9	you've been a Police Off:	icer here in the city - the Town of
10	Reading?	
11	OFC. FONTES:	Sworn, or started the academy?
12	LT. BULMAN:	Both.
13	OFC. FONTES:	Started the academy in March of 2017.
14	LT. BULMAN:	Okay.
15	OFC. FONTES:	Graduated in August, and I've been on
16	since August, so, about	five months.

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    of 4 o'clock, as far as time, I don't remember what time it was,
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    off the top of my head, but we got a call for an assault that
    had taken place at 1462 Main Street, the gas station. There is
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    an apartment located next to the side of that gas station. It's
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- 1 | a little bit between commercial and residential. And just that
- 2 |- there was the reporting party stated that he was assaulted
- 3 by his roommate. So we got there, the reporting party was there,
- 4 but the suspect was not there. That's the same party involved in
- 5 today's shooting.
- 6 **LT. BULMAN:** Okay.
- 7 **OFC. FONTES:** So, he -
- 8 LT. BULMAN: That was your call though, that
- 9 assignment? Ended up being your call?
- 10 **OFC. FONTES:** I was backup.
- 11 **LT. BULMAN:** Okay.
- 12 **OFC. FONTES:** I was backup for that call. Yup.
- 13 LT. BULMAN: So you didn't write the report?
- 14 **OFC. FONTES:** I did not write the report.
- 15 **LT. BULMAN:** Okay. Do you know who did?
- OFC. FONTES: But I was present on scene.
- 17 LT. BULMAN: Who did?
- 18 OFC. FONTES: Yup. It was Officer Vatcher.
- 19 LT. BULMAN: Vatcher did. Okay.
- OFC. FONTES: Yup.
- 21 LT. BULMAN: Think I had you two confused on that.
- 22 Alright, so, you're the backup, did you talk to any of the
- 23 | victims? Did you get any statements?

Yeah, so Officer Vatcher was primary, 1 OFC. FONTES: so he spoke to the victim there, but I filled out an injury 2 worksheet - domestic injury worksheet - for that victim. He had 3 4 - he had like, marks around his lips that were bleeding. He had a - he had a scratch around his neck that was bleeding. And he 5 had redness on the side of his - the left side of his head. And 6 7 he said that his roommate had put him in a headlock and 8 attempted to strangle him. That night, after he came home drunk 9 from a wake, he attempted to kick the door in, because he had 10 trouble opening the door. Came inside, got into an argument. 11 Then they got into a scuffle. The roommate broke the table, the 12 kitchen table. It's a large, wooden kitchen table, shattered in 13 pieces all over the ground. So - but like I had said, he had 14 left, the reporting party said that he left with a female in a 15 vehicle that was an unknown description. 16 LT. BULMAN: Okay. 17

OFC. FONTES: So, we took the report from them, we documented the injuries, and I believe we put a BOLO out for PC to arrest him, for domestic A & B.

LT. BULMAN: Okay. So that was last night, so transitioning back to today, so -

OFC. FONTES: Yeah.

23 LT. BULMAN: So you got told you had to head down

24 there.

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OFC. FONTES: That I got to head down there. Yup. I got in Car 14, I started heading down there when Sergeant Silva called me on the radio and told me to head to Lobster Claw, which was across the line in North Reading, on Main Street. And that the victims were no longer - that the reporting parties - who were the victims, were no longer at 1462 Main Street, and that they were at the Lobster Claw, and they were going to meet me there because they did not feel safe because the individual that had assaulted them - which was the same party from the night before that assaulted them - was still inside the house.

LT. BULMAN: Okay.

OFC. FONTES: So, I got to Lobster Claw. I was told that they were going to be in a green Dodge Caravan. There was no vehicle matching that description, I called it in. They said that they had called back the reporting party and they said that they were going to meet us back at 1462 Main Street. So I arrived, Officers Gooley, Lee, and Wilson were already on scene. They were at the door - there's two doors to the residence there. There's an outer door, and there's an inner door. They were at the outer door, they were having trouble getting into that door. They said that they needed to check to make sure that he was inside the apartment, so I stood to the side of the building - there's a window on the side of the building that I was just standing by to make sure he didn't jump out. They were

telling me that one of the doors was dead-bolted, so initially they had to call the fire department down to open the door. And then the person that was inside the house - or allegedly inside the house - his brother was on scene, and said that yeah, his brother was inside the house and he had him on cell phone, trying to get him to come outside, but that wasn't going to work. He said that the - he said the reporting party might have a key to get inside. So the reporting party showed up, but the key didn't work. But eventually, we were able to get the front door open, and then the second door was dead-bolted as well, and so the key wouldn't work on that door, so they couldn't get - so we couldn't get in. So, there was question whether there was PC or not - if there was PC from the night before to go in and arrest him. So, Officers Wilson, Vatcher - Vatcher - Officer Vatcher had arrived, because he had showed up to the station earlier as well, so, he had - Sergeant Silva sent him up to the scene, because he wrote the report from the incident from the night before. So they were discussing the PC and they were in contact with Sergeant Silva, who was in contact with Lieutenant Brown, about the PC. I was inside the hallway, inside the residence, with Officer Lee. We were outside that secondary door that was dead-bolted, and, at this point, we could hear the subject inside, he was screaming, because he was on the phone with his brother, who was trying to get him outside, just to

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open the door. The subject inside was concerned about us coming in and "bundling him" as he stated. He said that he was going to fight us. We told the brother that we weren't looking to hurt him at all, we just wanted to hear his side of the story, and get to the bottom of things. And the brother conveyed that to him, over the phone, but we could hear the subject inside the house screaming that "He wasn't going to let anyone in" and that he "Knew his rights" and so forth. So at that point Officer Lee tried talking to him through the door, but he wasn't responding. He tried, he tried talking to him even more, and he just was told like - he just saying like "Go F yourself. Go F yourself. I'm not gonna let you in". At that point, the brother, was still on the phone, trying to talk to him, to get him out. And we could hear the subject getting more and more aggressive inside, more banging, more screaming, louder, he was screaming louder into the phone to talk to his brother. At that point, we started hearing - the door started shaking, because he was hitting it with something. And he stated that he had a pole, and that if we open the door, or breech the door, he was going to assault us with the pole. So at that point I let the guys know that - I wasn't sure if they had cleaned up the kitchen table, that was broken from the night before, and I said that the pegs, the wooden pegs from the table, still had nails in them, pointing out, the sharp side - just to be aware - if that might be what

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he considered a pole. So, he still wasn't interested in talking to us, and eventually, the brother said that he would open a window and talk to one of the officers, so he opened the window next to the door and Officer Wilson went up and he talked to him. And it was just - the subject inside just insulting Officer Wilson, just screaming obscenities at him - and then he slammed the window shut. At that point, we didn't hear anything else from the subject inside the house, and, it turns out that, at one point, the brother told us, that - he's like "I'm gonna try and get inside the house. See if he'll let me in, and then I'll open the door for you guys". We said "Okay". So the brother - I guess there was a side door that connects to the gas station. So we're on the right side, here, on the left side, there's another side door. And the brother went over there and I quess he - and I guess the subject inside the house - he came out through that door, to talk to the brother, and then went back in, slammed the door. But I guess he had never locked it. So, the brother came around the side - back around the side and said "Hey guys, that door's unlocked". And around this time, Officers Savio and Drauschke, and Sergeant Silva were on scene. Officer Savio went around to the back of the house and stated that there was a window open. And at that point, I'm not sure which officers because I was still in the - the hallway there, with the deadbolted door. I believe some officers went around side and opened

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1 | that - went through that side door that he left unlocked - and

OFC. FONTES: Just in case - he tried to - with the officers come in through that side door, just in case he tried to leave, through that door, thinking that no one was on that

OFC. FONTES: At that point, they stated that he wasn't inside the residence, and that he had possibly gone through the back window, and ran somewhere. So I had walked out of that hallway with Officer Lee, we walked down the stairs, and the officers that were - had gone through the side door, had started canvassing the left side of the property there, where the cars were parked. And I was with Sergeant Silva, Officer Wilson was there, and then moments later we heard - I heard two

gunshots. Initially, we thought that the subject had fired,

at first, we thought that it was possibly an officer had been shot. And then - I believe Officer Drauschke -

OFC. FONTES: Yup.

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LT. BULMAN: You kind of lost me a little bit.

6 OFC. FONTES: Yup.

7 LT. BULMAN: Right before you heard the two gunshots

8 - what did you just say?

9 **OFC. FONTES:** Sergeant -

LT. BULMAN: You stayed with Lee at the front door -

OFC. FONTES: Well, we were - we were walking out.

12 LT. BULMAN: Yeah.

OFC. FONTES: We had walked down the steps and we

14 | were kind of conveyed on the - like right in front of the house.

15 **LT. BULMAN:** Yeah.

16 OFC. FONTES: Officer Wilson was there and Sergeant

17 | Silva was there, kind of like "Okay, we're going to have to set

18 | a perimeter, to start looking for this guy". And there were some

19 officers on the left side of the property, starting a canvass,

20 for him. And at that point, we heard two gunshots.

21 **LT. BULMAN:** Okay. And then what happened?

OFC. FONTES: Like I said, we were unsure if it was

23 | an officer shooting or if it was the subject shooting. We didn't

24 hear anything over the radio right away, and then we heard

Officer Drauschke come over the radio and we heard "Shots fired". So we started running towards that direction. And then when I got over to where everyone was running to, it was - there was - I don't know who was where, but there was two or three officers around the subject, that had been shot. They'd begun CPR and Sergeant Silva immediately ordered me to get an Ambu bag with Officer Vatcher, so I ran to Car 14 and Officer Vatcher ran to Car 1. Officer Vatcher got the bag out first, so I assisted him over back over to the subject who had been shot. And Officer Vatcher jumped right in and started working him with the guys, and handing them supplies. At that point - around that time, we called for the Fire Department and Rescue to come down. The fire department had left the scene, because we - once we figured out the side door was open, they weren't needed, so we cleared them from the scene, but it wasn't that long, they were just down the street. So they returned, I ran out to the street to direct the fire department in, because based on where the cars were, it was a confined area, and all the officers around the subject who had been shot, trying to help him - I wasn't going to be of any use, so, I ran out to the street to direct the fire department in. And the first engine, they got out, and they started heading towards the residence of the apartment, so I had to direct them back over to the subject who had been shot. And after that, I taped off the - I started taping off the area.

17	OFC. FONTES:	Correct.
18	LT. BULMAN:	And who was that?
19	OFC. FONTES:	Sergeant Silva.

21	LT. BULMAN:	Are you aware of any civilian witnesses
22	that may have observed i	t? Did you - did you see anybody that we
23	should talk to, that we	may not know about?

Sergeant Silva told me to get everyone 1 OFC. FONTES: in the areas ID. There were a few workers, and possibly patrons-2 3 I don't know - I couldn't distinguish between the two. In the 4 gas station lobby area -5 LT. BULMAN: And did you get all their names? 6 OFC. FONTES: By the pumps. Correct. Yeah. Me and 7 Officer Wilson collected everyone's ID and then at that point I 8 had to finish taping up the scene, so I transferred all the IDs 9 over to him. Officer Wilson? 10 LT. BULMAN: 11 OFC. FONTES: Officer Wilson. And I informed Sergeant 12 Silva that Officer Wilson would be taking over the duty of 13 collecting everyone's ID and information, while I taped off the 14 rest of the crime scene. 15 (PAUSE) 16 LT. BULMAN: Then you came back here and you've 17 basically been waiting ever since. 18 OFC. FONTES: Correct. 19 Okay. Had you ever had any previous LT. BULMAN: 20 encounters with this subject? Other than the previous night? Had 21 you ever encountered -2.2 No, I haven't. OFC. FONTES: 2.3 LT. BULMAN: No. 24 (PAUSE)
