INTERVIEW OF OFFICER KAYLYN GOOLEY

LIEUTENANT PAUL BULMAN, MASSACHUSETTS STATE POLICE
DETECTIVE MICHELLE HALLORAN, READING POLICE DEPARTMENT

FEBRUARY 4, 2018

LT. BULMAN: Good evening, it's approximately 12:10 1 p.m. on February 4th, 2018. Present are Lieutenant Paul Bulman, 2 3 Mass State Police, Middlesex District Attorney's Office, and 4 Detective Halloran from the Reading Police Department, and do 5 you mind stating your name for the record? OFC. GOOLEY: Kaylyn Gooley. 6 7 LT. BULMAN: And, your assignment? OFC. GOOLEY: I was working today, an overtime shift. 8 9 The 8 a.m. to 4 p.m. 10 LT. BULMAN: And what was your sector? 11 **OFC. GOOLEY:** It was Sector 1, Car 5. 12 LT. BULMAN: And Kaylyn, how long have you been a 13 police officer in Reading? 14 OFC. GOOLEY: It's going to be four years in July. 15 LT. BULMAN: And prior to Reading, were you employed by another agency prior to working in Reading? 16 17 OFC. GOOLEY: I was. I worked down in Orleans, Mass, 18 as a summer officer. I was a sworn summer officer. And then I 19 worked at three colleges. I worked at Curry College -20 LT. BULMAN: Hold on a second. How many years do you 21 think you did in Orleans? 2.2 It was just the summer, so a couple OFC. GOOLEY: 23 months. I think it was like three months.

| 22 | inside the building -inside t | he apartment. |
| 23 | LT. BULMAN: Okay | . Then what happened? |

OFC. GOOLEY: We arrived on scene. First it was

Officer Lee, then it was me, and Officer Wilson. When we arrived
on scene, the suspect - we weren't sure if he was inside his
apartment building, we've had past dealings, so we knew, where
he resided. We made contact with his brother, who works at the
gas station, he tried contacting him. He ended up making contact
with his brother stating that he was inside the apartment
building. At that point, we started trying to get in through the
front door, but we weren't able to because - there was the front
door, and then there was the apartment door on the inside.

LT. BULMAN: Okay.

OFC. GOOLEY: I was able to eventually to make contact with the other neighbor, in the other apartment, and I asked him to come down and open the front door and he did so.

LT. BULMAN: Do you remember his name? No one seemed to get his name.

OFC. GOOLEY: I didn't get his name.

LT. BULMAN: Okay. Alright. No biggie, we'll get it.

OFC. GOOLEY: Once we got in, we were standing in the hallway of the apartment complex, and we're knocking on the door heavily. The dead-bolt was locked, cause we had a key from the victim that came back - he gave us the key to the apartment, but unfortunately the key didn't work for the dead-bolt. It didn't work for the dead-bolt to the actual apartment building either.

- 1 We ended up trying to speak with the suspect through the door,
- 2 and then later he came to the window, where he stated that he
- 3 had a pipe, and that he was afraid -
- 4 LT. BULMAN: Were you at the window, or did you just
- 5 | hear this?
- 6 OFC. GOOLEY: I heard it.
- 7 LT. BULMAN: Through the door?
- 8 OFC. GOOLEY: Nope, I was standing outside and
- 9 Officer Wilson was standing at the window speaking.
- 10 LT. BULMAN: Okay. So at some point you're inside
- 11 | the common hallway -
- OFC. GOOLEY: Yup.
- 13 LT. BULMAN: With Officer Lee.
- OFC. GOOLEY: Yes.
- 15 LT. BULMAN: And is there someone else in there with
- 16 you?
- 17 **OFC. GOOLEY:** There was. It was Officer Vatcher.
- 18 LT. BULMAN: Vatcher.
- 19 **OFC. GOOLEY:** And Officer Kirwan (phonetic) was also
- 20 | there. At one point we were kind of like in and out.
- 21 LT. BULMAN: Officer Kirwan?
- 22 **DET. HALLORAN:** Fontes or Kirwan?
- OFC. GOOLEY: I'm sorry, Fontes.
- 24 LT. BULMAN: Fontes.

1 OFC. GOOLEY: Sorry. DET. HALLORAN: They're both relatively new, so 2 3 that's why -4 LT. BULMAN: Okay. Yup. Okay. 5 So, at that point - the victims were on OFC. GOOLEY: 6 scene, I was trying to talk to them, and I also was trying to 7 relay messages back, to try to find out about probable cause. 8 Initially, we showed up, knowing that we had probable cause to 9 get in, but then there was the question of whether or not we had 10 probable cause for arrest from the assault from the night prior, 11 involving the same individuals. The gentleman - the suspect -12 would not - refused to come out. We got word that he was 13 extremely agitated today and he assaulted his roommate, and 14 tried to throw a speaker at the roommate's girlfriend. 15 LT. BULMAN: Okay. And who told you this? The 16 victim? 17 OFC. GOOLEY: The roommate. 18 LT. BULMAN: The roommate? 19 OFC. GOOLEY: Yeah. I forget the victim - I forget 20 what his name was. 21 Okay. Just the roommate is fine. He LT. BULMAN: 22 relayed how agitated he was.

Yeah.

OFC. GOOLEY:

1 LT. BULMAN: And some of the violence that had 2 occurred?

OFC. GOOLEY: He stated that he - that the suspect - tried to go after him again today. Tried to punch him several times, but they ended up wrestling, and then the suspect tried to throw a speaker at the girlfriend and that's when the suspect's brother stepped in and separated the parties, and that's when the two victims were able to leave the building.

LT. BULMAN: Okay. Then what happened?

OFC. GOOLEY: From there, Officer Lee was still trying to communicate with the suspect through the door, trying to get him to calm down, to talk to us, even just through the door, to try to hear his side of the story. I was still outside at this time. Officer Silva arrived on scene, as well as Officer Drauschke. And we were trying to make a game plan - the FD was also on scene at some point, but then they ended up clearing. Sorry am I taking up the whole thing?

LT. BULMAN: Nope. No, no, no.

OFC. GOOLEY: I'm a long winded person.

LT. BULMAN: No.

OFC. GOOLEY: Let's see, at some point, we were standing outside, some people - some officers were going around to the back of the building. I know Officer Savio was one of them. Officer Wilson checked the back of the building at some

- point too. Again, it was still the question of the PC and what 1 we were going to do, once we were able to talk to the suspect 2 out of the house, or allow us to get into the house. And I 3 4 remember the suspect's brother came over and said - I asked him, 5 when I first arrived on scene if there was another door -6 because we knew there was a back door. And he said "No, that 7 back door goes to the other apartment", and I asked him "Well, 8 okay, is there any door that allows me to get in from the gas 9 station?" he goes "Nope, there's no door". Later on in the evening, he told me "The door's open. The door's unlocked" and 10 11 we were all like "What door? What are you talking about?" and we 12 walked over towards the gas station entrance - like where their 13 office is - and there's a door that led to the apartment 14 building, and he goes "It's unlocked. He left it unlocked." and 15 I was like "Why didn't you tell us this earlier?" So we made 16 entrance through that way. 17 LT. BULMAN: When you say we - who was you that made 18 entrance at that point? 19 OFC. GOOLEY: It was Officer Wilson, and Officer 20 Vatcher. Once we entered the building, we started to clear -21
- Vatcher. Once we entered the building, we started to clear what seemed to be the kitchen area. Then the dining room, it was
 all in disarray there was broken furniture everywhere. We then
 tried to open the door, where Officer Lee was where he was
 trying to make communication, but the door was bolted. We still

couldn't open it from the inside. We rounded the corner and we saw that the back window was open, and Officer Savio was already out back, and he said "I think he jumped out through the window".

LT. BULMAN: Who said that?

OFC. GOOLEY: Officer Savio.

7 LT. BULMAN: Officer Savio?

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OFC. GOOLEY: Yes. At that time, Officer Vatcher and I then went upstairs to try to clear. We heard that he may be outside, Officer Vatcher and I are making our way back down. That's when we heard "Shots fired". I ran out, through the door I entered, and I heard, on the radio it said that Drauschke -I'm sorry -Officer Drauschke said that he had him in the car, or near the cars - I can't really remember right now. I called for Erik, and there was a pause - I heard him - I went to - if you're facing the gas station, I went to left where all the vehicles are parked. I saw Erik crouched down. I had my weapon drawn, already. Erik said that he had the suspect down. That he had fired and I rounded the corner, I saw that Erik - the suspect was on the ground, on his knees, head down on the ground. I asked Officer Drauschke if there was any weapons, at which time he stated that he "Wasn't sure. The suspect wouldn't take his hands out of his pocket. He kept making comments of 'Shoot me. Shoot me."' He still had one arm tucked underneath

- 1 him. Officer Drauschke had his right arm behind his back,
- 2 | holding it. I -
- 3 LT. BULMAN: Can I back you up for one second?
- 4 OFC. GOOLEY: Oh, sorry. Yeah.
- 5 LT. BULMAN: No. Nope. You're doing great.
- 6 OFC. GOOLEY: I don't know if I'm like -
- 7 LT. BULMAN: You're doing great. Nope. I just want
- 8 to flush a few things out.
- 9 **OFC. GOOLEY:** Yes.
- 10 LT. BULMAN: So, you were upstairs, clearing the
- 11 second floor.
- OFC. GOOLEY: Yes.
- 13 LT. BULMAN: When you heard someone say "He's out by
- 14 | the cars". So you started making your way down the stairs?
- 15 **OFC. GOOLEY:** Yes.
- 16 LT. BULMAN: At that point you heard Officer
- 17 Drauschke say something over the radio?
- 18 **OFC. GOOLEY:** We heard "Shots fired".
- 19 LT. BULMAN: Shots fired.
- OFC. GOOLEY: Yeah.
- 21 LT. BULMAN: Did you actually hear the gunshots?
- OFC. GOOLEY: So I thought I did, but, like, now that
- 23 | I'm thinking about it, I'm not completely clear if I did or not.
- 24 LT. BULMAN: Okay.

Okay. And, several people described 1 LT. BULMAN: the suspect's position. Would you say - how would you describe 2 what the suspect - how the suspect was positioned, to the best 3 4 of your recollection? 5 OFC. GOOLEY: He was on his knees, like I said, right 6 arm behind his back, left arm tucked, and his head was face down 7 on the ground. 8 LT. BULMAN: Was his head facing towards the front 9 of the vehicle, or the driver's -10 OFC. GOOLEY: It was facing towards the front of the 11 vehicle. 12 LT. BULMAN: Okay. 13 OFC. GOOLEY: The passenger's door of the Hummer was 14 open at that time. 15 LT. BULMAN: Okay. 16 OFC. GOOLEY: And Officer Drauschke was facing in the 17 same direction. 18 LT. BULMAN: Okay. And at that point, Officer 19 Drauschke said what to you, again? Officer Drauschke told me that he fired 20 OFC. GOOLEY: 21 - that he didn't know if there was any weapons. That the suspect 2.2 wouldn't take his hands out of his pockets. He kept repeatedly

asking him to take his hands out of his pockets, but he refused.

That's when I quickly ran over - I holstered my weapon, ran

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- 1 over- I cuffed the hand that Officer Drauschke had, and we
- 2 quickly grabbed his other hand and cuffed the other hand.
- 3 LT. BULMAN: Okay. Initially, I think you said, Erik
- 4 | may have said he kept saying "Shoot me. Shoot me." Did he -
- 5 **OFC. GOOLEY:** The suspect kept saying "Shoot me.
- 6 | Shoot me." Yeah. Officer Drauschke told me that, while I was
- 7 asking what -
- 8 LT. BULMAN: Okay.
- 9 **OFC. GOOLEY:** Had happened.
- 10 LT. BULMAN: Drauschke had the right hand was
- 11 | holding the right hand (indiscernible) -
- 12 OFC. GOOLEY: Right hand was behind his back, yes.
- 13 LT. BULMAN: You ran over, grabbed the left hand -
- OFC. GOOLEY: Nope, I ran over, I initially quickly
- 15 cuffed the right hand that he already had.
- 16 **LT. BULMAN:** Okay.
- OFC. GOOLEY: And then, I grabbed the left hand and
- 18 | we cuffed the left hand.
- 19 LT. BULMAN: Okay. And then that's when Erik said he
- 20 kept saying "Shoot me. Shoot me."?
- 21 OFC. GOOLEY: Yes. Officer Drauschke said "I don't
- 22 know if he has any weapons. He kept saying 'Shoot me. Shoot me.'
- 23 | I kept asking him to show me his hands, and he refused." At that

time, we tried to do a quick pat down to see if he had any
weapons on him, and then we started rendering aid right away.

LT. BULMAN: Okay. Did you assist rendering aid?

OFC. GOOLEY: I did, yes.

LT. BULMAN: Okay. Can you tell me what Officer Lee did? Did he -

OFC. GOOLEY: Yup. So, I don't know who brought the medic bag over, someone brought the medic bag over. I asked for gauze right away. We noticed that he had a bullet hole, in his back. We quickly rolled him over, to the front. Officer Lee asked for a knife. He took Officer Drauschke's knife. He cut the suspect's shirt open, we then ripped it open. We noticed that there was two bullet holes. We started to grab some gauze to try to hold pressure. While I was holding pressure, Officer Lee started doing compressions.

LT. BULMAN: Okay. So, that's a little different.

So, the gauze was on the front of the chest, not the back of the chest? Or did you put gauze on the front and back?

OFC. GOOLEY: I initially started on the back, and then when we rolled him over, I started to put pressure on the front.

22 LT. BULMAN: Okay.

OFC. GOOLEY: His back was on the ground.

Okay. So there was gauze on his back, 1 LT. BULMAN: you just rolled him over? 2 3 OFC. GOOLEY: Yes. 4 LT. BULMAN: And the weight of his own body held 5 that gauze, and then you put additional gauze -I put gauze - yeah - on his front. 6 OFC. GOOLEY: 7 LT. BULMAN: And you -8 OFC. GOOLEY: I was holding it, yes. 9 LT. BULMAN: And Lee was doing chest compressions? 10 OFC. GOOLEY: And Lee was doing chest compressions, 11 and then we got the Ambu bag. 12 LT. BULMAN: Yup. 13 OFC. GOOLEY: And Officer Savio started to do the 14 Ambu bag. 15 LT. BULMAN: Okay. 16 OFC. GOOLEY: If I'm talking too fast, let me -17 LT. BULMAN: Nope. Not at all. That's why I have the 18 recorder. I mumble too. 19 OFC. GOOLEY: 20 LT. BULMAN: So you guys did chest compressions 21 until relieved by EMS? 2.2 OFC. GOOLEY: So he ended up starting to choke on his own blood. At that point, I started to open his mouth, and I 23

turned his head to the side - the suspect. I also tried to get

the blood to come out. Rescue started to come - they started to 1 2 get prepared. They started wiping his chest down. They put on 3 the AED pads. Officer Lee was still doing compressions. Officer 4 Savio was still doing the Ambu bag. I was still trying to apply pressure. That's when Officer Lee asked for relief. I relieved 5 6 Officer Lee. I started to do compressions. Because of my angle, 7 I was up at the head of the suspect. Officer Vatcher said "I 8 have better angle, why don't you let me do it?" That's when 9 Officer Vatcher stepped in, he started to do compressions. 10 Again, Officer Savio, still was -11 LT. BULMAN: Doing the -12 OFC. GOOLEY: Doing the Ambu bag, and at the same 13 time, I then took over supporting the head, and trying to make 14 sure he wasn't choking on the blood anymore. 15 LT. BULMAN: Okay. 16 And then, that's when the paramedics OFC. GOOLEY: stepped in, and they -17 18 LT. BULMAN: Okay. 19 OFC. GOOLEY: They took over. 20 LT. BULMAN: Did you get any of his blood on you? 21 OFC. GOOLEY: I did.

Were you gloved?

I was gloved, yes.

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    I haven't moved." I then labeled the two shell casings, and I

    stayed put, until I was relieved.

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OFC. GOOLEY: At first, it was Detective Holmes. He 1 allowed me to warm up for a few minutes, and then I 2 3 came back out and then I was back on scene. 4 LT. BULMAN: Okay. 5 At the time. But there was also -OFC. GOOLEY: 6 Sergeant Silva was still in the area at the time too. They both 7 knew that I needed to thaw out my toes. 8 LT. BULMAN: Was it readily apparent to you that 9 this - he was in very critical condition? 10 OFC. GOOLEY: Yes. 11 LT. BULMAN: Okav. 12 OFC. GOOLEY: We also kept checking his pulse. I 13 checked his pulse. Officer Lee checked his pulse. While doing 14 the Ambu bag, and the CPR. We were trying to see if he had a 15 pulse the entire time that we were there. 16 LT. BULMAN: Okay. And did he? 17 OFC. GOOLEY: It was hard for me to tell. At first, 18 when I first came across him he did, and he was making noises -19 that was before -20 LT. BULMAN: Yeah. 21 OFC. GOOLEY: When I was putting cuffs on him. As we 22 were working him, it just seemed, that he didn't have a pulse. 23 LT. BULMAN: Okay. 24 OFC. GOOLEY: And he wasn't breathing.

LT. BULMAN: So, did Erik say anything else to you, 1 after that initial statement? He just kept saying "Shoot me. 2 3 Shoot me." And he wouldn't take his hands out of the pockets. 4 OFC. GOOLEY: I didn't ask -5 LT. BULMAN: Okay. **OFC. GOOLEY:** Officer Drauschke anything. The only 6 7 thing I asked him was if he was okay. And he said "Yup". 8 LT. BULMAN: Okay. 9 OFC. GOOLEY: And that was it. 10 LT. BULMAN: Okay. 11 OFC. GOOLEY: I knew not to ask him any further 12 questions. 13 LT. BULMAN: So you stayed on scene until you were 14 relieved, and then you came right back here. 15 OFC. GOOLEY: Yeah. I'm sorry, yes. Once we were 16 relieved, myself, Officer Lee, we took one cruiser back to the 17 station and we were directed to stay in the Sergeant's Office. 18 LT. BULMAN: Okay. And someone told you not to 19 discuss -20 OFC. GOOLEY: Yes. 21 The incident, amongst yourselves? LT. BULMAN: 2.2 OFC. GOOLEY: Yes. 23 And you didn't? LT. BULMAN: 24 OFC. GOOLEY: No.

1 LT. BULMAN: Okay. And then at some point, you left

2 | the station, only to get medical treatment?

OFC. GOOLEY: Yes.

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LT. BULMAN: And then you came right back?

OFC. GOOLEY: And then we came right back. Yes.

LT. BULMAN: And again, you didn't talk to anyone -

OFC. GOOLEY: No.

LT. BULMAN: About the incident? Okay. Can you think of anything else? Had you ever had any interaction with this individual?

11 OFC. GOOLEY: Yes, I have.

LT. BULMAN: Okay. Did you ever arrest him?

OFC. GOOLEY: We did not arrest - I did not arrest

14 him on the incident that I was in.

15 LT. BULMAN: Can you describe that incident?

OFC. GOOLEY: Sure. It was - I was on an overnight shift, which was the 12 p.m. to 8 a.m. shift. It was early in the morning - I want to say it was around 1 o'clock. We got dispatched to the same apartment building. It was for him - it was for medical treatment for him - he said he wasn't feeling well. He said he felt sick, and he needed medical assistance. I arrived on scene, as well, with a couple other officers, because we had past dealings with him, knowing that he didn't like

police. When we arrived on scene, he barricaded himself in the

- 1 apartment. He wouldn't come out for us, even though we were
- 2 | there for his own medical treatment. We also had an ambulance on
- 3 the scene as well. Sorry.
- 4 LT. BULMAN: No. It's okay. You can keep going, I'm
- 5 just taking it in shorthand.
- 6 OFC. GOOLEY: Oh, okay. I finally was able to talk
- 7 | him to come out of the building with the help of his roommate
- 8 | helped me talk him to come out of the building. At that point,
- 9 he was ranting and yelling, that he was beaten up before, and he
- 10 | didn't like police, and he didn't trust us, and he wouldn't come
- 11 | near us, that he thought we were going to beat him up, and I
- 12 explained that we weren't, we were there for his needs. At that
- 13 point, he agreed that he would talk to the paramedics, if we
- 14 | would kind of stand a couple feet away from him. He kept trying
- 15 to, like, move away he was very nervous and agitated. At that
- 16 time, his roommate told me he had been drinking heavily, and
- 17 | that he had, extreme, like, emotions, throughout the evening. We
- 18 finally got him to agree to go into the ambulance. He went in
- 19 the ambulance, and we had an officer follow behind, where he was
- 20 then transported to the hospital.
- 21 **LT. BULMAN:** And how long ago was this, prior to
- 22 today? Was -
- OFC. GOOLEY: It was last year.
- 24 **LT. BULMAN:** It was last year?

| 8 | LT. BULMAN: Okay. |
| 9 | OFC. GOOLEY: So you had that one time. Did you have |
| 10 | any other interactions with him prior to today? |
| 11 | OFC. GOOLEY: I don't believe so. |
| 12 | LT. BULMAN: Okay. But, was he a frequent flier? Was |
| 13 | he known to you guys? |
| 14 | OFC. GOOLEY: He was known to us. |
| 15 | LT. BULMAN: Okay. |
| 16 | OFC. GOOLEY: We've been there several times. Every |
| 17 | time, you know - the last time I got sent there, I was given the |
| 18 | heads up, you know, not to go alone, that he will be aggressive, |
| 19 | that he will fight. Like I said, tonight, he made threats to use |
| 20 | a pipe. We didn't know what he had in his apartment. |
| 21 | LT. BULMAN: Did you hear that threat also? |
| 22 | OFC. GOOLEY: I did. It was through - he said it. |
| 23 | LT. BULMAN: He said the word "pipe"? |
| 24 | OFC. GOOLEY: That's what I heard. Yeah. |

OFC. GOOLEY: Oh, pole, yeah. Pole.

5 | - I remember him stating that, because we - at that point, we

6 knew, that he wasn't going to come willingly.

OFC. GOOLEY: I was standing - so, Officer Lee was by the door. It was Officer Fontes, and then it was me, I was standing on the deck. And Officer Wilson was by the window, and Officer Wilson was talking to the suspect through the window, and that's when the comment was made. The brother kept stating that he was trying to talk him down, but at the same time, he kept saying that his brother was going to fight us if we tried to go in there, and that because there were so many officers, he was going to fight us - for us to be prepared if we walked in there.

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OFC. GOOLEY: Anthony, yes.

I 11 could smell puke and alcohol coming off his breath. 12 LT. BULMAN: Okay. 13 OFC. GOOLEY: As I was - I was that close to his 14 face. 15 How about his eyes? Were his eyes LT. BULMAN: 16 closed? 17 OFC. GOOLEY: His eyes were wide open. 18 LT. BULMAN: Yeah. 19 OFC. GOOLEY: They were just kind of, like, 20 pinpointed at one point. 21 LT. BULMAN: Red? Glassy? 2.2 OFC. GOOLEY: I remember looking at them, and I just 23 remember knowing they were open, but I wasn't paying attention.

I knew that he was an alcoholic and that he has used before, in

- 1 | the past. So, when I smelt the alcohol, I wasn't surprised. I
- 2 | also closed the car door, I don't think I mentioned that. After
- 3 | we cuffed him, and I came around front to the front of -
- 4 LT. BULMAN: You closed the door?
- 5 **OFC. GOOLEY:** I was the one that closed the door. I
- 6 | wasn't sure if there was any weapons, so I wanted to close the
- 7 door to make sure that there was nothing in reach.

- 10 | door, but I didn't see anything inside.

- OFC. GOOLEY: So there were a couple civilians on
- 15 | scene my main concern, after the whole thing happened, was his
- 16 | brother. It was just kind of weird, the fact that when I asked
- 17 him about the door and then he told me there was no door, but
- 18 | then magically, there was a door, and it was unlocked.
- 19 LT. BULMAN: Yeah.
- OFC. GOOLEY: It kind of felt like he was helping his
- 21 brother, in a way?
- 22 LT. BULMAN: Mhm.
- 23 **OFC. GOOLEY:** Because then his brother wasn't in the
- 24 apartment, when he was in the apartment not too long ago because

we were just talking to him through the window. Sorry, at the 1 time that I was running to Officer Drauschke, to back him up, 2 3 the brother, was running towards me shouting "He shot my 4 brother! He shot my brother!" And I remember wondering why he 5 was already in the area where Officer Drauschke was? I didn't 6 understand, like, he was literally by the front door when we 7 started to do our walk through, and we told him to stay put. And 8 then, somehow he ended up near Officer Drauschke, and he saw his 9 brother. I let Detective Holmes know that he should be -10 definitely one to be questioned, because I wasn't sure what his

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OFC. GOOLEY: At the time that his brother escaped the apartment.

LT. BULMAN: Okay. So besides Anthony and the second floor gentleman who opened the common hallway door, can you think of anyone else we should talk to?

OFC. GOOLEY: I don't know if they saw much, but I do know the two victims were on scene. The roommate and the girlfriend. They were sitting in the car, on the other side of where the incident had occurred. There was also the gentlemen that works at the gas station. They were in the central area -
