hurts?
A. Yeah. That's why I don't take it, so...
Q. Okay. I want to talk to you back about February of this year.
A. Yeah.
Q. February 12 th .

That morning, was there a point at which you were in your bedroom, or -- and you had a conversation with Brendan Reilly?
A. Not a conversation before with the -- what happened, but, yeah, he came -- I went up to upstairs, and he came in my room, and accused me of taking his medication so...
Q. Okay. And when he accused you of taking his medication --

THE COURT: Can we just turn the phones off?

BY MR. VAN EPPS:
Q. When he accused you of taking his -- his --

Brendan - -
THE COURT: Hold on one second.
UNIDENTIFIED SPEAKER: Excuse me.
It's a diabetic alarm. It's not an emergency.

THE COURT: Oh, okay. That's more important than the cell.

MR. VAN EPPS: We'll wait.
(Pause.)
UNIDENTIFIED SPEAKER: Thank you.
THE COURT: Do you need to take a break?
Do you need any --
UNIDENTIFIED SPEAKER: No, no, I'm good.
THE COURT: Any candy or anything like that?

UNIDENTIFIED SPEAKER: No, I'm good.
Thank you.
THE COURT: You're good?
BY MR. VAN EPPS:
Q. So when -- when Brendan approached you and accused you of taking his medication, how did he do it?

Can you tell me -- tell me what you were seeing.
A. He -- he came in, he was already -- he was,
like, sweating and -- and yelling.
He was, like, Give me back my fucking medication.
Q. Okay.
A. And, yeah, he was already upset and stuff like that. It wasn't, like, a conversation. I was really surprised.
Q. Okay. And -- and where did that happen in the house?
A. In my room. He's like, Oh, let me in. I think he -- yeah, he's -- let me.

In, $I$ let him in my room, because nothing happened before that and he was giving -- he's like, Give me my medication. And it was very surprising to me.
Q. When he -- what did he do to -- to let you know he was outside the room?

How did you know he was outside your room?
A. I think he -- he just said, Let me in, or he might have knocked or something.
Q. Okay. Knocked quietly or loudly?
A. I don't remember. I think he was -- it seemed normal.

But, like, he was -- he always spoke a little, like, aggressively, so, like, it didn't
seem -- $I$ was -- I didn't think it was a big deal. I.

Didn't think he was, like -- I thought maybe he was looking for something or, like, maybe he was doing something, but $I$ don't think -- $I$ didn't think it was a big deal, like, he was, like, really mad until $I$ opened the door.
Q. So you opened the door; he seems mad.
A. Yeah.
Q. What happens after that?
A. Well, he seems out of it a little bit.
Q. What does that mean?
A. Like, he's, like -- I don't know, like, he's like -- he's, like, pacing, like, Give me my medication and stuff, like.

I just -- I think $I$ was just really confused, because we had never spoken about his medication or anything.

And $I$ had never -- $I$ had no reason to take his medication or anything. I was really surprised that this was happening. Q. And as he's telling you he wants his medication, first of all, did you have his medication?
A. No, I didn't -- I didn't have his medication,
yeah.
Q. And as he's telling you he wants his medication back --
A. He asked me (indiscernible.)
Q. -- what else did he say?
A. That's it.

I was saying, like, $I$ don't have your medication, I didn't take it.

And he was like, Give it back to me, give it back to me, $I$ know you took it.
Q. Okay. Did there come a point where you became scared that he was going to hurt you? A. I was -- $I$ was already scared he was going to hurt me because he was talking about, like, killing the day before, so...
Q. Tell me about that.
A. Yeah, the day before, he had -- I was in the living room and it's connected to the dining room and he -- $I$ wasn't looking at him -- my back was to him, $I$ was on the couch, and $I$ was just -- and he was, like, Oh, hey, you know, if I killed a cop, would you tell on me, and stuff like that. Q. Okay.
A. So I said, Yeah, I said, Yeah, I would.
Q. And had you ever had a conversation about
that kind of thing with him before?
A. No. I had -- I had had -- not that.

He had, like, talked about, like, like, two weeks before it or something like -- for a couple weeks, he had been -- like, there had been noises downstairs and he had been trying to break into a safe.

And he was like -- and me and James -- me and James didn't really know what he was doing, but, like, I was, like, Is he breaking into the safe? But, like, I didn't -- he was, like, Oh, don't say anything. I said, okay.

And, like, before that, a long time ago, I found out he had taken a TV that they had brought; but, like, he said he was golng to replace it, like.

Okay, fine, so I didn't say anything elther, not really, yeah.
Q. But the house, you mentioned a safe?
A. (Indiscernible.)
Q. Is that a safe that they normally keep medication in?
A. I don't know what that safe is. I don't remember what it was.

They had -- $I$ think it was, like, money in
it, maybe. $\quad$ think there was money in it.
Q. But you don't know?
A. Yeah. I just know he was -- there were weird noises, and it turned out he was trying to break in to the safe.

I thought it might be that, but, like, we didn't know what it was for sure.
Q. So when you're upstairs with him and he's demanding his medication back --
A. Yeah.
Q. -- you don't have it to give him.

So what's happening?
A. Yeah. I told -- I was, like, I don't have it, don't freak out, $I$ don't have it.

And then, like, I was, like, I was really scared, and then so $I$ was, like, Let's go look for it.

He said, We're not looking for it; you give it back to me right away, right now or I'll hurt you.

I forgot exactly -- did he say he was going to kill me or stab me, but $I$ don't exactly remember, $I$ just know he said he was going to hurt me, and so $I$ had to trick -- I said, okay, I'll go get it, because he would let me, like,
not look for it, but get it, so $I$ said, I'll go get it.
Q. So what did you do, to kind of move this
along --
A. Yeah.
Q. -- and (inaudible)?
A. Like, I had to -- I said, I'll go get it, and so, like, I went outside with him, I was, like -I was -- he went out, and then $I$ ran back in and shut the door.
Q. So you go out in the hallway --
A. Yeah.
Q. - with him?
A. Yeah.
Q. As if you're going to go downstairs?
A. Yeah.
Q. And then you double back and lock him out?
A. Yeah.
Q. And then what happens?
A. Then $I$ opened the door and said, Help. Like, Help, someone help me, as he's trying to hurt me.
Q. Okay. Was there at some polnt where you're yelling to people outside the house?
A. Yeah, out the window, yeah, because the wandow faced the street, so $I$ was -- opened the
window and try to get someone to help me. I don't have -- I didn't have a phone at the time, so, yeah.
Q. So while this was going on, Brendan's still locked outside of your room?
A. Yeah.
Q. Can you hear what he's doing?
A. I think he -- when $I$ called for help, he goes downstairs and he starts rummaging for a knife.
Q. Okay. And you can't see him rummaging, so what makes you think he was rummaging?
A. I -- I could hear him rummaging.

And then, like, the night before, he had mentioned, $I$ want to stab you -- I want to stab a police officer with a knife, so $I$ figured he was going for a knife.
Q. Did you -- what makes you think it was -- let me withdraw that question.

You hear him rummaging --
A. Um-hum.
Q. -- and you're afraid?
A. Yeah.
Q. Okay. And you're yelling out the window?
A. Yeah.
Q. Is there anybody that you end up yelling to
or talking to?
A. A jogger and -- came by, and he's, like, Oh. And he called, and, like, some lady called. And they called and left and stuff, yeah.
Q. As this whole thing is going on -- well, let me back up.

Does Brendan have a bedroom on the second floor?
A. Yes. Yes.
Q. Where $1 s$ that compared to yours?
A. It -- from my door -- facing my door, it's to the right, so -- face outside of my room, it's to the right.
Q. Okay. And does James have a bedroom on the second floor?
A. Yeah. I think it was also to the right of mine.
Q. Was James home when this happened?
A. Yeah. I think James locked himself $1 n$ his room; $I$ (indiscernible) hear him breathing and stuff so...
Q. Did you hear anything that James was doing while this was going on?
A. Later I saw James go for a smoke once the police arrived, yeah.
Q. So you're -- you're yelling out the window for help?
A. Yeah.
Q. There's a jogger?
A. Yeah.
Q. And then what happens after that?
A. Yeah, Brendan -- I see Brendan go outside to -- I think he crossed over the neighbor's yard later.

And then, like, I heard it -- later I heard the police say he was in the backyard.

When they were, like, coming in, they're, like, Oh, he's in the backyard, so, yeah.
Q. Your -- your bedroom window is in the front of the house, right?
A. Yeah.
Q. And it looks out on the front yard and the rotary?
A. Yeah.
Q. After you -- after you heard Brendan go downstairs, when is the next time you saw Brendan?
A. Yeah, I saw him go out to the front to cross through the neighbor's yard into the back, I think, yeah.
Q. Okay.
A. I don't know if he was looking for something he buried or was trying to get out.

I thought he was trying to leave, but he went to the backyard, I guess.
Q. Did you see whether he was carrying anything or not?
A. No, I didn't see whether he had a knife on him or not.
Q. Okay. Are you still looking out the window when the police arrive?
A. Yeah, when the police arrive, yeah.

And then $I$ went back inside and $I$ barricaded the door. I think I might have done that before that, yeah. I don't know.
Q. And did you keep the door barricaded until later in the day?
A. Yeah. I kept it until it was over.
Q. Okay. Once the police arrived, what did you -- what were you able to see from your window?
A. I saw them go in and, like, try to talk to Brendan, and it seemed like they knew him from before.
Q. Where was that happening?
A. In the front. I saw them -- I saw James be, like, Brendan's in the back or something like that, I saw him talk to the police, I think. I'm not sure about that.

But, like, yeah, I saw Brendan -- James go out for a smoke in the front porch or front area, and, yeah.

And then $I$ saw -- later $I$ saw Brendan make a break for it, but it was, lıke, way later, I mean, like.
Q. Okay. So can you see -- could you see what was happening in the driveway next to the house?
A. Next to the house?

I don't remember.
Q. Okay. Do you remember seeing police in that area at any point?
A. I don't remember how (indiscernible) stuff.
Q. Okay. Now, you mentioned -- you said a couple minutes ago, Brendan made a break for it.
A. Yeah.
Q. Where was he when he made a break for it?
A. In the backyard, yeah.

I think -- yeah, he was -- he was -- I saw him running -- $I$ think $I$ saw him running with the knife.

And then, like, he went out to -- down the street and stuff, and, like, there was -- the police went after him, followed him and stuff. Q. So when that happens, I'm trying to imagine where you're -- what you're seeing.
A. Yeah.
Q. Where does he start from, and where does he end up?
A. The left side of the house, and then he runs out.

And then $I$ think -- $I$ don't really remember that, $I$ just remember he ended up down the road to my left --
Q. Okay.
A. -- and way down the road.

And, like, he had his knife and he was surrounded by the police and stuff.
Q. Is that on the far side of the rotary?
A. Yeah.
Q. Okay.
A. Just far down.
Q. So what -- what were you able to see as that's going on?
A. I saw him, like, throw the knife; and then get shot, fall down, and then they shot him again
(indiscernible), I think.
Q. Can you remember how many police officers were there?
A. I think there were three to five, and I just -- yeah.

I just remember him falling. I know he fell and he got shot, $I$ don't really remember the order -- and $I$ know he threw the knife first, so...
Q. Can you tell Judge Brennan how were the officers standing compared to where Brendan was? A. It was -- they were standing, like, maybe a few feet away, like, they're surrounding him. It was -- yeah.

It was enough that he had to throw the knife, so...
Q. Did -- and were you able to see whether or not the police were holding anything while this was going on?
A. I -- their guns, yeah.
Q. And what do you remember about those?
A. I remember they had silencers on them, I think.

They were -- like, they were -- like, I don't know if there were flare guns at first,
and, like, yeah, like --
Q. Do you remember anything about the color?
A. No, I don't remember.

I think they were black, but, like, for some reason, I have confused them with flare guns, $I$ think.
Q. Was there a point before Brendan makes a break for it and goes across the rotary, that's what you said earlier.
A. Yeah.
Q. Is there a point at which he's closer to the house and you're watching him with the police closer to the house?
A. No. They were $\ln$ the backyard talking.
Q. Okay. And the rotary is -- there's some distance between the rotary and your bedroom window, right?
A. Yeah. They were really small. Like, it's pretty far down.
Q. How is your vision?
A. My vision's not that good, but $I$ could see him. I could see the knife, and $I$ could see the gun, and $I$ could see them.
Q. Do you -- do you wear glasses for distance?
A. Yeah.

I think there was some, like, a bit of a stretch where you see it, because it wasn't, like, right in front of my window. There was a tree blocking, something like that.
Q. Can you remembex anything else about what Brendan was saying to you when he was in your room looking for -- telling you he wanted his medication?
A. I - I don't -- nothing.

I just remember him asking for his medication and just saying $I$ had it, yeah. He's saying he was going to hurt me and, like --
Q. He was going to hurt you?
A. He's, like, yeah.

He's, like, I'll fuck you up, like, maybe, like, something along the lines of, I've done it before.

Like, something he has experience, like, fighting. I don't think he did, but (indiscernible) yeah, like...
Q. When you talked to the police after this incident, you -- you described both your size and Brendan's size.

How tall are you?
A. I think five foot, eight or something.
Q. Okay. How much do you weigh?
A. 140, one...
Q. Do you have a sense of how --
A. One tharty-five, $I$ think now.
Q. I didn't hear you.
A. I think 135 maybe now. I think $I$ was 140 at the time.
Q. Do you have a sense of how large Brendan was compared to you?
A. He was bigger than me, yeah.
Q. Did you hear anything while Brendan and the police were on the other side of the rotary?

Did you hear what was going on?
A. Yeah, just, Put down the knife, put down the knife, yeah.
Q. Did you hear whether there was one voice saying that or more than one voice saying that?
A. I think there might have been two. I don't -- I don't remember.
Q. And could you hear any response from Brendan, of any kind, whether or not you could make out the words?
A. I don't -- I remember he -- I saw him -- he kept on aiming the knife. Like, he was getting ready to throw it still, or (indiscernible) he
was still trying to stab them, so, yeah.
He wasn't very -- I don't -- he wasn't cooperative, yeah.
Q. The -- the way you heard people saying, Drop the knife --
A. Yeah.
Q. -- were they saying it, you know, like, the way you and $I$ were talking now or --
A. They were sort of screaming it.

Yeah, when they first got there, they were amicable; but, then, once he made a break for it, they were screaming and stuff, yeah.
Q. Okay. What about when Brendan was talking to you in your bedroom, was he talking to you like the way you and $I$ are talking --
A. No.
Q. - or was it louder?
A. He was -- he was, like, sweating. He looked out of it. And, like, he was -- like, I don't know if he was having psychosis or he was in trouble or, like, because he had been talking about his friends and even trying to borrow money, $I$ think, before that, so, like, yeah, or if it's from not having his meds or something. But, like, he -- he was, like -- and he
was, like, obviously, like, impossible to talk to, because I don't -- I don't have his medication and stuff.

And $I$ 've never done anything to make it seem like $I$ want his medicatıon or anything. I don't even know what he was on.

But, like, he -- and he -- but he refused to believe I -- I didn't take it, so...
Q. Before this day --
A. Yeah.
Q. -- what was your relationship with Brendan like?
A. I think -- I was -- I would -- like, order a slice of pizza; other than that $I$ didn't -- for everyone, James and him, like, I'd get a pizza, like, just have a slice.

But, like, at the most, I didn't talk to him, but $I$ think he was threatening me.

I think he might have wanted to hurt me and may have used the drugs as excuse because he had been, like, Oh, hey, what's up, buddy, buddy, and stuff like that, and, like, $I$-- in my experience, being Asian, when, like, white people who are hoodish or lower-class white people, they just call me buddy or things out of nowhere and
try to infantilize me, they usually end up trying to hurt me later, to pick a fight.
Q. Okay.
A. Or try to control me or something.
Q. Did you hear any noises besides yelling from the rotary while Brendan and the police were over there?
A. I heard when the gunshots came.
Q. Do you have a memory of how many you heard? A. A few.

I don't remember exactly how many.
Q. And do you -- could you see what happened after you heard the shots?
A. I saw him on the ground. I think I might have saw him get hit by them and fall down, yeah. Q. Okay. Can you describe any of the movements of the officers or Brendan before the shots?
A. Yeah. He -- Brendan was running. He's not very fast.

He ran down the rotary and, like, they circled him, and that's it.

They were just -- he was just trying to get out the circle with the knife, and then he got shot much.

They were sort of circling for, like, I
think it was, like, 15 minutes or something $1 t$ seemed like -- I didn't have a watch or anything -- but, like, they were just circling him, and, like, telling him, Put down the knife, then they shot him.
Q. Do you have a -- as that's happening, do you know whether Brendan was standing? Sitting? Laying down?
A. Ah...
Q. Do you remember?
A. He threw the knife. I think he -- I don't know. Because I -- I remember throwing the knife, $I$ remember him falling down, and $I$ remember him getting shot. I don't remember the order.

He might have fallen down and threw the knife, or he might have tripped and threw the knife, like, or he might have thrown the knife, got shot, and then fell down.

I think that's what happened, but I'm not sure.
Q. Understanding that your -- your eyesight at distance is not great --
A. Yeah.
Q. -- a couple times you've said that you
thought Brendan threw the knife.
A. I know Brendan threw the knife.
Q. And what about what you saw makes you think he threw it?

I mean, because you're looking at some distance from him.
A. It was -- I could see the -- even though it was far, $I$ could see pretty clearly he had a knife and stuff.

It's just, like, I couldn't, like -- lıke, the lighting was good, it was a bright day, so I could see the whole thing, so.

Like, I know he threw the knife. I saw him throw it, so.

MR. VAN EPPS: If Could I just have a moment.
A. It's sort of, like, it hit the floor and stuff.

MR. VAN EPPS: Your Honor, I don't have any more questions for Mr. Chang.

I don't know if your Honor does.
THE COURT: All right. Before $I$-- do you have any questions, Mr. McDonald? MR. MCDONALD: No, your Honor. THE COURT: Mr. Heineman?

MR. HEINEMAN: No.

THE COURT: Mr. Chang, let me just ask you this.

You said that you're pretty sure that Mr. Reilly threw the knife.

THE WITNESS: Yeah.

THE COURT: Do you recall what order things, like -- when did things happen when you say that he threw the knife?

THE WITNESS: He was down in the rotary getting circled by the cops when he -- they were telling --

THE COURT: So once he was down, was he standing, seated, or lying down?

THE WITNESS: I don't remember if he was -- if he had trıpped or not. I think he was trying to run.

I think he tried to throw the knife and then run off.

THE COURT: So when you say "he tried to throw the knife," did you actually see the knıfe leave his hand?

THE WITNESS: Yeah. I saw the knife leave his hand and fall on the ground -THE COURT: Okay.

THE WITNESS: -- before he got shot. I think that's what happened.

THE COURT: All right. Do you know where the knife ended up?

THE WITNESS: On the ground.

I know that the -- he threw the knife before the cops shot him.

THE COURT: Before the cops shot him?

THE WITNESS: Yeah.

THE COURT: All right. And when he threw the knife, did it go far?

Did it go a distance, or was it just right next to -- next to --

THE WITNESS: Right next to him (inaudible) so...

THE COURT: Right next to him.
Did he drop the knife or did he throw the knife?

THE WITNESS: He threw it, he threw it for sure, but, like, it didn't go very far.

THE COURT: Who did it throw it at? Or did he throw it at nobody?

THE WITNESS: The cop to the right of him.

THE COURT: So he did throw it -- you say
he threw the knife at a police officer?
THE WITNESS: Yes, yeah.
THE COURT: All right.
THE WITNESS: Because he admitted it.

Because $I$ said the day before, he had been talking about wanting to stab a police officer with a knife. I think he really wanted to.

THE COURT: Okay.

THE WITNESS: So - -

THE COURT: All right. Anything on any of that?

MR. VAN EPPS: No, I don't have anything further.

MR. HEINEMAN: Nothing, your Honor.
MR. MCDONALD: No, your Honor.

THE COURT: Okay. Mr. Chang, thank you very much. (Witness excused.)

MR. VAN EPPS: Your Honor, I'm just going to (inaudible) our next witness.

Your Honor, the Commonwealth calls James Hanify.

THE COURT OFFICER: Stand right here. Raise your right hand.

THE CLERK: Do you solemnly swear or affirm the testimony you will provide the court today will be the truth so help you God?

THE WITNESS: Yes.

JAMES HANIFY, SWORN

THE COURT: Mr. Hanify, before we begin, my name is Judge Brennan. I'm presiding over the inquest here.

I can't order you not to tell people what you're testifying to; but at some point $I^{\prime} m$ going to be issuing a report as to what happened and findings that I'm making, which is going to be based upon the testamony of the witnesses, so what I'd ask you to do is just hold off on talking to anybody until you know that that report's been issued. All right?

THE WITNESS: Okay.
EXAMINATION

BY MS. GEMMILL:
Q. Good morning, Mr. Hanify.
A. Good morning.
Q. Can you spell us your first and last name?
A. Yes, James Hanify.
Q. Can you spell your last name for us?
A. $\quad \mathrm{H}-\mathrm{A}-\mathrm{N}-\mathrm{I}-\mathrm{F}-\mathrm{Y}$.
Q. How old are you, Mr. Hanify?
A. Forty-five.
Q. Can you tell us what your date of birth is?
A. $5 / 13 / 77$.
Q. What town do you live in right now?
A. Woburn.
Q. How long have you been in the Woburn area?
A. Since six months.
Q. Six months.

Where were you living before you moved to Woburn?
A. I was in an extended stay in -- let's see - Waverley -- or in Watertown -- Watertown. And, then, before that, Lexington.
Q. Okay. Were you living at a house in

Lexington?
A. No, I was living at a hotel in Lexington, and then previous to that, $I$ was at a house.
Q. All right.
A. So it's been hotel, hotel, and now woburn since $I$ was living in Lexington, and that was with Brendan.
Q. Gotcha.

Sir, do you remember having a conversation with myself and Attorney Van Epps, Graham Van

Epps, the other day?
A. Yes. Thank you, yes.
Q. Yes. And during that conversation, did you tell us a little bit about why you were living at the house in Lexington with Brendan?
A. I -- I only said that $I$ had nowhere to live and $I$ enrolled myself into Eliot Community Services.
Q. Can you share with us a little bit about why you work with Eliot?
A. Let's see -- well, I -- I had nowhere to live.

I was a homeless guy kind of for a while, and that works good, and $I$ lived nice, and then, eventually, $I$ got enrolled with Eliot Community Services, and that's easier -- I'm trying to remember where they posted me.

I'm having trouble with that, remembering that.
Q. Let me ask you another question, if $I$ can.

Did we talk a little bit about your mental health during that conversation?
A. No.
Q. Okay. Sir, do you take any medications regularly?
A. Yes.
Q. And the medications that you take, does that make it hard for you to understand anything that we're doing here today?
A. No.
Q. Okay. And you heard the court officer and the clerk swear you in earlıer, right?
A. Yes.
Q. Okay. And you understand what it means to be telling the truth at this proceeding today, right?
A. Yes.
Q. Okay. Great.

So I want to talk to you a little bit about your time when you were living with Brendan at the house in Lexington.

Was that at 98 Hancock Street?
A. Yes.
Q. How long did you live at that house for?
A. Two years.
Q. Two years.

Did Brendan live there with you?
A. Yes.
Q. How long did he live there with you?
A. Same period of time.
Q. Okay. Was there ever a time that you were living at the house that Brendan wasn't living at the house prıor to him passing away?
A. No.
Q. Okay. And we're talking about Brendan Reilly; is that right?
A. Yes, miss.
Q. Did anybody else live at that house with you, besides you and Brendan?
A. Yeah.

There was a couple roommates there, dorm-mates; Jenna, a woman, nice, beautiful woman, and then she left.

Then there was Johnny Chang -- or Johnny, they call him.
Q. Johnny Chang?
A. Johnny, yeah.

I think you just met him.
Q. Do you remember how long Johnny lived at the house with you?
A. It must have been four months. Maybe eight months.
Q. Okay. Was he living at the house with you and Brendan in February of 2022?
A. February?

Well, which month is that, according to his death?
Q. So -- so the same month that Brendan passed away, was Johnny living there with you?
A. Obviously, yes. Yes, he was.
Q. Was anybody else luving at the house with you and Johnny and Brendan during the month that Brendan passed away?
A. No.
Q. Okay. Can you tell us a little bit about what your relationship was like with Brendan, like, how did the two of you get along?
A. Sure. We were pals.

We were -- we're kind of near the same age group, and we both like -- we both like hip-hop, rap music, gangster talk, $I$ like to understand and listen to.

And he offered a lot of kind of gangster enthusiasm, and had hip-hop pouring out of his room a lot, and we were just kind of -- kind of providing nice to one another.

We were just kind of friends, you know. Q. Would it be fair to say that you guys got along pretty well?
A. Yes.
Q. Okay. Do you remember how Brendan was, how he seemed, the day before he passed away? Did anything unusual happen?
A. Well, he seemed riled up. Like I said, I don't think he slept that night.
Q. Okay.
A. So he -- he was wound. He was -- he was wound up.
Q. What makes you think that Brendan didn't sleep the night before he passed away?
A. Because $I$ went to bed very late; and he was still active, very active.

I saw him -- hıs door open, shut, out of the side of my vision here when $I$ went to the bathroom, and it was very late, and then he played music all night.

And $I$ woke up earlyish and then $I$ saw him again.
Q. Did that seem normal for how Brendan usually was at nighttime?
A. No, no, it seemed pretty bad to me that he had been awake because it seemed like he had been complaining about his medicine the day earlier.
Q. Okay.
A. To answer your question, $I$ think he was angry
about medicine, so -- so he stayed awake, and who knows what that could have done to him psychologically, I guess.
Q. Okay.
A. Delerism or fatigue, maybe. I don't know. Maybe upset.
Q. Did Brendan ever talk to you about what kind of medicine he needed, what he was using?
A. Not really.
Q. Okay. How do you know that he --
A. It looked like cocaine to me.
Q. Okay. How did you know that he was missing medication?

Can you remember things that he was saying, if anything?
A. Yeah.

I'm not sure what his discussion was with the nurse but -- oh, about his missing medication.
Q. Um-hum.
A. Well, he had somehow acquired some pills, maybe -- maybe enough to feed a small platoon, I don't know, and he had been yelling at Johnny, Where's my pills? Where's my pills? So then I knew he had lost his pills.
Q. All right. When was he yelling about the pills to Johnny?

Was that the day that he died?
A. The morning.
Q. That morning?
A. Yeah.
Q. Okay. I'm going to ask you a couple questions about how the house was set up.

It's a two-story house, right?
A. Yeah.
Q. Where were your bedrooms located?
A. They're on the second floor. Go up the stairs, take a left, and there's a corridor.

And on this corridor there's two bedrooms on the left, and there's one straight ahead.
Q. Okay. Where was your room?
A. My room's the second door on the corridor as the two doors are on the left.
Q. How about Mr. Chang's room -- Johnny's room?
A. John's the first room.
Q. And where was Brendan's room?
A. Brendan's down the corridor at the end.
Q. Do you have -- did you have a window in your room?
A. Yes, miss, yes. There's three.
Q. Three windows?
A. Yeah.
Q. Do you know if Johnny had windows in his room?
A. Yes, he does, yes.
Q. Do you know where those windows looked out onto?

Like, if you were in Johnny's room, what could you see?
A. I guess the front yard, the driveway, the sidewalk, the -- the street.
Q. Okay. Do you know if Brendan's room had any windows?
A. Yes.
Q. What would his windows have faced out onto?
A. The side of the yard, the house next to us; and $I$ guess the door he owned had a window in it, and it looked out back.
Q. Okay. Did the house have a backyard?
A. Yes, ma'am.
Q. Did you have any place that you usually kept, like, your trash barrels outside the house?
A. Yeah. We keep them on the side of the steps as you go out the back.
Q. Okay.
A. So they're in the driveway area.
Q. Okay. So if you were going out the back door of the house, what side would you see the barrels on?
A. Well, they're immediately on the right.
Q. Okay. Okay. So the -- so the morning of the 12th, the morning that Brendan passed away, tell me -- tell me what you first remember noticing about Brendan that morning.
A. I guess -- I guess I was right, he seemed dysfunct, psychologically, he seemed a little messy, he had welts on his eyes, messed up hair, kind of un -- un -- untidy.

He was untidy from -- from living a day awake, you know, and besides that, $I$ guess that's all $I$ can say, kind of.
Q. Did he seem to look different to you from how he normally looked?
A. Yeah. He was disheveled.
Q. Okay. Where were you and he when you saw him first that morning?
A. I went downstairs and he was upstairs, and I heard him banging on Johnny's door.

And $I$ was in the kitchen. I actually went outside, went out front, and that's -- that's
when $I$ saw him more formally that day by the trash barrels, yes.
Q. Okay. So you heard him first that day before you actually saw him more clearly?
A. Yes.
Q. Okay. So tell us about what you heard when you were in the kitchen.

You could hear Brendan banging on Johnny's door.

Tell us about that.
A. I think $I$ heard Johnny scream out the window, Help, help, there's a madman trying to kill me.

I think he yelled that -- Johnny yelled that.

And he yelled, You get out here, open this door, open this door, what's the code. He wanted to know the code to the door.

It was very kind of traumatic to think that someone would ask for the code, banging on the door, you know what $I$ mean?
Q. Let me ask you a question about the code.

Did the doors to each of your rooms have,
like, a keypad with a code you could put in?
A. Yes, miss, yes.
Q. Okay. And was that so that you could, you
know, keep your own room locked?
A. Yes.
Q. Okay. Was it normal for you guys to share the codes with each other?
A. No.
Q. All right. So, as far as you know, did Brendan have the code to Johnny's room?
A. No, I don't know.
Q. All right.
A. I don't think so --
Q. Okay.
A. -- because he couldn't get in, and he really wanted to.
Q. What makes you say he really wanted to get into the room?
A. He kept banging on the door screaming to Johnny, Where's my pills, where's my pills. You get out here.

Give me the code to the door, bang bang, bang, bang.

Johnny, open the door, bang, bang, bang, bang.

Johnny, come here, open the door, open the door.

What's the code, Johnny, to the door.

Tell me now, Johnny, tell me now. Don't make me do anything irrational, Johnny. Bang, bang, bang, bang.
Q. Did you see --
A. So he kind of lost it, Brendan lost it at Johnny's door.
Q. Did you see Brendan in front of Johnny's door or could you just hear what was going on?
A. I could just hear what's going on.
Q. All right. Do you remember hearing Brendan saying anything else or threatening Johnny in any way at that point?
A. No, that's all $I$ can remember.
Q. Do you remember hearing Brendan saying anything about having a knife?
A. No, I don't remember anything.
Q. Okay. In the time that you lived with Brendan, did you ever see him with a knife or a weapon of any kind?
A. Yes, yes. I saw him with a knıfe, and a screwdriver a lot.
Q. Can you --
A. He had a screwdriver in his hand, like that, waving it around.
Q. When was that?
A. A couple weeks earlier.
Q. Okay.
A. And a couple weeks earlier than that.
Q. Do you remember if he was saying anything when he was waving the screwdriver around?
A. No. He just wanted something maybe from me, wanted money or -- $I$ don't know.
Q. Okay.
A. He was bothering me.
Q. When else did you see him with a knife; do you remember?
A. No.
Q. Okay.
A. No, I can't.
Q. Do you remember if Brendan ever tried to talk about having the knife?
A. He talked about guns.
Q. He talked about guns?
A. I guess he likes guns, but -- no, not really.
Q. okay. So you're in the kitchen; you're hearing Brendan at the door for Johnny's room.

Tell us what you see happened next.
A. Johnny's screaming out the front window, Hey, come help me. There was some guy that was walking by.
Q. Did you see a guy walking by?
A. Yeah.
Q. Okay. And where were you when you saw the man who was walking by?
A. On the front porch.
Q. Okay. Do you remember why you went outside?
A. Smoke a cigarette.
Q. All right. So you see a man walking by; you hear Johnny in the window.

Can you see Johnny in the window from where you were?
A. No.
Q. All right. What do you see happen next?
A. Well, $I$ think $I$ - I think this guy went rushing off and was using a phone to call the police, and $I$ was somewhat gratified by that.
Q. Okay.
A. So - -
Q. You saw the man who -- who had been outside calling -- calling police, you think?
A. Yes.
Q. Okay. Could you see Brendan?
A. No.
Q. Okay. At some point while you were outside to smoke your cigarette, did you see Brendan
again?
A. Yes.
Q. Can you describe what you saw him do?
A. Yeah. I saw him hang a knife around like this, in his hand, and sort of whittle on these trash barrels, these plastic trash barrels.

He was leaning up against them.
Q. Okay. Were those the trash barrels that you were talking to us about being behind your house? A. Yes.
Q. All right. Did you see how Brendan got outside?

Like, did you see him come outside?
A. No.
Q. Okay. Can you describe to us what he was doing by the trash barrels?
A. No. That's -- that was a question $I$ had, what -- what is he doing there, kind of with his feet in the dirt, kind of muddy, dirt there, bending the trash barrels in half.

I'm not sure.
Q. Did it seem like he was -- he was sitting on those barrels?

Like --
A. Yes.
Q. - what was he doing with the barrels?
A. Yeah. He was kind of leaning on them, sittıng on them, kind of.
Q. Okay. Did he have anything in his hands?
A. Yeah.
Q. You might have told us this.
A. Yeah. He had a knife.
Q. What did you see?
A. A Smith \& Wesson knife. This long pointed knife, silver.
Q. Okay. It looked like a Smith \& Wesson knife to you?
A. Yeah. Silver there.
Q. All right. Do you remember what hand he was holding that with?
A. Jeez, good question. His left hand.
Q. It was his left hand?
A. Yeah.
Q. Okay. Could you hear Brendan saying anything at that point, like, when you first see him by the trash barrels with the knife?
A. Get out of here, something (indiscernible), and he said it to the police.
Q. So at what point -- you saw the guy outside who called police.

Did the police actually come?
A. Yes.
Q. All right. Did you see how many police came to the house at first?
A. Yes, two.
Q. Two? Where did you see them go?
A. To the driveway.
Q. Okay. Did they interact with Brendan at all?
A. Yes.
Q. Can you describe for us what you saw those police officers do first while you're still by the house.
A. Sure. I saw him took out his gun. One had his gun out. Then the next guy was trying to get his gun out, trying to get his gun out, and got his gun out, pointed it at him, two cops asked him -- because one was out of (indiscernible) that had the gun out, pointed at him.
Q. Can you tell us what that gun looked like, like how big it was?
A. It was like a 45.
Q. Okay. Did it look like a handgun - -
A. Yeah.
Q. -- or, like, a longer gun?
A. It was like a handgun.
Q. Okay. Did the police officer say anything to Brendan?
A. Yeah, put it down, put it down, put the knife down.
Q. Could you hear if Brendan said anythang back to those officers?
A. No.
Q. So you have two police officers who come, they're in the driveway area, and Brendan's by the trash cans, right?
A. Um-hum.
Q. Okay. What happens next?

Like, does Brendan stay in that spot or --
A. $\quad \mathrm{N} \circ$.
Q. -- does something else happen?
A. He fled. He -- he took -- he went on foot and jumped, passed them, down the driveway, in his sneakers, running, holding his knife.
Q. Okay. Was he running -- could you tell where he was running to?
A. No. He Just was going to leave the property.
Q. Okay.
A. And -- and run -- kind of crosscut the rotary.
Q. Right.
A. It looked like.
Q. So, like, he was running across the rotary that's in front of your house?
A. Yes.
Q. Could you hear him saying anything while he was running?
A. Well, he started in on his preaching about the mob.
Q. Tell us about that. What did you hear him say?
A. He said, $I^{\prime} m$ the mob. I'm the mob. $I^{\prime} m a$ gangster, $I^{\prime} m$ the mob. So he -- he said -- he was saying for real that he was the mob.
Q. Okay. He was saying that while he was running?
A. Yes, ma'am.
Q. Okay. How -- did you see where Brendan went?

Lıke, how far did he get?
A. He may have gone 400 feet maybe. It looked like he slammed the ground, on the concrete, because his shoes was untied and stuff.
Q. Okay did - -
A. The cops was arriving there, you could see them with their guns that moved into some sort of position on him.

And then he got up, and he tried tripping across the concrete more.

The cops came near him, he swung his knife around, he swung it at them near the chest.

And then he hit the ground again, he hit the concrete.
Q. You were just making a motion with your hand, your right hand --
A. Yeah, yeah.
Q. -- where you were kind of like waving your hand back and forth.
A. I think it was in his right hand, I think.
Q. Okay. So is that the motion that you were seeing Brendan making with the knife, with his right hand?
A. Yeah. Big swings, like this. Big swings. Q. Okay. So the first time you saw him, I think you said, hit the concrete, did Brendan fall - -
A. Yes.
Q. -- while he was running?
A. He slipped and fell.
Q. Okay. And it looked to you like it was a slip?
A. Yeah.
Q. Could you hear the police officers saying
anything to him while he was running that -- that first time?
A. No. I think, Put the knife down was the phrase they used to --
Q. Did you hear any other noises at that point that -- that didn't sound like words or voices?
A. No, just the gunshots.
Q. Okay. How many times did you hear gunshots that day?
A. I figure ejght.
Q. All right.
A. Nine, maybe ten.
Q. Did you hear more than one kind of sound, or did all the shots sound, like, the same to you? A. Oh, they sounded the same, the gun.
Q. All right.
A. Yeah.
Q. Do you remember what Brendan was doing the first time you heard the shots?
A. He was on the ground. It looked like they busted him in the chest with the gun --
Q. Okay.
A. -- a number of times. And he -- he wouldn't surrender.
Q. Okay.
A. He still had a knife and he was on the ground.
Q. Okay.
A. And. Finally, it was really dramatic, it was, the guns keep -- keep firing, pop, pop, pop, pop, pop.

And then he -- he looked like he was going to die, and he threw the knife and fell down on the ground like that and surrender --
Q. okay.
A. -- in some sort of surrender.
Q. You were just describing to us the first set of pops.

You kind of were holding your hands, like in a -- in a, like, a rifle shape?
A. Yeah.
Q. Is that the kind of gun you were seeing at first?
A. Yeah.

It looked like a shotgun, and it had orange on it.
Q. How many of those guns did you see?
A. I see maybe -- maybe eight.
Q. Eight of those guns?
A. Yeah.
Q. Okay. Did it look like all the police officers had a gun like that or just some of them?
A. I guess just some.

The guys in front, they walked out in front, like, five of them, six of them maybe. Q. Okay. So Brendan fell.

You said that he was on the ground at some point when they're -- when you're hearing the pops and that he's not surrendering.

Can you describe to us what he was doing during that time?
A. That's when he said, I'm the mob. He had just yelled that he was. And that was all he said.

I mean --
Q. Okay.
A. -- it looked like he was stone cold out of it, definitely.
Q. Okay.
A. I mean --
Q. He still looked to you at that point different from how he usually was when you were with him?
A. After all that gunshot and final falling on
the concrete, $I$ don't think he had much constitution left.
Q. Okay. You said that he was down on the ground.

Did you ever see him stand back up?
A. No, ma'am.
Q. Did you ever see him trying to -- was he trying to move around at all, or was he just staying on the ground?
A. I can't tell. I can't remember if he was -- if he maybe at first was writhing a little.
Q. I think one of the things you told us was that you saw him running or charging.

Can you describe what you saw?
A. I remember him kicking through the dirt with the knife in his hand with his sneakers onto the street and that was basically -- basically the whole night.

I mean, $I$ didn't really -- it was -- it didn't take long for the -- the sequence of those events.

And -- $I$ mean, once the police had gotten there, it was just, $I$ don't know, 30 seconds -Q. Okay.
A. -- of mayhem. Like I said, it was like he was at war.
Q. It was like he was at war?
A. It was like he -- yes.
Q. What did --
A. There's no distinction about the environment, or the enemy, or his confluence wath everyone - I don't know -- but he was just at large, you could say, raging.
Q. Okay.
A. Yeah.
Q. What was Brendan doing before that last time when he -- when he finally fell back and stopped moving?

Do you remember what happened right before that?
A. I don't.

Oh, right before that.
Q. Yeah, right before that.
A. Yeah. Well, the last thing he yelled was,

I'm the mob.
Q. Okay.
A. And then pop, pop, they shot him.
Q. Okay.
A. With the nonviolent lethal weapon.
Q. All right. I think $I$ heard you say that he threw the knife at some point.

Can you describe to us what you were seeing?
A. I saw him surrender the knife and his conduct, because he fell down onto the ground; but right previous to that, when he was sitting up on his butt and wavering, he whipped the knife out of has hands.
Q. Okay. He whipped it out of his hands?
A. Yeah.
Q. Did it look like he was dropping the knife or throwing the knife?

How would you describe that?
A. He was throwing it, yeah. He threw it away.
Q. Okay. Where did he throw it to?
A. It looked like the rotary.
Q. Okay.
A. It looked like it could have landed on
even -- even five feet off the rotary.
Q. Okay.
A. Just it's a turnaround to (indiscernible), type of grass outlet.
Q. Okay.
A. It sounds very big. They call it a rotary,
and a rotary's a highway, you know, but that's not quite a -- this is a little field of grass they got there in Lexington.
Q. Yeah. Like a little patch of grass surrounded by a circular road --
A. Yes.
Q. -- with lots of other little roads?
A. Yes, miss, yes.
Q. Okay. The direction that he threw the knife, was that towards other people or just away?
A. Away.
Q. Okay.
A. I'm trying -- I'm trying to help and I -- and I wonder if you want to know if he had died at that time.

I'm not sure. I don't know.
Q. Okay. Can you tell us what Brendan was doing in the moments right before he was shot that last time?
A. He was aggravated. He was agitated. He was threatening, and he looked like a -- he looked like a crazed Indian, like that, swinging his arm back and forth at the police, trying to mobilize himself across those two streets -Q. Okay.
A. -- for some reason.
Q. All right. And so that's what was happening right before the last set of shots?
A. Yes.
Q. Okay. Mr. Hanify, we talked a little bit earlier today about you take some medications.
A. $\quad \mathrm{Mmm}$.
Q. Would you be able to tell Judge Brennan what your medications are?
A. Sure.

Wellbutrin, met formula (phonetic), and I'm taking a cholesterol pill. The doctor said I had high cholesterol, and $I$ take a half a Klonopin at night.
Q. Okay.
A. And aprosium (phonetic) -- aprosium at night, and (indiscernible) pill. It's called zegrimium (phonetic).
Q. What are those pills supposed to help with, like, what are those for?
A. ADD, schizoaffective bipolar.
Q. Schizoaffective bipolar?
A. Um-hum.
Q. Do you -- is there anything about your -- can you tell us what some of the symptoms are of your
schizoaffective disorder?
A. Sure. Disorganized, tired, unmotivated.
That's basically it.
Q. Does it --
A. Chronic fatigue.
Q. Does it affect your memory at all?
A. No.
Q. Okay. Does it affect any point your abilıty
to sort of understand what's happening in front
of you?
A. No.
Q. Okay. Are you clearheaded today while you're
talking to us?
A. Yes, ma'am.
Q. Okay. Thank you.
MS. GEMMILL: Thank you, Mr. Hanify.
I don't --
THE WITNESS: Sure.
MS. GEMMILL: -- any more questions for
you. Some other folks might.
THE COURT: Mr. McDonald?
Oh, hold on one second, sir.
Give me a couple minutes.
Do you have any questions?
MR. MCDONALD: Just a couple, if I may.

THE COURT: All right.

EXAMINATION

BY MR. MCDONALD:
Q. Mr. Hanify, have you discussed your testimony here today with Johnny Chang at all or -A. No.
Q. -- in exchange (indiscernible) of what happened?
A. No. (Indiscernible) said not to talk about it.
Q. Okay. Did you have an interview by the state Police prior to -- shortly after the incident?
A. Yes.
Q. And let me read a sentence to you and see if that refreshes your memory.

It says, Hanify advised that there was a standoff in the street between officers and Reilly.

Hanify could not observe anything further due to the distance between him and the apparent standoff.

Does that refresh your recollection about what you actually saw at the time of the shooting?
A. I did at last.

I was -- I was -- I was never allowed to go to the shop, and it didn't seem like my business. An ambulance had arrived there. Q. And I'm talking before the shooting, you said the officer reported that you told him it was a standoff, which means the police weren't leaving and Brendan wasn't leaving, correct?
A. Yes, sir, yes.
Q. And then you said that you didn't observe anything after that, you went in the house and heard shots?
A. No, no. I was in the yard. I heard the shots. I saw him fall.

I believe -- $I$ believe there was someone on a stretcher. And I left.
Q. Okay. But immediately before the shooting, the last thing you saw was a standoff, or did you see something else?
A. No, you're right. I did see that. It was him with -- right.

MR. MCDONALD: That's all I have.

Thank you.

THE COURT: Mr. Heineman?

EXAMINATION

BY MR. HEINEMAN:
Q. Good morning, Mr. Hanify.
A. Morning.
Q. I just want to try to get some -- some things in order in time, if 1 could --
A. Um-hum.
Q. -- because $I$ was a little confused.

Flrst of all, you used a phrase when you were talking about the shotgun -- I think you called it a nonviolent lethal weapon.

Where'd you learn that phrase from?
A. I don't know.
Q. Okay.
A. I just know that it's -- it had a fluorescent orange on it, so maybe -- maybe my friend's -- my (indiscernible) $B B$ gun. I don't know.
Q. Okay. But you saw some of those -- some of the police officers with those shotguns with the orange, right?
A. Yes.
Q. And can you estimate for us how many times you heard those guns fired that day?
A. Yeah, fifteen.
Q. And earlier when you told us that Brendan was on the ground at times while he was being shot, was Brendan actually on the ground being shot by
those shotguns?
A. Yes.
Q. How many times did you see Brendan be shot by those orange shotguns while he was on the ground? A. I must have heard it go off six. I couldn't really tell that he was getting hit.
Q. Um-hum.
A. It didn't cause blood.

I don't know lf it was a sandbag or what
it $1 s$, but he -- maybe -- that was the big part of the gun, six.
Q. And then at the end, right at the very end, before the ambulances came, did you hear a different sounding gunshot?
A. No.
Q. Okay. Again, just for order of things, you mentioned that you saw or heard the last shot and you also told us about Brendan throwing the knife away.
A. $\quad \mathrm{Um}$-hum.
Q. Which of those happened first?

In other words, was the knife thrown before the last shot or after the last shot? A. After.

Or -- you know, $I$ can't remember.
Q. Okay. That's fine. That's --
A. I'm pretty -- I'm pretty sure it was -- it was -- it became past 15 once he hit the ground, and right prior to that, he threw the knife.
Q. How many times did you see Brendan fall out in the street that day?
A. Twice.
Q. Was one time closer to the rotary and then once a little farther away?
A. Yeah. It was - yeah.
Q. Okay. And the first time you heard Brendan fall, or saw Brendan fall, had you heard any of those shotgun shots yet?
A. No.
Q. And then, after Brendan fell, was when the shotgun shots started?
A. When he got up, $I$ think they started pecking at him.
Q. And then Brendan went down a second time?
A. Yes.
Q. And, while he was down the second time, did they continue to shoot while he was down on the ground?
A. Yes, sir, yes.

MR. HEINEMAN: Thank you, Mr. Hanify.

That's all the questions $I$ have.
THE COURT: Anything on that?
MR. VAN EPPS: Just a second.
MS. GEMMILL: Nothing further, your
Honor.
THE COURT: Mr. Hanify, thank you very much.

THE WITNESS: Thank you.
(Witness excused.)
MR. HEINEMAN: Your Honor, can we perhaps
do a quick restroom break?
THE COURT: That's fine.
Why don't we take five, ten minutes?
MR. HEINEMAN: Sure.
THE COURT OFFICER: All rise.
Court will be 1 n a brief recess.
(11:39 a.m. court in recess.)
(11:49 a.m. court resumes.)
THE COURT OFFICER: You may be seated.
Court is in session.
MR. VAN EPPS: Your Honor, before we call the next witness, I'm going to offer, and I'm showing (inaudible), but I'm going to offer the interview reports that were on cases referenced in prior testimony --

THE COURT: All right.
MR. VAN EPPS: -- of the witnesses, Ms. Hine, Mr. Chang, and Mr. Hanify.

And $I$ know the Court's already reviewed them because they were filed with the clerk -THE COURT: Yes.

MR. VAN EPPS: -- and I would ask that they be marked as Exhibits 2,3 , and 4 .

THE CLERK: Hine No. 2; Chang three; Hanify four.
(Exhibit No. 2, Interview Report of Ms. Hine, received into evidence.)
(Exhibit No. 3, Interview Report of Mr. Chang, received into evidence.)
(Exhibit No. 4, Interview Report of Mr. Hanify, received into evidence.)

MR. VAN EPPS: And the next witness is Tal Dinnar.

THE COURT OFFICER: Right this way, please.

Stop here, and face the clerk, and raise your right hand, please.

THE CLERK: Do you solemnly swear or affirm that the testimony you will provide for this court will be the truth so help you God?

THE WITNESS: (Inaudible.)

TAL DINNAR, SWORN

THE COURT OFFICER: Right this way, please. Right over here.

Just watch your step going over here. Try and sit as close as you can (inaudible). THE COURT: Careful. Ma'am, is it Dinnar or - -

THE WITNESS: Dinnar.

THE COURT: Dinnar.

THE WITNESS: Yes.

THE COURT: My name's Judge Brennan. I'm presiding over the inquest. Two things.

I saw when you came in you were wearing a mask. If you want to continue to wear it, that's totally fine.

THE WITNESS: Okay.

THE COURT: Secondly, $I$ can't order you not to talk about your testimony with anyone, but at some point following the inquest I'm going to produce a report that's going to be published - at least to the parties here, it's not for general publıcation -- but $I^{\prime} d$ just ask if you could not discuss your testimony until that's been released. Okay?

EXAMINATION

BY MR. VAN EPPS:
Q. Good morning, ma'am.
A. Good morning.
Q. Would you give us your name and would you
spell your full name for our transcript?
A. Tal Dinnar, $T-A-L$, and last name Dinnar.
$D-I-N-N-A-R$.
Q. And, ma'am, where do you live?
A. Lexington, 95 Simonds Road.
Q. Okay. How far is that from the -- the rotary where Blake and Burlington meet Hancock and North Hancock?
A. Five minutes's walk.
Q. Five-minute walk? Okay.

How long have you lived in Lexington?
A. Twenty years.
Q. Okay. Always at that address or a different address?
A. Different address, but we live in that address for 18 years.
Q. Eighteen years, okay.

And are you married?
A. Yes.
Q. Okay. And you mentioned it's about a
five-minute walk from the rotary.
Does that mean you're familiar with that area from walkıng there a lot?
A. Yes. That's our regular route.
Q. Okay. And are you employed, ma'am?
A. Right now I'm self-employed.
Q. What do you do?
A. Well, I am project manager and I'm a UX designer.
Q. UX designer?
A. It's user experience designer.
Q. So that's for computer software, something like that?
A. Yeah, something like that.
Q. Okay. I want to ask you some questions about February 12 th of this year.

Did you go out for a walk around 12:30
p.m. that day?
A. Yes.
Q. Okay. How do you get to the rotary from where you were?

How would you get there?
A. We live on the corner of Simonds and Blake.
Q. Okay.
A. So we go down Blake Road, which connects from
the northwest to the rotary.
Q. Okay. Is that what you did that day?
A. Yes.
Q. Okay. And were you with your husband?
A. Yes.
Q. Okay. As you're approaching the rotary, were you able to hear anything that drew your attention?
A. We stopped because we heard something. We stopped at -- near 16 Blake.
Q. Okay.
A. And then we saw a man crossing the rotary from west to east.
Q. Okay. Had you heard anything unusual as you were approaching the rotary?
A. No.
Q. Okay. The person approaching the rotary, tell me about that person.
A. So we -- I was not able to see details, I saw him running, and nothing unusual, and then he fell on the road between the rotary and the sidewalk, on the east side.
Q. Okay. This man that was running.

Can you describe anything about his appearance?
A. He was kind of tall, $I$ think more than average.

I cannot say any more details at that point when $I$ first saw him.
Q. Okay. Okay.
A. Then - -
Q. But you kept watching, it sounds like?
A. I what?
Q. It sounds like you kept watching or you kept --
A. Yes, oh, yes.

We stood -- we stood right there next to 16 Blake and we watched the -- the scene, what was happening after that.
Q. Okay. And what -- so the man running into the rotary falls.

What about that led you to stop with your husband?
A. Oh, that there were -- oh, just that something is going on, maybe noises or -- and it was unusual that, $I$ mean, crossing from the rotary, because it's not a place where people normally walk, so...
Q. And when you describe the man running, are you describing somebody running like they're
jogging or --
A. $\mathrm{N} \circ$.
Q. -- somebody, like, running away from something?
A. No, it was, like, definitely someone is running away from something.
Q. Were there any other people that you could see behind that man that came into view?
A. Not at the first moment, but when he fell, there was a bunch of, like, I would say five policemen running after him and standing -eventually on the sidewalk, between the road leading to the school and Burlington Road, so it was the side, the east side of the rotary.
Q. Okay. And is that sort of before the road that takes you to the middle school?
A. It's between the road taking to the middle school north and to -- to the Burlington Road.

It's a very tiny, very -- yeah, I can show you exactly.
Q. I'm going -- I'm going to just show you -I'm just going to show you a map now.

What I'd like you to do, I'm just going to give you a marker.

If you could -- first of all, does that
appear to be a Google Earth map or a Google map? A. Yes.
Q. Based out of the way it --
A. Okay. Here's Blake. This is north. This is the rotary, Hancock -- I'm looking for the tıny -- it must be this one, going to the school, so they were standing right here. He fell right here.
Q. So why don't you -- let's -- I'm going to give you a marker.
A. Yup.
Q. Why don't you write your initials where you were standing first.
A. Okay. It's not --
Q. If you can see it on the map.
A. -- but it's close, No. 16.
Q. Okay.
A. Next to No. 16 .

So we were able to see from here, okay?
Q. Can you make -- why don't you make an $M$ for where the man --
A. Fell?
Q. -- ended up with the police?
A. Okay. Here is a man and here are the police.
Q. Okay. And can you --
A. Police. Police, man.
Q. All right. That's what $I$ was going to ask you, you wrote police.

MR. VAN EPPS: And $I^{\prime} m$ just going to ask this be offered as the next exhibit (inaudible). THE COURT: Exhibit 5 .
(Exhibit No. 5, Map, received into evidence.)

MR. VAN EPPS: Thank you.
BY MR. VAN EPPS:
Q. All right. So -- actually, I'm golng to turn it (inaudible). Sorry. I'm going to turn it like that.

THE COURT: Um-hum. BY MR. VAN EPPS:
Q. okay. So you've -- you've indicated in the top left, you drew a little arrow indicating that's where you were --
A. Close, close to where we were.
Q. -- (inaudible) from? Okay.

And you're looking down between the curb marking and the kind of straight black marking that you drew?
A. Correct.
Q. That's your -- kind of your line of sight?
A. Um-hum.
Q. And the $M$ in the middle of the rotary is the man that was running and fell?
A. Correct.
Q. And the officers ended up in this kind of arc shape that you just --
A. Correct.
Q. Okay. I just wanted to make sure I understood how you marked it up.
A. Um-hum.
Q. Okay. Now, so what happens after -- you're now watching this.

What can you hear?
A. So we heard -- during this event --
Q. Um-hum.
A. -- we heard two main voices coming out from the police --
Q. Okay.
A. -- men.
Q. You could distinguish different voices?
A. Two different voices.

One was very calm, coming from a policeman
on the right.
Q. Okay.
A. And saying thing -- you want me to say
what --
Q. Please.
A. Yeah.

So this policeman said, Brendan -- and this is how we -- we learn what was probably the man's name -- Brendan, it's going to be okay. We are here to help you. We will call an ambulance. It will be okay, don't worry, but we need you to drop off your knife.

And he kept on saying things like that in a very calm and -- and reassuring voice.

A policeman on the left --
Q. Okay.
A. -- he constantly in a very, like, hectic voice said, Drop the knife; drop the knife; drop the knife.
Q. Okay.
A. In a very scary way.
Q. (Indıscernible.)
A. So there were these two voices coming -coming out from the policemen.
Q. So -- so you have two voices, one that is -is calmer than the other, the other one for -giving instructions, as opposed to -A. In a very scary way, actually.
Q. Okay. Did that voice seem stressed?
A. Yes, yes.
Q. Okay.
A. Yes.
Q. Tell me, if you can, could you observe what the police were holding, if they were holding anything?
A. As far as $I$ remember now, they were holding something. I could not tell what it was. I saw the man holding something in his hand --
Q. Okay.
A. -- and waving with it.
Q. You're gesturing with your right hand.
A. Yes.
Q. Could you see what that thing was?
A. I -- I think it was his right. I'm not sure about that.
Q. Understandable.

But you gestured with your right hand, and you sort of waved it above your head a little bit.
could you see what was in that hand?
A. No, no.
Q. Okay.
A. There was something in the hand. I cannot
say what it was.
Q. Okay. And as they're addressing him, the police (inaudible), as they're addressing Brendan, are they giving him instructions about anything he's holding?
A. As I mentioned, there was, Drop off the knife.
Q. Okay. And was this once or more than once or many times or what?
A. Many times.
Q. Okay.
A. And $I$ heard some kind of (indiscernible) coming from him. I was not able to understand what he was saying.
Q. Okay.
A. He was, like, half -- faced to us, so I couldn't --
Q. You couldn't make out the responses?
A. I could not hear what he said.
Q. Okay. Putting aside words, could you describe for us the tone or the volume or anything about what was coming out of his mouth?
A. Not really.
Q. Okay. So after this man fell, and the police potentially catch up, what's the position of
the -- Brendan -- Brendan?
A. He was --
Q. What was the position of the man?
A. He was at the same place where $I$ drew him, and most of the time on his back, really, like, you know, like, moving around a small area.
Q. Okay. Moving around -- he's on -- he's on his back side, meaning his butt, is he -- is he moving around, like, I'm trying to find -- if you could describe how he's moving around.
A. You want me to demonstrate?
Q. No, no.
A. He was on the ground, but -- but moving, like, because he was waving with -- with the knife, so he was moving around, but -- but not, like, trying to run around, okay, he was -- he was most of the time.
Q. All right. So as they're giving him instructions for what -- for the item he's holding, you had, again, you had gestured sort of with your hand with sort of waving it, is that something that you saw him motion like that once, more than once, many times?
A. Many times.
Q. Okay.
A. Yeah.
Q. And could you get a sense -- could you describe for us the distance between the man on the ground and the officers that were talking to him?
A. You could see it right there. I mean, you see where he was standing and the policemen were standing on the sidewalk, so, you know, it was, like -- it's difficult for me to -- to say, to estimate.
Q. Could you estimate using items in this room? A. I mean, you can measure on -- on there. I mean, it was, like, maybe -- maybe a little bit behind you, the man was, Brendan was, and the policemen were here, like, and it wasn't, like, an immediate contact, if that's what you're looking for.
Q. There was a little bit of distance?
A. There was a distance, definitely a distance.

THE COURT: Just for the record, I don't know if everybody can agree, but $I$ would say somewhere -- I'm basing this on foul shot, somewhere around 15 feet, 15,20 feet? MR. VAN EPPS: Give or take. THE COURT: Give or take.

So basically from, I guess what she's describing. Is somewhere around the railing in this room to the judge's bench.

MR. VAN EPPS: Correct. In Courtroom 2 of this court.

THE COURT: Yup. BY MR. VAN EPPS:
Q. So you're watching -- is there any point at which you can see that the man did whatever the police were asking him to do so that they stopped giving him instructions?
A. No.
Q. So tell me what you observed after that.
A. So it lasted for long time. It lasted for, I would say, for 15 minutes, during which they shot him with what we understood later from the police with, like, a bean bag.
Q. Um-hum.
A. They told us that's what they do, because we heard the shot and -- and then he fell -- he fell back whenever it happened.

It happened probably twice, as far as I can tell.
Q. Okay. So you would hear those shots?
A. Yes.
Q. You'd see some kind of physical movement on -- after the shot?

Would the instructions and whatever he was saying continue after that?
A. Yes.
Q. Okay. All right. So what happened after that?

Can you -- before we get to that, can you describe, if you can, anything about the man's demeanor, in terms of the way he communicated and the way he was (indiscernible) his instructions or anything about his demeanor at that pornt? A. So as $I$ mentioned, he continue moving -- be restless -Q. Um-hum.
A. -- and waving with his hand, and whatever he held in his hand, and they continue with their instructions.

So it was, like, kind of back and forth, back and forth, back and forth, going on for - for $a$ long time.
Q. Okay. So what happens as this unfolds?
A. So, during that time, a police car showed up and blocked Burlington Road from the north. Q. Um-hum.
A. I blocked Blake Road from the northwest, so I redirected the traffic coming in.
Q. Um-hum.
A. And at some point the policeman on the left slipped on the ice and fell on the -- fell on the ground, and then we heard another shot.
Q. Okay.
A. And, after that, one policeman went to the car, to the police car, and got equipment out of it and approached the man, yeah.
Q. So as this is happening, you mentioned a second -- or that you were -- you were blocking, is it Blake?
A. Blake.
Q. Okay. So does that mean you're -- you're kind of -- you're in the street kind of as cars are coming, motioning them away?
A. Correct.
Q. Okay. Are you still at this time trying to keep an eye on what's going on?
A. When $I$ was redirecting traffic, $I$ was not able to see the scene.
Q. Okay. But, like, in between?
A. In between, we kept on watching until my husband told me, Let's go, because he understood
what happened. I did not.
Q. And tell me about the -- the moment when the officer slips, if you can.
A. So it was February, there was snow and ice on -- on the sidewalk and as he was moving back and forth, he slipped on the lce and fell.
Q. Forward or backward or --
A. Forward, forward.
Q. Okay.
A. So I -- at this point, $I$ cannot remember if he was still on the sidewalk or he fell on the road. I cannot. I'm not sure. (Indiscernible.)
Q. But is it right by that curb?
A. Yeah.
Q. Okay. And so what happens at that point? You said you heard shots?
A. I heard a shot.
Q. What -- what could you see happening as you heard the shots?
A. I don't remember.
Q. Okay. The last -- just before the shots, do you have a memory of where the man was in relation to police?
A. Same place.
Q. Okay.
A. He was same place.
Q. Okay. In the moments before the -- the last moment you can remember before the shot, did it appear to be the man was still holding whatever he had been holding the whole time?
A. Probably.
Q. And, in terms of shots, did those shots sound different or the same as the earlier what you described as the bean bag shots?
A. I cannot really tell. To me, it sound the same.
Q. Okay. In the sense they were loud? okay.
A. (Indiscernible.)
Q. Do you remember how many shots you heard?
A. One, but $I^{\prime} m$ not very sure about that.
Q. Okay. As you're -- when you hear the shots, is this something that you hear as you're facing the rotary, or are you in the middle of directing traffic at the same time?
A. I believe facing the rotary.
Q. Okay. The -- the officer who approached the car after the shots began (inaudible), how quickly did that happen after the shots?
A. Pretty quickly. And their ambulance arrived, too.
Q. Okay. How quickly did that happen?
A. Quickly.
Q. Okay. So you described one car -- one police car blocking off Burlington Street.

As you're watching, did you get a sense of whether there were other police or emergency vehicles nearby?
A. No, not that we were able to see.

As you can -- as you can see, we were able to see only until half of the rotary.

We were not able to see the west or southwest.
Q. Okay. After the shots, could you -- could you see whether the position of the man on the ground changed?
A. (No audible response.)
Q. Could you hear any -- you're indicating no.

Can you -- can you tell me whether there was a point at which the police were still giving that person instructions after the shots?
A. Not as far as $I$ recall, there were not any more instructions.
Q. And the officer that slıpped at the curb, we'll say, when that happens, are you able to tell whether the officer just went flat down or
was scrambling to get his feet or what?
A. Just flat, I think. He was the officer,
like, the farthest from the man. He was farthest.

There were officers closer to the man.
Q. Were there -- could you tell whether that officer was carrying anything, or holding anything?
A. I believe he did carry, as far as $I$ remember, he did carry a gun or something.
Q. Do you remember anything about the -- the shape or the color of that gun?
A. No.
Q. Do you remember at any point -- do you remember at any point that the -- the closest -it sounds like your testimony, what you're sayıng is that there's this -- this kind of semicircle of officers and then there's a man on the ground who's moving in different ways.
A. Yeah, more towards the south.
Q. Right. Towards -- towards the south would be towards you?
A. No. We were on the northwest.
Q. Okay.
A. So he was on the -- moving around the south
part.
Q. Okay. And, again, this is still while he's essentially on his backside on the (inaudible)?
A. Yes.
Q. So almost like butt scooting, is that --
A. Yeah, like -- yeah.
Q. At any point -- or do you recall talking to the police about whether, when you were interviewed, whether the distance between him and the police got closer at any point?
A. Not really.

He was -- he was moving around, but not really getting close, really close to the policemen.
Q. Okay. When you -- when you saw him after the shots, the man, can you approximate the distance he was from the officers at that point?
A. When -- after he was shot?
Q. Yes.
A. No. I don't remember.
Q. Do you remember when you were interviewed by the Lexington police on February 16 th , do you remember that interview -- and you met with, I believe it was Detective (indiscernible)?
A. I don't remember the names.
Q. Okay. But, in fact --
A. There were two of them.
Q. Right.

And do you remember discussing or talking about how at one point the distance between the officer and the man was at one point as close as six feet?
A. Which officer, the one that's hit? That stepped on the ground?
Q. One of the officers with -- that was holding up a rifle.
A. Well, $I$ think there were more than one holding a rifle, so $I$ 'm not sure which one you are talking about.

But the man was there and the man that slipped was on the north side of the semicircle. Q. But do you remember that topic coming up when you talked to the police back in February?
A. (No audible response.)
Q. The movements of the man on the ground, can you describe how, you know, what were they, fast, slow, were they smooth, were they jerky?

Can you describe the movements in a little more detail?
A. He was trying to move. Sometimes he even,
like, was tryıng to lift himself a bit, and $I$ believe that's when they shot him first. Q. That's when you would hear the noises?
A. Yeah. But he never, like, stood on his feet or, like, moving towards -- really towards them. Q. He never got fully to his feet?
A. Right.
Q. Okay. So, if $I$ understand you, correct me if I'm wrong, at different points he's moving and beginning to rise up, and then you would hear the --
A. Yeah.
Q. -- the bean bag shots?
A. Yeah.
Q. Okay.
A. Sometimes he was moving back, sometimes he was moving side, so it wasn't like he was going somewhere.
Q. Okay.

MR. VAN EPPS: Nothing further for this witness, Judge.

THE COURT: Mr. McDonald?

MR. MCDONALD: Yes, your Honor.
Q. Mrs. Dinnar, when during the course of the incident did you begin to direct traffic?

Do you recall when that was?
A. Say it again.
Q. When during the course of the incident did you begin to direct traffic, stopping them from getting closer to the (inaudible)?
A. Yeah. It happened maybe twice, like, whenever a car approach from the road, I would redirect them.
Q. Okay. And would you turn toward that car?
A. Correct.
Q. Redirect the car?
A. Yes.
Q. And then turn back?
A. Correct.
Q. And you believe you did that twice?
A. Probably twice.
Q. And the first time you redirected the car, do you recall what was going on at the rotary?
A. I was not able to see what's going on on the rotary while $I$ was redirecting the car.
Q. And do you know, for instance, did you redirect the cars twice before the final shooting?
A. Correct.

MR. MCDONALD: That's all I have. Thank you. THE COURT: Mr. Heineman? EXAMINATION BY MR. HEINEMAN:
Q. Good morning.

Good afternoon, actually now.
With regard to the timing, I believe you said your best estimate -- and I know you weren't probably looking at your watch -- was that this whole sequence of events took around 15 minutes.

Is that what you said?
A. So difficult to tell, you know, exactly how long it lasted.

It looked like forever, but...
Q. It seemed like forever.

When you were interviewed by the Lexington police --
A. Um-hum.
Q. -- were you and your husband interviewed together?
A. First -- no, we were interviewed separately. Q. Okay. Now, with regard to -- you've referred to an officer on the left and an officer on the
right, $I$ want to make sure that I'm understanding --
A. Right - right is south, and left is north. Q. So on -- on the map, on the diagram we have here, as you're looking towards the -- what - the scene that you've described to us, when you're using left and right, you're talking from your own perspective, correct?
A. Correct.

And -- and $I$ corrected myself.
Right is south, and left is north.
Q. All right. And so the officer to the left or to the north was the officer who was being loud?
A. Yes.
Q. And --
A. Yeah.
Q. And you said that the way he was talking was in a scary tone?
A. Correct.
Q. Did he continue with that loud, scary tone --
A. Yes.
Q. -- through the entire episode?
A. Yes.
Q. And the other officer, who was to the right, was --
A. One -- one of the right - I cannot say if it was the -- the one at the right or the one next to him.
It came from the right side -- from the south side.
Q. All right. So one of the officers, who was to the south of the loud officer, was talking in a more calm voice?
A. Correct.
Q. Do you remember telling the Lexington police that towards the end, it was the louder officer who took control of the situation towards the end?
A. I don't know.
Q. Okay. That loud officer, did you see that loud officer moving around during this interaction?
A. Yes.
Q. And the loud officer, was he carrying one of the long guns or some other type of a weapon?
A. I cannot tell you what kind of weapon he was holding.
Q. Was it the loud officer who slipped and fell?
A. I believe so.
Q. And the police report we've been provided
says that when the officer -- of the interview, and $I$ can't tell whether it's of you or your husband, so I apologize -- but it says, When the officer fell, tension went up, and the man in the street sat up.

Did you see that?
Did you see the man sit up when the officer fell?
A. He was moving. He was moving same way he was moving before.
Q. Okay. After the officer fell, though, the man never got to his feet, did he?
A. I believe not.

MR. HEINEMAN: Thank you.
That's all I have, Ms. Dinnar.
Thank you.
THE COURT: Anything on that from anyone?
MR. VAN EPPS: $I$ just want to clarify
something.
REDIRECT EXAMINATION
BY MR. VAN EPPS:
Q. You said you believe.

Earlier -- earlier $I$ asked you if you saw
it or not; $I$ believe your answer was no.
Were you able to see what the man was
doing just before the shots happened? A. No. I don't remember. I cannot put it, like, in the timing.

THE COURT: I just have one or two questions.

Did you ever see the man on the ground throw the knife away?

THE WITNESS: Excuse me?
THE COURT: Did you ever see the man on the ground throw the knife away?

THE WITNESS: No way.
THE COURT: Did you ever see the man on the ground throw the knife at any of the police officers?

THE WITNESS: No.
THE COURT: Did you ever see the man on the ground drop the knife?

THE WITNESS: No.
THE COURT: Okay.
MR. HEINEMAN: One follow-up quickly.
REDIRECT EXAMINATION

BY MR. HEINEMAN:
Q. After the man was down on the ground the first time, as you've described for us, did you ever see him get back up to his feet at any point
in time?
A. To his full feet, no.

MR. HEINEMAN: Thank you.
THE COURT: Ma'am -- anything on that?
MR. VAN EPPS: No, thank you, Judge.
THE COURT: Thank you very much.
(Witness excused.)
MR. VAN EPPS: And the next witness is going to be --

THE WITNESS: My husband.
MR. VAN EPPS: -- Samuel Dinnar.

THE COURT OFFICER: (Inaudible) the clerk (indiscernible).

THE COURT: Thank you.
THE COURT OFFICER: Sir, stop right there, and face the, clerk and raise your right hand, please.

THE CLERK: Do you solemnly swear or affirm that the testimony you'll provide the Court today will be the truth so help you God?

THE WITNESS: I do.
SAMUEL DINNAR, SWORN

THE COURT OFFICER: Right this way, please.

Just stop here (inaudible).

THE WITNESS: Okay.
MR. VAN EPPS: Good afternoon.
You can have a seat.
THE COURT: Sır, you can have a seat.
THE WITNESS: Thanks.
THE COURT: Sir, so I've been telling everybody the same thing.

I can't order you not to discuss your testimony today, but what goes on here as supposed to be private and confidential.

There is going to be a report that will be issued to the parties at least -- it's not going to -- it's not a public report -- but I'd just ask if you could to not discuss your testimony -- I understand that you and your wife are going to talk about it; but, beyond that, you not discuss your testimony until that -- until you're notified as to the results of the inquest.

Mr. Van Epps?
THE WITNESS: Understood.
THE COURT: Thank you, sir.
EXAMINATION
BY MR. VAN EPPS:
Q. Good afternoon, sir.
A. Good afternoon.
Q. Could we have your full name and could you spell it for our court reporter?
A. Samuel Dinnar, $S-A-M-U-E-L, D-I$, double $N$, A-R.
Q. And, sir, where do you live?
A. 95 Simonds Road, Lexington.
Q. And have you lived at that address for about 18 years?
A. Yes.
Q. Okay. And your wife is Tal, who testified earlier; is that right?
A. That's true.
Q. What do you do for work, sir?
A. I'm an engineer. I work in -- in technology management and $I$ teach.
Q. What do you teach, engineering?
A. Engineering leadership, so negotiation, things like that.
Q. Okay. And let me - - I want to -- I'd like to ask you some questions about February 12 th of this year.

Around 12:30 that afternoon, what were you and your wife doing?
A. We just finished lunch, and we decided to go out for a walk.
Q. And you live only maybe five minutes from the rotary behind North Hancock and Hancock and Blake; is that right?
A. Yes.

We live on the corner of Blake and Simonds, so just down the road a few minutes. Q. Okay. Did the path of your walk take you to the rotary, or in the direction of the rotary? A. Yes.

That's our normal path that we walk, and it took us in that direction; and then we were held short because of the event, yeah. Q. And a residential neighborhood, lots of homes nearby, there's a school nearby; is that right? A. Yes.
Q. As you're approaching the rotary, you know, as you're approaching where, you know, Blake feeds into Burlington and Burlington hits the rotary, did you become aware of any sounds or any noises that were out of the ordinary? A. We -- as we're walking down Blake, it starts descending in that direction, $I$ heard a far-off siren, didn't pay much attention to it, but it was a Saturday morning, and it did seem to be in the general direction. That was it.
Q. And what do you recall about that day in terms of -- you're out for a walk, what was the weather like, what was the condition like?
A. It was -- it had snowed, so the ground
was -- had snow and ice on it, patches of snow and ice, and it was a nice, sunny winter day, which felt good for a walk, yeah.
Q. Fair enough.

As you approach where Blake and Burlington feeds into the rotary, what, if anything, did you observe in the rotary that seemed unusual to you? A. So first we heard this -- so this is a couple minutes after that siren, we heard sort of boot stomping --
Q. Um-hum.
A. -- and just, like, this commotion.

And we looked up in the direction of the rotary, and $I$ saw a person run in our direction from the rotary direction to Burlington, and then slip at -- at the place where Blake and Burlington would meet, just shy of the rotary, slip on the ground facing us, and then immediately thereafter several policemen came up behind and sort of positioned themselves facing that person.
Q. Okay. The person that had been running, could you describe that person's looks and appearance in any detail?
A. It's -- it's hard from so long ago.

Younglsh, $I$ would say 38 , thin, athletic.
Q. Clothes, if you can?
A. I think a tan-colored shirt and -- and pants. Hard to -- $I$ don't recall exactly.
Q. Okay. So this person falls, I think you said.
A. Yeah.
Q. And you had -- as you're approaching, you had heard sirens.

Now that you're watching this, are you able to hear anything about what's going on in the rotary?
A. So -- so, initially, I didn't put the suren together. I don't know if it was connected.

In hindsight, it seemed connected, but at that moment, it was just a commotion of everybody on the -- on the ground.

He was falling $\quad n$ our direction, trying to get up; told to stay down, and -- and that was more or less the essence of the discussion that went on for -- that -- an extended period of time
afterwards.
Q. okay.
A. Some of it we could hear, especially the officers or policemen who were facing us.

Most of the time we could not hear what the -- the person, which I later know as Brandon [sic], so if it's okay 1 'll use Brandon [sic], he was most of the time with his back towards us, so what we could make out, $I$ couldn't make out what he was saying.
Q. Okay. Just so $I$ understand you, could you hear if the police were talking to him, if so, could you make out what they were saying? A. Yes.

Initially, he was told to stay down. He was told to drop the knife. I don't know at what point he was -- one of the officers or policemen addressed him by his name and tried to calm him down and tell him that an ambulance was on his way; they -- they want to get him back home, back to his family.
Q. Okay.
A. So there were -- there were basically two distinct voices among them, but that was the essence of the conversation throughout.
Q. Okay. And we'll come back to those in a second, but so you're hearing police say things to him.
A. Yeah.
Q. Could you hear any response at all coming from him, even if you couldn't make out the words?
A. I could tell he was highly distressed.
Q. What makes you say that?
A. Highly anxious.

The voice was -- I mean, you could see by the body gestures, by the -- by the tone of the voice, but $I$ couldn't make out what was being said, yeah.
Q. Can you tell us about the -- you told us about the body language and the tone.

What about the volume of the response, anything you tell us about that?
A. I --
Q. Compared to, say, the way you and I are talking today.
A. Yeah, I don't --
Q. (Inaudible.)
A. Again, this is a long time and I'm not -- I don't think it was consistent, so $I$ don't think
it was that he was yelling all the time or that he was talking softly.

I think there were some of this and some of that, so --
Q. Some of both?
A. Some -- some of both.

Some where he was sort of talking in a softer and quiet voice, either to himself or to them, and then at some point it was getting louder and a little more agitated.

I mean, they had shot him with bean bags or whatever it was.

I mean, there was definitely moments of distress there; and the tone was $1 m p a t i e n t$, higher, you know, pitch, sharper kind of.

But it -- but it changed. It wasn't consistent.
Q. Okay. Can you tell us from where you were watching where the man and where the police appeared to have come from as they're running into the rotary and they end up in front of you?
A. So we're positioned up street on Blake about two houses down.

What you can see is the intersection of

Blake and Burlington.
You don't see much of the rotary. They all came from the direction of that rotary. Q. Okay.
A. And then Brandon [sic] ran and slipped and fell on the ground, and then the officers sort of created this arc or semicircle all on the west -eastern side of the rotary, so towards Burlington, sort of in a semicircle or an arc. Q. And when that's happening, is the man, is he, you know, on the grassy part of the rotary or is he in the street? Where is he?
A. Brandon's [sic] in the middle of the street. Q. Okay. And the officers are where at this time?
A. And the officers -- the one, No. 1, that was on the left, our left, was on the sidewalk, right on that seat.

Two and three were on the street towards the direction of the rotary.

And four was -- and maybe there was a five, $I$ don't remember, $I$ don't recall exactly -were more towards that side of the rotary where -- where -- that disappears out of view, that's blocked by going off to the right --
Q. Okay.
A. -- so...
Q. What I'm going to ask you to do is, I'm going to give you a Magic Marker. Showing you a Google maps printout of the rotary.
A. Yeah.
Q. We can agree that that looks like a Google map?
A. Yeah.
Q. Okay. So if you could, take a minute, think about where you were observing from and put your initials where that is.
A. Okay.
Q. All right? Well, actually, I'll ask you to start with that.
(Inaudible) up here. It's kind of a --
A. Well, this is --
Q. As closely as you --
A. That's not a good - that's not a good Google map excerpt because this half is -- so we're up here --
Q. Um-hum.
A. -- right.

So we're outside this image on Blake.
Q. Right.
A. And we're seeing the events happen around here.
Q. Okay.
A. And so most of this is -- is irrelevant, and I couldn't put my initials on where $I$ would be because it would be outside the image.
Q. From the way you're gesturing, it looks like you are indicatıng further up Blake, at least the north of this green lot; is that right?
A. Oh, much further. This is -- this is the first house on Blake. We'd be probably out here.
Q. Okay. Fair enough.

Can you indicate, then, at least where Brandon [sic] was, and you could just put a B. From what you recall.
A. (No audible response.)
Q. And then --
A. Right around there.
Q. You had -- you had indicated there was, you
described as an arc - -
A. Yeah.
Q. -- of police officers.

Can you just kind of indicate on the -the map you're holding where that was?
A. Something like that.

It's -- I mean, it wasn't a perfect arc. I think this one was a little further back, and it -- it may have been -- it's a little hard with this angle.
Q. Okay. And, as $I$ understand, I'm going to just circle on this, when $I$ showed you the green blob that you were to the north of, that's the thing that $I$ 've circled, you're up here somewhere?
A. We're -- we're up -- yeah, we're up here.
Q. (Inaudible.)
A. Yeah.

MR. VAN EPPS: I would offer this as the next exhibit.

THE COURT: That will be the next exhibit.

THE CLERK: No. 6.
(Exhibit No. 6, Map, received into evidence.)

MR. MCDONALD: Wait. (Inaudible) with the statement on the (inaudible) is in there?

MR. VAN EPPS: Yes.
(Inaudible.)
MR. McDONALD: Okay.
BY MR. VAN EPPS:
Q. The -- you're looking into the rotary from this position.

The arc of police officers -- well, so there's the man on the ground. You drew the different numbers of the officers --
A. Yeah.
Q. -- that you recall in the map.

Do their positions, you know, sort of change as the incident unfolds are or they standing perfectly motionless throughout? A. Most of these that $I$ drew, the four, I think they were more or less in the same position throughout.

There appeared to have been more coming from the back, and things were happening on the rotary beyond what $I$ could view; and, eventually, there were also others, police cars coming in from the Burlington side or -- or then later to the Burlington side.

But for the most -- most of the interaction, these -- these were the primary officers that were engaged --
Q. Okay.
A. -- and they were more or less in the same positions.
Q. Tell me about the instructions you heard the police giving to the man.
A. Um --
Q. I think you -- I think you --
A. Yup.
Q. -- had said there were multiple voices.
A. So there were two prımary voices.

The one on the left $I$ would call No. 1 , stockier build, shorter, black hair, if $I$ remember correctly, pointing a -- a rifle at the person on the ground, and most of their commands, or most of their sentences, were commands in - in a very abrupt, loud, staccato kind of voice, so, Put the knife down. Stay down. Put the knife down. Things like that.

The person that was officer 3 or 2, because $I$ mean, they may have sort of moved around a little bit between them, taller, darker voice, more steady and relaxed, not relaxed, but calming, trying to be calming, and trying to be more empathetıc in the -- in the way they were conversing.

And they were -- they were -- they did more, $I$ think, of the talking, and their sentences were longer and tried to call him by
name, at least at some point, $I$ don't know if right from the beginning, but, Brandon [sic], we're trying to get you, or, we called your famıly, or, We're trying to get you home, we're calling an ambulance, things like that.
Q. Okay. And are these, with respect to these two voices, are they guving these instructions multiple times or a couple times or -- can you give us a sense of that?
A. Yes.

This is going on for quite a while, multiple times.

The -- the man on the ground occasionally would turn back; look as if they were going to maybe try and, you know, see if there's another way to go, or try to get up or -- or talk back to them and shaking their hand with what appeared to be a knife at them.

And, occasionally, the person on the -the officer, policeman No. 1, would shoot at Brandon [sic] what seemed to be nonlethal, you know, bean bags or -- or whatever it is, to keep him on the ground.
Q. Let me just ask you a couple follow-up questions.
A. Sure.
Q. So when you were talking to me about the man on the ground talking back and indicating that you -- you were -- you kind of raised your hand and were sort of waving it or gesturing with it. A. That was one time. That was maybe the third kind of interaction or after he was doing that, so that was at a later -- again, I - I apologize.

It's been a long time. I don't remember the exact sequence, but that was later in one of the exchanges with them.
Q. Okay.
A. And by that time, I mean, it was hard for me to see that it's a knife, but from having heard them say, Drop the knife, I assumed that was the knife.
Q. Okay. And you're also, I would note, you're sort of shaking your hand, holding your hand as if you're holding an imaginary knife?
A. Yes.
Q. Is that how you remember that man's handing, in terms of --
A. Yeah.
Q. -- the shake?
A. Yeah. He was holding it as -- like you would hold a stick, not like you would do a down stabbing motion, but holding up, is what $I$ recall.
Q. Understood.

So, as this is happening, so you described him also, the man on the ground, looking around. Tell me about his position and whether he was moving, in addition to looking around.
A. He -- he was moving around. He was looking in different directions at the different officers.

There were different officers talking to him; there were others with rifles pointed at him.

So he's looking nervously around; he's looking at the other direction where there are no officers, as if that may be an escape route or whatever, $I$ don't know, so he's moving about, sitting, sitting up, sitting down, sort of lying down or being hit by the bean bag and being back on the ground.

At no point did -- do I remember him getting up, okay.

So he's shifting his weight around, he's
moving around, he's -- but at no point do I remember him getting up.
Q. Like, standing?
A. Standing.
Q. You know --
A. Yes.
Q. -- on his feet or, you know, like the way I am?
A. That's right.
Q. Okay. As this is going on, so you described him looking around nervously or maybe agitated is the word.

Is that -- was that your perception from the, you know, the -- the movements he's making, you know, the speed or the way he's moving? A. Yes.

There are moments where he's silent, where he's not responding, and then there are moments where he's talking to somebody -- to himself or to them -- and there are moments where he directly is addressing one of them. It's -- it's not consistent.

There are sort of moments, and there were periods where there was nothing happening, right, so he wasn't talking; they -- they would wait,
they would say something, and -- yeah.
Q. The -- you mentioned one of the officers was holding some kind of rifle or -- or a long gun, I guess we can call it.

Do you remember anything about the shape or the color of any of those?
A. The best $I$ recall is that it was black, so the barrel was -- was black and a little thicker, from my memory, but $I$-- I can't be 100 percent sure.
Q. And, in terms of when you describe them as, I think, bean bags or something like that, but you describe the man on the ground being shot with those periodically.

What was happening at the time you heard those shots in terms of his position, his movements, their instructions?
Can you sort of -- describe that?
A. Yeah.

It -- again, if ut was -- I don't know the
exact conversation dynamics; but at some point when it appears he was either looking to go elsewhere or trying to change positıon and maybe get up, or not responding to their instructions to stay down and to drop the knife, then there
was, you know, there was a shot or -- or two -- I think $I$ thought one at the time -- and then he would get hit and sort of stay on the ground or -- or fall -- fall back down from sitting to laying down.
Q. Was -- and how many times did you hear shots like that, like the -- that sounded like that, what you're describing?
A. I -- I probably had a better description in my interview after the fact of how many times. It's hard for me to recall, maybe three, maybe four. I don't recall exactly from ten months later, but.
Q. But today you remember it as three or four? A. It's several, several, yeah.
Q. And you described them as being bean bags.

After -- after the -- after the shots, the whole interaction would continue, there'd be instructions and he'd still be kind of moving around?
A. Yeah.

So it was -- it appeared to me it wasn't lethal.

It caused the man, Brandon [sic], to, you know, be hit and -- and physically change his
position or fall on the ground, but it didn't stop him from later sitting back up or continuing the conversation or, so that's why $I$ assumed it was a bean bag or a rubber something, some nonlethal.
Q. I understand.

As you're -- so while this is going on; you're watching, am $I$ correct in thinking that at one point your wife begins to -- as cars are coming, she'll turn and basically direct them away from the rotary?
A. Yes.
Q. Okay.
A. Yeah, yes.

So there were cars coming from both Burlington side and from Blake.

So the ones coming from Blake, she would wave off and ask them to turn around, not go down there.
Q. Do you have a memory of how often she had to do that?
A. Probably two or three times.
Q. So describe what happens at the end of the incident.

Where is the man positioned and what can
you see happen?
A. The -- the positioning are pretty much the same as they had been for this whole period. This has been going on for quite a while.

The officer, or Policeman No. 1, who was on the left with the -- what $I$ perceived to be the bean bag long gun, rifle, is -- is occasionally adjusting their position, so they -they would shuffle forward, shuffle back to decide as they're -- as they have their rifle trained on Brandon [sic] on the ground and yelling, and at some point after this had happened several times, they -- they are shuffling and they slipped on the ice and fell on their back.

That caused this sort of shift in the dynamic because. All of a sudden, things that have been pretty stable, all of a sudden there's a big kind of change in the dynamic, a person's on the ground with the rifle, people are looking up, they're looking in different directions, and Brandon [sic] reacted as well to -- to the fact that the officer's on the ground, by leaning forward or looking at him on the ground, et cetera, and -- and then a different sounding
rifle $1 s$ what $I$ heard, fire -- fire a couple of shots, or a few shots, and then Brandon [suc] fell down.
Q. Do you remember how many shots you heard? A. I don't precisely, but $I$ think it was maybe three or four in short sequence.
Q. And did anybody approach him thereafter?
A. Yes, although not immediately. There was still, Drop the knife, let go of the knife.
Q. The instructions?
A. There are still instructions, because now he's on the ground, but he's still clutching the knife.

And so they're -- they kept giving him instructions to drop the knife; and, eventually, with rifles trained, one of them walked over; with their leg, if $I$ remember correctly, sort of slid over the knife, and then they tended to him.

Meanwhile, another cop car came around to the Burlington side and they administered first aid or -- yeah.
Q. After he fell, but was apparently still holding the knife, how long did it take before somebody grabbed the knife and they started doing first aid, if you know?
(Inaudible.)
A. Yeah, it's tough to estimate time, moments like this.

A guesstimate would be 15 long seconds, but I -- it's hard -- it's hard to tell. Q. Was there an ambulance that showed up shortly thereafter?
A. Yes.
Q. Had you been aware of an ambulance in the area as you're watching this?
A. Yes.

I think at one point Officer No. 3-- I say officer because my assumption was that was the highest ranking of policeman there -mentioned, The ambulance is here, all right.

So the ambulance is here. Brandon [sic], we want to -- you know, we want to help you get to the hospital or something like that.
Q. Just before -- so you described when the officer slipped and fell.

You said you thought it was the ice. Is that -- does that happen over by the curb? A. Yeah, yeah. So -- so the -- it's hard for me to know for sure what -- because there was snow and ice, but there's part of the curb that's,
like a step and part of the curb that's a little more flush with the road there, and he was moving back and forth around that area, and there, you know, there were some ice patches or snow patches there, so.
Q. But when that officer falls, you were describing it earlier, you said the situation, the dynamic $I$ think is what you said, change, and you kind of -- and your body language was -- and you sort of sat $u p$ and you looked, you know, a little more -- like you were looking around, (inaudible) like that?
A. Yeah.
Q. What was your observation about Brendan's movements at the time that fall happens, as best you can describe?
A. Yeah, it -- I think my attention went to the officer first; and then my thought was, no,
don't -- $I$ was -- $I$ was afraid something bad might happen as a result, because things were, you know, $I$ was getting nervous, everybody was getting nervous, I'm sure everybody there was, I'm sure Brandon [sic] was.

I don't remember him getting up. I don't remember him lunging forward. I don't remember
him -- any -- anything dramatic of that nature, but he did make some change in the posture or whatever, so $I$-- $I$ don't know what the intent was.
Q. And - -
A. And $I$ wasn't - and $I$ don't think $I$ was focused on him, because $I$ was looking at the officer.
Q. Because you had Just seen that movement and so you (inaudible) --
A. Because I had seen the officer fall and, you know, and -- yeah.
Q. Okay. As that happens, so are you -- is he, Brandon [sic], facing the officers when that happens or is he -- I mean, are you sort of looking at this in a profile or how is he facing compared to you?
A. I think he was with his back towards me, and then when he's looking at the officer who fell, then he's more into profile or two thirds profile.
Q. Okay. At that point, do you have an a approximation, or can you estimate the distance between Brendan and the officers?

And can you use either -- you can use the
furniture in this room.
A. Yeah, I think it's something, like, seven or eight feet --
Q. Okay.
A. -- which is the middle of the row to that curb --
Q. Okay.
A. -- to that officer a little bit further away from the other officers --
Q. Okay.
A. -- in the middle of the arc that I mentioned, and then probably simılar or a little more with the officer that's on the right side.
Q. Okay. And you -- you described earlier you perceived some -- some kind of movement or change of posture or something in Brendan, but he never fully got to his feet?
A. That's -- that's -- that's my recollection.
Q. Okay. And at the time, what, if I understand you, at the time that happens, were you able to see what he had been doing with the knife right before that?
A. No. I mean, I -- the answer is no, but $I$ don't remember thinking that there was something going on that $I$ wasn't seeing with the knife.

I don't think that was the center of the focus of -- of the attention.

It's different than it was throughout the whole period, which is, you know, Drop the knife. Let go of the knife.
Q. Okay. And, clearly, he still had it
afterward because --
A. Yes.
Q. -- somebody went to get it?
A. Yes.

MR. VAN EPPS: That's all I have, Judge.
MR. MCDONALD: No questions, your Honor.
THE COURT: Mr. Heineman.

EXAMINATION

BY MR. HEINEMAN:
Q. Good afternoon.
A. Good afternoon.
Q. I just have a couple follow-up questions.
A. Sure.
Q. You had mentioned the two distinct voices --
A. Yeah.
Q. -- and one officer's voice was louder, and the other officer's voice was calmer or softer; is that fair to say?
A. Yeah.

I don't know if it -- I don't know as to louder, but was -- the -- was speaking -- you know, the -- the officer that $I$ mentioned calmer had a deeper, stronger voice, so I'm not sure which one was louder, but less stranned and calmer, yes.
Q. I'm just trying to place officer numbers with those voices.
A. Yes.
Q. You had talked, as you're looking at it, the officer to the left -- farthest to the left -was the one who was talking in the more abrupt, less calm manner?
A. Yes.
Q. And the officer somewhere to the right of that officer was one of the officers who with the deeper voice was talking in a calmer manner?
A. Correct.
Q. And you identified the officer to the left as Officer No. 1 --
A. Yes.
Q. -- in your drawing?

I want to talk about Officer No. 1 .
A. Okay.
Q. Officer No. 1 during the course of this event had a long rifle or a shotgun in his hands, right?
A. Yeah.
Q. Was it pointed at Brandon [sic] the entire time?
A. Yes. I mean, apart from repositioning, et cetera, but the -- yes.
Q. And so when we're talking the entire time, we're talking the scope of minutes?
A. Yes.
Q. And during that time, were there officers other than Officer No. 1 who also had rifle or shotguns pointed at -- his name is Brendan, by the way --
A. Yeah.
Q. -- I wouldn't expect you to know it, but Brendan, not Brandon -- pointed at Brendan.
A. I'm sorry.
Q. It's not your -- not your fault.

The offlcer was calling him Brandon, I get
it, but his name's Brendan.
Were there other officers pointing their rifles at Brendan?
A. Yes.
Q. Okay. Could you tell which of the officers
were firing those bean bags, officer one or one of the other officers with the long rifles?
A. One.
Q. And if the evidence is that there were eight of these shotgun shells found at the scene after the shooting, would that be consistent with your memory of the approximate number of times you heard that shotgun fired?

MR. MCDONALD: Objection.
THE COURT: So I think sustained at this point because there is no --

MR. HEINEMAN: Okay.
THE COURT: -- evidence as $u t$ relates to the number of shots fired.

But how many shots do you recall being fired?

THE WITNESS: I remember several, so anywhere between five and ten would be a reasonable number.

MR. HEINEMAN: Thank you.

BY MR. HEINEMAN:
Q. And if -- at some point you were interviewed by the Lexington police; is that right?
A. Correct.
Q. Were you interviewed with your wife together
or separately?
A. We were interviewed together.
I believe it was the Tuesday following
that event.
Q. And, because you were interviewed together, I
can't tell who said what in the report, so $I$ want
to read a line to you from the report and ask you
if you remember this.
A. Okay.
Q. And the report, it says, When the officer fell, tension went up. Subject, meaning Brendan, sat up.
A. Yeah.
Q. Is that, you think, something you saw?
A. That -- that would probably be me describing things three days later, as opposed to ten months, yes.
Q. All right. And so when the tension went up when this officer fell, you saw Brendan sit up, but never get to his feet, right?
A. Correct.
Q. I want to talk about the moments leading up to the officer falling.
A. Yeah.
Q. Could you describe for Judge Brennan that

Officer No. 1 's movements in the, $I$ don't know, 10 or 15 seconds before he fell, as best you remember.
A. Yeah.

As you mentioned, this has been going on for minutes.

He's got his rifle pointed at Brendan, and he's occasionally yelling orders.

He is occasionally adjusting his position, so shuffling right; shuffling left; shufflıng forward; shuffling back as a way of maybe getting a better angle or maybe just changing position because it's tiring to hold that tense position for that long.

So that -- the movement wasn't inconsistent with the way he had been shuffling to adjust his position throughout several events, except that time, my reading is, he slipped on the ice or something and -- and fell.
Q. And so the last question $I$ have for you is about distances.

At the time you saw Brendan sit up for the last time, right before those different-sounding shots, was he located essentially in the middle of that lane of travel?
A. Yes.
Q. And when the officer slipped and fell, was he at the edge of that lane of travel?
A. Yes.

He slipped -- he slipped right past the edge; and then $I$ think, as he was getting up, he was right on the edge, as best as I recall.

MR. HEINEMAN: Thank you for coming in today, Mr. Dinnar.

THE WITNESS: Thank you.
THE COURT: Anything on that?
MR. VAN EPPS: Nothing further, Judge. Thank you.

THE COURT: Thank you very much, sir.
THE WITNESS: Thank you. Thank you. (Witness excused.)

THE COURT: Why don't we take a break until two.

THE COURT OFFICER: All rise. Court will be in recess until 2:00.
(1:07 p.m. court in recess.)
(2:12 p.m. court resumes.)
THE COURT OFFICER: You may be seated. Court is in session.

MR. VAN EPPS: Good afternoon, your

Honor.

So our next witness is going to be Charlotte Newman.

We have Scott Mattoon scheduled for a 3:00 Zoom, so a few minutes before three I'll just need a couple minutes to do some stuff with the computer.

THE COURT: That's fine.
MR. VAN EPPS: It should work. We'll see.

THE COURT: It's all right.
MR. MCDONALD: Famous last words.

THE COURT: Mr. Van Epps, just for my planning purposes, there are three witnesses left for today?

MR. VAN EPPS: We anticipate Ms. Newman, Tom Wetmore, Scott Mattoon by Zoom, and Davis Gould (phonetic) from the lab - -

THE COURT: Okay.
MR. VAN EPPS: -- if we have time.

THE COURT: Great. Okay.

THE COURT OFFICER: Right this way, please.

You're just going to stop there, you're going to face the clerk, and raise your right
hand, please.
THE CLERK: Do you solemnly swear or affirm the testimony you're about to give the Court will be the truth so help you God?

THE WITNESS: I do.
CHARLOTTE NEWMAN, SWORN
THE COURT OFFICER: Okay. Right this way, please. Just watch yourself getting into here.
(Inaudible.)
THE COURT: Good afternoon.
I just wanted to -- I've been telling everyone this.

I can't order you not to talk about what your testimony is after you leave here today; but these are secret, confidential proceedings at this point.

At some point there will be a report that's issued to the partıes, or a report relative to what the outcome is, so what I'd ask what you do is just not discuss your testimony until that happens. Okay?

THE WITNESS: Um-hum.
THE COURT: Also, further, I saw that you were wearing a mask when you came in.

If you want to keep wearing it, that's totally okay.

THE WITNESS: That's okay. I (inaudible).

EXAMINATION

BY MR. VAN EPPS:
Q. Good afternoon.
A. Hi.
Q. Could we have your name and could you spell it for our court reporter, please?
A. Yup. It's Charlotte Newman,
$\mathrm{C}-\mathrm{H}-\mathrm{A}-\mathrm{R}-\mathrm{L}-\mathrm{O}-\mathrm{T}-\mathrm{T}-\mathrm{E}, \quad \mathrm{Newman}, \quad \mathrm{N}-\mathrm{E}-\mathrm{W}-\mathrm{M}-\mathrm{A}-\mathrm{N}$.
Q. And, Ms. Newman, what town do you live in?
A. Lexington.
Q. What street?
A. Blake Road, No. 10.
Q. Okay. How long have you lived there?
A. About six years.
Q. Okay. Are you employed?
A. I am.
Q. What do you do?
A. I'm the chuef business officer for a
pharmaceutical company.
Q. Okay. And I'd like to direct your attention to February 12 th of this year.

What were you doing that day around 12 , 12:30?
A. I don't know the time, I'm afraid, but $\quad f$ you're talking about what we're here for, I walked my dog --
Q. Okay.
A. -- for his afternoon walk.
Q. And what -- what route did you take?

Where did you end up?
A. Um-hum. I went down from my house on Blake Road down to the mini roundabout, or rotary; I crossed over North Hancock onto -- I think it's called Hamilton, and walked down Hamilton to Ledgelawn, and then did a loop back around North Hancock so I'd end up back on the rotary, and that was the route.
Q. okay. And as you got to the rotary, was your attention drawn to anything that seemed unusual to you?
A. On the way out on my walk --
Q. Yes.
A. -- or the way back?

Um-hum. Yes, so as I turned onto Hamilton, I noticed the gentleman, who lived two houses on that corner, from that corner, to my
left.
I was walking with my dog down the street. I noticed him to my left, sort of tiptoeing along the side of the house, it was next to his house, and it caught my attention because it was very quiet. I saw him, I looked, and he was clearly looking behind him as if he thought something was following him, and he was trying to be unheard, so he was tiptoeing -Q. Okay.
A. -- and looking behind him, like someone playing hide and seek and trying not to be followed.
Q. The house that he's doing that alongside of, is that the one on the corner --
A. Yes.
Q. $\quad-\quad 100$ ?
A. Um-hum.
Q. And is this a person that you knew by sight or by name?
A. By sight. I don't believe $I$ knew his name before that day, but definitely by sight in that I'd seen him on the street before when he appeared to be having some sort of event, lots of shouting, and it caught my attention again
because I've been out on the street with my dog and my children were out on their bikes, and so I'd gone to check where my kids were and make sure there was nothing that they were involved in and when $I$ saw they weren't there, $I$ went back in and $I$ saw the police came that time.

And I'd seen him walking to -- walking down North Hancock before, just to observe him, as $I$ would any neighbor, but that's pretty much it, so $I$ knew him by sight.
Q. That -- that one incident where you described him as he had an event or shouting --
A. Um-hum.
Q. -- when was that, approximately?
A. Years ago.

I couldn't tell you exactly when, but it was years ago.
Q. Okay. All right. So you see this individual tiptoeing along. What do you remember about his appearance in terms of physical description, clothing --
A. $\quad \mathrm{Um}-\mathrm{hum}$.
Q. -- Things like that.
A. Um-hum. Hmm. At that point I didn't notice a lot about his clothing. He didn't have a coat
on, $I$ know that.
I was more -- my attention was more drawn to how he was moving and where he was moving, because $I$ was looking to see if he was following, coming in my direction as $I$ walked down the street, but he turned around the back of the house on that corner.

I looked back. He went all the way around the house, so he was between the house on the corner and the house where he lived, and $I$ assumed, okay, he's going back into his house, and $I$ kept walking.

But $I$ didn't -- I don't recall anything other than the fact he didn't have a coat on, at that point.
Q. And what do you remember next after that?
A. Walking down Hamilton, if that's what it's called, to Ledgelawn, turned onto Ledgelawn. I heard sirens. Vaguely remember thinking it was quite a lot of sirens, didn't think much more, kept walking.

Then, as $I$ started to walk down North Hancock back towards the rotary, as I approached it, my attention was caught by the fact there seemed to be a large group of people out for a
walk, because it was sunny and warm, who'd stopped on the corner opposite the road $I$ was coming down, as if they were golng to walk down towards the middle school, Diamond Middle School, but they'd stopped, and they turned around and they were looking back towards my direction, but to the side, so over to where the gentleman's house was.

And I thought, oh. And in my mind, I thought, $I$ hope everything's okay, maybe those were sirens to do with --
Q. Okay.
A. -- to do with this.

And then $I$ noticed a man who appeared to be out jogging had stopped jogging, and was stood on the corner, or running, was stood on the corner on his cell phone.
Q. Okay.
A. And that's what $I$ walked up to.
Q. Okay. And tell -- is that somebody you knew?
A. $\quad \mathrm{N} \circ$.
Q. Okay. And he's on his cell phone.

Were you able to tell anything about the call, the nature of the call?
A. No, just he seemed a bit agitated, I would
say.
It caught my attention that he was clearly -- $I$ wasn't listening particularly to what he was saying because pretty much at that moment my attention was drawn to the fact there were police clearly on the corner.
Q. Okay. And what were they doing, the police?
A. They were standing -- it sounded like they were -- I think they were shouting -- loud talking, shouting -- but pretty much immediately I saw the gentleman running.

And that's what really caught my attention, and $I$ stopped, with my dog.
Q. Did you recognize the gentleman running?
A. Yes.
Q. Who was that?
A. The guy who lives in that house, whose name I believe is Brendan.
Q. Okay. The person you saw earlier?
A. Um-hum, same -- same gentleman, and this time I did notice what he was wearing because $I$ could see he had no shoes on.

It looked like -- I think, he had no shoes on or -- and he was trying to keep his pants up as he was running.

They were falling down, and it was making him stumble, which $I$ noticed, as he ran across the rotary.
Q. In what direction?
A. So from his house, across the rotary, as if you would like to go down Burlington or up Blake, towards the zebra crossing -- whatever you call it, crossing walk.
Q. Okay. And what did you observe that the police were doing as that happened?
A. They were shouting and following him and telling him to stop.
Q. Could you make out what they were shouting?
A. I recall snippets of -- I recall snippets. I remember his name being used. Lots of telling him to stop.

I remember $I$ became aware that they must have said something about, Drop the knife, because $I$ became aware he had a knife, but $I$ hadn't seen it, per se.

And so they were shouting, but it was replaced pretty quickly as he got over the rotary and he stumbled, but then he got back up, and then there were some bangs.
Q. Okay. I'm going to show you a map.
A. Sure.
Q. I'm going to ask you to do your best to show us, if you can, on the map where Brendan -- this person fell.
(Inaudible.)
And here's the magic marker. You can take a couple minutes to look at it and get oriented, if you like.
A. Okay. Well, he stumbled and fell a few times, so, ultimately, he ended up here, but he fell here, stumbled, pretty much all the way along to here.
Q. Okay.
A. So you just want me to mark where he fell?
Q. Why don't you do a one and a two.
A. A one and a two?
Q. One for the first place you became aware that he fell --
A. Okay.
Q. -- and two for (inaudible)?
A. Somewhere around here, and two is somewhere around here.
Q. All right. So just so I understand the falls, one and two --
A. Um-hum.
Q. -- is there a pause or a break in the movement after Fall No. 1 or is it a fall and then a kind of continued running, scrambling to get footing kind of thing?
A. I recall, I think, more of a scrambling, more of a scrambling, I believe.
Q. And when we get to Fall No. 2 --
A. Um-hum.
Q. -- on this map, which I'm going to offer as the next exhibit, where do the police officers go?
A. So --

THE COURT: Seven?
THE CLERK: Seven.
(Exhibit No. 7, Map, received into evidence.)
A. -- the zebra crossing, I remember maybe three, four police officers who had come chasing behind, standing around like this.
Q. You're motioning sort of a -- a line or a semicircle?
A. Yes, a bit like a semlcircle, I would say. My attention was mainly focused on one individual who had whatever, $I$ gathered, were soft bullets or whatever, something that had tried to stop
him, so that was really what $I$ focused on, but I know there was a police officer to either side, maybe -- maybe more than one.
Q. What caused your attention to be drawn to that particular officer?
A. Because $I$ heard these very loud bangs, and I was shocked and I was, like, Wow, what was that, and $I$ could see it was red -- there was red.

It didn't look like a -- there were guns and then this looked different, this particular. Q. So the coloring of the gun was different? A. Or maybe what came out. I couldn't tell you precisely.
Q. Okay. But something about it was different? A. Um-hum.
Q. Could you make out, at that point, as they take up this -- what you described as a semicircle position, what is being said back and forth?

Can you make out what the police are saying to the individual --
A. Um-hum.
Q. -- and can you make out any response from the individual?
A. Um-hum.

I could hear what the police were saying, along the lines of, Let us help you, you're hurt. They said his name again, drop the knife.

I didn't hear the individual saying anything. I just could see he very much wanted to get himself up and away.
Q. And what makes you say that?

Like, what about physically that you're observing makes you say that?
A. That he was scrambling. He was holding -trying to hold his pants and trying to -- and he'd go, and then they'd say, Don't get up, or something along those lines, and he'd stop, and then he'd got to do it again, and then he'd stop, so he was -- that's how $I$ would describe it.
Q. And when is that happening compared to when you're hearing the bang of the -- what you believed was a --
A. Something non --
Q. -- bean bag round?
A. Yeah. I don't know what they're called. It was after that.
Q. So the bean bag round --
A. He was down, and then they were saying, You're hurt, let us help you.
Q. Did you hear any other similar bangs or noises lıke what you heard?
A. I heard the next set of bangs, which sounded very different.
Q. Okay.
A. And I'd moved position from that point.
Q. Okay. Before we get to that --
A. Um-hum.
Q. -- are you able to make out any response from the individual, even if you can't understand the words, like, just noise?
A. I don't recall.
Q. In terms of the police, whoever is doing the speaking, could you tell if it's one or more than one person?
A. I heard one. Predominantly, I heard one voice.
Q. Can you tell us anything about the -- the tone and delivery of those statements --
A. Um-hum.
Q. -- of the individual, the volume, the --
A. They were loud; they were clear.
Q. Was -- were there -- was there one or more than one incident in which the individual appearing to be scrambling and then you would --
and then there were any kind of shot-like noises, that you can recall?
A. I may -- I may be misremembering, to be completely honest, but $I$ think I may remember two sets of the bean bag, because they were very jarring; one and then another set when he was further over to Point No. 2, and then there was a gap in time before the other bangs.
Q. Okay. With respect to the first set of -we'll just call them bean bag shots, because that's how you described them --
A. Um-hum.
Q. -- was that when he had already done the second fall or was it --
A. Before.
Q. Okay. And what about the second set of bean bag shots, was that --
A. Around there.

I can't recall if he'd fallen and -- or if that was what caused him to then fall.
Q. Earlier you testified that you heard them yelling something about dropping the knife or -A. Yes.
Q. -- something about a knife.
A. Yes.
Q. Did you make any observations of the individual's hands or whether he was carrying anything?
A. Well, subconsciously I think I then realized one hand was trying to hold the pants and one hand was holding something, but $I$ wasn't close enough to see the knife.
Q. All right. And you, just a second ago, sort of gestured with your -- with your left hand, sort of holding something up like this.
A. Um-hum.
Q. Can you remember how that person was holding their hand, holding what -- that object?
A. No, I -- no.
Q. Were you able to see whether he was moving or doing anything with it?
A. He wasn't doing anything with it, he was holding it.
Q. okay.
A. His demeanor was more about getting away.
Q. As this is going on, are you aware, do you have a memory of any other emergency vehicles being in the area, you know, like police cars, fire trucks, ambulances, things like that?
A. I remember a emergency vehicle coming down

North Hancock, so behind where I was, because for a long while $I$ noticed why is no one blocking off the road, the streets, because cars were coming around, people were going around the rotary multiple times, so it struck me as -- what worried me to -- they need to block this, so I remember somebody arriving, I can't remember what kind of vehicle, though.

That's all I recall. I was very focused on how to get home at that point.
Q. Do you have any recollection of whether there were other pedestrians or passersby in the area? A. Yes, there were numerous. I mentioned a group of walkers.

They'd gone, though, so I assume they
left. I remember the gentleman who lives in the house on the corner was stood on his doorstep outside his front door watching, the jogger, or runner; the cars, $I$ said.

And then around the time after fall No. 2,
I decided $I$ needed to get home, as my house was directly across from where the police officers were facing and where the gentleman might run, and I was worried my children were going to come out because it was loud, and I didn't want them
to come out and be right there, so I decided I had to get home.

And as $I$ made my way, $I$ couldn't go -- I couldn't go my usual route, $I$ couldn't go backwards because it would take too long and my kids might come out, so I decided to go across Hancock towards the road that leads down to Diamond

And as $I$ was doing that, $I$ saw, you know, the cars lined up, and I think I mentioned, there was a lady filmıng in her car, which caught my attention, and I -- I frowned at her, because I thought it was not cool.

And do I remember any other people? There was a car. At that point $I$ started to run. Q. What do you remember about the conditions that day?

And by that $I$ mean the weather (inaudible)?
A. Um-hum. It was sunny, and it was an unusually warm day, because $I$ was surprised to hear $1 t$ was February, because $I$ know it was warm, but $I$ know there was still some snow and crud on the ground.

MR. VAN EPPS: If $I$ could just have that
last exhibit.

BY MR. VAN EPPS:
Q. If you could just, if it's possible for you to indicate on Exhibit 7 , when he gets to Fall No. 2 --
A. Um-hum.
Q. -- can you give us an idea with the marker of where you're observing that from, maybe just put your initials where you're observing it from?
A. Um-hum.
Q. Thank you.

Can you take us through what you recall from where you see the individual at Fall No. 2, what happens through the last louder set of bangs that you heard?
A. Um-hum. Um-hum. That's where I decided to leave --
Q. Right.
A. -- so I wasn't looking this focused. There was more shouting.

As $I$ got to cross Hancock, around there, or maybe just before there, is where $I$ heard the really loud bangs, because that was -- I was, like, all right, I'm going, this sounds different, $I^{\prime} m$ leaving, $I$ need to get back to my
kids.

But $I$ didn't see -- I heard it, $I$ was looking in that direction, but $I$ can't tellyou $I$ saw anything particularly to comment on there. Q. Okay. Did you become aware of whether or not one of the officers had lost his footing at some point?
A. No.
Q. After you heard the louder bangs, did you hear anything after that?
A. I ran, so no.
Q. You were tying to get home?
A. Um-hum.
Q. Did you become aware at that point of whether there was any first aid or -- or rescue-type vehicles in the area?
A. The route $I$ took to get home, which took me down the street towards the Diamond Middle School, there's a cut-through the woods, which you can see on a map probably, $I$ took that cut-through, so then came back down Burlington, so $I$ now was on the other side -- the other - yeah, the other side.

And at that point $I$ could see there were people trying to help.

And $I$ think $I$ saw an emergency vehicle, but, again, $I$ was very focused on getting into my house because my children and my husband had come out, and $I$ was trying to get them back in. Q. Okay. At the last point at which you saw the individual who you knew, could you tell whether or not he was still holding a knife?
A. I could not tell anything at that point, no. He was flat on the ground.
Q. Okay. And that was after Fall No. 2?
A. Yeah.
Q. Okay. And can you tell us anything about whether he was moving or not moving and if so, how?
A. I can't tell you.
Q. When the officers were - what you described as a semicircle -- can you give us an idea of the distance between them and the young man?
A. I'm not very good with distances, so I'll point it out.

If he was lying on the ground about here, they were probably around where you guys are.
Q. So you're indicating --
A. He was in the -- he was in the street on the -- on the crossing, and they were on the
pavement area.
Q. Okay. And while they were in that semicircle position, did you observe any of them, the officers, $I$ mean, moving or changing position? A. Incrementally, maybe, in an effort to keep their distance, but trying to predict, perhaps, which way they were going to go. That's what it looked like.
Q. Could you see where the individual was looking?

Was he facing you?
Was he facing out?
A. No, he was facing -- he gave me the impression he would like to scramble up Blake Road, which is my street.

MR. VAN EPPS: If I could just have a moment.
(Pause.)
MR. VAN EPPS: I have nothing further, Judge.

THE COURT: Mr. McDonald?

MR. MCDONALD: No questions.
THE COURT: Mr. Heineman?

MR. HEINEMAN: Yes. Thank you, your Honor.

BY MR. HEINEMAN:
Q. Just a couple of questions, ma'am.

With regards to where you were located when you were making these observations once you stopped and were seeing things -- I haven't seen the drawing yet -- but were you essentially at the end of Hancock Street where $1 t$ meets the rotary?
A. Yes.
Q. And you mentioned that there was a woman you saw who was filming.

Was she in a car on Hancock Street?
A. Not North Hancock, but Hancock.

So I'm here; she was here, yes.
Q. And at some point in time did you walk in front of her vehicle?
A. Yes.
Q. All right.
A. That's why I noticed her filming, because I looked to see.
Q. Now, using your -- your terms of Fall 1 and Fall 2, the rotary has a center section with grass.
A. Yup.
Q. Am I right that Fall 1 was closer to that grassy --
A. Yes.
Q. And then Fall 2 was a little farther up?
A. Yes.
Q. Did you hear any of the shots which we're calling the bean bag shots before Brendan fell the first time?
A. No.
Q. Did you hear bean bag shots between the first fall and the second fall?
A. Yes.
Q. Did you hear more bean bag shots after Brendan was on the ground on the second fall?
A. I believe so.
Q. After Brendan fell the second time and was on the roadway, did he ever again get up to his feet?
A. I didn't see him get to his feet.
Q. And $I$ know times are tough; that is, estimated times --
A. Yes.
Q. -- but can you give me an estimate of the time between Fall No. 2 and the time of those final different-sounding shots?
A. That's very hard.

It wasn't seconds; it wasn't ten minutes, I don't think. Somewhere...

MR. HEINEMAN: Thank you, ma'am.
That's all the questions $I$ have.
THE COURT: Thank you.
MR. MCDONALD: If I could?
THE COURT: Sure. Go ahead.

MR. MCDONALD: Thank you.
EXAMINATION
BY MR. MCDONALD:
Q. Ms. Newman, you said several times that at some point you became extremely focused on getting home because of fear of that your children --
A. Yes.
Q. -- were out.

On those occasions, did you distract your vision from what was going on?
A. No.
Q. At all times you're saying you --
A. Because I couldn't see my house. It was more of a mental --
Q. Okay.
A. -- a mental worry.
Q. So did you -- were you interviewed by the State Police shortly after this event? A. I don't recall exactly who it was. I walked down -- so $I$ went home.

Later on, when $I$ heard that the gentleman had died, I went outside, because there were still lots of people there and I asked, Should I speak to somebody? I saw what happened.

And then $I$ did give a statement to a gentleman, who $I$ have seen since, but $I$ can't remember his name.
Q. Okay. And did -- did he tell you he was a police officer --
A. Yes.
Q. $\quad-\quad$ with some agency?
A. Yes.
Q. And $I$ have here a report that he drafted after he met with you, and $I^{\prime} d$ like to draw your attention to a sentence that he put in here and see if that refreshes your recollection, if $I$ may.
A. Um-hum.
Q. You said -- he says, Newman then observed a police officer fall on his back while trying to create dustance between himself and Reilly.

Does that refresh your recollection of ever saying that?
A. No. To be clear, I didn't say that.

I was asked, Did $I$ see the police officer fall; and $I$ said, No, $I$ didn't see that. Q. okay. Did you see -- you said you found out that Mr. Reilly was deceased later on.

Did you actually see him being shot?
A. I don't think so.
Q. Okay. And did you see him fall down after he was shot?
A. He was already in a down position, so I didn't see any falling, per se.

MR. MCDONALD: Thank you.
That's all I have.

EXAMINATION

BY MR. HEINEMAN:
Q. Just a clarification.

If the police report says that you saw -you said you saw the officer fall on his back, that's wrong?
A. Correct.
Q. You have a memory - -
A. Because I didn't --
Q. -- of what you saw that day --
A. I didn't --
Q. -- and you never saw the police officer fall on his back?
A. No.
Q. Thank you.
A. No.

THE COURT: Anything on that?
MR. VAN EPPS: Just a second, Judge.

Nothing further.

THE COURT: Thank you, ma'am.
(Witness excused.)
(Inaudible discussion.)

MR. VAN EPPS: Thomas Wetmore.

THE COURT: And if we need to suspend at three and -- that's fine.

MR. VAN EPPS: Yeah, (inaudible).

We'll deal with the (inaudible)
the -- (inaudible).

THE COURT OFFICER: Sir, if you just stop right there and face the clerk and raise your right hand, please.

THE CLERK: Sir - -

THE COURT: You don't have to raise your right hand. You're good.

THE CLERK: Do you solemnly swear or
affirm the testimony you will provide the court today will be the truth so help you God?

THE WITNESS: Yes.
THOMAS WETMORE, SWORN
THE COURT OFFICER: Right this way, please.

I'm just going to ask you to be careful.
THE COURT: And, Mr. Wetmore, before we get started, $I$ just want to let you know a couple of things.

The proceeding that we're doing here is a closed proceeding.

It's a pravate, basically, investigatory proceeding until at some point it's going to be a -- a report that's generated by me following the inquest.

I can't order you not to talk about what your testimony is, but I'd ask that if you could, to refrain from discussing what you testified to, all right?

But $I$ can't order you to do that, all right.

EXAMINATION

BY MS. GEMMILL:
Q. Good afternoon, sir.
A. Hello.
Q. Can you tell us your first and last name and spell them both for the court?
A. Thomas Wetmore, T-H-O-M-A-S, W-E-T-M-O-R-E.
Q. How old are you as you sit here today, sir?
A. Thirty-five.
Q. Can you tell us your date of birth?
A. December 6th, '87.
Q. Where do you live currently?
A. 23 Exeter Street in Arlington, Massachusetts.
Q. How long have you lived at that address?
A. About three years, three and a half years.
Q. Do you regularly travel through the Town of Lexington for, you know, various things in your life?
A. Very frequently.
Q. What brings you into Lexington?
A. I'm usually riding my bike through to get to quiet roads.
Q. Are you -- would you describe yourself as an avid cyclist?
A. Yeah, I do about 250 to 300 miles a week when the weather permits.
Q. Are you -- did you say 250 to 300 miles a week?
A. (No audible response.)
Q. Sorry, you need to say yes or no.
A. Yes.
Q. Yes?
A. Yes.
Q. Sir, do you currently work?
A. Yes, I do.
Q. What do you do for work?
A. I am in account management. I work for a healthcare IT firm.
Q. Okay. I'm going to turn your attention now to February 12 th of 2022 .

Did your plans on that particular day take you into Lexington?
A. Yes. I was doing a cycling route going through Lexington.
Q. Okay. And, I apologize, can you maybe scoot a little closer to your microphone?

THE COURT: And just so it's clear, I can hear him fine.

MS. GEMMILL: Okay. I'm just having a little bit of trouble.

THE COURT: Sure.
MS. GEMMILL: I apologize.
BY MS. GEMMILL:
Q. So you were on a cycling route.

Where were you traveling from. Like, what was your path that day?
A. So $I$ started in Arlington, and $I$ was going, generally speaking, northwest. Q. And obviously when we're talking about a bike.

Are we talking about, like, a two-wheel bicycle, not a motorcycle, correct?
A. Yes, two-wheel, pedal bicycle.

THE COURT: Hopefully that's not how the shoulder injury happened.

THE WITNESS: It is.
THE COURT: I figured it was.
BY MS. GEMMILI:
Q. When you're on a bike ride, when you're on that bike ride that day, were you cycling alone or did you have a (inaudible) of people you were out with?
A. I was by myself.
Q. Is there any kind of equipment that you were using on that day to record your cycling trip, your ride?
A. Yes.

I have a Garmin GPS unit that $I$ record
pretty much all of my rides on.
Q. Does that connect to some kind of application that helps you analyze and look at your data later on?
A. So that data gets uploaded to a variety of services.

The most common one, or most popular one, is called Strava, so the route that $I$ went on that day is readily accessible on the Internet. Q. Okay. And that's Strava, $S-T-R-A-V-A$, correct?
A. That's correct.
Q. Okay. And did you, in fact, have your route from that day saved on Strava?
A. Yes.
Q. So $I^{\prime} m$ going to turn your attention now to sort of midday.

Were you traveling into Lexington a little bit before 1:00 in the afternoon?
A. Yes.
Q. Okay. Can you describe to us what path you would take through Lexington on that day?
A. So that day $I$ was heading away from Lexington Centre, on, $I$ believe it's Hancock Street, going towards -- going towards the rotary.

Before that, I was going to head towards, I believe, Page Road and Grove to get out further from more densely populated areas.
Q. Is that a route you've taken before?
A. Very frequently.
Q. Okay. So as you're traveling up Hancock Street towards that rotary, did something catch your attention?
A. As I entered the rotary, I noticed several police, police cars, and, yeah, I stopped because the road was -- was blocked off.
Q. Do you recall about where you came to a stop?
A. Yes, just about the -- if you're looking at the rotary as a -- as a clock, I'd guess it's, like, four or five o'clock.
Q. Okay. And as part of this investigation, did you have a chance to speak with police officers on multiple occasions?
A. I did not speak with them, I would -- I heard the police officers speaking and yelling.
Q. I apologize, I don't mean on that day.

After this incident, did you have a chance to talk to officers and tell them what you'd seen?
A. Yes. I called the Lexington police and
received a phone call from a detective and I gave my account of -- of events.
Q. Okay. And later on, were you able to provide your Strava data from that day to investigators? A. Yes.

I provided the raw doc FIT file, as well as a link to the ride itself.
Q. Okay. Mr. Wetmore, I'm going to show you a map and ask you if you recognize this.

Sir, do you recognize what's depicted in this -- this chart?
A. Yes.

This is the part of the ride where I mentioned $I$ would -- arrived at the rotary when $I$ saw the -- the police action.
Q. Okay. And is this sheet taken from your Strava data on that day, including the map of you going through the rotary and then speeds associated with that?
A. Yes, exactly.

And this -- actually, yes, I don't need to expound and answer your question. Yes.
Q. And can you explain to us, are there different -- is there a line that goes through that map that represents something significant to
you?
A. Yes.

So the reason there's a straight line that goes not over roads is because the Garmin was paused at the end of the red line and didn't begin recording again until the end -- the red line begins again.

The blue line is what I've highlighted to -- to show this period of tame, this 47 seconds, and my Garmin was not recording data due to being auto paused at that point in time.
Q. Okay. So the red line on the right side of this map shows your path on your bike up to the rotary, correct?
A. Correct.
Q. And then you come to a stop at that sort of apex point, correct?
A. Yup, where the blue and red meet on the right-hand side of the map, correct.
Q. And then on the left-hand side of this map where the red line starts again, is that where your -- you started up your GPS again?
A. Exactly, yes.
Q. Okay. And so you had to cross that rotary, but you weren't recording and that's reflected in
that blue line there?
A. Exactly, yes.
Q. Okay. And you were able to actually measure how much time passed from your first pause until you started again; is that correct?
A. Yes, and that's evident on the sheet. And it's 47 seconds.
Q. Forty-seven seconds.

Does that reflect the amount of time you stayed stopped in the rotary on that day? A. Yes, with the only caveat that the auto pause takes a second or two to start, and then because of the difference between the start point and end point, there's probably a few seconds, but, yes, that's very close to the amount of time $I$ was stopped.
Q. Okay.

MS. GEMMILL: I'd ask that this be introduced as our next exhibit, please.

THE CLERK: No. 8.

THE COURT: Thanks.
(Exhibit No. 8, Bike Route, received into evidence.)

BY MS. GEMMILL:
Q. So, Mr. Wetmore, I'm just going to have you
mark on Exhibit 8 for us with this marker here.
If you can just put your initials by that little corner where you first came to a stop - A. Yup.
Q. -- in the rotary for us.

That's (inaudible)?
A. No, that's okay.
Q. Okay. And then if you want to just put a number two next to the part where you started up again. okay. Thank you.

Okay. So you come into the rotary on Hancock Street, you come to a stop.

Can you describe for us what you could see when you first came to a stop at that moment? A. There were police, police cars, and the thing that stuck out most was there were police with their guns drawn on an individual in front of me. Q. Okay. How many police officers could you see?
A. With -- with weapons out $I$ saw three, but there was another one in the rotary, and I assume others, but $I$ can say four at least.
Q. How many -- could you see what kinds of weapons those three officers had out?
A. My -- my recollection, which it's been some
time, is that one had a -- what looked to be a shotgun.

There was another with more, $I$ believe an assault-style weapon, and another, $I$ belıeve, had a pistol.
Q. Okay. Did you notice anything about the color of the gun that looked like a shotgun to you?
A. Black.
Q. Black?
A. Yeah.
Q. Did you notice the color of the gun that looked like a handgun?
A. I believe that was also black.
Q. And how about the gun that looked more like an assault-style rifle, what color was that?
A. I believe that was also black.
Q. Okay. Do you recall seeing any other different colors on any of those weapons besides black?
A. I do not.
Q. Okay. You also mentioned that there was --

THE COURT: Counsel, can $I$ just take a
look at that exhibit while we're --

MS. GEMMILL: Yes, of course.

THE COURT: -- (inaudible) questions? Thanks.

MS. GEMMIIL: $I^{\prime} m$ handing the court Exhibıt 8 .

THE COURT: Thank you.

BY MS. GEMMILL:
Q. So how far -- you mentioned that there was also a man in the road.
A. Yes.
Q. Is it fair to say that man didn't appear to be a police officer, correct?
A. He was definitely not a police officer.

The police were yelling at him, many
things that he -- yeah.
Q. Where was he positioned when you first noticed him?
A. He was -- I believe he was -- if I could just see a map of the rotary, but he was in between two of the roads.

So if you look at where $I$ was stopped on the rotary in that direction is exactly and basically the way $I$ was going. He was -- at that moment in time.
Q. And, sir, I'm going to show you, actually, a map of that rotary.
A. Um-hum.
Q. (Inaudıble) map.

And I'm going to give you back this marker here.

Do you see on the map $I$ just handed you the area that you came to a stop on your bicycle? A. Yes. I came to a stop about here.
Q. Okay. Do you want to just put your initials next to the spot where you indicated you came to a stop?

Okay. And can you draw a little -- little dots for us, like, one, two, and three where you could see those police officers.
A. I think they were --
Q. Okay. And you've written, like, a little one, two, three in that area?
A. Yup. I have horrible handwritang.
Q. That's okay.
(Inaudible.)
A. I just - I can't take this off.
Q. No, no, no, it's okay.
A. I'm not -- as long as $I$ don't move my shoulder in a weird way, I'm not in pain, so... Q. We want to make sure you don't get injured here in our court.
A. Yeah.
Q. And then if you want to just draw a circle for us where you could see the man.

Okay. Thank you.
MS. GEMMILL: I'd ask that this be entered as the next exhibit.

THE COURT: Exhibit 9.
(Exhibit No. 9, Map, received into evidence.)

BY MS. GEMMILL:
Q. So, sir, just showing you Exhibit 9 again that you were just looking at.
A. Yeah.
Q. There we go.

Did you see the man moving any closer to those police officers or the police officers moving closer to him while you were watching? A. No.

The man was on the ground and he was -from the brief period $I$ was stopped, he was trying to get up.
Q. Okay. Can you describe what he was doing with his body?

Like, what did you see?
A. I saw that he was -- let's pretend I'm on the
ground.
He was essentially leaning back, like, I don't know, $I$ guess $I$ need to describe it for - he was trying to get up whıle, like, slightly leaning onto his right side.
Q. Okay. And you could have had your feet extended out, right?
A. Yeah, because his -- his -- he was -- I mean, yeah.

He was lying on the -- he had been on the ground and he was trying to get up.

His feet were -- I mean, yeah, I don't know how to describe it. Q. Okay.

So what you were doing with your body, you had extended your legs out 1 n front of you, and he had -- did he have --
A. Yeah --
Q. -- his legs out in front of him?
A. Not straight like a plank.

I mean, he -- my recollection, he was just kind of on his side, maybe bent like this is a more accurate description.
Q. Okay.
A. But he was on his side trying to get up.
Q. And you're kind of tilting your knees a lıttle bit, kind of going onto your right side a little bit?
A. Yeah. That's my recollection, is that he was tilted, kind of towards me.

I could see more of his torso than $I$ could his back.
Q. Could you see anything about this man's hands?
A. No.
Q. Could you see how he was trying to lift himself up?
A. He was trying to push himself up, I believe, with one of his arms.
Q. Okay. But you couldn't see what his hands were doing?
A. I did not notice what his hands were dolng.
Q. Did you notice anything about his physical appearance that was significant to you?
A. He looked -- he looked very unhappy, like --
Q. Describe to us what makes you say that.
A. Yeah.

I guess it's just a frustrated body
language; and maybe that's me reading into it, having heard the police officers shouting orders
and him not doing what -- they were telling him to stay on the ground and he was, in my view, trying to get up.
(Inaudible discussion.)
MS. GEMMILL: Your Honor, mindful of the time --

THE COURT: Yes.

MS. GEMMILL: -- we might have to take a quick break from Mr. Wetmore's testimony.

THE COURT: So, Mr. Wetmore, we have somebody that's coming on by video conference --

THE WITNESS: Okay.

THE COURT: -- in about three minutes. Can $I$ just ask you to step outside, and we will get back to you in probably about 15,20 minutes?

THE WITNESS: Okay.
MS. GEMMILL: And $I$ will take Exhibit 9 back from you, sir, and return it to Mr. (inaudible).

Here you are.
(Pause.)

THE COURT: Mr. Van Epps, do we have to switch off of the ELMO or is that -- does it need to go with different --

MR. VAN EPPS: I'm going to try to get
the picture on here.
THE COURT: oh, okay.
MR. VAN EPPS: But --

THE COURT: Perfect.

MR. VAN EPPS: First, $I^{\prime} m$ going to try to get the (inaudible).
(Pause.)

MR. VAN EPPS: Sorry, your Honor. I just need a minute.

THE COURT: Okay.
(Pause.)
THE COURT: I can't put my laptop -- the laptop -- not yet. There's no -- Ethernet (inaudible) Wi-Fi. There's no Ethernet.

I think it's plugged into -- I think the blue is connected to the --

THE CLERK: To there nowadays, yeah.
THE COURT: We should have two. We should have one that's black.

THE CLERK: Yeah.
THE COURT: And the other one - -

THE CLERK: The connector that $I$ have, the purple ones are running to the FTR.

THE COURT: Oh, okay.
THE CLERK: I've got --

THE COURT: What's under here?
MS. GEMMILL: We have extra Ethernet cables in case there's a possibility of -THE COURT: No, all the Jacks are taken. MS. GEMMILL: Oh.

THE COURT: So those are two reasons for me asking.

One I was going to bring my laptop out, but the other one is we need to set you guys up.

THE CLERK: Yeah, this courtroom isn't --
THE COURT: And not -- just the whole building.

THE CLERK: Courtroom 3 (inaudible) just had a (inaudible).

THE COURT: You guys did -- you did have them?

THE CLERK: Yeah. Courtroom 1 and 33 (inaudible) as of the beginning of this week on Monday.

THE COURT: Oh, good.
THE CLERK: This courtroom (inaudible).
THE COURT: I doubt they will.
THE CLERK: This is what our --
(inaudible).
THE COURT: Yeah, I just find you don't
really need it.
I'm actually just going to step off for a minute and grab my water.

THE COURT OFFICER: Court.
All rise.
Court will be in a brief recess. You may
be seated.
(3:03 p.m. court in recess.)
(3:04 p.m. court resumes.)
THE COURT OFFICER: You may be seated.
THE COURT: Give them a break because
these benches are rough.
UNIDENTIFIED SPEAKER: I know.
THE CLERK: Judge, you want me to come
(inaudible)?
THE COURT: Might as well. Might as well do that.

THE CLERK: I'm (inaudible) set up.
(Pause.)
(Inaudible discussion.)
(3:05 p.m. court in recess.)
(3:16 p.m. court resumes.)
THE COURT OFFICER: You may be seated. Court is 1 n session.

THE COURT: Can he see us okay?

MR. VAN EPPS: I believe Mr. Mattoon can see us and hear us.

THE COURT: All right.
Is that correct, Mr. Mattoon, you can
hear us okay?
MR. MATTOON: Yeah, I think people who are a little farther away, it might be a little muffled, so if $I$ ask --

THE COURT: The main thing is, yeah, the microphone.

MS. GEMMILL: Right.
MR. MATTOON: Yeah.
MS. GEMMILL: I don't know if he can see the (inaudible).

MR. VAN EPPS: Judge, what $I$ was going to suggest is because of -- I wanted you to be able to see the screen, and the cameras's looking at you, I --

THE COURT: Yup.
MR. VAN EPPS: -- might ask ADA Gemmill to maybe stand by the witness chair and use that microphone.

THE COURT: All right. So let me ask this.

Is this through FTR? Are we connected --
is he connected through FTR?
THE CLERK: So our -- that -- yes, your Honor.

THE COURT: Okay.
THE CLERK: Our FTR telephone is --
THE COURT: Is dialed in to him?
THE CLERK: -- dialed --
THE COURT: Perfect. Okay. Then he should be able to hear us through the microphones, et cetera, as opposed to us having to use the laptop.

THE CLERK: Correct, your Honor.
THE COURT: Okay.
THE CLERK: As long as we speak into --
towards the mlcrophones --
THE COURT: Right.
THE CLERK: -- on the (inaudible), we should be all set.

MS. GEMMILL: And, your Honor, do you mind if $I$ sit at the blue chair --

THE COURT: That's totally fine.
MS. GEMMILL: I'm hoping he can see me.
THE COURT: That's fine.
MS. GEMMILL: Thank you.
Okay. I'm not sure.

## SCOTT MATTOON

## EXAMINATION

BY MS. GEMMILL:
Q. Can you hear me okay, Mr. Mattoon?
A. Yes, I can.
Q. Okay. Good afternoon, sir.

Can you please tell us your first and last name and spell them both.
A. Scott Mattoon. Scott is S-C-O-T-T. Mattoon is $\mathrm{M}-\mathrm{A}-\mathrm{T}-\mathrm{T}-\mathrm{O}-\mathrm{O}-\mathrm{N}$.

THE CLERK: And, your Honor, I'm sorry, I'm just going to swear him in very briefly.

THE COURT: Yes.
THE CLERK: Mr. Mattoon, do you solemnly swear or affirm that the testimony you will provide the Court today will be the truth so help you God?

THE WITNESS: I do.
SCOTT MATTOON, SWORN
THE COURT: Go ahead.
MS. GEMMILL: Thank you.
BY MS. GEMMILL:
Q. Sir, can you tell us how old you are?
A. Fifty-three.
Q. What is your date of birth?
A. May 12, 1969 .
Q. In February of 2022 , where were you living?
A. Seven Royal Circle in Lexington.
Q. Where do you live now?
A. I now live in Oakland, California.
Q. All right. And are you Zooming with us from Oakland, California, today?
A. Correct.
Q. Okay. Sir, are you employed?
A. I am.
Q. What do you do for work?
A. I'm an education administrator.
Q. Okay. I'm going to turn your attention to February 12 th of 2022 .

Were you in Lexington on that day?
A. I was.
Q. All right. And did your plans on that particular Saturday take you towards the area of the rotary in the $H$ ancock Street area in Lexington?
A. Yes. I was going for a distance run.
Q. A distance run?
A. Yup.
Q. When you were going for a run, were you by yourself, or were you running with anybody else?
A. By myself.
Q. Okay. Do you regularly -- at that time, were you regularly running through that rotary area?
A. I -- I had run through that rotary area for about a seven-year period but at varying times, depending on the day.
Q. Okay. Would you say you were familiar with the roads and the homes in that area?
A. Yes, I am.
Q. Okay. So around midday on that day, were you running through the area of the Hancock Street rotary?
A. I was.
Q. Did something catch your attention as you were headed through that area?
A. Yes. As $I$ crossed through the rotary and landed on -- on the sidewalk, I heard a man from the second-floor window kind of yelling frantically about needing help because someone was going to kill him.
Q. Now, did you hear this man before you saw him?
A. I heard him before $I$ saw him.
Q. Okay. About how far away from the house where this man was yelling from were you at the
time you first heard that voice?
A. I was at the -- on the sidewalk where it met the driveway to the house, so $I$ would -- I would guess $I$ was about -- I want to say maybe 50 feet from that second-floor window.
Q. Now, was that five, zero or one, flve?
A. I'm sorry, five zero.
Q. Okay.
A. That's just a best guess.
Q. The house at that address, was that

98 Hancock Street?
A. That was my understanding, yes.
Q. Okay. So you hear the voice.

What do you do when you hear that voice calling?
A. I ask -- when it first caught my attention, I asked what was wrong; and he repeated that he was trying to kill me, someone's trying to kill me.

I asked him to repeat what he was saying, just to make sure $I$ heard what $I$ thought $I$ heard. Q. Were you able to look to see where this man was yelling from?
A. Yes.

At that point $I$ could -- I could -- I made face contact with the person.
Q. Okay. And where was that person located? A. In the second floor -- in a second-floor window, I believe.

It was one of those windows that -- well, let's see. No, it was -- I believe it was the second-floor window on the kind of right side of the house as you're looking at the house.
Q. Can you describe what that man looked like? A. Yes.

So, I mean, from a distance, he had dark hair. He was wearing a hoodie, but $I$ could see kind of mid-length dark hair up front, and some, like, light brown skin.

I -- I asked him, when I had made a 911 call, to describe himself, because that's what I was being asked to do.

And then this person described himself as his being of, as he put it, he said he was of Chinese -- he was Chinese, and 27 years old. Q. Okay.
A. So...
Q. You mentioned calling 911.

Did you call 911 n response to this man yelling for help?
A. I did, yes.
Q. Okay. Was that on your cell phone?
A. Yes.
Q. Did you actually talk to a 911 operator that day
A. I did.
Q. -- or to a dispatcher? Okay.
A. Yes.
Q. All right. And did you tell 911 what you observed?
A. I did.
Q. Okay.
A. I said simply $I$ heard a man who was -- who seemed in distress, and was -- who was yelling frantically that, Please help, please help, someone was trying to kill him.
Q. The time you were interacting with the man in the window, could you see anybody else in the house with him or in the window with him?
A. I could not.
Q. Okay. At that time, did you see anyone else outside of his house, like, in the vicinity of the yard, that kind of thing?
A. I did not see anyone else who I might have thought to be a resident of that house outside of the house.

There was a woman in a car, who did not live there, who also had heard this man's voice who had pulled into the driveway.

That was the only other person that $I$ saw on the property at that moment.
Q. Did you stay to wait for the police?
A. I did.
Q. Okay. Did you see anyone else come out of the house while you were waiting for police? A. While $I$ was waiting for police, yes.

A white male came out of the house and walked down the driveway toward the car, that the woman who had been parked in -- the woman $I$ mentioned previously.

And the person approached, was approaching that car slowly, and making a -- a gesture, putting his finger up to his mouth, as if to say, shush or be, you know, quiet or be calm, but the -- the woman started backing out and then was driving away.
Q. Okay. Did you talk to that woman at all before she left the scene?
A. Before she left the scene?

No, I did not have any more conversation with her.
Q. Okay. At some point did you talk to her about how you had called the police?
A. Yes.

So I -- I had suggested that she -- I think she asked me, you know, if $I$ had a sense of what was going on.

But she had clearly sensed that something was not -- not quite right or not seeming right.

And $I$ suggested that she stay and at -- at that point she was parked in a driveway; and I suggested she stay, because she was in a car and I did not have a car.

And at that moment, my son, who's in college in North Carolina, happened to call me at the time, and so $I$ took that call and at that point $I$ kind of walked down the sidewalk a bit away from the -- the drıveway, but that was the extent of the conversation $I$ had with the woman in the car.
Q. Okay. Could you -- did you notice anything else about that white male when he was approaching the woman in the car, making a shushing sound?
A. He was wearing, I believe, a white T-shirt, and maybe some, like, light gray shorts,
something along those lines, just very casual dress --
Q. Okay.
A. -- dark hair.

And it was when -- when $I$ saw him walking toward the car with the woman in it and making that shushing gesture, he was walking slowly, but it -- it just seemed -- it seemed unclear or a bit confusing what his intention was; and not meaning to assume anything bad or good about that, just -- it just seemed a little -- it didn't seem like -- it didn't seem like a -- kind of a usual interaction that he was trying to make with the woman.
Q. Did you notıce whether he was holding anything at that point in his hands?
A. I did -- yeah, I did not notice if he was holding anything at that point.

He -- he was doing the shushing gesture with one hand.

I believe the other hand was, like, (indiscernible) at his side or behind his back, but $I$ did not -- $I$ can't say that $I$-- I could not see if there was anything in his hand.
Q. Okay. As the woman leaves, does this man
have any interaction with you at that point? A. Yes.

Once the woman leaves, he then sees me a bit down the sidewalk from the driveway and I'm on the phone with my son at that point.

And then he started to head toward me, and when $I$ sensed that, I walked -- I turned and walked up the sidewalk up the circle a little ways; and then he stopped and went back toward the house, and $I$ just stayed in my new position there.
Q. Could you see where he went once he went back towards the house?
A. Back down the driveway and kind of to the -- that side of the house that the driveway -- you know, the driveway was on the right side of the house as you were facing the house, and then he was behind trees and I couldn't really see much more than that.
Q. All right. So you lost sight of him at that point?
A. I did.
Q. Did police officers arrive in response to your 911 call?
A. Yes.
Q. Did you --
A. One officer arrived -- I'm sorry.
Q. No.

So did -- how many officers did you see arrive at first?
A. At first was one officer --
Q. Okay.
A. -- who parked the car near the entrance to Diamond Middle School, on that part of the rotary, and then walked over, crossed over Hancock Street to the property.

And -- yeah, that was -- that was the first officer who came.
Q. Okay. Did you see where that first officer went after crossing onto the property?
A. Down the driveway, but then, again, from where $I$ was, $I$ lost sight after the officer went behind the trees.

I -- it -- there was a sense that maybe it was kind of to the side of the house or behind the house, similar to the -- the man $I$ was describing before.
Q. Did you see that officer come back out from the property pretty quickly after that?
A. I don't know if it was quickly, but it wasn't
long.
And that officer did come back to the car and got -- if $I^{\prime} m$ recalling correctly, got a firearm that had bright orange kind of pieces to it.

It sort of had the look of a gun that did not have live ammunition, and $I$ just maybe wonder if that was, like, a rubber bullet type of gun or something like that.
Q. Okay. Was the whole gun orange or just part of it?
A. Just part of it.
Q. Okay. And was it, like, a long gun, like a rifle, or was it smaller, like a handgun?
A. Yeah, rifle -- more, like, rifle-style.
Q. Okay. Where did he go once he got that -that longer -- that gun out of the car?
A. Then he headed back down the driveway to the property to the same area, I presume, the area that I couldn't see.

At that point, also, you know, a couple of other officers had arrived and kind of joined back there as well.
Q. All right. You saw the other officers go back towards the house as well?
A. Yes.
Q. Could you see, was it -- how many officers was that, that second bunch of officers?
A. So two arrived after the first one, so three total.
Q. Okay. Could you see whether the two new officers were carrying any kind of weapon?
A. I believe that they -- I believe one was carrying a simılar rifle style as the first officer I described.
Q. Okay. Could you hear anything once the officers were back by the house?
A. Yes.

I mean, not at first, but at some point voices got louder, and just here and there, it was a bit louder for a bit and then quiet for a bit, and then louder again and some commotion and then some quiet.

And so $1 t--I$ couldn't make out words, but the occasional word or two just left me with an impression that they were trying to engage a man to come with them.

That's the best sense that $I$ had.
Q. You said you could hear voices.

Was it more than one person whose voice
you could make out?
A. Yeah. It felt like it was -- it was voices between the officer and the man. Q. Okay.
A. In other words, it sounded like -- there was no, like, clear pattern to it.

There was a man, the man was getting louder first, and then the officers were trying to respond to that.

And then after some quiet, the officers would try to say something again and then the man's voice would come.

That was the best sense that I had. I really couldn't make out the details of what was being said.
Q. Did you tell anything about the tone of voice of the man when you could hear his voice?
A. It sounded -- it sounded, I don't know, the word that jumps to mind is kind of defensive.
Q. Okay.
A. And a sense of -- a sense of concern about being trapped.
Q. Okay. So some tones of agitation?
A. Yes, yes. That would be fair to say, agitation.
Q. Could you hear any of the words that the man was saying at that point?
A. I could not.
Q. All right. So you're -- you're listening to this.

What do you see happen next?
A. Then after this goes on for a bit, all of a sudden the man is running down his driveway into the street of the rotary and then across the kind of grassy tree area of the rotary and onto the other side on the -- the other side of that center part of the rotary in the road and on that -- while he was running over there, he -- he was running at a -- kind of a sprint, and had tripped maybe two or three times on his way and then the -- the three officers were kind of following suit themselves.
Q. The man that you saw running, did you recognize him from earlier that afternoon?
A. It was the same man.
Q. Okay. This is the same man that was, you know, had the shushing sign who had come out of the house?
A. Correct.
Q. Okay. Were the officers running in pursuit
of him, or walking, or how were they moving?
A. At first they were jogging -- I would say more like jogging after him.

And when it was -- $I$ think when it was clear that he was tripping $1 n$ his sprint, the man, they were kind of a mix of jogging and walking to just kind of keep up.
Q. Could you hear any of those officers saying anything while they were pursuing this man? A. I don't recall specific words being said.

At that point it might have been -- here, I'm a little fuzzy, but $I$ feel like there was a sense of, you know, please, to hold on, something along those lines.
Q. Okay. Did you hear any sounds that sounded like something besides the voices?
A. Well, yeah.

So after -- after the man had tripped into
the road and had -- had fallen onto his back and he tried to get up, the -- that was the first round of what $I$ believe were kind of rubber bullets, and -- to just try to -- to have the man kind of dismissed, and at the same -- and after that round of bullets, and $1 t$ was just a quick round, and then the officers said, Dróp the
knife, very -- they were -- they said it very clearly, loudly, and -- and they repeated it a second time, and then they paused --
Q. Okay.
A. -- to see -- between bullets if what they said would effect the change.
Q. Okay, So while this man is running before he has fallen to the ground, did you hear any of those shot-like sounds before he falls?
A. Before he fell to the ground, um, I believe that -- $I$ believe that, yes, that the round that was fired was either before he fell to the ground or - no, no, it was -- yes, as he got to the other side, that's when the round of bullets happened and kind of had -- and sort of had the man on the ground.
Q. Okay. Could you hear the man saying anything while he was running?
A. While he was running. I don't recall anything specıfic. There might have been a - kind of a noise, but I'm a little fuzzy on that. Q. Okay. So the man runs, at some point he falls. About where in the rotary is he once he is on the ground?
A. So he is roughly -- mean, where in the
rotary.

So he's in the road of the rotary, and it's probably -- like, it's coming out of 98 Hancock, that driveway, if that just -- if we call that twelve o'clock, I would say the man was at about five o'clock at that place in the rotary in the road.
Q. Okay. You heard the officer saying, Drop the knife.

Was it more than one officer who was saying, Drop the knife, or just one particular person?
A. It sounded like two of the officers were saying that.
Q. Okay. Could you see the man on the ground holding anything in his hands at that time? A. Yes. At that -- I could see him holding a knife.
Q. All right. Prior to him being down on the ground, had you seen that knife in his hands before, like while he was running from behind the house?
A. When he was running, it was hard for me to tell if he had had that in his hand while running.

But right when he was on the ground, it was very clear because it was in his right hand. Q. Okay.
A. So from where $I$ was positioned, him running in front of me, if he had it in his right hand, I wouldn't have had great vision on that; but when he was on the ground and on his back, his right hand was facing me and $I$ saw that pretty immediately after he was on the ground, so -- in other words, it didn't -- I didn't have a sense if there was something that he had pulled out (inaudible) after that he was on the ground.
Q. Can you describe what you noticed about that knife?
A. Yeah. It was -- I would say it was a big-bladed knife.

It (inaudible) was a thick blade. It
looked like it was maybe six- to nine-ınches long, and a -- and a -- and fairly wide.
Q. Okay. How was he holding it while he was down on the ground after falling?
A. So he had -- his right hand was kind of around the handle.
Q. Like, kind of gripping the handle? You're showing us your hand.
A. Yeah.

So it's -- kind of gripping the handle with the blade facing down from his pinky, if that makes sense.
Q. Okay. Did you have any sense of how hard he was holding on to that knife?

You looked like you were kind of clenching your fist.
A. Yeah. He was -- he had a firm hold on it.
Q. Okay. Once he was down on the ground --
A. (Inaudible.)
Q. -- where did the police officers who were chasing him, where did they go?
A. Once he was down on the ground, they kind of held position to see what he would do.
Q. Okay. Where were they in relationship to him? Like, are they in front of him, to the side of him, behind hım?
A. At this point, you know, they were in -- in the rotary in the road also, more like at six o'clock from the Hancock driveway position being noon.

And they were at this point, $I$ would say, facing the man, because the man had fallen on his back and hıs -- his feet were pointing toward
where the three officers had lined up.
Q. Okay. Could you hear anybody talking once the man was on the ground?

You said you heard, Drop the knife.
Could you hear anything else?
A. Drop the knife was -- that's what I heard, and they -- that's what they -- that's what they were repeating, was, Drop the knife; drop the knife.
Q. Did the --
A. There wasn't more -- there wasn't more kind of, like, dialogue around that or other types of phrases to try to encourage the man to stop what he was doing.
Q. Okay. That's what you were hearing, you were hearing, Drop the knife; drop the knife?
A. Yes.
Q. Could you hear the man saying something back to the officers?
A. Yes.
Q. And what do you remember him saying?
A. A couple things that $I$ remember were, Leave me alone -- and, forgive the language, but, I'm fucking going to kill you.
Q. Okay. While he is on the ground, did you
notice the man trying to move in any way; and, if so, can you describe what you saw?
A. Yeah. It felt like he was -- he was on his back and kind of moving backwards, a little bit like a crab, right, kind of between his shoulder -- his elbows and his -- his feet and legs was just kind of like shuffling back.
Q. Okay. Did he --
A. Away from the officers.
Q. Did you ever see him moving in another direction besides backwards?
A. Yes.

So at one point, you know, when they -there was another -- let's see.

At one point the man did get up and started walking assertively toward the officers -- it felt like kind of a march for them -- and at that point had a knife kind of up here, $I$ don't know if you can see me, but -Q. You have --
A. -- the knife was positioned up here as he did that kind of assertive march-like walk towards them, and that was kind of a brisker -- had a brisker feel to it.
Q. You had had your right arm lifted up, you had
your -- you sort of had your fist, like, your hand's raised.

Can you tell us, is that how the man was holding -- holding a knife in that hand?
A. Yeah. So I don't know if you can see, this is a pen.
Q. Yeah.
A. And if this pen were the knife, this is how he was holding it and as he was walking, it was -- it was in this position.

THE COURT: Just for the record, he's describing basically the knife protruding down, sort of the hilt -- or the top of the hilt, would be by his thumb, and the blade would be by the bottom or the palm -- by the pinky side of his hand.

THE WITNESS: Correct. BY MS. GEMMILL: Q. So while he was walking like that, does that mean the blade was polnted towards the police officers or away from the police officers?
A. Toward the police officers.
Q. Did you see whether there was anything that this man was reacting to that made him stand up?

Like, how did it come to be that he was
standing?
A. I wasn't entirely sure there was -- there was a bit of -- there was a bit of commotion.

I -- I didn't have a great vantage point to it, but $I$ had a feeling that one of the officers, kind of standing in the back of the three of them, might have, like, tripped and -and kind of was partially on the ground, and -but $I$ don't know if that's what the man was reacting to.
Q. Did you see the officer partially on the ground?

Like, why did you say that you had a feeling about it?
A. Well, I didn't have a great vantage point. I just sensed some different kind of motion that was happening with that officer compared to their standing position of three, walking slowly, maintaining a position, that was just a little difference.

And -- and through the -- trying to look through the center of the rotary, it looked like that officer got shorter for some reason.

I don't know if it was because the officer was bending over or had tripped or something, but
that was just -- that was the first change in the position of any of the officers in that whole period in the rotary.
Q. Before the man -- was that the only time the man got to his feet that you saw?
A. In that -- yes, in that sequence, that was - that was the time.

I think maybe one other time when he had first sprinted across the rotary and tripped, I think he was kind of in between trying to stand up, but then falling down, then tryang to stand up and run, and $I$ think the first round of rubber bullets hit him when he was down.

But, other than that, when he was on his back in that mode and kind of shuffling backward, that was the first time that he stood up. Q. Okay. About how far away from these three police officers was the man when he first stood up, if you could estimate?
A. My best estimate would be -- I would say it was, like, around three people lengths, so maybe about 15 feet.
Q. Okay.
A. Maybe 15 to 20 feet, somewhere in there at most.
Q. What happened while the man was -- was walking, or marching, as you described it?
A. Yeah.

So at that point, there was a larger burst of rounds from the -- those two rifles, and, like, noticeably larger, and then - Q. What do you mean "larger?"

Is that, like, a reflection of sound or a number of shots?

Can you explain that?
A. I think a bit of both, you know.

I mean, the first two -- the first round that $I$ heard was just sort of a quick, short burst; and this one was a -- it was longer, but not prolonged.

It was just longer than that -- the previous one, and $I$ think, because it was longer, it just sounded louder, that's my guess, and then after that, that -- then the man fell down. Q. All right. And at that point, did -- did you see whether the man got up again after that last round of shots?
A. No.

When the man fell down that time, he was more motionless and quiet, and that's when one of
the officers, when they sensed that, went over and kneeled down next to him and checked him out, and then very quickly performed CER -- CPR.

And $I$ think an ambulance was called, if it wasn't already there. I'm not sure about that. Q. Did you see what happened to the knife when the man fell down that last time?
A. I don't recall that with certainty.
Q. Okay.
A. It was def -- but it was no longer -- when the man was down in the position that he was in, the knife -- $I$ don't recall exactly if he was still holding the knife, but his hand was in a more kind of prostrate position, but it wasn't in a -- it wasn't in a sort of defensive or attacking kind of position either way.

It was just -- the man was just motionless at that point.
Q. Okay.
A. And so $I$ can't say for sure where the knife was, but.
Q. Do you have a sense of how close the man was to the police officers when you heard that last round of shots?
A. Maybe about -- maybe about 10 feet --
Q. Okay. Was he still--
A. -- is the best guess.
Q. Was he still moving at the time you heard the shots?
A. Yes, yes. He was in -- he was in hıs full kind of marching sort of stride.
Q. You described it as an assertive stride.

Did you have a sense of how quickly he was moving, how quickly he was marching?
A. Faster than a neighborhood walk and slower than a distance run.
Q. Mr. Mattoon, at any point during this incldent while you were observing these events, did you document this in any way with your cell phone?
A. Yeah, I did take one picture.
Q. Okay. Do you remember what you took a picture of, like, what was going on at the time you took a photograph?
A. Yeah.

So that picture was -- that picture was at the moment when the man was on the ground on his back and the offacers were $\quad$ n their formation of three and it was -- but it was before the man had sit up and tried marching toward them.
Q. Okay. Were you able to provide that photograph to the -- to investigators when you were interviewed?
A. I did. I -- I went to the Lexington police office later that day, because on the news that evening they were asking for any witnesses to come -- to come in, so when $I$ spoke with him, that had come up, so $I$ shared it with him then.

MS. GEMMILL: Your Honor, may $I$ have just one moment?

THE COURT: Sure. (Pause.)

BY MS. GEMMILL:
Q. Mr. Mattoon, I'm going to try to show you a photograph.

I'm not sure if it's going to --
A. Okay.
Q. -- it's going to work, but I'll take it over to the camera and see if you can see it and see if you recognize it, okay? Can you see that?
A. Yes. That's it.
Q. Is it the photograph you gave to the police?
A. It is.

MS. GEMMILI: I'd ask that this be marked
as our next exhibit, please.
THE COURT: Exhibit 10.
THE CLERK: Exhibit 10, your Honor.
(Exhibit No. 10, Photograph, received into evidence.)

MS. GEMMILL: Nothing further for
Mr. Mattoon.
the Court: Mr. McDonald, Mr. Heineman. EXAMINATION

BY MR. MCDONALD:
Q. Mr. Mattoon, my name is Alan --

THE COURT: Mr. McDonald, if you can, go over to that so he can see you.

MR. MCDONALD: Okay.
BY MR. MCDONALD:
Q. Mr. Mattoon, my name is Alan McDonald, and I represent the police officers involved in this incident.
A. Um-hum.
Q. Was there any strategy that you observed about when the officers used the bean bag weapons, any pattern that you observed?
A. If there had been a pattern, I would say it was -- it was being used at times when they were trying to persuade the man to -- to stop what he
was doing.
Q. And when you say "stop what he was doing," what was he doing that they were trying to stop? A. Well, in the first round, they were
trying -- my sense is they were trying to stop him from running away from some kind of a confrontation or a conversation about what had been happening at the house and that perhaps the -- perhaps there was a knife involved, but whether a knife was involved or not at that moment was -- I had the sense it was someone that may have been fleeing a scene of questioning, and so they were trying to stop him from doing that.

But then in another round, it was a different situation where there was clearly a knife out and they were trying to persuade the man to drop the knife.
Q. Did you give a statement to the Lexington police at the time you made the visit?
A. I did.
Q. Yeah.
A. I did.
Q. I'd like to read a sentence from that report and ask you if it refreshes your recollection more clearly about the use of the bean bag
weapons.
A. Okay.
Q. Quote, Officers using less-lethal, fired and gave it a chance.

They would hit him with pellet and give it time to work.

When male would be in process of getting up, they would shoot again and direct him to drop the weapon.

Does that refresh your recollection of -- of the testimony that you gave when you were questioned?
A. Yes. Yes.
Q. And does it, to the best of your knowledge, reflect truthfully what you saw at the time?
A. Yes.

MR. MCDONALD: Thank you.
THE COURT: Mr. Heineman, any questıons?
MR. HEINEMAN: Yes, your Honor. EXAMINATION

BY MR. HEINEMAN:
Q. Good afternoon, Mr. Mattoon.

I just have a few questions to follow up on what was asked to you earlier.

I want to start with the knife.
A. $\quad \mathrm{Um}$-hum.
Q. You told us that the knife was six- to nine-inches long; $1 s$ that right?
A. That is a best estimate.
Q. And when you're using that six- to
nine-inches, are you talking about the blade size or the entire length of the knife, including the handle?
A. Just the blade.
Q. All right. So the blade that you saw sticking out from the bottom of this man's hand was six- to nine-inches long; is that right?
A. That was my -- that was my estimate.
Q. And you said it was a thick blade.

Is that, like, a butcher knife, as opposed
to a regular steak knife?
A. Yes, more -- more of like -- more of like a butcher-knife width to it.
Q. So it was a hefty knife, it wasn't just a regular, you know, a steak knife that $I$ would use to cut up a piece of steak?
A. Correct, yeah. Nothing that you would normally find in a kitchen.
Q. Now, you said a couple of times that you didn't have a great vantage point --
A. (Inaudible.)
Q. -- and there really weren't any questions about where you were.

So can you tell us where you were when you were watching this interaction?
A. When $I$ was watching the interaction once the police and the man were in the rotary and engaging in the -- in the pellet rounds?
Q. Yeah, that was a bad question by me --
A. Okay.
Q. Thank you.

Yeah, that was a bad question by me. Thank you for the clarification.

Once the man was on the ground --
A. Yes.
Q. -- the last time he was on the ground before you say you saw him get up, what was your vantage point then?

Where were you?
A. I was at -- I'm actually blanking on the name of the road, but there's a road that is off of the rotary that is exactly across from the road that is the entrance to Diamond Middle School, and $I$ was standing right $1 n$ that -- at the entry of that road.
Q. So the picture that you took and that has been put into evidence you took at an earlier point in time, right?
A. No, I -- when I took that picture, it was pretty -- that was in the location that $I$ just described.
Q. Okay. And did you stay in the location where that picture is taken from during the entire remainder of the interaction between the man and the police officers?
A. Correct.
Q. You say that you saw this man stand up and walk, or, in the DA's word, march towards the police officers.

How many steps did the man take from the time he got up to the time you heard the shots fired?
A. About four, four large steps.
Q. And then the -- the last area $I$ want to ask you about is this idea about the police officer falling down or tripping.

When the Lexington police interviewed you after this, they video recorded that $n$ nerview, rlght?
A. Yes.
Q. And when they were done with that interview, they allowed you an opportunity to review what they had written down, right?
A. That is correct.
Q. And you were able to add some things that you thought might have been missing, right?
A. I believe so.
Q. Am I right that nowhere in that entire statement to the Lexington police did you tell them that you saw this officer trip or fall? A. If there had been any moment where that had come up, $I$ was a bit fuzzy on whether someone had actually tripped or fallen.
Q. Have you since heard press publications about what happened that night and pronouncements by the district attorney's office, press conferences, about what happened?
A. I'd seen -- I think $I$ saw maybe one -- one broadcast of something, but $I$ don't even remember if it was an official press conference or $1 f$ it was just a, like, a report onsite or something. Q. Okay. Is it possible, sir, that this idea of seeing the police officer fall is something you heard about after, but didn't actually see yourself that day?

MS. GEMMILL: Objection.
THE COURT: Just to be clear,
Mr. Heineman, he never said that he saw him fall.
MR. HEINEMAN: Oh, okay.
THE COURT: He said he saw him get shorter and he wasn't sure if he tripped --

MR. HEINEMAN: Thank you.
THE COURT: -- or if he just bent over.
BY MR. HEINEMAN:
Q. So let me ask it that way.

Is this idea of seeing the officer get shorter or change in vision something that you have memory of or something that you're piecing together based on things you heard after the fact?
A. It is possible that I -- I suppose it's possible --

THE COURT: So, Mr. Mattoon, Mr. Mattoon, just keeping in mind that anything is possible --

THE WITNESS: Yeah.
THE COURT: -- just what's your best memory?

THE WITNESS: My best memory is -- is -is fuzzy.

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            I -- I had a sense of something going on
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with one officer who was in the rear and that was it, but $I$ can't really -- $I$ can't stake a claim on, like, what -- what it was or what happened or -- or if it happened.

MR. HEINEMAN: Thank you, Mr. Mattoon.
Thank you, your Honor.
THE COURT: Okay. Mr. Mattoon, can I just ask you a couple of questions?

The vantage point or the road across the rotary that you were on --

THE WITNESS: Yeah.
THE COURT: -- is that the road that
leads to the Mobil station by Bedford Street, or is it the road that leads to Liberty and Ledgelawn, where you were?

THE WITNESS: The latter.
THE COURT: All right.
THE WITNESS: Yeah, the latter is
(inaudible).
THE COURT: So the smaller road that leads to Liberty and Ledgelawn?

THE WITNESS: Yeah.
THE COURT: Okay.
THE WITNESS: Because it's the
neighborhood one.

THE COURT: Yup, okay. So it was Hamilton Road; does that sound familiar?

THE WITNESS: (Inaudible.)
THE COURT: If I said that was Hamilton Road, does that sound familiar?

THE WITNESS: I believe so.
THE COURT: All right. Okay. But lt was definitely the one that leads into that neighborhood behind Hancock and not the one that leads out toward Bedford Street.

THE WITNESS: Yeah. I know for certain that road that you're talking about, it goes out to Mobil and Bedford Street, and it was not that road.

THE COURT: Okay.
THE WITNESS: I was not standing there.
THE COURT: All right. I -- all right.
THE WITNESS: Yeah, it was the one -yeah, it was the one closer to $98 / 95$.

THE COURT: Okay. Thank you very much.
THE WITNESS: Okay.
MS. GEMMILL: Nothing further.
THE COURT: All right. Thank you, sir. (Witness excused.)

MR. VAN EPPS: (Inaudible.)

Your Honor, I would propose to resume -THE COURT: Yes, please.

MR. VAN EPPS: -- Mr. Wetmore.
Judge, if $I$ can just step out for one second.

THE COURT: Sure.
MR. VAN EPPS: I don't think we're going to get to our last witness.

THE COURT: That's fine.
(Pause.)
THE COURT: Thank you for your patience.
So I was jealous in looking at some of your stats.
(Laughter.)
MS. GEMMILL: May I proceed, your Honor?
THE COURT: Yes.
CONTINUED EXAMINATION
BY MS. GEMMILL:
Q. Good afternoon, sir.

Thank you for returning.
You were previously sworn in this proceeding earlier today, correct?
A. Yes.
Q. And you're still under oath now?
A. Yes.
Q. All right. So returning to pick up where we left off.

You were describing to us what you were observing when you got to the area of Hancock and that road when you came to a stop?
A. Yes.
Q. I believe you had described to us seeing a man on the ground.

I'm not sure we got a whole lot farther than that.

Can you describe to us what you were seeing, like, what observations you made of the man during the time that you were stopped?
A. Yeah. So he appeared to be distressed, and he appeared to be, like, trying to get up, which was counter to the instruction he was receiving from the police officers.
Q. And $I$ think you were describing to us before the positioning of how he was -- how he was on -in the road, this --
A. Yeah.
Q. -- this -- (inaudible), like, kind of bent, trying to get up?
A. Yeah. Slightly leaned over to his right, trying to get up.
Q. And refresh my memory, could you see what -could you see his hands while he was on the ground (inaudible)?
A. I don't recall seeing his hands.
Q. Okay. Could you hear the man on the ground saying anything?
A. I don't remember hearing him say some -say -- I don't remember specifics or anything he said.
Q. Could you hear whether or not he seemed to be talking or making any kind of noises?
A. I don't recall specific words.

I think that he was making -- he might
have been making some -- some, like -- he did not look comfortable.

He might have been making some -- I can't remember specifically, I'm sorry. I can't give you a good answer there.
Q. Were there any things that he -- he was doing or some things -- something you were hearing that made you think he was uncomfortable?
A. It was mostly, like, body language in the way he was getting up, like, somebody's got -somebody comfortable isn't really getting up in that way.

I don't know how better to describe it in words.
Q. So do you have a memory of hearing him making, like, verbalizations and you just don't know the words or is that not clear?
A. That's not clear.
Q. There were police officers on scene?
A. Yes.
Q. How many officers did you see?
A. I remember seeing three with guns drawn, and then $I$-- $I$ believe $I$ remember another officer who was also there.
Q. Okay. Where was -- where were those first three officers positioned in relatıonship to the man on the ground?
A. Relative to my vantage point, further to the right; and the guy was to the left, and $I$ was looking basically north --
Q. okay.
A. -- as indicated in the drawing.
Q. Did you have a sense of, like, how many feet away they were from each other?
A. Um - -
Q. And I mean -- by "each other," I mean the police officers to the man on the ground.
A. Call it 15 to 20, I think, yeah. Q. While you were watching, could you see whether the police officers -- those three police officers who were closest to him -- were they making any movements?
A. No. While $I$ was there, I remember -- I believe they were barely stationary.
Q. Could you hear any of those police officers saying anything to the man?
A. Yes.
Q. Were they all talking? Was one of them talking? Who was speaking?
A. I don't recall whether it was one or multiple, but $I$ do remember hearing, like, Stay on the ground, and, Drop the knife.
Q. Okay. So words you could hear were, Stay on the ground and Drop the knife? Sorry, you need to say --
A. Yes, sorry, yes.
Q. Do you recall hearing the police officers say any other words or phrases to the man?
A. Nothing that sticks in my memory.
Q. Was there any speaking or -- any speaking you could hear that you could tell people were talking, but you couldn't make out the words they
were using?
A. It's been too long. I don't remember that, anything like that. Sorry.
Q. What was the tone of voice for the police officer you could hear saying, Stay down?
A. Urgent and commanding.
Q. Urgent and commanding?
A. (No audible response.)
Q. Sorry, you're nodding. You need to say yes or no.
A. Yes -- yes.
Q. How was -- how was their volume?

Was this a loud command, kınd of quiet, was it (inaudible)?
A. It was -- it was loud, yes.
Q. Every one of the commands heard, was every command loud?
A. Yes.
Q. Did you hear any different tones of voice being used by the police officers?
A. I don't recall any different tones of voice, no.
Q. And you have a pretty good idea of about how long you were there watching; is that fair?
A. Yes.
Q. And that's from --
A. From - -
Q. -- reminding yourself on your strava data, correct?
A. Yes, that's looking at GPS data.
Q. So from about the point you were stopped until the point that you restarted your GPS was somewhere around 47 seconds, give or take a little bit of time - -
A. Correct.
Q. -- then you restart?
A. Yes.
Q. Okay. What is happening with the man and the police officers when you decide you're ready to continue your ride?
A. Yeah.

So as soon as I figured out how to get around and out of the situation -- and that's probably part of why $I$ don't -- I didn't see his hands enough because $I$ was looking at my phone trying to figure out where to go -- the situation didn't change very much from when $I$ showed up to when $I$ was leaving.
Q. Other than the voices you were hearing between the man and the police officers giving
commands, did you hear any other sounds while you were watching --
A. No.
Q. -- their interaction?
A. While $I$ was watching, no.
Q. Okay.

So you -- you'd mentioned that several of the officers had some kind of -- some kind of weapon in their hands, correct?
A. Yes.
Q. Did you see that anybody fired those or hear them fire those weapons while you were watching?
A. Not while I was there, correct.
Q. All right. So you get back on your bicycle.

What path do you take to depart the area?
A. So I went the wrong way around the rotary to go up one street further west from where I had intended to go.

I don't remember the name of that street, and $I$ took one of the first right-hand turns after that.
Q. Okay. And that's reflected in that second red line on your Strava, correct?
A. Correct.

That's the way that $I$ went, yes.
Q. Did you make any other observations from back behind you near the rotary as you were leaving the area?
A. I didn't look behind me as $I$ was golng.

There were guns out. I wanted to get out of there pretty -- pretty quickly, yeah.
Q. Did you hear anything?
A. Yes.

So I -- I exited the rotary, I took a right-hand turn, and $I$-- when $I$-- there was a hill that $I$ needed to get over in order to get back to the path $I$ was intending on going, and while $I$ was at the very beginning of that hill, I remember hearing gunshots.
Q. Okay.

Can you tell us how loud the sound that you thought was gunshots, how loud was that sound?
A. It was -- it was fairly loud, but $I$ was also -- I mean, a minute later $I$ was probably a couple tenths of a mile away at that point, so. Q. You said "a minute later."

Do you know exactly how much time had gone by from the time you left the rotary to the time you first heard the sound?
A. Yeah.

It was a minute and 15 seconds from the time my GPS started up again after that 47 second period block to when $I$ got to the beginning of that hill that $I$ mentioned that $I$ turned onto on the next road.
Q. Okay. So you know how long that was by (inaudible) your data, what time you reached that hill; is that correct?
A. Yes.
Q. It had been a minute and 15 seconds that had passed.
A. Yes.

I -- I'm highly confident it's a minute and 15 seconds; we can be 100 percent certain by checking the data on Strava.
Q. Okay. But pretty close to --
A. I'm very confident it was a minute and 15 seconds.
Q. Do you recall how many shots you heard?
A. I did not count.

I would say four, plus or minus a few.
Q. So falr to say more than one?
A. Yes, more than one.
Q. Less than ten?
A. Yes.
Q. And somewhere in the vicinity of four, give or take?
A. Yes.
Q. What did you do when you heard those sounds?
A. Kept riding my bicycle to get away from the situation.
Q. At some point did you come forward to investigators to explain what you'd seen?
A. Yes.

On advisement of some friends, I called the Lexington police Department to give my account.
Q. And $I$ think we already discussed this, but you provided all your Strava data from your ride (inaudible)?
A. Yes.

I gave the original doc FIT file that the computer itself spits out, as well as a link and excerpts from the uploaded file to Strava.

MS. GEMMILL: Thank you, sir.
If I may have one moment.

I don't have any further questions for Mr. Wetmore.

Take care.

THE COURT: Mr. McDonald? Mr. Heineman?

MR. MCDONALD: No questions.
MR. HEINEMAN: Very quickly.
THE COURT: Sure.

EXAMINATION

BY MR. HEINEMAN:
Q. The data that you gave from your phone, or from your Garmin, when did you give that?
A. I provided that when $I$ met with the -- these attorneys. I don't recall the date that that was.
Q. So just -- that was one of my - I thought that was my question.

So you were interviewed originally way back in February when this happened; and then some point later the district attorney spoke to you and you gave that data?
A. Yeah

I -- I may have emailed the -- the detective with the link. I don't -- I don't recall. I may have.
Q. Okay.
A. The only time $I$ know that $I$ provided it was when $I$ met with the attorneys.
Q. Do you remember telling the police officers
when they interviewed you that, quote, Space between the officers and the male party is reported as the male in the center of the road and the officers at curbside.
A. Yeah. The --
Q. And so --
A. Yes.
Q. -- when you're seeing this man, he's on the ground in the center of the roadway, center of that travel way, and the officers are roughly at curbside?
A. Yeah.
Q. Okay.
A. Yes.
Q. And -- and am $I$ right that you never saw a knife 1 n the man's hand or never saw a knife at all that day?
A. I did -- I don't recall taking note of what was -- what was in his hands.

MR. HEINEMAN: OkaY. Thank you very
much, and $I$ hope the shoulder heals up. THE WITNESS: Okay. Thanks.

THE COURT: Thank you, sir. You're all set.

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                                    THE WITNESS: Thank you.
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(Witness excused.)
MR. VAN EPPS: That's our last live witness for today.

THE COURT: Okay.

MR. VAN EPPS: I have some proposed exhibits we could deal with this afternoon or tomorrow morning.

THE COURT: Whatever you want to do.
MR. VAN EPPS: Um --
THE COURT: We've got ten minutes left, but if you want to do it tomorrow morning before we start, that's fine, too.

MR. VAN EPPS: Yeah, let's -- let's get done when we can.
(Pause.)
(Inaudible discussion.)

MR. VAN EPPS: Your Honor, $I^{\prime} m$ going to offer first the 911 transcript as well, and there's a -- a CAD sheet, which I've given to counsel.

I'm going to hand up a disk and the transcript and --

THE CLERK: So, your Honor, I was just handed two pieces of items here.

Would your Honor like to keep it
chronologically or do 11 A and 11 B ?
THE COURT: Dealer's choice.
THE CLERK: 11A, 11B, your Honor.
11A is disk; 11B, transcript.
(Exhibit No. 11A, Disk, received into evidence.)
(Exhibit No. 11B, Transcript of 911 call, received into evidence.)

MR. VAN EPPS: I'll get -- I'll get the CAD sheet, (indiscernible).

I have a disk containing the video referenced by Kim Hine.

There's also the video interview of Mr. Mattoon, which counsel referenced, and there's a video recorded by one of the -- Rita Mukherjee (phonetic), a child who reported it. All three videos are on a disk.

THE COURT: All raght.
THE CLERK: We'll mark it as the next exhibit.

So A is the disk.
MR. VAN EPPS: I would offer the -- well, I'll let you mark it first.

The -- the accompanying Mukherjee interview report, which references the recording,

I'll offer that.
THE CLERK: 12B.
(Exhibit No. 12A, Disk, received into evidence.)
(Exhibit No. 12B, Report, received into evidence.)

MR. VAN EPPS: I would offer the Lexington police report of Tom Wetmore as the next exhibit.

THE CLERK: Thirteen.
(Exhibit No. 13, Report, received into evidence.)

MR. MCDONALD: Fourteen or 13?
THE COURT: Thirteen.
MR. MCDONALD: Thirteen.
THE COURT: The last two were 12A and 12B, so --

MR. MCDONALD: Ah.
THE COURT: -- the video was 12A, 12 B was the report regarding Mukherjee video.

MR. MCDONALD: Thank you.
I wrote it down wrong. Thank you, your Honor.

MR. VAN EPPS: I would next offer the Lexington police report of the interview of

Tal Dinnar and Samuel Dinnar.

THE CLERK: Fourteen.
(Exhibit No. 14 , Police Report, received into evidence.)

MR. VAN EPPS: I would offer the Mass. State Police report.

I'm sorry.

THE CLERK: It's okay.
(Pause.)

MR. VAN EPPS: I would next offer the -- we have the video in evidence, we have also the -- the Lexington police report of scott Mattoon.

Attached to it is a black-and-white copy of the submitted photo on his email.

THE COURT: Fifteen.
(Exhibit No. 15, Report, received into evidence.)

MR. VAN EPPS: The last one is -- there was a Mass. State Police report of Charlotte Newman, which $I$ would offer as the next exhibit.

THE CLERK: Sixteen.
(Exhibit No. 16 , Report, received into evidence.)

MR. VAN EPPS: And, as for the CAD sheet,

I'll get a copy for the clerk tomorrow.
THE COURT: All right.
MR. VAN EPPS: I guess that would be 12C,
if that's --
THE COURT: That's fine.
And so tomorrow, we have, it looks like eight or nine witnesses?

MR. VAN EPPS: Yes. Vikas Kinger, Patricia Jenness, Rabbi Bukiet, medical examiner, Mr. New, Mr. Olidort, Ms. Cunningham, Mr. Collazo.

THE COURT: All right.
MR. VAN EPPS: And -- and the crime scene person who was supposed to testify today.

THE COURT: Okay. So I guess two things. Mr. Heineman, I assume you want to have a conversation with the family about --

MR. HEINEMAN: Yes.
THE COURT: -- the medical examiner.
MR. HEINEMAN: I already did, and I will again.
