Attorney Spiros will address that in a second --1 that there's no sense in delaying it until we get 2 3 the final ME report. 4 So, with that, I asked everybody to come 5 on to see -- to see what dates we can do this. And from the email chains I was looking 6 7 at, it looked like -- and I think, Attorney 8 Kazarosian, you weren't on that chain -- but it 9 looked like the week of March 20th. 10 Am I right? MS. SPIROS: That's correct. 11 12 THE COURT: And, Attorney Kazarosian, how does that fit into your schedule? 13 MS. KAZAROSIAN: Um... 14 That -- I mean, yes, I can do that week. 15 16 It's just -- I would like to have more time to review stuff but, um, I just got on 17 18 board, but, um... 19 THE COURT: Okay. MS. KAZAROSIAN: If I could -- you know, 20 21 I understand everyone is under a time --22 THE COURT: Yeah. MS. KAZAROSIAN: -- constraint. 23 24 And my understanding is we don't have the 25 ME's report yet, right?

Is that correct?

THE COURT: We don't.

And, hopefully -- it may become available, but I figured no sense delaying the actual -- if there's any witnesses to be called, let's get that under way.

And then if something -- if I feel I need something else, we can always just delay it to obtain that.

But I don't want to -- I just don't think it's something that we should be delaying any longer given what I've already learned about the -- the matter.

And as I think I -- you weren't present on the first call.

I have not looked at any of the news reports about this case of the and I know there are some news reports about it.

I did -- once I was assigned to this -- and I was assigned probably the day after it was requested, which was probably immediately after the incident -- I have not looked at anything.

But now that I have some feeling of what this case is about, I think we can -- we can start this.

And if I need some more information, we can always suspend and obtain that at a later date. Okay.

MS. KAZAROSIAN: That's fine.

THE COURT: So, with that, I think you may have heard Clerk-Magistrate Casey talk about the Cambridge location.

And the reason why we are doing that is to do it over at the actual Cambridge District Court/Malden District Court; we'd have to sort of bifurcate our days a little bit, start late, so that they could get their daily work done.

But if we go over to Cambridge, we can go right from 9:00 to 4:00.

And I think that's better for all parties involved if we can just keep this going right at 9:00 and move along and go day-to-day until it's complete, at least the witness aspect of the -- of the inquest. So that's why we're doing it in Cambridge.

And I think that leads me to my next topic I wanted to discuss is -- you know,
Attorney Spiros, what are you proposing for actually bringing in for live witnesses and how many?

1	MS. SPIROS: In terms of the actual names			
2	or a number at this point?			
3	THE COURT: Number. A number.			
4	MS. SPIROS: I think we've gotten the			
5	list down to about 25 to 30.			
6	THE COURT: Okay.			
7	MS. SPIROS: And I some of them are			
8	very short, obviously.			
9	THE COURT: Okay.			
10	MS. SPIROS: And some of them are still a			
11	little bit up in the air, as well.			
12	I do anticipate about 25 to 30.			
13	THE COURT: Okay. And you say some of			
14	those are short and some of those probably have			
15	already given recorded statements?			
16	MS. SPIROS: That's right.			
17	They're particularly a lot of civilian			
18	witnesses, it's very limited as to what they			
19	actually saw.			
20	THE COURT: Yeah. Okay.			
21	Okay. And what what I think might be			
22	helpful is you know, given their availability,			
23	too if you and Attorney Evans and maybe even			
24	Attorney Anderson with Attorney Kazarosian, if			
25	you could just work on getting which ones will			

1 appear on which days, so that way no one's 2 waiting around. 3 So if we have Monday, Tuesday, Wednesday, 4 we could have a list that's going to be called on Monday. That way no one's waiting around. 5 6 And then we can -- once we exhaust that 7 list, we can -- we can break for the day --8 MS. SPIROS: Uh-hum. 9 THE COURT: -- or the Tuesday. 10 That way no one's going to be -- and 11 we'll try to get through every witness so that no 12 witness have to come back, you know, from say, 1.3 Monday afternoon to Tuesday morning. 14 Does that sound doable to you? MS. SPIROS: That sounds -- that sounds 15 very doable, your Honor. 16 17 THE COURT: Okay. And I know we -- I 18 know I asked everybody to block off four to 19 five days, but I am kind of hoping we can do this in three to four. 20 21 Does that sound doable? 22 MS. SPIROS: I think four sounds doable. 23 THE COURT: All right. I am going to ask 24 it again, Attorney Spiros.

Do you think three -- three or four

sounds doable?

MS. SPIROS: I think three or four sounds great, your Honor.

THE COURT: All right. Okay. Good answer.

MS. SPIROS: Progress.

THE COURT: All right. And the other thing that -- before I turn it over to counsel is, I think I may have sent an email about we did get, from the language office, a Bengali interpreter.

MS. SPIROS: Great.

THE COURT: And all I have to do is give them the dates well in advance, and they will have a Bengali interpreter -- interpreter present.

Now, anybody who's worked in the court system long enough knows that just because the language offices will have a Bengali interpreter present doesn't mean that we are going to have a Bengali interpreter present every day, all right.

So, with that, like I said, we are going to have one; but just on the off-chance there isn't, I don't want to delay it because even though the next of kin, the family, you know,

have the right to be there, it's a little different because -- unless they are going to give testimony -- what's going to happen so -- but I think we can alleviate that -- that issue if the family has a bilingual friend, maybe another family member, who would assist the Court.

What I can do is then make an exception and allow them into the inquest, so that at least they are available, so that the family members can have someone there to interpret for them.

And so I think this is -- Attorney

Kazarosian, how does that sounds to you?

MS. KAZAROSIAN: I -- I think that's

doable.

I know that the father -- because I'm coming in for the father.

THE COURT: Okay. I see.

MS. KAZAROSIAN: Just the father.

Father's brother is bilingual, so I've communicated through him.

And there's also, I believe it's father's sister, who is in Bangladesh right now but I think coming back next week some point.

THE COURT: Okay.

1	MS. KAZAROSIAN: And I think between the			
2	two of them, hopefully, they will be able to			
3	cover. So I would like, if possible, have both			
4	of them be able to come in.			
5	THE COURT: I will make an exception I			
6	will allow both of those, the brother and the			
7	sister or the father to come in.			
8	And and they even if we have the			
9	interpreter, I'll let them stay, because, of			
10	course, there could be an issue.			
11	MS. KAZAROSIAN: So I was going to ask			
12	you that because then I would I need the			
13	brother or someone to communicate with			
14	THE COURT: To communicate communicate			
15	with your client.			
16	MS. KAZAROSIAN: Yes.			
17	THE COURT: Yes.			
18	MS. KAZAROSIAN: And I can't obviously do			
19	that.			
20	THE COURT: Right.			
21	So so why don't we plan on that.			
22	So just let your client know that his			
23	brother and his sister are going to be allowed to			
24	come into the courtroom.			

MS. KAZAROSIAN: Okay.

1	Does anybody anybody have an objection	
2	to that, either counsel?	
3	MS. SPIROS: No.	
4	MR. ANDERSON: No.	
5	THE COURT: Okay. And it was a Bengali	
6	interpreter, right? It's Bengali?	
7	MS. KAZAROSIAN: Bengali, yes.	
8	THE COURT: Okay. So I think we can get	
9	covered that way, that way they know exactly	
10	what's going on, and they won't be left out of	
11	of this process, okay?	
12	MS. KAZAROSIAN: Thank you, your Honor.	
13	THE COURT: And any counsel have	
14	anything else they want to address?	
15	MS. SPIROS: Just a couple of brief	
16	things, your Honor.	
17	THE COURT: Yes.	
18	MS. SPIROS: We had talked about a view.	
19	THE COURT: Yes.	
20	MS. SPIROS: We propose doing that the	
21	21st of March in the morning.	
22	THE COURT: Okay. The 21st in the	
23	morning?	
24	MS. SPIROS: That way we have some	
25	testimony done before we go there.	

1 THE COURT: Yes. 2 MS. SPIROS: So I can coordinate that. 3 THE COURT: Sure. MS. SPIROS: And you can let me know what 4 5 you want in terms of -- and I can coordinate with 6 the clerk, as well, I mean --7 THE COURT: Okay. 8 MS. SPIROS: -- the State Police will 9 give us an escort and --10 THE COURT: The State Police. 11 And we should notify the local PD, as 12 well, just so they know. 13 MS. SPIROS: Yeah. We will do that, as 14 well. 15 THE COURT: And I've -- I've spoken to 16 the chief court officer here, and I am going to 17 talk to Kevin Kachuk (phonetic), who is in charge 18 of all the court officers, just so that --19 because the place we have having this in is a 20 juvenile court really, and I don't want to use their court officer -- you know, all their court 21 22 officers. 23 I don't think we are going to have an 24 issue; but I think, you know, having additional

court officers, given they have their own work to

1 do, just to get a couple of different -- extra 2 court officers present just so we'll have them 3 there. All right. 4 And they can also assist in the view as 5 well. MS. SPIROS: Great. 6 7 THE COURT: And, as it relates to the view, Attorney Spiros, from what I've looked at 8 so far and it's -- and this is fluid -- the most 9 important aspect of the view, I'd say, would be 10 11 the backyard to Chestnut Street, right? 12 MS. SPIROS: Yes. And that witness is represented by an 13 attorney, so I've been communicating with him. 14 15 THE COURT: Okay. MS. SPIROS: Ms. Susan Freireich. 16 And she -- I don't anticipate that will 17 18 be an issue. She's been cooperative. THE COURT: All right. Is that the owner 19 20 of the building or the individual who took the video from the adjacent building? 21 22 MS. SPIROS: Um, you know what, she is a 23 tenant there. 24 THE COURT: Okay. 25 MS. SPIROS: I am more in touch with the

1 landlord, as well. 2 THE COURT: Okay. 3 MS. SPIROS: So I am sure that they are aware, and I don't think it's a problem. 4 5 THE COURT: All right. All right. Thank you, counsel. 6 7 MS. SPIROS: Uh-hum. 8 THE COURT: All right. And anything 9 else, Attorney Spiros? 10 MS. SPIROS: I just wanted to let you 11 know that I have been diligently and 12 periodically, along with ADA Evans, checking on 13 the time estimations on the ME report and the 14 toxicology report. 15 THE COURT: Yes. 16 MS. SPIROS: And, as of last check 17 yesterday afternoon, neither were complete, 18 although, I'm told that the toxicology is much 19 closer --20 THE COURT: Yeah. 21 MS. SPIROS: -- than the ME's report. 22 THE COURT: Yeah. 23 MS. SPIROS: I also did want to let the 24 Court know and counsel know that -- to expect 25 probably one additional round of discovery.

KAZAROSIAN: Yeah. I don't think 10 they -- I didn't see any other than the length of 11 the video. Okay. 12 MS. SPIROS: Some of them are cell phone 13 videos, but -- but it's certainly once you've 14 read through the police reports, if I can be of 1.5 assistance, just let me know. 16 MS. KAZAROSIAN: Appreciate it.
