

INTERVIEW OF ERIK DRAUSCHKE

DETECTIVE LIEUTENANT PAUL BULMAN

LIEUTENANT RICHARD ABATE

ATTORNEY PETER PASCIUCCO

1           DETECTIVE LIEUTENANT BULMAN: Good afternoon.  
2 The time is approximately 2:17 on February 7, 2018.  
3 Present in the room is Lieutenant Paul E. Bulman of the  
4 Massachusetts State Police, Middlesex District  
5 Attorney's Office.

6           LIEUTENANT ABATE: Lieutenant Richard Paul  
7 Abate, Reading Police Department.

8           MR. PASCIUCCO: Attorney Peter Pasciucco on  
9 behalf of Erik Drauschke. My last name is spelled P-a-  
10 s-c-i-u-c-c-o.

11           OFFICER DRAUSCHKE: Officer Erik Wilhelm  
12 Drauschke. Last name is D-r-a-u-s-c-h-k-e, badge  
13 number 74.

14           DETECTIVE LIEUTENANT BULMAN: Officer  
15 Drauschke, as we've talked earlier, this is a criminal  
16 investigation being conducted by the Middlesex District  
17 Attorney's Office. Lieutenant Abate is here in that  
18 capacity. He is in no way here in any Internal Affairs  
19 capacity.

20           OFFICER DRAUSCHKE: I understand.

21           DETECTIVE LIEUTENANT BULMAN: This is strictly  
22 a criminal investigation. That being said, I'm going  
23 to advise you of your rights. You have the right to  
24 remain silent. Anything you say can and will be used

1 against you in Court. You have the right to talk to a  
2 lawyer for advice before we ask you any questions, to  
3 have him with you during questioning. If you cannot  
4 afford a lawyer, one will be appointed for you.

5 If you decide to answers questions now, you  
6 still have the right to stop questioning at any time.

7 Do you understand what I have read to you?

8 OFFICER DRAUSCHKE: Yes, sir.

9 DETECTIVE LIEUTENANT BULMAN: Would you guys  
10 like some more time to confer or are you all set?

11 MR. PASCUICCO: We're all set.

12 OFFICER DRAUSCHKE: All set.

13 DETECTIVE LIEUTENANT BULMAN: Can I just go  
14 over -- I'd like to stop and get some biographical  
15 information from you.

16 OFFICER DRAUSCHKE: Absolutely.

17 DETECTIVE LIEUTENANT BULMAN: Could you just  
18 spell your last name for me?

19 OFFICER DRAUSCHKE: Sure. It's D, as in David,  
20 r-a-u-s-c-h-k-e, and first name is Erik with a K.

21 DETECTIVE LIEUTENANT BULMAN: Erik, how long  
22 have you been employed by the Reading Police  
23 Department?

24 OFFICER DRAUSCHKE: I got hired in September of

1 2006, so it's just a little over 11 years.

2 DETECTIVE LIEUTENANT BULMAN: And prior to  
3 that, had you ever had any police experience? Did you  
4 have any other jobs in the police --

5 OFFICER DRAUSCHKE: I worked as a security  
6 guard. No other police jobs, though.

7 DETECTIVE LIEUTENANT BULMAN: And how long were  
8 you a security guard?

9 OFFICER DRAUSCHKE: I had worked several  
10 different security positions for -- while I was in  
11 college. I had worked Stop and Shop loss prevention as  
12 well as I worked for a company called Chem Security  
13 that became Celadon Security in Woburn.

14 DETECTIVE LIEUTENANT BULMAN: Approximately how  
15 many years did you do those two jobs?

16 OFFICER DRAUSCHKE: I'll say three to four  
17 years.

18 DETECTIVE LIEUTENANT BULMAN: Three to four  
19 years. Did you have any sort of military background at  
20 all?

21 OFFICER DRAUSCHKE: I only had ROTC in college  
22 for I believe it was one semester for Air Force ROTC,  
23 and then I discontinued.

24 DETECTIVE LIEUTENANT BULMAN: And what year was

1 that?

2 OFFICER DRAUSCHKE: That was the 2001-2002  
3 semester I recall.

4 DETECTIVE LIEUTENANT BULMAN: If you could, I  
5 just want to ask you to the best of your recollection  
6 if we could start -- we're going to start on the day  
7 prior to the event that took place, on Saturday, the  
8 3rd.

9 OFFICER DRAUSCHKE: Okay.

10 DETECTIVE LIEUTENANT BULMAN: Were you  
11 dispatched to the call that initially led to you guys  
12 going there the second day?

13 OFFICER DRAUSCHKE: Not initially. On  
14 Saturday, I was not initially dispatched to that call.

15 DETECTIVE LIEUTENANT BULMAN: No, I'm sorry.  
16 Not Saturday, Friday.

17 OFFICER DRAUSCHKE: Friday, I was -- I did  
18 respond to that --

19 DETECTIVE LIEUTENANT BULMAN: Okay.

20 OFFICER DRAUSCHKE: -- the domestic incident up  
21 at the East Coast gas station at 1462 Main Street.

22 DETECTIVE LIEUTENANT BULMAN: Okay. Can you  
23 identify what your assignment was on Friday?

24 OFFICER DRAUSCHKE: I was working the C shift

1 which is 4:00 p.m. to 12:00 a.m. I was in -- assigned  
2 to sector 2 in marked cruiser 1.

3 DETECTIVE LIEUTENANT BULMAN: Is that how you  
4 guys identify yourself by cruiser call sign?

5 OFFICER DRAUSCHKE: We go by our badge number.

6 DETECTIVE LIEUTENANT BULMAN: Okay. And by  
7 that -- so on the radio transmissions, your badge  
8 number would be --

9 OFFICER DRAUSCHKE: 74.

10 DETECTIVE LIEUTENANT BULMAN: 74.

11 OFFICER DRAUSCHKE: Correct.

12 DETECTIVE LIEUTENANT BULMAN: And you've had  
13 that badge number -- once you got out of the academy --

14 OFFICER DRAUSCHKE: From the start, correct.

15 DETECTIVE LIEUTENANT BULMAN: From the start,  
16 okay. So is the sector 2 shift, does the cover the  
17 area where this event occurred?

18 OFFICER DRAUSCHKE: Sector 2 is actually the  
19 south side of town. That actually is separated from --  
20 the best way to explain it is separated from the train  
21 tracks, everything south and west of the train tracks  
22 is sector 2.

23 DETECTIVE LIEUTENANT BULMAN: So on Friday, can  
24 you tell me when you first heard of this event going on

1 at 1462?

2 OFFICER DRAUSCHKE: So I was responding as an  
3 additional unit from the station with the other units  
4 that were dispatched originally to the call.

5 DETECTIVE LIEUTENANT BULMAN: Okay.

6 OFFICER DRAUSCHKE: And from my recollection,  
7 all four patrolmen responded to the scene.

8 DETECTIVE LIEUTENANT BULMAN: Now, did all four  
9 patrolmen respond to that scene because there was some  
10 familiarity with this individual?

11 OFFICER DRAUSCHKE: That is correct. We had  
12 been down to the location several other times for  
13 domestic disturbances and reports of past assault and  
14 batteries.

15 DETECTIVE LIEUTENANT BULMAN: Did it usually  
16 involve the individual that you confronted on Saturday?

17 OFFICER DRAUSCHKE: Correct. I had been  
18 familiar with the names.

19 DETECTIVE LIEUTENANT BULMAN: You were -- so  
20 you were familiar --

21 OFFICER DRAUSCHKE: And the individual that we  
22 went and were met outside by that was the victim on  
23 Friday night.

24 DETECTIVE LIEUTENANT BULMAN: So you're

1 familiar with Alan Greenough?

2 OFFICER DRAUSCHKE: Correct.

3 DETECTIVE LIEUTENANT BULMAN: Had you ever  
4 arrested him or had any interaction yourself --

5 OFFICER DRAUSCHKE: I do not --

6 DETECTIVE LIEUTENANT BULMAN: -- motor vehicle  
7 stops --

8 OFFICER DRAUSCHKE: I do not recall ever having  
9 arrested him personally. I don't recall off the top of  
10 my head any traffic stops with him.

11 DETECTIVE LIEUTENANT BULMAN: But you were  
12 familiar with him just from assisting other officers on  
13 the past calls --

14 OFFICER DRAUSCHKE: Correct, with the name --  
15 right. With the name and being down there prior  
16 incidents that we had been called down there.

17 DETECTIVE LIEUTENANT BULMAN: All right. Walk  
18 me through what happened on Friday.

19 OFFICER DRAUSCHKE: So on Friday when the  
20 officers had arrived, as I stated, I was one of the  
21 back-up units to respond as well. The other officer  
22 that was in charge of that sector as well as the  
23 back-up unit that were interviewing the male party  
24 outside that was the victim, he was explaining what had



1 happened and from my understanding, when I arrived, the  
2 other individual, Mr. Greenough, had already left the  
3 scene, was believed to be with a female. So when I  
4 arrived, the victim walked with the officers inside to  
5 the residence to explain what was going on and so that  
6 they could speak with the female who was also present  
7 during the incident.

8           DETECTIVE LIEUTENANT BULMAN: Did you partake  
9 in any of those interviews?

10           OFFICER DRAUSCHKE: I was just standing in the  
11 background as an extra officer on scene to assist if I  
12 could. I was not asking any specific questions for the  
13 report because it was the reporting officer that was  
14 taking down any pertinent information.

15           So I was observing and the gentleman did speak  
16 with me. He did, you know, repeat several times about  
17 what had occurred, you know, while I was standing there  
18 present in the room.

19           DETECTIVE LIEUTENANT BULMAN: And what was your  
20 understanding of what occurred there if you could --

21           OFFICER DRAUSCHKE: From what my understanding  
22 was was Mr. Greenough had come home from a wake for a  
23 friend of theirs during the afternoon or nighttime and  
24 evidently, was very upset. It appeared that there had

1 been sort of an argument between Mr. Greenough and the  
2 victim where he had been inside the residence and  
3 smashed either a table or the kitchen table that was in  
4 the room. I observed that both -- the chairs and the  
5 table were on the ground in pieces. He stated that at  
6 some point Mr. Greenough had finished and destroyed the  
7 rest of the -- either the table or chairs at some point  
8 during the time. And from my understanding this  
9 argument turned into a physical altercation where they  
10 had put each other in headlocks and evidently, they  
11 wrestled back and forth.

12 I believe it was Officer Savio who spoke with  
13 the female party that was upstairs.

14 DETECTIVE LIEUTENANT BULMAN: I'm sorry.

15 OFFICER DRAUSCHKE: Yeah.

16 DETECTIVE LIEUTENANT BULMAN: Do you know who  
17 was doing the interview, the primary that was doing the  
18 questioning for that portion with the male victim?

19 OFFICER DRAUSCHKE: If I recall correctly, it  
20 was both Officer Fontes and Officer Savio.

21 DETECTIVE LIEUTENANT BULMAN: Okay. I'm sorry.  
22 Keep going.

23 OFFICER DRAUSCHKE: So while we were downstairs  
24 with the male victim, Officer Savio had gone upstairs

1 to speak with the female. At this time, I had checked  
2 one of the bedrooms that was off to the right that from  
3 my understanding was Mr. Greenough's room, make sure he  
4 wasn't still in the residence and also checked down in  
5 the basement to make sure that he wasn't still there.

6 We had gone upstairs and checked upstairs to  
7 make sure he also wasn't up there. I was not present  
8 during the interview between Officer Savio and the  
9 female, so I don't know what she had explained. But  
10 when they had come back down and we had all spoke, from  
11 my understanding, she had been assaulted as well from  
12 Mr. Greenough.

13 DETECTIVE LIEUTENANT BULMAN: And that was  
14 related to you by Savio saying this is what she told  
15 me?

16 OFFICER DRAUSCHKE: Right. That's all the  
17 officers were speaking together in the room. That's  
18 what I had heard.

19 DETECTIVE LIEUTENANT BULMAN: So you basically  
20 heard like a recap of like --

21 OFFICER DRAUSCHKE: Correct.

22 DETECTIVE LIEUTENANT BULMAN: -- she told me  
23 this and he told me that.

24 OFFICER DRAUSCHKE: Correct.

1 DETECTIVE LIEUTENANT BULMAN: Okay.

2 OFFICER DRAUSCHKE: And, as I stated, the  
3 gentleman that was the male victim kept on repeating  
4 himself. He appeared to have had some alcohol that  
5 night and seemed to be repeating like a broken record  
6 what had been going on, the fact that, you know, he had  
7 come home from work, had a few drinks. Alan came home  
8 upset and that, you know, the table and the chair had  
9 gotten smashed and he had been in a physical  
10 altercation with Alan which resulted in injuries to  
11 him. He had a bloody lip. He had a mark on his neck  
12 in which he indicated had been from wrestling around  
13 and been in the headlock with him.

14 DETECTIVE LIEUTENANT BULMAN: I don't think I  
15 asked you, but have you ever had any police  
16 interactions with the male victim, Alan's roommate?

17 OFFICER DRAUSCHKE: I had been down there for  
18 similar incidents where there was a disturbance between  
19 the two individuals. The last time I had actually been  
20 there I recall the male that was the victim Friday  
21 night had to call his mother to come and pick him up  
22 because he was actually locked outside of the  
23 residence.

24 DETECTIVE LIEUTENANT BULMAN: Do you remember

1 when that was; the last time that was? Ballpark it.

2 OFFICER DRAUSCHKE: I'd say less than six  
3 months prior.

4 DETECTIVE LIEUTENANT BULMAN: And he was locked  
5 out of the house by Greenough?

6 OFFICER DRAUSCHKE: Correct. And, if I recall  
7 correctly, it was that night that Mr. Greenough was  
8 hiding upstairs inside the residence and was refusing  
9 to come down and speak with officers or to allow us in  
10 there to ascertain his side of what had occurred. And  
11 that's the night I recall that the victim from Friday  
12 night actually, like I said, had to call his mom for a  
13 ride to get out of there because had no way to get in.

14 DETECTIVE LIEUTENANT BULMAN: So you're at the  
15 point where you guys are conversing about what the two  
16 victims said to each other. What happened after that?

17 OFFICER DRAUSCHKE: So from after that, it was  
18 determined that there were going to be criminal charges  
19 filed. I was not the deciding officer and the specific  
20 charges that were going forward, but from my  
21 understanding, it was going to be for an assault and  
22 battery and that they had put a BOLO for Mr. Greenough  
23 for a domestic assault and battery on a roommate as  
24 well as for the assault and battery that had occurred

1 on the female.

2           Also, while I was inside the residence and I  
3 had searched Mr. Greenough's room to make sure that he  
4 wasn't in there, during the process, I had taken note  
5 of several things that were inside his room that just  
6 appeared a little out of the normal for me. One which  
7 was appeared to be an older hatchet that was up over  
8 the mantel piece. It looked like it was rusted with  
9 the old wooden handle. It just seemed a little odd.  
10 And then I had also noticed that there was what  
11 appeared to be what I recognized from my training and  
12 experience is a gun lock with the long cable strand and  
13 the yellow mechanism -- locking mechanism. It was on  
14 the table.

15           While I had seen that, I had heard one of the  
16 officers reading through the sheet asked -- for  
17 domestic disturbances asking the victim if he knew if  
18 Mr. Greenough had a firearm or would be able to get one  
19 easily, and I recall him saying no, but it still seemed  
20 unusual for him to have that specific item there. And  
21 I recall either advising all the officers or a few of  
22 the officers that I had seen it in there and I  
23 understood that the victim had said no, that he didn't  
24 have a firearm, but that, to me, seemed a little out of

1 place. That's not something someone would normally just  
2 have sitting on a table in their bedroom.

3 DETECTIVE LIEUTENANT BULMAN: And the lock  
4 you're referring to, based on your training and  
5 experience, that is a lock that's utilized to lock up  
6 firearms?

7 OFFICER DRAUSCHKE: Right. That's correct.  
8 And I recognized it as one that we generally as a  
9 department issue to officers that I have seen before  
10 this incident.

11 DETECTIVE LIEUTENANT BULMAN: Did you bring  
12 that lock to the attention of the officers?

13 OFFICER DRAUSCHKE: I did make note of it. I  
14 told them that -- you know, I said it seems a little  
15 strange that there's a gun lock there. I said I know  
16 you just said no, that, you know, he doesn't have  
17 anything, but that's a little odd. But I don't think  
18 anyone else seemed to make a big deal out of it.

19 DETECTIVE LIEUTENANT BULMAN: Okay. What  
20 happened next?

21 OFFICER DRAUSCHKE: After they had put out the  
22 BOLO that they were looking for Mr. Greenough that  
23 charges were going to be filed, I advised the other  
24 officers that if they didn't need me any further that I

1 would be clearing from the scene. I cleared from the  
2 scene and I actually had responded to another call  
3 shortly after.

4 DETECTIVE LIEUTENANT BULMAN: Okay. So while  
5 you were there, they put out a BOLO for Mr. Greenough  
6 --

7 OFFICER DRAUSCHKE: Correct.

8 DETECTIVE LIEUTENANT BULMAN: -- and then after  
9 that BOLO, you recall leaving that scene and just  
10 resuming your normal patrol functions.

11 OFFICER DRAUSCHKE: Correct. Yeah, that's  
12 correct.

13 DETECTIVE LIEUTENANT BULMAN: To the best of  
14 your knowledge, did anybody else encounter Mr.  
15 Greenough that night?

16 OFFICER DRAUSCHKE: Not that I'm aware of, no.

17 DETECTIVE LIEUTENANT BULMAN: Were there any  
18 other radio transmissions regarding Mr. Greenough that  
19 night?

20 OFFICER DRAUSCHKE: Not that I recall.

21 DETECTIVE LIEUTENANT BULMAN: Are you aware of  
22 any steps people took to actively seek out Mr.  
23 Greenough that night?

24 OFFICER DRAUSCHKE: As far as I'm aware, the



1 report was filed and also, like I said, the BOLO was the  
2 only other thing I was aware of. I know I had spoken  
3 with one of the officers about the actual charges that  
4 were going forward. Actually, I apologize. I believe  
5 sector 1 was actually Officer Vatcher, not Officer  
6 Fontes, because I had spoke with Officer Vatcher  
7 regarding the charges that were going forward, and when  
8 I spoke with him about the charges that were going  
9 forward, I said, you know, are we going to be looking  
10 for the malicious destruction of property, you know,  
11 and questioning -- as of that point, he was filing a  
12 summons for the assault and battery on the male victim  
13 as well as an assault and battery charge for the female  
14 victim as well. And I had not heard any further  
15 transmissions regarding whether anyone had located him  
16 or not.

17 DETECTIVE LIEUTENANT BULMAN: And that's all  
18 you can recall as far as what transpired on the 2nd --  
19 Friday, February 2nd?

20 OFFICER DRAUSCHKE: As far as I can recall,  
21 that's to the best of my knowledge.

22 DETECTIVE LIEUTENANT BULMAN: Any questions,  
23 Rich?

24 LIEUTENANT ABATE: No.

1           OFFICER DRAUSCHKE:  If we could now jump  
2 forward to February 3rd, the Saturday.  If you could  
3 like start at the top of your shift, what was your  
4 assignment --

5           OFFICER DRAUSCHKE:  Okay.

6           DETECTIVE LIEUTENANT BULMAN:  -- and where you  
7 were when you first heard the call.  Just kind of  
8 chronologically walk me through what happened.

9           OFFICER DRAUSCHKE:  Okay.  I had arrived for my  
10 shift was 4:00 to 12:00 -- 4:00 p.m. to 12:00 a.m.  I  
11 arrived in roll call.  I observed that there was no one  
12 else in roll call and was shortly followed by Officer  
13 Savio who came in.  We hadn't even gotten shift  
14 assignments or sector or cars at that point.  We had  
15 spoke with the sergeant who was on duty, Sergeant  
16 Silva, and Lieutenant McKenna, and come to the  
17 understanding that evidently there was another domestic  
18 disturbance at the same location as Friday at 1462 Main  
19 Street, the East Coast Gas.  And from my understanding  
20 it was between the same individuals as Friday night.  
21 And --

22           DETECTIVE LIEUTENANT BULMAN:  So you said  
23 similar incident, same individuals, as Friday night?

24           OFFICER DRAUSCHKE:  Correct.  That's the --

1 that's the information that I was under the  
2 understanding and then day shift officers and from my  
3 understanding several of the officers that were coming  
4 in for the 4:00 to 12:00 shift were also on scene.

5           While I was speaking with both the sergeant and  
6 lieutenant and Officer Savio was walking back and forth  
7 in the hallway speaking with them and hearing what was  
8 going on in dispatch, I was under the understanding  
9 they were going to be sending the fire department up to  
10 the residence because the suspect had dead-bolted the  
11 door and they were unable to gain access into the  
12 residence.

13           DETECTIVE LIEUTENANT BULMAN: And I'm sorry.  
14 Did you hear that from the radio or did you hear that  
15 from Sergeant -- Lieutenant McKenna?

16           OFFICER DRAUSCHKE: I heard it from both the  
17 radio and I heard it from the supervisors that they  
18 were going to be sending the fire department up there.

19           DETECTIVE LIEUTENANT BULMAN: But at this point  
20 you're still in the roll call room with Officer  
21 Vatcher.

22           OFFICER DRAUSCHKE: Going between -- this was  
23 going between roll call and the sergeant's office with  
24 Officer Savio and I recall being in dispatch at one

1 point and hearing dispatchers ask to speak with  
2 Lieutenant McKenna because the fire captain was asking  
3 why they were sending the fire department up there to  
4 respond to access the residence. He stated that he was  
5 going to speak with them -- to the fire captain to  
6 explain the situation.

7           While he had been off and he was, from what I  
8 believe, speaking with the fire captain, I went in and  
9 I was speaking with Sergeant Silva regarding the  
10 incident on Friday night and the incident Saturday  
11 night and the legal --

12           DETECTIVE LIEUTENANT BULMAN: I'm sorry. You  
13 said Friday and Saturday night?

14           OFFICER DRAUSCHKE: I was speaking with him  
15 regarding the incident that had occurred Friday and  
16 what was going on currently --

17           DETECTIVE LIEUTENANT BULMAN: Okay.

18           OFFICER DRAUSCHKE: -- and asking about the  
19 legal course of action that they were going to be  
20 taking as far as if they had PC to arrest for the  
21 incident for Friday night, as well as what they had for  
22 what the situation was going on right now, and if they  
23 had PC to arrest Mr. Greenough based on what had  
24 occurred Friday night.

1           Lieutenant McKenna came into the room and was  
2 also conversing with the two of us and at that point I  
3 had spoke with Officer Savio and informed him that  
4 Lieutenant McKenna was going to request that we go down  
5 to the scene, find a cruiser, and go down to the scene.  
6 We went down to roll call. We took a set of keys.  
7 Unfortunately, the keys I had taken didn't go to any of  
8 the vehicles that were out back. We didn't have a  
9 marked unit that had a key available, so as we started  
10 to come back in towards the back door of the station, a  
11 transmission came over the radio from Officer Wilson  
12 that the situation was becoming a shit storm and that  
13 the suspect had a pole and was locked inside with a  
14 pole.

15           And then I recall hearing dispatch ask him  
16 again or someone asking him again over the radio to  
17 confirm that information and hearing him say that it  
18 was a shit storm, that they had -- the suspect was  
19 locked inside the unit with a pole.

20           DETECTIVE LIEUTENANT BULMAN: Then what did you  
21 do?

22           OFFICER DRAUSCHKE: At this point, I went back  
23 in and I determined that the only keys that we were  
24 going to be able to have that we would be able to use

1 were the animal control officer's van. So I took those  
2 keys and I informed Officer Savio that that's the  
3 vehicle we were going to be going up to the scene with,  
4 and I informed Lieutenant McKenna who had asked if we  
5 were going up there again, I informed him that we were  
6 going to be going up to the scene.

7           Sergeant Silva was also at that point going to  
8 be responding to the scene. We got inside the animal  
9 control officer's van.

10           DETECTIVE LIEUTENANT BULMAN: When you say  
11 "we", can you clarify?

12           OFFICER DRAUSCHKE: Me and Officer Savio. We  
13 put our equipment in the ACO van, the animal control  
14 officer van, and we started to pull out. We had the  
15 lights that were on in that vehicle. We used them. We  
16 used the siren. We then determined -- Sergeant Silva  
17 was behind us. We determined that it was better to let  
18 him pull in front of us with the supervisor vehicle,  
19 pulled behind him. So when we got to the scene at 1462  
20 Main Street, he actually arrived -- the sergeant  
21 arrived right in front of us. We pulled up inside --  
22 in front of the gas station closest to the road sign  
23 that's near the street.

24           At that point, all the other officers were on

1 scene, the fire department was on scene, Sergeant Silva  
2 had gotten on scene just before us. While speaking  
3 with Officer Vatcher from what I recall, he can confirm  
4 that they had seen him, Mr. Greenough, inside the  
5 residence. From what I recall, Officer Lee and Officer  
6 Gooley were still trying to bang on the front door to  
7 the residence to try to gain access.

8           Someone, I don't recall who it was, but someone  
9 had mentioned if anyone had been to the back of the  
10 house and someone had observed in the back of the house  
11 -- it had come across my knowledge someone observed in  
12 the back of the house there was an open window where  
13 the fire department would be able to gain access if  
14 necessary.

15           I recall Officer Savio going to the right side  
16 of the residence and going around to the back. At this  
17 point, I recall what I understood was two employees  
18 coming from the front of the gas station, one of them  
19 stated the door that leads from the garage, the office  
20 garage area of the gas station into the apartment  
21 residence had either been unlocked or was open, and he  
22 had just been inside and Alan was not inside there.

23           DETECTIVE LIEUTENANT BULMAN: Do you know who  
24 the gas station employee was?

1           OFFICER DRAUSCHKE: From what I later found  
2 out, I believe it was Mr. Greenough's brother. I don't  
3 know whether he's an employee or if he was just there.  
4 I was under the understanding that he was an employee,  
5 but I later found out that I believe it was his  
6 brother.

7           DETECTIVE LIEUTENANT BULMAN: Do you know who  
8 the brother -- so were you present when the brother  
9 relayed to someone that the door --

10          OFFICER DRAUSCHKE: Correct.

11          DETECTIVE LIEUTENANT BULMAN: -- station --

12          OFFICER DRAUSCHKE: Correct.

13          DETECTIVE LIEUTENANT BULMAN: And who did the  
14 brother relay that to? Was it to you directly or --

15          OFFICER DRAUSCHKE: He was relaying it to the  
16 officers that were out -- standing out -- anyone that  
17 was standing out in front. It wasn't directed towards  
18 any specific person.

19                 And from what I recall, I went in to that area  
20 through the front door that leads into the office of  
21 the gas station. I was behind -- I recall Sergeant  
22 Silva being there. I had asked the gentleman that had  
23 informed us about the door being open if any of the  
24 doors that were inside the office area if they led



1 outside and he informed me that no, they were either the  
2 bathroom or that they didn't lead outside.

3           Sergeant Silva had been in front of me and  
4 entered the residence through that -- like I said that  
5 back door prior to -- before I did. As soon as I  
6 started to clear through the threshold of that door,  
7 Sergeant Silva had asked why was no one outside in the  
8 back of the residence for the officers that were there.  
9 If there had been officers on scene, why was no one  
10 covering the back?

11           DETECTIVE LIEUTENANT BULMAN: Okay. Can I stop  
12 you there real quick?

13           OFFICER DRAUSCHKE: Yeah.

14           DETECTIVE LIEUTENANT BULMAN: Just so I have  
15 clarification. Sergeant Silva learns that the door  
16 from the office of the gas station is open and that  
17 doorway actually leads into the apartment.

18           OFFICER DRAUSCHKE: Correct.

19           DETECTIVE LIEUTENANT BULMAN: So he decides to  
20 open the door and enter the apartment to look for this  
21 individual?

22           OFFICER DRAUSCHKE: There were several  
23 officers. I don't recall who was the first inside the  
24 residence because I was speaking to who I later found

1 out was the brother about whether the two doors led  
2 outside, so I was not aware of who entered the  
3 residence first through that door. But --

4 DETECTIVE LIEUTENANT BULMAN: But you know  
5 Sergeant --

6 OFFICER DRAUSCHKE: -- I recall Sergeant Silva  
7 was in front of me.

8 DETECTIVE LIEUTENANT BULMAN: Okay. So you're  
9 following Silva and as you're entering the doorway to  
10 this apartment, Silva says -- repeat that, again.

11 OFFICER DRAUSCHKE: He said that, you know, if  
12 there's officers on scene -- something to the nature of  
13 if there's officers on scene, why was no one covering  
14 the back of the house or checking to make sure that he  
15 didn't exit through the back of the house.

16 I took it upon myself as that's a sign that I  
17 should be going out as well to start looking for Mr.  
18 Greenough. So, at that time, I had exited from the  
19 office area through the front by the gas station and I  
20 had asked the two individuals, like I said, the one  
21 that I later found out was Mr. Greenough's brother and  
22 another older gentleman what his description was,  
23 because it had been some time since I had seen Mr.  
24 Greenough. And the explanation and the description I

1 had of him that they gave as I was quickly exiting the  
2 gas station was he's tall and he's skinny. And from  
3 what I recall he was a white male.

4 DETECTIVE LIEUTENANT BULMAN: So you asked  
5 Greenough's brother if -- Anthony.

6 OFFICER DRAUSCHKE: I didn't know who he was at  
7 that point.

8 DETECTIVE LIEUTENANT BULMAN: Okay.

9 OFFICER DRAUSCHKE: Like I said, I just -- I  
10 had just quickly asked as I was exiting because I was  
11 under the understanding they were either familiar with  
12 him or that they worked there what the description was.

13 DETECTIVE LIEUTENANT BULMAN: Okay. So you  
14 asked him what he was wearing or what --

15 OFFICER DRAUSCHKE: I just asked what he looked  
16 like and he said, you know, tall -- tall and skinny.

17 DETECTIVE LIEUTENANT BULMAN: And then what  
18 happened?

19 OFFICER DRAUSCHKE: Okay. I'm just going to  
20 give you an overview. This gas station is cluttered  
21 with many vehicles. It's not just a gas station. It's  
22 also a repair shop from my understanding. There are  
23 numerous vehicles that were in the main part of the  
24 parking lot as well as in an area that's behind a small

1 section of fence that's also more vehicles and a bunch  
2 of junk that's, you know, associated with the gas  
3 station.

4           So I exited. I didn't immediately see him in  
5 the main parking lot. From what I scanned, I could not  
6 see him. So then I started to go around towards the  
7 back of the fenced in area where there were other  
8 vehicles. I slowed down and I knew -- the information  
9 that I had in my head was that he had been armed with a  
10 pole is what had come over the radio, so I knew he may  
11 be armed, so I had the latch down on my firearm, my  
12 hand on my firearm, but still in the holster.

13           DETECTIVE LIEUTENANT BULMAN: Can I slow you  
14 down a little bit so I can catch up --

15           OFFICER DRAUSCHKE: Yes, sir.

16           DETECTIVE LIEUTENANT BULMAN: -- on my notes.  
17 You knew he was armed with a pole.

18           OFFICER DRAUSCHKE: I knew he had been armed  
19 with a pole and that information had come, as I said,  
20 had come over the radio while he had been locked inside  
21 the residence.

22           DETECTIVE LIEUTENANT BULMAN: Did you have any  
23 ideas that he might be potentially armed with anything  
24 based on your previous night's encounter?

1           OFFICER DRAUSCHKE: Well, as I had mentioned, I  
2 had taken a mental note the night before of the items  
3 that I had seen in his residence, you know, between the  
4 hatchet and the gun lock, and even though the roommate  
5 had said that he was not aware that he had -- you know,  
6 that he didn't have a firearm or didn't believe he had  
7 easy access that possibility was still in my head that  
8 that could be -- there could be a firearm present.

9           DETECTIVE LIEUTENANT BULMAN: Okay. Then what  
10 happened?

11           OFFICER DRAUSCHKE: I started to scan the back  
12 area looking for any movement, looking for Mr.  
13 Greenough, anyone that could possibly be out back. I  
14 didn't see any other officers or anyone else out back,  
15 like I mentioned, of that back fenced-in area where  
16 there were other vehicles.

17           As I started to walk behind the fence line of  
18 where the vehicles were, I had observed there was a --  
19 either an orange or rusty-colored Hummer, I believe it  
20 was a H2 model, that was faced with the front end  
21 pointing towards the fence line. I believe it's west  
22 if I'm correct.

23           As I started to approach that Hummer, I  
24 observed through the front passenger window what

1 appeared to be a tall, skinny white male that was  
2 leaning towards the center of the vehicle attempting to  
3 conceal himself inside the vehicle. I'm sorry.

4 DETECTIVE LIEUTENANT BULMAN: Just hold on for  
5 one second. Just for clarity, you were walking around  
6 the fence and you're looking in the passenger side  
7 front window.

8 OFFICER DRAUSCHKE: Correct.

9 DETECTIVE LIEUTENANT BULMAN: Of the Hummer.

10 OFFICER DRAUSCHKE: Correct.

11 DETECTIVE LIEUTENANT BULMAN: Okay. All right.  
12 Go ahead.

13 OFFICER DRAUSCHKE: And as I had seen him  
14 there, I recall calling over the radio and making a  
15 transmission that I had located the individual hiding  
16 in a Hummer out in the back of the gas station.

17 At that point, I said Alan, get out of the car.  
18 I then opened the vehicle door and I observed him still  
19 leaning towards the center of the vehicle and I  
20 observed that both of his hands were tucked inside his  
21 sweatshirt or outer jacket that he was wearing front  
22 pockets. I said show me your hands and he said  
23 something to the nature of fuck you. I then drew my  
24 firearm fearing that he may have a -- either still have

1 a pole, a gun or another weapon concealed in there and  
2 that's why he's not listening to my verbal commands. I  
3 drew my firearm. I drew down on him and I ordered him  
4 to show me his hands. He then said something to the  
5 extent of fuckin' shoot me and as quick as that  
6 happened, he started to get up and out of the vehicle  
7 and still had his hands inside his pockets. I then,  
8 based on my training and experience, created distance,  
9 backed up with my firearm still trained on him,  
10 continuing to give him orders to show me his hands,  
11 take his hands out of his pockets and show me his  
12 hands. And I don't recall how many times I had said  
13 it. I had said it numerous times over and over and he  
14 continued to say, "Shoot me. Fuckin' shoot me. Shoot  
15 me."

16           And as quick as this is all happening, he  
17 started to come towards me. Knowing my background,  
18 knowing that there were other vehicles around, that  
19 there wasn't many places to turn and to go to and that  
20 he had every opportunity to comply, I felt if he gets  
21 any closer, he's going to pull a weapon and he's either  
22 going to seriously injure me or he's going to kill me.  
23 That's his intent. If he's not willing to comply with  
24 what I'm telling him, giving him verbal commands at

1 gunpoint, he has no other intent than to seriously  
2 injure me or kill me.

3 DETECTIVE LIEUTENANT BULMAN: Can I stop you  
4 right there?

5 OFFICER DRAUSCHKE: Yes, sir.

6 DETECTIVE LIEUTENANT BULMAN: Can you -- can  
7 you articulate again best guess how many times you told  
8 him to, you know, show me your hands while he's both  
9 inside the car and as he's getting outside the car.

10 OFFICER DRAUSCHKE: I would say more than six  
11 times, and that's to the best of my recollection.

12 DETECTIVE LIEUTENANT BULMAN: And how many  
13 times could you -- can you recall that he said, "Shoot  
14 me. Shoot me. Shoot me.?"

15 OFFICER DRAUSCHKE: It was after every time I  
16 had given him commands. He was continuing to repeat  
17 that. "Shoot me," or, "fuckin' shoot me." And failed  
18 to comply.

19 DETECTIVE LIEUTENANT BULMAN: So as he's  
20 getting out of the car -- in your own words, we've said  
21 his hands were in his pockets.

22 OFFICER DRAUSCHKE: Correct. And as he's -- as  
23 he's getting out of the car in an aggressive manner,  
24 and he wasn't just saying this, he was yelling, "Shoot



1 me. Fuckin' shoot me." I knew he wasn't in the right  
2 state of mind. He wasn't calm. He was angry and when  
3 he started yelling and he started coming towards me, it  
4 was in an aggressive manner. And as he started to come  
5 towards me, he was closing the gap faster than I had  
6 been stepping back and he was closing that gap between  
7 us.

8 DETECTIVE LIEUTENANT BULMAN: Where were you at  
9 this point? This is -- this is kind of critical. Were  
10 you still -- was your left side directly next to the  
11 Hummer? So were you backing up --

12 OFFICER DRAUSCHKE: I was backing up, so from  
13 what I recall, I was towards the back of the Hummer  
14 still --

15 DETECTIVE LIEUTENANT BULMAN: By the rear  
16 bumper?

17 OFFICER DRAUSCHKE: -- from my best  
18 recollection, near probably the back of the vehicle,  
19 somewhat near the fence line, and there were other  
20 vehicles that were also behind. I can't recollect what  
21 specific vehicle was around me, but -- and as I started  
22 to back up, I recall my left side was still to the  
23 Hummer, he was still directly in front of me.

24 DETECTIVE LIEUTENANT BULMAN: How quickly did

1 this happen?

2           OFFICER DRAUSCHKE: I would say it appeared  
3 very fast. As fast as I could say, Alan, get out of  
4 the car. "Fuck you." "Show me your hands, now. Show  
5 me your hands." "Fuck you. Shoot me. Shoot me." I  
6 start backing up a few feet. "Fuckin' shoot me, shoot  
7 me." "Show me your hands. Show me your hands. Show  
8 me your hands." He starts coming towards me and then I  
9 fired two shots once I felt that if he had gotten any  
10 closer, that was when I was going to get seriously  
11 injured or killed. To me, it felt like it was less  
12 than a minute.

13           DETECTIVE LIEUTENANT BULMAN: Less than a  
14 minute? Okay. Less than a minute from the time you  
15 saw him in the car --

16           OFFICER DRAUSCHKE: And started speaking with  
17 him and opening the door.

18           DETECTIVE LIEUTENANT BULMAN: Were you speaking  
19 to him prior to opening the door?

20           OFFICER DRAUSCHKE: No. I had made the  
21 transmission that I had located him and then as I  
22 started -- and I'm saying approximately a minute to my  
23 best recollection from the time of opening the door and  
24 telling him to get out of the car, seeing his hands in

1 his pockets and that whole interaction of actually  
2 speaking with him.

3 DETECTIVE LIEUTENANT BULMAN: Okay. So you had  
4 mentioned, and I'm just trying to get as clear a  
5 picture as I can of this, you see him in the car and  
6 he's -- is he in the passenger side and he's leaning  
7 over the center console?

8 OFFICER DRAUSCHKE: That's correct. Yes, he  
9 was in the passenger side leaning towards the center of  
10 the vehicle.

11 DETECTIVE LIEUTENANT BULMAN: So you couldn't  
12 see his hands.

13 OFFICER DRAUSCHKE: I saw his hands once I  
14 opened the door. I recall seeing his hands inside his  
15 pockets.

16 DETECTIVE LIEUTENANT BULMAN: And they were  
17 inside his pockets.

18 OFFICER DRAUSCHKE: Correct.

19 DETECTIVE LIEUTENANT BULMAN: Okay. So the  
20 door is open. You tell him to get out. Walk me --

21 OFFICER DRAUSCHKE: And I see -- and I told him  
22 to get out as I'm opening the door. I see that his  
23 hands are in his pockets and I immediately say to show  
24 me his hands.

1           DETECTIVE LIEUTENANT BULMAN: And you don't  
2 have your firearm out at this point.

3           OFFICER DRAUSCHKE: I didn't have my firearm.  
4 I had my hand on my firearm, the latch was down, but I  
5 still had holstered.

6           DETECTIVE LIEUTENANT BULMAN: Okay.

7           OFFICER DRAUSCHKE: When he did not comply with  
8 my first order to show me his hands is when I drew my  
9 firearm.

10          DETECTIVE LIEUTENANT BULMAN: Okay.

11          OFFICER DRAUSCHKE: And that's when I continued  
12 -- I backed up and I continued to give him orders. As  
13 I realized he was not going to comply, I determined  
14 that I needed to create officer safety. I needed to  
15 back up and create distance. This is going to be come  
16 hostile. This is immediately going to become hostile.  
17 If he's already not listening to me, what else is he  
18 willing to do. What else is he willing to do to anyone  
19 else?

20                 And, at that point, like I had mentioned that's  
21 when I started backing up continuing to give him the  
22 orders, the verbal commands to show me his hands, him  
23 continuing to not comply, yelling, "Shoot me. Fuckin'  
24 shoot me." And then, like I said, at the point where I

1 felt he was on top of me and I have to pull the trigger,  
2 that's when I made the decision that my life was in  
3 danger. I need to do this.

4 DETECTIVE LIEUTENANT BULMAN: Where were you  
5 when that occurred when you were at that position?  
6 Were you at the back of the --

7 OFFICER DRAUSCHKE: As I mentioned at the back  
8 of the vehicle.

9 DETECTIVE LIEUTENANT BULMAN: So you're -- are  
10 you -- are you in line with the bumper or is the -- are  
11 you behind the bumper --

12 OFFICER DRAUSCHKE: I don't recall -- I don't  
13 recall whether I had been past the vehicle or still in  
14 line with the vehicle, but I remember being back  
15 towards the back of the vehicle, because I had tried to  
16 create distance away from him.

17 DETECTIVE LIEUTENANT BULMAN: To the best of  
18 your recollection, how close did he come to you before  
19 you fired?

20 OFFICER DRAUSCHKE: I would say it was less  
21 than a body distance away.

22 DETECTIVE LIEUTENANT BULMAN: When you say a  
23 body distance --

24 OFFICER DRAUSCHKE: I feel less than six feet.

1           DETECTIVE LIEUTENANT BULMAN: Less than six  
2 feet.

3           OFFICER DRAUSCHKE: And that's to the best of  
4 my recollection.

5           DETECTIVE LIEUTENANT BULMAN: And you mentioned  
6 he appeared angry. Could you describe what made you  
7 feel -- was it a facial expression? Was it his  
8 demeanor -- his whole demeanor --

9           OFFICER DRAUSCHKE: Well, it was the fact that  
10 he wasn't -- he wasn't just saying shoot me, fuckin'  
11 shoot me, he was yelling it. He had the facial  
12 expression of being angry when he was yelling shoot me,  
13 fuckin' shoot me. And coming towards -- charging  
14 towards me, you know, as I said, closing that distance,  
15 it wasn't just a calm demeanor.

16           DETECTIVE LIEUTENANT BULMAN: Okay.

17           OFFICER DRAUSCHKE: He was obviously not in the  
18 right state of mind. He was not -- he wasn't listening  
19 to verbal commands. Any normal person would have  
20 either listened to verbal commands or under a threat of  
21 having a firearm pointed at him would have listened to  
22 verbal commands. He had the opportunity. He could  
23 have complied. He could've tried to run away, but he  
24 chose to keep his hands in his pockets, not listening,

1 not complying, and to come directly towards me.

2 DETECTIVE LIEUTENANT BULMAN: Okay. Were there  
3 any other avenues of escape for him aside from the --  
4 now, the door is open.

5 OFFICER DRAUSCHKE: Correct.

6 DETECTIVE LIEUTENANT BULMAN: Is that blocking  
7 an avenue or could he have gone around the door --

8 OFFICER DRAUSCHKE: He could have gone around  
9 the door. There were other places that he would have  
10 been able to -- I recall there being some sort of  
11 either leaves or snow pile that he could have gone up  
12 and over or gone the way that I had initially come  
13 behind the fence line.

14 DETECTIVE LIEUTENANT BULMAN: Uh-huh  
15 (affirmative).

16 OFFICER DRAUSCHKE: To try to run away or  
17 escape, but like I said, he chose to come directly  
18 towards me.

19 DETECTIVE LIEUTENANT BULMAN: Okay.

20 OFFICER DRAUSCHKE: He could've locked the door  
21 of the vehicle. There were other options. And that's  
22 how I knew that I was fearing for my life and that he  
23 had an intent to either seriously injure or kill me.  
24 If he's coming towards me and he has other avenues, and

1 this is the actions that he's choosing to take and to  
2 come directly towards me in an aggressive manner not  
3 complying to anything that I'm giving him.

4 DETECTIVE LIEUTENANT BULMAN: Were you able --  
5 were you making eye contact with him?

6 OFFICER DRAUSCHKE: I had my eyes trained on  
7 his hands, trying to watch him, his hands and where he  
8 was ending up, what direction he was moving in. At  
9 that point in time, his face really wasn't relative,  
10 because I was concentrating on what was coming out of  
11 his pockets or if his hands were staying in his pockets  
12 and his action, as I mentioned, coming towards me.

13 DETECTIVE LIEUTENANT BULMAN: Did he say  
14 anything else prior to getting shot?

15 OFFICER DRAUSCHKE: That's all I recall.

16 DETECTIVE LIEUTENANT BULMAN: Okay. What  
17 happened after you fired?

18 OFFICER DRAUSCHKE: After I had fired, I recall  
19 him going down on to the ground and when I was looking  
20 down and still holding him cover, I recall him being  
21 down on his arms -- or his knees and his elbows, and I  
22 could hear him wheezing, and I knew that he was  
23 spitting up blood. At that point while I was still  
24 attempting to try to cover him and try -- I don't know



1 whether he physically couldn't or if he just didn't --  
2 wasn't listening to my commands to show me his hands  
3 and bring his hands out to the side, he still wasn't  
4 complying.

5           As I'm trying to hold cover on him, I heard a  
6 voice come from the right-hand side where I had  
7 initially started out over by the fence line saying,  
8 "You shot my brother? You shot my fuckin' brother?"  
9 At that point, I had determined that that was his  
10 family member. I was trying to get him -- tell him to  
11 get out of there, clear the scene, get out of there.

12           He eventually walked off and as I was  
13 continuing to hold cover on him, I was attempting to  
14 call in my location that I had shots fired, the suspect  
15 was down and the first officer to arrive after I had  
16 made those transmissions, I heard officers yelling,  
17 "Where are you?". I could hear them out in the open  
18 yelling and over the radio yelling, "Where are you?" I  
19 tried to construe my location was behind the Hummer  
20 over behind the fence line in the back of the parking  
21 lot.

22           I recall Officer Gooley being the first one to  
23 come up behind me. As I was holding cover, I holstered  
24 my firearm. We were able to handcuff him. I attempted

1 to give him a quick pat-down to search and check and see  
2 what had been -- what is in the pockets where his hands  
3 had been, his side pockets, and his back waist line.  
4 At that point, Officer Lee also arrived and I could  
5 hear a voice from behind me I recognized as Sergeant  
6 Silva saying, "We need to flip him over. We need to  
7 start administering aid."

8           At that time, we immediately flipped him over.  
9 We used my work knife to cut his shirt open, assess  
10 where the injuries were. Officer Lee started giving --  
11 we started checking for a pulse, breathing. He did  
12 appear to have a pulse. He had blood in his mouth so  
13 he started gurgling. I had called for an ambu-bag. I  
14 had called for an AED and as Officer Lee started giving  
15 compressions, I started trying to assist Officer Gooley  
16 with turning his head to --

17           DETECTIVE LIEUTENANT BULMAN: Can I stop you  
18 right there?

19           OFFICER DRAUSCHKE: Yeah.

20           DETECTIVE LIEUTENANT BULMAN: You kind of talk  
21 a little fast.

22           OFFICER DRAUSCHKE: Sorry.

23           DETECTIVE LIEUTENANT BULMAN: So Officer Gooley  
24 arrives on scene.

1 OFFICER DRAUSCHKE: Correct.

2 DETECTIVE LIEUTENANT BULMAN: You guys were  
3 able to handcuff --

4 OFFICER DRAUSCHKE: Correct.

5 DETECTIVE LIEUTENANT BULMAN: -- him at that  
6 point, and then you start frisking his pockets.

7 OFFICER DRAUSCHKE: Correct.

8 DETECTIVE LIEUTENANT BULMAN: And, at some  
9 point, Officer Lee arrives on scene --

10 OFFICER DRAUSCHKE: Correct.

11 DETECTIVE LIEUTENANT BULMAN: -- and you guys  
12 make the determination that you have to start doing  
13 CPR.

14 OFFICER DRAUSCHKE: Correct.

15 DETECTIVE LIEUTENANT BULMAN: Is that when  
16 Sergeant --

17 OFFICER DRAUSCHKE: And that's when I heard --  
18 when I recognized Sergeant Silva's voice saying we need  
19 to start administering aid, because I had not located  
20 any -- anything -- any weapons or anything in the  
21 immediate area that I had quickly pat-frisked. I don't  
22 know if anything had fallen out. I don't know if  
23 anything was still there that I just had not covered.  
24 We had rolled him over at that point and that's when I

1 said -- I called for the ambu-bag and the AED and we  
2 started administering immediate aid.

3 DETECTIVE LIEUTENANT BULMAN: Okay. Stop right  
4 there one second.

5 OFFICER DRAUSCHKE: Yeah.

6 DETECTIVE LIEUTENANT BULMAN: And now you said  
7 that you -- you had a pocket knife that you utilized.

8 OFFICER DRAUSCHKE: Correct.

9 DETECTIVE LIEUTENANT BULMAN: What did you do  
10 with that pocket knife?

11 OFFICER DRAUSCHKE: It was left on scene from  
12 what I recall. It was left on the ground.

13 DETECTIVE LIEUTENANT BULMAN: But you utilized  
14 that pocket knife to do what?

15 OFFICER DRAUSCHKE: We had -- Officer Lee had  
16 used it to cut his shirt open so that we could check  
17 his injuries.

18 DETECTIVE LIEUTENANT BULMAN: Okay. So you  
19 handed your pocket knife to Officer Lee?

20 OFFICER DRAUSCHKE: Correct.

21 DETECTIVE LIEUTENANT BULMAN: Okay. Did  
22 Officer Lee ask for a knife and you just handed it to  
23 him?

24 OFFICER DRAUSCHKE: Correct. And after that he

1 still had a T-shirt on from what I observed and I was  
2 able to tear his T-shirt open to get down to his skin  
3 to check for his injuries, so they were able to start  
4 giving compressions and start administering that aid.

5 DETECTIVE LIEUTENANT BULMAN: Could you  
6 describe the knife that you handed to Officer Lee?

7 OFFICER DRAUSCHKE: It's a folding knife. It's  
8 gray with a black curved blade.

9 DETECTIVE LIEUTENANT BULMAN: Does it say  
10 anything on it?

11 OFFICER DRAUSCHKE: I believe it's a Smith and  
12 Wesson if I recall correctly.

13 DETECTIVE LIEUTENANT BULMAN: And you think  
14 that was left on the scene?

15 OFFICER DRAUSCHKE: Correct. From the last I  
16 had seen, it was lying on the ground.

17 DETECTIVE LIEUTENANT BULMAN: Okay. So to  
18 resume where we left off, you called for an ambu-bag?

19 OFFICER DRAUSCHKE: Correct.

20 DETECTIVE LIEUTENANT BULMAN: Someone cut part  
21 of his clothing off and then you --

22 OFFICER DRAUSCHKE: Correct.

23 DETECTIVE LIEUTENANT BULMAN: -- ripped the  
24 remaining clothing off?

1 OFFICER DRAUSCHKE: T-shirt, correct. Correct.

2 DETECTIVE LIEUTENANT BULMAN: And then --

3 OFFICER DRAUSCHKE: And then at that point we  
4 observed that he was starting to choke on his blood.

5 DETECTIVE LIEUTENANT BULMAN: Okay.

6 OFFICER DRAUSCHKE: So we turned his head  
7 sideways to try to alleviate and get that blood removed  
8 from his mouth.

9 DETECTIVE LIEUTENANT BULMAN: Okay.

10 OFFICER DRAUSCHKE: I recall right around that  
11 point I had heard a voice from behind me saying, you  
12 know, what happened, who shot him, and I remember  
13 turning around and saying, you know, that it was me.  
14 That, you know -- and described what had happened, that  
15 he was inside the vehicle, had his hands in his  
16 pockets, wouldn't show me his hands repeatedly --

17 DETECTIVE LIEUTENANT BULMAN: Do you remember  
18 who asked you that?

19 OFFICER DRAUSCHKE: At first, I thought it was  
20 the sergeant that had asked, but when I had turned  
21 around, I had observed Officer Wilson.

22 DETECTIVE LIEUTENANT BULMAN: And what did you  
23 tell Wilson?

24 OFFICER DRAUSCHKE: And I had said that, you

1 know, he had his hands in his pockets, he was failing to  
2 comply. I told him to take his hands out of his  
3 pockets. He kept on saying, "Shoot me. Fuckin' shoot  
4 me", and came towards me in an aggressive manner. And  
5 as soon as I had gotten that out, I heard Sergeant  
6 Silva say, "Erik, come over. Go stand by my supervisor  
7 vehicle until I come back over there."

8           So, at that point, I immediately left Mr.  
9 Greenough, I left the other officers and I walked over  
10 to where the supervisor's vehicle had been parked which  
11 was closer to the road, and I was advised to sit  
12 inside. I removed my gloves, which had been covered in  
13 blood, removed my gloves and I was told to sit inside  
14 the supervisor's passenger -- front passenger seat  
15 until they came back over.

16           And, at that point, the fire department had  
17 come over and started to try to clean me up, try to  
18 give me all sorts of antiseptics and all that stuff for  
19 the blood, to treat the blood, wiped off my face,  
20 cleaned me off, gave me several blankets and I was  
21 advised not to talk to anyone and that they were going  
22 to be transporting me to the hospital.

23           DETECTIVE LIEUTENANT BULMAN: And where was the  
24 blood on you?

1           OFFICER DRAUSCHKE: From what I recall, the  
2 blood was all over my -- my gloves were covered in  
3 blood. At least my left knee and leg had blood soaked  
4 into the pants. Unfortunately, I'm not aware of  
5 anywhere else specifically that it was located.

6           DETECTIVE LIEUTENANT BULMAN: You mentioned  
7 that they wiped your face --

8           OFFICER DRAUSCHKE: They did wipe my face  
9 because it was mentioned by Officer Savio that blood  
10 spatter had come out of Mr. Greenough's mouth and he  
11 thought he had felt blood on his face. So as a  
12 precaution I felt it was necessary for my own safety to  
13 make sure that there was no blood on my face or on my  
14 head, anything like that.

15           DETECTIVE LIEUTENANT BULMAN: So you're sitting  
16 in the -- and the fire department has attended to you.  
17 They've given you some blankets. They've wiped you  
18 off. You're waiting now.

19           OFFICER DRAUSCHKE: Correct.

20           DETECTIVE LIEUTENANT BULMAN: And, at some  
21 point, there's a determination made to transport you?

22           OFFICER DRAUSCHKE: Correct.

23           DETECTIVE LIEUTENANT BULMAN: Do you remember  
24 who transported you?



1           OFFICER DRAUSCHKE: From what I recall, it was  
2 North Reading's ambulance that I went over to the  
3 Winchester Hospital in.

4           DETECTIVE LIEUTENANT BULMAN: Do you remember  
5 the crew name?

6           OFFICER DRAUSCHKE: I do not recall.

7           DETECTIVE LIEUTENANT BULMAN: Truck number?  
8 Anything? Run number?

9           OFFICER DRAUSCHKE: Unfortunately, no.

10          DETECTIVE LIEUTENANT BULMAN: And you were  
11 transported to Winchester Hospital?

12          OFFICER DRAUSCHKE: Correct.

13          DETECTIVE LIEUTENANT BULMAN: Do you remember  
14 the name of the attending physician?

15          OFFICER DRAUSCHKE: Dr. Wood, I believe it is.

16          DETECTIVE LIEUTENANT BULMAN: And what happened  
17 at the hospital?

18          OFFICER DRAUSCHKE: They evaluated me, asked  
19 me, you know, if I had any concerns and I had to voice  
20 my concern about, you know, blood exposure. From what  
21 I had understood, Mr. Greenough was a substance abuser,  
22 excuse me, so I had some concerns for universal  
23 precautions and possible medications or procedures that  
24 I needed to take to prevent any blood-borne diseases.

1           DETECTIVE LIEUTENANT BULMAN: So you took those  
2 precautions?

3           OFFICER DRAUSCHKE: Correct. And Officer Savio  
4 was with me inside the emergency room as well.

5           DETECTIVE LIEUTENANT BULMAN: Okay. How -- if  
6 you could describe your mental state at that time.

7           OFFICER DRAUSCHKE: I was shaky. I was in  
8 shock. I mean this is the last thing any officer wants  
9 to ever have to experience in the line of duty. You  
10 know it's a possibility. You know that it could happen  
11 any day. You know you could be killed or seriously  
12 injured, but it was the last thing I ever wanted to  
13 have to face and it's the last thing I ever wanted to  
14 have to encounter. I've been here for over 11 years  
15 and never had this happen. Everything was brand new.  
16 Everything was a shock to me.

17           I mean I had a concern more for my wife as well  
18 because of the fact that we have a just over a two  
19 month old that was at home. What was going through my  
20 head was also the fact is she going to see this on the  
21 news. Is she going to think I'm hurt? I wanted  
22 someone to let her know that I'm okay, but I also knew  
23 because of the protocol that I'm not allowed to explain  
24 and no one is allowed to explain to her what happened

1 and I was like this is going to terrify her even more.  
2 So all this is compounding in my head as well.

3 DETECTIVE LIEUTENANT BULMAN: Okay.

4 OFFICER DRAUSCHKE: Finally, I was able to have  
5 -- Officer Savio was able to reach her and another  
6 officer who I've been friends with my whole life called  
7 and actually went to pick up my wife. That was very  
8 emotional, too.

9 DETECTIVE LIEUTENANT BULMAN: Okay. If I could  
10 just clarify a few things. When you left the office of  
11 the gas station --

12 OFFICER DRAUSCHKE: Uh-huh (affirmative).

13 DETECTIVE LIEUTENANT BULMAN: -- could you  
14 describe the route you took again? How did you -- did  
15 you go right to the fence line or walk along the fence  
16 line or did you go and circle in behind the Hummer? Do  
17 you recall like how you actually --

18 OFFICER DRAUSCHKE: From what I recall exiting  
19 from the front door where the office was because I  
20 recall speaking, as I mentioned, with what I later  
21 found was Mr. Greenough's brother and asking for that  
22 description and the continuing past the building,  
23 taking a right, going behind the fence line.

24 DETECTIVE LIEUTENANT BULMAN: Okay. So you

1 were on the other side of the fence line. So if Main  
2 Street is here, the fence kind of runs perpendicular to  
3 Main Street?

4 OFFICER DRAUSCHKE: Correct.

5 DETECTIVE LIEUTENANT BULMAN: Not  
6 perpendicular.

7 OFFICER DRAUSCHKE: Horizontally.

8 DETECTIVE LIEUTENANT BULMAN: Horizontally with  
9 -- so you were on the --

10 OFFICER DRAUSCHKE: So it's a short section of  
11 fence, so there is a gap on -- so I'm following along  
12 the building side and going towards the --

13 DETECTIVE LIEUTENANT BULMAN: Back --

14 OFFICER DRAUSCHKE: -- back towards the fence  
15 line and there's the short section of the fence and  
16 then there's the far side of the property where these  
17 vehicles. Going -- so following behind the side of the  
18 building and going behind that short section of the  
19 fence.

20 DETECTIVE LIEUTENANT BULMAN: Okay. So --

21 OFFICER DRAUSCHKE: That runs horizontally.

22 DETECTIVE LIEUTENANT BULMAN: So you started  
23 walking. So you're actually behind the fence?

24 OFFICER DRAUSCHKE: Correct.

1           DETECTIVE LIEUTENANT BULMAN:  You're the  
2 opposite side of the fence that Main Street is on.

3           OFFICER DRAUSCHKE:  Correct.

4           DETECTIVE LIEUTENANT BULMAN:  Okay.  And then  
5 you started walking towards the Hummer and the parked  
6 cars?

7           OFFICER DRAUSCHKE:  Correct.

8           DETECTIVE LIEUTENANT BULMAN:  So can you  
9 describe how -- was the Hummer parked in such a manner  
10 that you could look into the passenger side front  
11 window or did you just happen to -- did you come upon  
12 the Hummer when you observed him --

13           OFFICER DRAUSCHKE:  So it was -- when I started  
14 to walk along and I was looking -- you know, panning  
15 across scanning the whole area for any movement, it was  
16 when I got up to -- close enough to the Hummer that I  
17 could see into where the front seat was that I saw him  
18 inside the vehicle.

19           DETECTIVE LIEUTENANT BULMAN:  So, at this  
20 point, is it fair to say -- and, again, correct me if  
21 I'm wrong.  I'm just trying to paint a picture for  
22 myself.

23           OFFICER DRAUSCHKE:  Correct.

24           DETECTIVE LIEUTENANT BULMAN:  Are you at the

1 hood of the Hummer or are you like at the right front  
2 passenger --

3 OFFICER DRAUSCHKE: I was by the front  
4 passenger door from what I recall.

5 DETECTIVE LIEUTENANT BULMAN: Door. So you  
6 happened to look in and that's when you first observed  
7 him --

8 OFFICER DRAUSCHKE: And that's when I first  
9 observed him.

10 DETECTIVE LIEUTENANT BULMAN: Okay. So it's at  
11 that point you open the door and start giving him  
12 commands.

13 OFFICER DRAUSCHKE: And started giving him  
14 commands. Correct.

15 DETECTIVE LIEUTENANT BULMAN: And, again, when  
16 you opened the door, I believe you said your weapon was  
17 not out.

18 OFFICER DRAUSCHKE: Correct.

19 DETECTIVE LIEUTENANT BULMAN: You have a level  
20 3 holster so you flicked the thumb.

21 OFFICER DRAUSCHKE: The thumb latch --

22 DETECTIVE LIEUTENANT BULMAN: The thumb latch.

23 OFFICER DRAUSCHKE: -- it had already been  
24 down. Correct, but the firearm was still holstered.

1 DETECTIVE LIEUTENANT BULMAN: Still holstered.

2 And you're giving him commands at this point --

3 OFFICER DRAUSCHKE: Correct.

4 DETECTIVE LIEUTENANT BULMAN: -- and he's  
5 failing to obey those commands.

6 OFFICER DRAUSCHKE: Correct.

7 DETECTIVE LIEUTENANT BULMAN: He starts exiting  
8 the vehicle. You start retreating backwards towards  
9 the rear of the Hummer --

10 OFFICER DRAUSCHKE: Correct.

11 DETECTIVE LIEUTENANT BULMAN: -- all the while  
12 giving him additional verbal commands. He's ignoring  
13 those commands.

14 OFFICER DRAUSCHKE: Correct.

15 DETECTIVE LIEUTENANT BULMAN: Hands stay in his  
16 pockets.

17 OFFICER DRAUSCHKE: Correct.

18 DETECTIVE LIEUTENANT BULMAN: Exits the  
19 vehicle, hands in his pockets.

20 OFFICER DRAUSCHKE: Correct.

21 DETECTIVE LIEUTENANT BULMAN: He starts  
22 advancing towards you.

23 OFFICER DRAUSCHKE: Correct.

24 DETECTIVE LIEUTENANT BULMAN: You are

1 retreating towards the back of the vehicles. There's  
2 other vehicles parked in and around you.

3 OFFICER DRAUSCHKE: Correct.

4 DETECTIVE LIEUTENANT BULMAN: You feel -- I  
5 believe you used -- was it a contained area?

6 OFFICER DRAUSCHKE: Correct, sir.

7 DETECTIVE LIEUTENANT BULMAN: Okay. So you're  
8 retreating and you get to a point where you're not -- I  
9 think you used the term you weren't backing up quick  
10 enough as he was advancing towards you?

11 OFFICER DRAUSCHKE: And he was closing the gap,  
12 correct.

13 DETECTIVE LIEUTENANT BULMAN: He was closing  
14 the gap. You issued additional commands.

15 OFFICER DRAUSCHKE: As he was continuing  
16 towards me.

17 DETECTIVE LIEUTENANT BULMAN: Okay. And, at  
18 some point, you made the determination that you had to  
19 defend yourself --

20 OFFICER DRAUSCHKE: Correct.

21 DETECTIVE LIEUTENANT BULMAN: -- because you  
22 were in fear.

23 OFFICER DRAUSCHKE: Correct. I thought he was  
24 either going to seriously injure me or kill me with



1 whatever was inside his pocket.

2 DETECTIVE LIEUTENANT BULMAN: After Greenough  
3 was shot, did he say anything to you?

4 OFFICER DRAUSCHKE: I don't recall him saying  
5 anything. I remember hearing him wheeze and taking in  
6 several breaths and loud labored breaths, but I don't  
7 recall him saying anything.

8 DETECTIVE LIEUTENANT BULMAN: Okay. Have you  
9 spoken to anyone else about this incident other than  
10 your attorney?

11 OFFICER DRAUSCHKE: I spoke with Mr. Pasciucco.  
12 I've also spoke with Alan Shapiro. That was one of the  
13 other attorneys handling the case and I was informed  
14 that my wife was a privileged individual who I informed  
15 about the incident privately in our house. I have not  
16 had the chance to speak with any stress counselors or  
17 anyone else, minister or anything like that that had  
18 been privileged, so I have not -- other than those  
19 three individuals, no.

20 DETECTIVE LIEUTENANT BULMAN: Okay. Has anyone  
21 approached you and tried to rely their observations  
22 towards this incident?

23 OFFICER DRAUSCHKE: Other officers and just,  
24 you know, that weren't on scene had just mentioned, you

1 know, I would assume that they had heard about the  
2 incident and, you know, they had just conveyed to me  
3 that, you know, from what they had heard, it sounded  
4 like I did the right thing. But no one had tried to  
5 ask -- they knew they can't ask specific questions.

6 DETECTIVE LIEUTENANT BULMAN: Okay.

7 OFFICER DRAUSCHKE: But they just wanted to  
8 make their opinions known.

9 DETECTIVE LIEUTENANT BULMAN: Okay. If I  
10 showed you a picture of the knife, would you be able to  
11 identify it as your knife?

12 OFFICER DRAUSCHKE: Yes, sir.

13 DETECTIVE LIEUTENANT BULMAN: For the record,  
14 I'm going to refer to a few photographs. If that's all  
15 right with you. I'll show them to you, first.

16 (Pause)

17 OFFICER DRAUSCHKE: Yes, sir. That's my work  
18 knife.

19 DETECTIVE LIEUTENANT BULMAN: Okay. For the  
20 record, I'm going to initial that photograph as number  
21 1.

22 OFFICER DRAUSCHKE: Can I take -- just.

23 DETECTIVE LIEUTENANT BULMAN: That's your  
24 knife?

1           OFFICER DRAUSCHKE:  Yes, sir.

2           DETECTIVE LIEUTENANT BULMAN:  Attorney  
3 Pascuicco, if it's all right with you, I'd just like to  
4 show him a side view of the Hummer just so I can  
5 clarify in my own mind where approximately he was  
6 standing.

7           MR. PASCUICCO:  Sure.

8           (Audio stopped)

9           DETECTIVE LIEUTENANT BULMAN:  The time is 3:22  
10 p.m.  The recorder was just accidentally shut off while  
11 moving a folder on to it.  Resuming the conversation, I  
12 am showing Attorney Pasciucco a photograph of the side  
13 view of the Hummer in order to have the officer  
14 identify where he was standing at the time of the  
15 shooting.

16          DETECTIVE LIEUTENANT BULMAN:  You can just  
17 relay to me where you think that is occurring.

18          OFFICER DRAUSCHKE:  I was right at the back  
19 between where this -- the back of this vehicle is and  
20 the back of the Hummer H2.  Where the blood is right  
21 here where this large pool I would assume is is where  
22 he had rolled over and had started bleeding, was right  
23 there.  So right -- I would say right at the back of  
24 the vehicle, right near where the back of the tire is,

1 was approximately where I had been standing when the  
2 shots were fired.

3 DETECTIVE LIEUTENANT BULMAN: And if you could  
4 direct me to where you think he was -- how far -- how  
5 close he got to you.

6 OFFICER DRAUSCHKE: He -- so he had -- like I  
7 said, he had gotten from what appeared to me was less  
8 than six feet and when he had exited the vehicle, he  
9 had been not far from where the passenger door was and  
10 that's when he started to come towards me.

11 DETECTIVE LIEUTENANT BULMAN: I'm going to  
12 initial that number 2. Did you have anything else,  
13 Rich?

14 LIEUTENANT ABATE: Just at the beginning of  
15 your shift, Erik, you talked about roll call and no  
16 roll call.

17 OFFICER DRAUSCHKE: Correct.

18 LIEUTENANT ABATE: So is it typical for you to  
19 come in there and not have a supervisor and have this  
20 activity going on that --

21 OFFICER DRAUSCHKE: No. We normally sit down  
22 and everyone is there on time. If everything is  
23 working correctly and everyone is sitting down, then  
24 they start going through the roll call process. This

1 is -- when no one is inside roll call or people are  
2 absent or missing, generally something else is going  
3 on, so that's why we went down the hall to find out  
4 what was going on.

5           LIEUTENANT ABATE: And the idea of you going  
6 there wasn't to relieve a shift, but was to have more  
7 bodies at the scene?

8           OFFICER DRAUSCHKE: As a back-up -- correct.

9           LIEUTENANT ABATE: Okay.

10           DETECTIVE LIEUTENANT BULMAN: Erik, could you  
11 describe to me the lighting conditions at the time of  
12 this event?

13           OFFICER DRAUSCHKE: From best I recall, it was  
14 still daylight. It was going to be starting to  
15 approach the time where it would be starting to be  
16 fading light, but from my best recollection, it was  
17 still light out. And that's how I was able to see  
18 inside the vehicle and see him inside.

19           DETECTIVE LIEUTENANT BULMAN: So, Mr. Greenough  
20 would have no doubt that you were a police officer.  
21 You were in full uniform.

22           OFFICER DRAUSCHKE: Correct.

23           DETECTIVE LIEUTENANT BULMAN: Giving him  
24 commands. Okay.

1           OFFICER DRAUSCHKE: Especially at the point  
2 where I had opened the door. I was close enough to the  
3 vehicle, like I said, that he would have heard my radio  
4 transmission as well.

5           DETECTIVE LIEUTENANT BULMAN: I can't think of  
6 anything else. Can you. Do you have any questions for  
7 us, Attorney?

8           MR. PASCIOCCO: Just, Officer Drauschke, if you  
9 could clarify when you were at the residence on Friday  
10 night and you said you observed tables and chairs --

11           OFFICER DRAUSCHKE: Correct.

12           MR. PASCIOCCO: -- can you just go into a  
13 little more detail as to what you observed?

14           OFFICER DRAUSCHKE: When I observed the tables  
15 and the chairs that were -- when you entered the  
16 residence from the entry that we went in the front that  
17 had been locked on Saturday, that's the door we went in  
18 on Friday night, and when we entered, you're  
19 immediately inside the kitchen. And the table and what  
20 was left of the table and the chairs were smashed in  
21 pieces on the ground, and it appeared that the only  
22 part that may have been somewhat intact was the table  
23 top itself, but it was flat on the ground, and  
24 everything else was splintered into pieces.

1 MR. PASCIUCCO: And the information that you had  
2 received was that Mr. Greenough had smashed the table  
3 and chairs?

4 OFFICER DRAUSCHKE: Correct.

5 MR. PASCIUCCO: Lieutenant Bulman alluded to  
6 it, but you were in full uniform --

7 OFFICER DRAUSCHKE: Correct.

8 MR. PASCIUCCO: -- on the evening in question?

9 OFFICER DRAUSCHKE: Correct.

10 MR. PASCIUCCO: And can you just describe in a  
11 little more detail what full uniform consists of.

12 OFFICER DRAUSCHKE: Full uniform I have my  
13 uniform shirt with badge, pen, name plate, color pins,  
14 duty pants. I carry search gloves, a notebook, also a  
15 fire department directions book. I have a full duty  
16 belt which consists of my firearm, two additional  
17 magazines, handcuffs, a flashlight, duty baton, a  
18 department issued radio, and also a QuikClot Pouch as  
19 well as duty boots and then I also had, as I mentioned,  
20 my knife that I use for work.

21 MR. PASCUICCO: Do you carry mace?

22 OFFICER DRAUSCHKE: Correct. And pepper spray.

23 MR. PASCUICCO: Pepper spray.

24 LIEUTENANT ABATE: Do you carry a Taser?

1           OFFICER DRAUSCHKE: We do not carry Tasers.

2           MR. PASCUICCO: And you weren't equipped with a  
3 body camera?

4           OFFICER DRAUSCHKE: No, sir.

5           DETECTIVE LIEUTENANT BULMAN: Anything else,  
6 Rich?

7           LIEUTENANT ABATE: When you came up on scene,  
8 you said you were met by Officer Vatcher?

9           OFFICER DRAUSCHKE: Officer Vatcher, from what  
10 I recall, is the first one I had spoke with and  
11 confirmed with him that they had actually seen the  
12 suspect inside the residence and he confirmed that.

13           LIEUTENANT ABATE: So you got more information  
14 from him when you came on?

15           OFFICER DRAUSCHKE: Correct. That was the  
16 additional information that I had gotten. I didn't  
17 unfortunately get to ask him many more questions  
18 because the fact the sergeant asking if anyone had been  
19 around to the back. So I was able to show up on  
20 scene, ask where the -- if they had confirmed -- if he  
21 could confirm that they had seen him inside, which he  
22 did, and recall asking where the -- where Officer  
23 Wilson was, and I recall him saying that he had been  
24 over speaking with the victims.



1           LIEUTENANT ABATE: Erik, are you right-handed  
2 or left-handed?

3           OFFICER DRAUSCHKE: I am left-handed.

4           LIEUTENANT ABATE: And you shoot with your left  
5 hand?

6           OFFICER DRAUSCHKE: Correct.

7           DETECTIVE LIEUTENANT BULMAN: I think that's  
8 going to conclude this interview. The time is 4:29  
9 p.m. I'm going to shut the recorder off at this time.
