(Court called to order.)
(3:00 p.m.)

THE COURT: All right. Good afternoon, everyone.

MS. SPIROS: Good afternoon, your Honor.

MS. KAZAROSIAN: Good afternoon.

THE CLERK: All right. You have the protective order, right, signed?

MS. SPIROS: Yes. We received that.

Thank you.
THE CLERK: Okay.

THE COURT: Attorney Kazarosian, good afternoon.

MS. KAZAROSIAN: Yes, Kazarosian.

Thank you.

Good afternoon.

THE COURT: Kazarosian. I'm sorry.

Good afternoon.

MS. KAZAROSIAN: That's okay.

THE COURT: And we are just waiting, I think, on Attorney Anderson, correct?

THE CLERK: Yes.

MS. SPIROS: Yes. He is just texting me, asking if it's the same log in, so I'm just going
to forward him the information.
THE COURT: Okay. All right. Thank you.
THE CLERK: Because it is not the same.
I think $I$-- I used mine this time.
MS. SPIROS: Yeah. I will let him know that right now, Madam Clerk.

THE CLERK: Sorry about that. (Pause.)

MS. SPIROS: I sent it to him.
(Pause.)
THE CLERK: Your Honor, I'm golng to go down to Third Street on Monday --

THE COURT: Okay.
THE CLERK: -- and make sure that, like, the FTR and everything is --

THE COURT: Okay. All right. Great.
THE CLERK: -- is running.
THE COURT: Great. Thank you.
THE CLERK: Okay.
THE COURT: Thank you.
And I'll -- I'll give Judge Kahn a call after we -- just once we solidify the dates --

THE CLERK: Yep.
THE COURT: -- just so, you know, so he knows what's happening as well.

THE CLERK: Okay.

THE COURT: And -- do you want me to reach out to Joe Jackson, too, to see if he can meet you there in case there is any issues with FTR?

THE CLERK: That's funny.
I was just going to reach out to Phil and Joe, so I'll --

THE COURT: Okay.
THE CLERK: -- I'll coordinate with them.
THE COURT: Okay. All right.
THE CLERK: Okay?
THE COURT: All right. Great. Thanks.
MS. SPIROS: Madam Clerk, Mr. Anderson said he's in the waiting room.

THE CLERK: He is.
Thank you very much.
MS. SPIROS: You're welcome.
THE CLERK: Sorry, that -- sorry about that, counselor.

It is a different -- it was a different Zoom this time.

MR. ANDERSON: You are trying to trick me.

No problem. It's my bad.

Carrie -- Carrie helped me.
THE CLERK: No worries.
THE COURT: All right. Good afternoon, Attorney Anderson.

MR. ANDERSON: Good afternoon, Judge Coffey.

THE COURT: All right. And $I$ think we have everybody.

We have Attorney Spiros, Attorney Evans, Attorney Anderson, and Attorney -- and I am going to mispronounce it one last time.

MS. KAZAROSIAN: You can say Marsha.
THE COURT: Okay. All right.
MS. KAZAROSIAN: Kazarosian.
THE COURT: Kazarosian. Okay. I won't mispronounce it again.

MS. KAZAROSIAN: No problem.
THE COURT: All right. So thanks, everybody, for joining in. I know it's late on a Friday.

I just wanted to -- I -- after I've reviewed -- I first reviewed the -- what was marked notice of discovery 1 , and after $I$ reviewed it $I$-- I thought that given what I had and what $I$ figure will get prior to March -- and

Attorney Spiros will address that in a second -that there's no sense in delaying it until we get the final ME report.

So, with that, I asked everybody to come on to see -- to see what dates we can do this.

And from the email chains $I$ was looking at, it looked like -- and I think, Attorney Kazarosian, you weren't on that chain -- but it looked like the week of March $20 t h$.

Am I right?
MS. SPIROS: That's correct.
THE COURT: And, Attorney Kazarosian, how does that fit into your schedule?

MS. KAZAROSIAN: Um...
That -- I mean, yes, I can do that week.
It's just -- I would like to have more time to review stuff but, um, $I$ just got on board, but, um...

THE COURT: Okay.
MS. KAZAROSIAN: If I could -- you know, I understand everyone is under a time --

THE COURT: Yeah.
MS. KAZAROSIAN: -- constraint.
And my understanding is we don't have the ME's report yet, right?

Is that correct?
THE COURT: We don't.
And, hopefully -- it may become available, but $I$ figured no sense delaying the actual -- if there's any witnesses to be called, let's get that under way.

And then if something -- if $I$ feel I need something else, we can always just delay it to obtain that.

But $I$ don't want to -- I just don't think it's something that we should be delaying any longer given what I've already learned about the -- the matter.

And as $I$ think $I$-- you weren't present on the first call.

I have not looked at any of the news reports about this case of the and $I$ know there are some news reports about it.

I did -- once $I$ was assigned to this -and $I$ was assigned probably the day after it was requested, which was probably immediately after the incident -- I have not looked at anything.

But now that $I$ have some feeling of what this case is about, I think we can -- we can start this.

And if $I$ need some more information, we can always suspend and obtain that at a later date. Okay.

MS. KAZAROSIAN: That's fine.

THE COURT: So, with that, I think you may have heard Clerk-Magistrate Casey talk about the Cambridge location.

And the reason why we are doing that is to do it over at the actual Cambridge District Court/Malden District Court; we'd have to sort of bifurcate our days a little bit, start late, so that they could get their daily work done.

But if we go over to Cambridge, we can go right from 9:00 to 4:00.

And I think that's better for all parties involved if we can just keep this going right at 9:00 and move along and go day-to-day until it's complete, at least the witness aspect of the - of the inquest. So that's why we're doing it in Cambridge.

And $I$ think that leads me to my next topic I wanted to discuss is -- you know, Attorney spiros, what are you proposing for actually bringing in for live witnesses and how many?

MS. SPIROS: In terms of the actual names or a number at this point?

THE COURT: Number. A number.

MS. SPIROS: I think we've gotten the list down to about 25 to 30 .

THE COURT: Okay.

MS. SPIROS: And I - some of them are very short, obviously.

THE COURT: Okay.
MS. SPIROS: And some of them are still a little bit up in the air, as well.

I do anticipate about 25 to 30 .
THE COURT: Okay. And you say some of those are short and some of those probably have already given recorded statements?

MS. SPIROS: That's right.
They're -- particularly a lot of civilian witnesses, it's very limited as to what they actually saw.

THE COURT: Yeah. Okay.
Okay. And what - what $I$ think might be helpful is -- you know, given their availability, too -- if you and Attorney Evans and maybe even Attorney Anderson with Attorney Kazarosian, if you could just work on getting which ones will
appear on which days, so that way no one's waiting around.

So if we have Monday, Tuesday, Wednesday, we could have a list that's going to be called on Monday. That way no one's waiting around.

And then we can -- once we exhaust that list, we can -- we can break for the day --

MS. SPIROS: Uh-hum.
THE COURT: -- or the Tuesday.
That way no one's going to be -- and we'll try to get through every witness so that no witness have to come back, you know, from say, Monday afternoon to Tuesday morning.

Does that sound doable to you?
MS. SPIROS: That sounds -- that sounds very doable, your Honor.

THE COURT: Okay. And $I$ know we -- I know I asked everybody to block off four to five days, but $I$ am kind of hoping we can do this in three to four.

Does that sound doable?
MS. SPIROS: I think four sounds doable.
THE COURT: All right. I am going to ask it again, Attorney Spiros.

Do you think three -- three or four
sounds doable?
MS. SPIROS: I think three or four sounds great, your Honor.

THE COURT: All right. Okay. Good answer.

MS. SPIROS: Progress.
THE COURT: All right. And the other thing that -- before $I$ turn it over to counsel is, I think $I$ may have sent an email about we did get, from the language office, a Bengali interpreter.

MS. SPIROS: Great.
THE COURT: And all $I$ have to do is give them the dates well in advance, and they will have a Bengali interpreter -- interpreter present.

Now, anybody who's worked in the court system long enough knows that just because the language offices will have a Bengali interpreter present doesn't mean that we are going to have a Bengali interpreter present every day, all right.

So, with that, like $I$ sald, we are going
to have one; but just on the off-chance there isn't, I don't want to delay it because even though the next of kin, the family, you know,
have the right to be there, it's a little different because -- unless they are going to give testimony -- what's going to happen so -but I think we can alleviate that -- that issue if the family has a bilingual friend, maybe another family member, who would assist the Court.

What $I$ can do is then make an exception and allow them into the inquest, so that at least they are available, so that the family members can have someone there to interpret for them.

And so $I$ think this is -- Attorney Kazarosian, how does that sounds to you?

MS. KAZAROSIAN: I -- I think that's doable.

I know that the father -- because I'm coming in for the father.

THE COURT: Okay. I see.
MS. KAZAROSIAN: Just the father.
Father's brother is bilingual, so I've communicated through him.

And there's also, I believe it's father's sister, who is in Bangladesh right now but I think coming back next week some point.

THE COURT: Okay.

MS. KAZAROSIAN: And I think between the two of them, hopefully, they will be able to cover. So I would like, if possible, have both of them be able to come in.

THE COURT: I will make an exception -- I will allow both of those, the brother and the sister or the father to come in.

And -- and they -- even if we have the interpreter, I'll let them stay, because, of course, there could be an issue.

MS. KAZAROSIAN: So I was going to ask you that because then $I$ would -- I need the brother or someone to communicate with --

THE COURT: To communicate -- communicate with your client.

MS. KAZAROSIAN: Yes.
THE COURT: Yes.
MS. KAZAROSIAN: And $\operatorname{can}$ 't obviously do that.

THE COURT: Right.
So -- so why don't we plan on that.
So just let your client know that his brother and his sister are going to be allowed to come into the courtroom.

MS. KAZAROSIAN: Okay.

Does anybody -- anybody have an objection to that, either counsel?

MS. SPIROS: No.
MR. ANDERSON: No.
THE COURT: Okay. And it was a Bengali interpreter, right? It's Bengali?

MS. KAZAROSIAN: Bengali, yes.
THE COURT: Okay. So $I$ think we can get covered that way, that way they know exactly what's going on, and they won't be left out of -of this process, okay?

MS. KAZAROSIAN: Thank you, your Honor.
THE COURT: And any -- counsel have anything else they want to address?

MS. SPIROS: Just a couple of brief things, your Honor.

THE COURT: Yes.
MS. SPIROS: We had talked about a view.
THE COURT: Yes.
MS. SPIROS: We propose doing that the 21st of March in the morning.

THE COURT: Okay. The 21 st in the morning?

MS. SPIROS: That way we have some testimony done before we go there.

THE COURT: Yes.
MS. SPIROS: So I can coordinate that.
THE COURT: Sure.
MS. SPIROS: And you can let me know what you want in terms of -- and $I$ can coordinate with the clerk, as well, I mean --

THE COURT: Okay.
MS. SPIROS: -- the State Police will
give us an escort and --
THE COURT: The State Police.
And we should notify the local PD, as well, just so they know.

MS. SPIROS: Yeah. We will do that, as well.

THE COURT: And I've -- I've spoken to the chief court officer here, and I am going to talk to Kevin Kachuk (phonetic), who is in charge of all the court officers, just so that -because the place we have having this in is a juvenile court really, and $I$ don't want to use their court officer -- you know, all their court officers.

I don't think we are going to have an issue; but I think, you know, having additional court officers, given they have their own work to
do, just to get a couple of different -- extra court officers present just so we'll have them there. All right.

And they can also assist in the view as well.

MS. SPIROS: Great.
THE COURT: And, as it relates to the view, Attorney Spiros, from what I've looked at so far and it's -- and this is fluid -- the most important aspect of the view, I'd say, would be the backyard to Chestnut Street, right?

MS. SPIROS: Yes.
And that witness is represented by an attorney, so I've been communicating with him.

THE COURT: Okay.
MS. SPIROS: Ms. Susan Freireich.
And she -- I don't anticipate that will be an issue. She's been cooperative.

THE COURT: All right. Is that the owner of the building or the individual who took the video from the adjacent building?

MS. SPIROS: Um, you know what, she is a tenant there.

THE COURT: Okay.
MS. SPIROS: I am more in touch with the
landlord, as well.
THE COURT: Okay.
MS. SPIROS: So I am sure that they are aware, and $I$ don't think it's a problem.

THE COURT: All right. All right.
Thank you, counsel.
MS. SPIROS: Uh-hum.
THE COURT: All right. And anything else, Attorney Spiros?

MS. SPIROS: I just wanted to let you know that $I$ have been diligently and periodically, along with ADA Evans, checking on the time estimations on the $M E$ report and the toxicology report.

THE COURT: Yes.
MS. SPIROS: And, as of last check yesterday afternoon, neither were complete, although, I'm told that the toxicology is much closer --

THE COURT: Yeah.
MS. SPIROS: -- than the ME's report.
THE COURT: Yeah.
MS. SPIROS: I also did want to let the Court know and counsel know that -- to expect probably one additional round of discovery.

The transcripts of the officer interviews went out along with a few other things in the second notice.

I do anticipate one more round related to training materials for Officer McMahon and Officer Colbert.

THE COURT: Okay. All right. And so we have discovery -- notice of discovery 1 , notice of discovery 2.

And, once we begin, I am going to have discovery 1 entered as Exhibit 1 , discovery 2 entered as Exhibit 2, and, obviously, the next one is 3, just so that they become part of the permanent record.

And, unless I'm mistaken, the actual hard copies -- I am the only one with -- that -- I am the one with the actual hard copies, right?

MS. SPIROS: That's right.
THE COURT: AIl right.

So I'll take very, very, good care of those until we get those entered into as an exhibit, okay?

MS. SPIROS: Great.

THE COURT: And anything else, Attorney Spiros?

MS. SPIROS: None, your Honor.
THE COURT: All right. Attorney
Anderson, anything from you?
MR. ANDERSON: Yes, Judge, because I have to ask Carrie -- the one thing I had inquired about was the 911 call and the radio dispatch stuff.

Is that in the -- two, or is that coming out or...

MS. SPIROS: It's in notice 2. It was uploaded to the Sharefile.

MR. ANDERSON: Okay. I just haven't looked at it yet. Okay.

MS. SPIROS: It's lengthy. It's about an hour and 15 minutes, I believe.

MR. ANDERSON: Okay.
THE COURT: And, Attorney Kazarosian, anything from your point of view?

MS. KAZAROSIAN: Yeah, just because I just got -- just finally was able to download the discovery and -- and look at a couple of things and wondering if -- the videos don't have times or dates on them other than the -- is that going to be something that will be provided when the -- when it was taken, like...

MS. SPIROS: I think, um, I can try to answer that question in terms of -- I think once you look through all the police reports it will be clear that certain video matches up with general time frames.

But unless the actual video has a timestamp on it, there is nothing else that we have.

MS. KAZAROSIAN: Yeah. I don't think they -- I didn't see any other than the length of the video. Okay.

MS. SPIROS: Some of them are cell phone videos, but -- but it's certainly once you've read through the police reports, if $I$ can be of assistance, just let me know.

MS. KAZAROSIAN: Appreciate $1 t$.
Thank you.
MS. SPIROS: Uh-hum.
THE COURT: All right. And just -- and just so everybody else knows, Attorney Nick Brandt from the administrative office is assisting me in the inquest.

And Attorney Evans, have you done what you said you'd do?

Attorney Brandt --

MS. EVANS: Yes --
THE COURT: Yes, okay. All right.
MS. EVANS: Yeah, so it was a little complicated but we figured -- Nick and I figured It out yesterday and it's all set.

THE COURT: All right. All right. Thank you.

And -- and Clerk-Magistrate Casey, anything we have to discuss?

THE CLERK: No. I think we're good.
THE COURT: Oh, you are muted.
THE CLERK: Can you hear me?
THE COURT: Yep, we can hear you.
MS. SPIROS: I can, yes.
THE CLERK: Yeah, no, I'm all -- I'm all set.

THE COURT: Okay. All right.
So I don't know if we need to have another Zoom video other than just to say I'll see everybody at nine o'clock on March 20 th over at the juvenile court.

It will be in courtroom, I believe -- is that 6?

THE CLERK: It is. Six.
THE COURT: Six.

It's the courtroom as you go up the staircase in the left-hand front corner of the building. Okay.

MS. SPIROS: Great. Thank you.
THE COURT: All right. And -- and just on the off-chance anything does come up, don't be afraid to reach out.

We can always schedule an -- if an issue becomes available, I'd rather do it before the -- nine o'clock on the 20th, okay, because Attorney Evans knows what I'm like.

I'm nine o'clock and $I$ go. All right.
MS. SPIROS: Understood.

THE COURT: All right. Okay. And if - and once you kind of pare down the -- that witness list and as to days, just make sure of -of, obviously, their availability.

I think that will go a long way towards - towards planning this and getting us to -like $I$ said, once we finish with the evidence, if I feel I need to wait around, if the ME's report, $I$ can do that.

And then, if $I$ get that, and we need to reconvene, we can always do that, as well, okay.

But $I$ just don't want to wait -- you know, once $I$ got my teeth into it, I want to get going, okay?

MS. SPIROS: Thank you, your Honor.
MS. KAZAROSIAN: One last question. I know this is a horrible thought.

But what if we do go longer than three days, will we have a Bengali interpreter or should $I$ just make sure someone's there or they are available.

THE COURT: Um, I'm going to ask for five days, just so you know. okay.

MS. KAZAROSIAN: All right.
THE COURT: All right. Because it's -it's easier to say --

MS. KAZAROSIAN: You don't need -- we don't need you.

THE CHERK: Yeah, right.
THE CoURT: I don't need you, than it is to say, Hey, I need you, especially when I think there might be only one in the state.

So we are going to be -- we are going to be utilizing that person, you know, sort of monopolizing that person for at least three days, if not four.

But at least if $I$ put in the five-day request, $I$ was assured that they'd -- they'd mark us off for that -- for those five days. Okay?

MS. KAZAROSIAN: Okay. Sounds good.
Thank you.
MS. SPIROS: Thank you.
MR. ANDERSON: Thank you.
MS. SPIROS: Have a good day.
THE COURT: Anything else?
All right. Thank you, all.
Have a good afternoon; good weekend.
THE CLERK: Thank you, everyone.
MR. ANDERSON: Thank you, Judge.
MS. SPIROS: Thanks, everyone.
